Overnight Permissions

A general permission form, signed by the parents, must be on file for freshmen in the Dean of Students' office before college convenes. If a student's General Permission does not give her a blanket privilege for overnight visits to the destination of her own choosing, the student must have a special letter sent by her parents to the Dean of Students regarding visits away from the campus other than to her home. Each student is responsible for knowing and observing the terms stated in her individual permission form. A student with overnight permission does not negate college regulations or expectations specified elsewhere in the Handbook.

Curfew Hours

In order to preserve the security of the students and the buildings, each residence hall is locked at the closing hour. (Any student unlocking a locked door after curfew will be dealt with by the Honor Court.) Freshmen and Sophomores without self-determining hours should be inside and signed in at the following hours:

Sunday-Thursday 12:30 a.m.

Friday-Saturday 2:00 a.m.

Campus Code

It is not intended that all possible student affairs and/or disciplinary matters be discussed in this HANDBOOK. Such omissions in no way imply that the Honor Court, Student Government, and/or College Administration does not have authority to deal with any situation which arises and establish a policy or precedent when necessary. Any special cases will be handled by the Judiciary or Honor Court. In the event that a student feels she has been unjustly dealt with by the Judiciary or Honor Court, she may appeal the decision to the President of the College and/or the College Council. She also has the opportunity to obtain legal assistance.






A Voice of My Own




