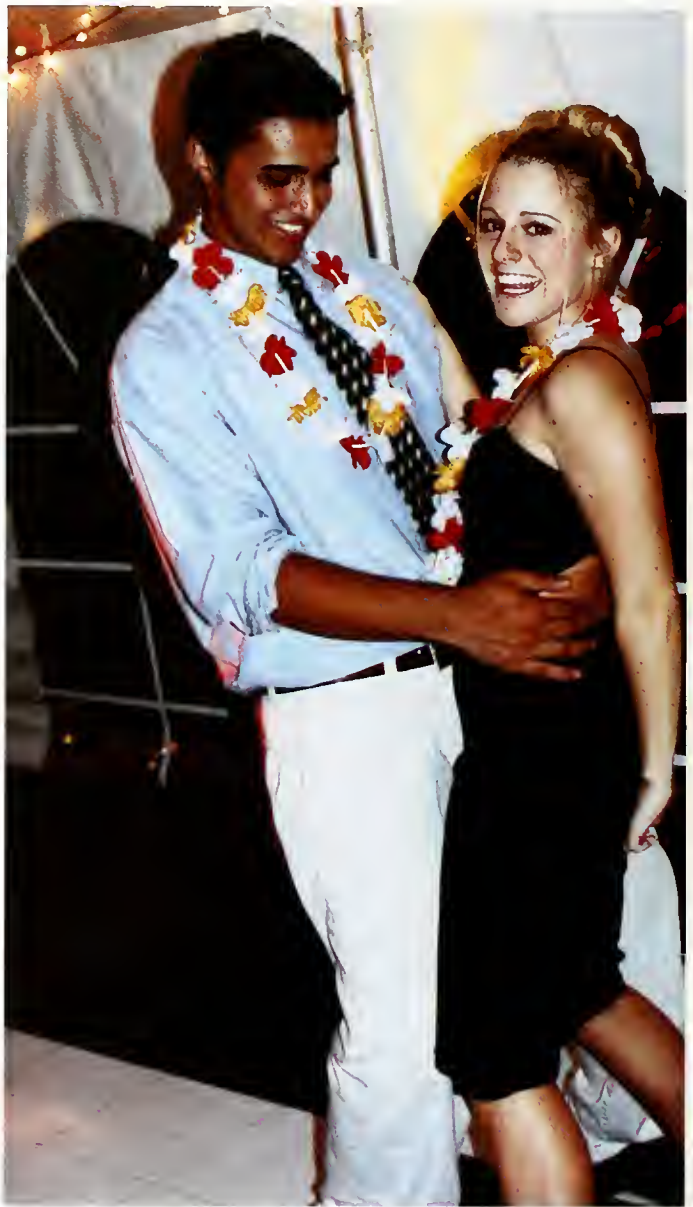

"A Shayna Maidel:" a pretty girl. Peace College Theatre's presentation of Barbara Lebow's play tells the story of two "pretty girls." Set in West Side, New York City, Rose Weiss's everyday life is turned awry in 1946 with the arrival of her older sister Lusya Weiss Pechenik. The Weiss family lived in Poland prior to WWII, though as a baby, Rose and her father, Mordechai, left the country before the onset of the war. They left to seek out a better life in America, and once established, the plan was to bring the rest of the family over. The war upset these plans, to say the least. Over twenty years later, the Americanized Rose is shocked to learn from her father that her Holocaust survivor sister, Lusya, will be coming to live with her. Both sisters, now thrust together by a domineering, earnest father, each face a period of adjustment. Rose strives to embrace her family heritage, while Lusya deals with her own inner battles from the Holocaust. Lusya faces memories of Mama and Hanna, as well as longings for her missing husband, Duvid, now separated due to the war. Each member of the family comes with vastly different experiences, and the family must learn to draw together to receive strength and healing.

Speaking out against the cruelty of animal testing and experimentation, the Peace College Theatre production of Paul Zindel's "Let Me Hear You Whisper" brought technologically advanced puppetry to the stage. This story begins when ABADABA (American Biological Association Development for the Advancement of Brain Analysis), a research company, hires a new cleaning woman, Helen (played by Melissa Lee). Under the direction of the eternally perky Miss Moray (Brittany Allen), Head of Custodial Engineering, Helen begins to clean one of the many labs during the night shift. However, this lab houses Specimen 4: a dolphin undergoing experimentation led by Dr. Crocus (Megan Brown) and Mrs. Fridge (Emily Feimster). As tender-hearted Helen develops a friendship with the dolphin, she also meets Danielle (Maggie Cochran), Night Porter on the fifth through ninth floors. Eventually, Helen has to make a decision once she learns the truth surrounding the dolphin. The dolphin puppet was brought to Peace Theatre through Rickey Boyd and Richard Goodman. After training, students Jeaneal Guy, Caroline Boney and Johanna Stevens handled the dolphin puppet to create the magic on the stage, creating quite a realistic product. A special lecture was held for the college on puppetry, giving people an opportunity to ask questions and see exactly how this remarkable piece works. This was yet another great Peace production.

Tartuffe

Religious hypocrisy, adultery and deception mark the world of Moliere's *Tartuffe*. The play revolves around Tartuffe (Brian McMurray): a hypocrite who deceives people under the guise of an evangelical figure. Orgon (Brittany Allen) finds Tartuffe and immediately falls under his spell. He welcomes Tartuffe into his home where the evil man begins to seep his way into usurping Orgon's wealth, as well as his wife. Initially, everyone idolizes the "saint," especially Orgon's mom, Madame Pernelle (Keisha Miller) and her blind maid Flipote (Megan Brown.) After a short time, Tartuffe rules the house with his slick followers, the Tartuffe-o-maniacs (Blake McMurray, Katy Pulley, and Nina Hafner) and his sidekick Laurent (Maggie Cochran), who in reality is an undercover agent. Orgon arranges a marriage between Tartuffe and his naive daughter, Mariane (Meghan Beeler), despite her pleadings to marry her football-loving boyfriend Valere (Kristen Brackett) instead. Meanwhile, Orgon remains oblivious to Tartuffe's attempts to seduce his sexy wife, Elmire (Jeaneal Guy.) With the help of Dorine (Melissa Lee) the sassy maid, Cleante (Emily Feimster) the brother-in-law with a neck brace, and Orgon's rebellious son, Damis (Adrienne McDaniel) the household realizes Tartuffe's deceit. But the family finds that Tartuffe has already taken steps to assure his con. Only Loyal (Rachel Morris) the local bailiff can help the family regain what is lost. This musical features 10 original songs including, "Here in the Dark," "This is Just Like That," and "An Revoir Tartuffe--Hello Jesus." The scores were composed by guest artist Paul Hamilton with lyrics by Peace College student Brittany Allen and director Kenny Gannon. This "seventeenth century masterpiece presented in a ridiculous manner with only one period costume" marks an amusing, satirical look at religious hypocrisy.

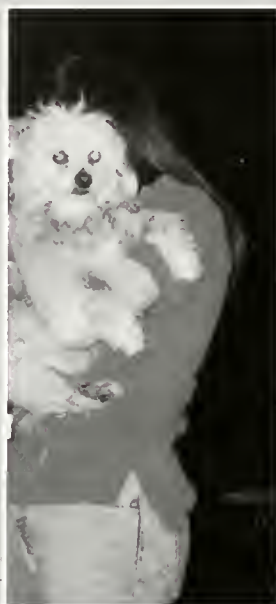

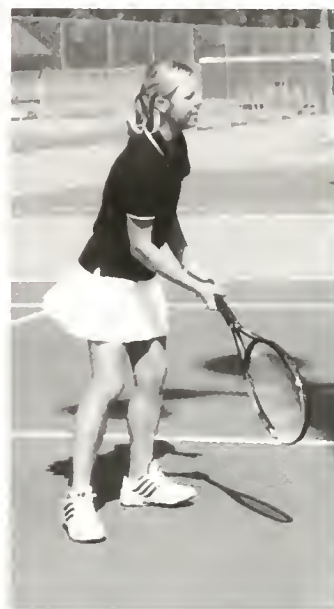

This year, Peace sponsored the Organizational Studies Division Student Presentations. Students presented various works, such as web sites, videos and scientific research, to faculty members and other students. The

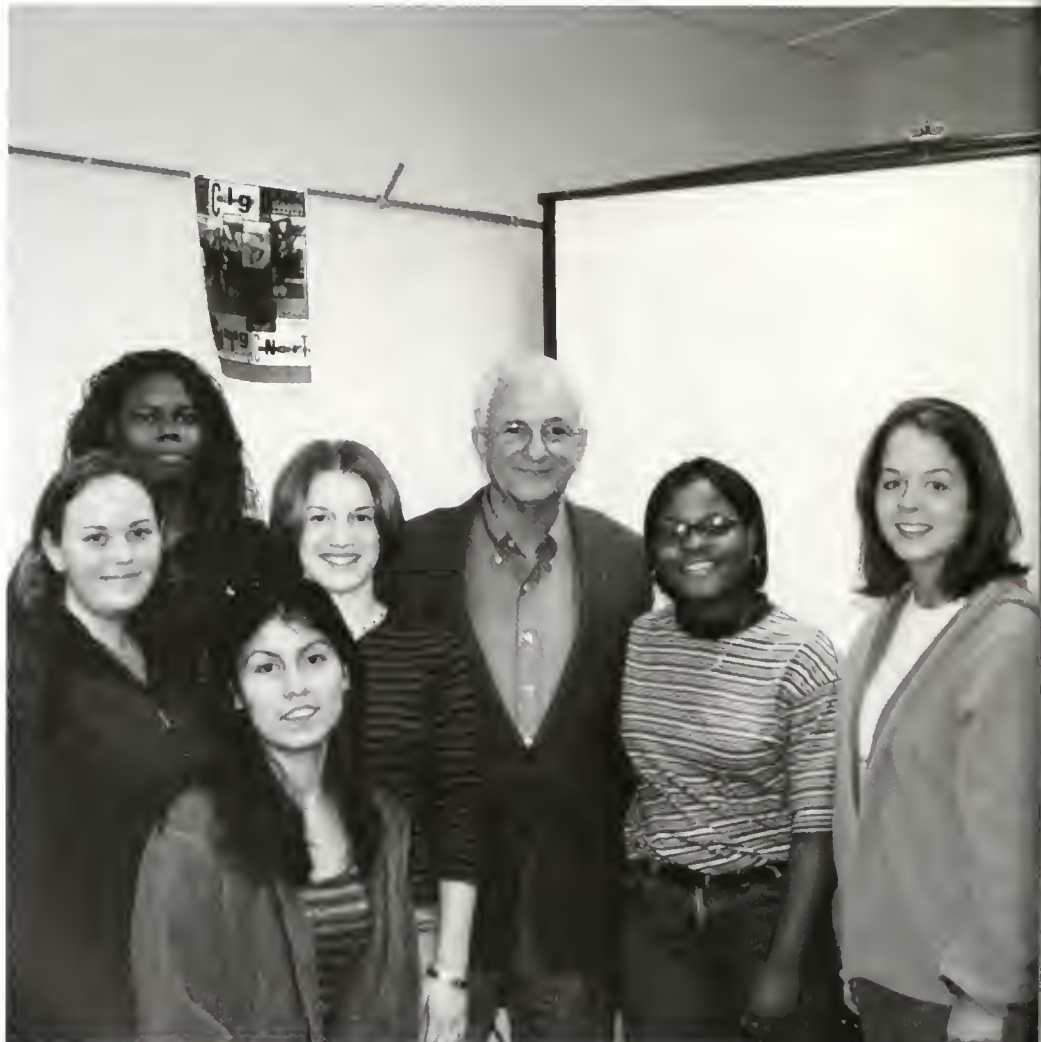
