

In sincere appreciation of all that they did for our school as they passed this way, we lovingly dedicate this book. "To live in the hearts of those we leave behind is not to die."






Surrounded by oaks, beautiful with age, stands our beloved Alma Mater. For many years its doors have stood ajar, beckoning to all those who seek to learn.




ANN BURT


JOYCE SPIVEY (moscot)






