"Moments To Remember"

Now as a wonderful dream is abaut to become a reality, thoughts wind themselves among events that have became immortalized in our hearts. These we shall attempt to preserve here so that they may commemorate forever what we have shared together.

Saturday, September eighth, nineteen hundred, fifty-six, marked the starting point in our lives in our chosen career of nursing. We arrived and were greeted by Sister Mary Gertrude, Sister Mary Carmel and upper classmen. We were shawn to the roams which were to become aur new homes. Sister Gertrude with her graciausness reminded us that she would assume the rale of aur mother away fram home — a part which she played to the fullest capacity. Our first glance at the haspital with its strange, unmistakable medicinal odars, and its busy corridors gave us a new and heretafore unexperienced thrill.

At six a'clock, P.M., thirty-five happy student nurses marched in carrying in our hands the symbol af our achievement, aur cap.

After a shart vacatian we returned to resume our duties. Everything seemed different now that we were wearing our caps. In August we began night duty and the weeks and months that lay ahead were filled with new adventures, many happy, many sad. Along the wayside many af our classmates departed far various reasons and with each one went a partion af each af us for the things we had shared together. During our Junior year Sister Mary Jerame came as aur directar.

February marked our first separation when affiliation to Dix Hill began for our class.

Summer passed and then the fall and September saw another plateau reached, we received our blue bands, signifying that we were seniors.

Our Senior Year has been a happy one but as it canvenes we look with ambivalence toward graduatian when we will feel sorrow for the familiar faces we will miss, the happy times we have shared; and happiness for the successful abtaining of our goal. We go forth with a culmination of knowledge with which we shall sustain and nourish the soul as well as the body of man and in the darkness may we be the light.






