Che Student Council, with faculty advice, provides the student government of Durham High School. Its purpose is to train students in the vorrect method of government.
Each of the tweny-nine home rooms has a vepresentative. The president of a home room dutomatically becomes the Council representative from his home room. These representatives assemble in a meeting on the first Wednesday of each month.

All officers for the Council are nominated and elected by the student body. The officers, who must be seniors of good scholarship and citizenship, serve both semesters of the school year. The president and vice-president are elected in the spring for the following year. The officers, secretary and treasurer, are elected in the fall for that year.
The Student Council sponsors lunch line supervision, and socials on Friday afternoons. Representatives from various home rooms serve at assigned posts of duty during lunch periods.

Those on duty are signified by Durham High School arm bands. All students may attend Friday socials and dance to the tunes of popular recordings, provided they pay a small admission fee to defray necessary expenses.

The 1940-1941 Council proposed an amendment to the school constitution. Heretofore there was no set date for the election of officers for the student body, senior, junior, sophomore classes, and the home rooms. The amendment set a specific date for the nomination, elimination, and election of the officers of each of these. The senior officers are nominated on the last Wednesday in September; eliminated on the next day, Thursday; and elected the following day, Friday. The junior and sophomore officers are elected in a similar fashion, the junior election being held one week later; the sophomore election, two weeks later.

This amendment was ratified by the student body and approved by Mr. Holton, principal.

## The Hi-Rachet

The Hi-Rocket as the official news organ of the high school community has tried to present an unbiased picture of activities, both sides of controversial questions in editorials and letters, timely, interesting features, accurate forecasts of coming events while maintaining standards of policy and expression worthy of the school it represents.
The measure of its success is shown in its reception by the subscribers and its rating in competitive journalistic events.
This year, entered for the first time in the Southern Interscholastic Press Institute, the HiRocket won first place at the meet which two delegates attended. For the sixth consecutive time
medalist rating was awarded the paper by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association in the national contest at Columbia University, New York, and an All-Columbian award for excellence in headlines was received. A news feature on his impressions of the meeting written by Charles Markham, who represented the editor-in-chief, appeared in the Columbia Spectator and the School Press Review.

Harris Proctor, editor-in-chief, was student chairman of the North Carolina Press Institute. In the contest for the best editorial printed in any high school newspaper in the state, Harris received the first prize, a copy of "The Tar Heel Editor" by

Josephus Daniels. Twenty-five delegates attended with Betty Poe, Mariella Hooker, Raney Stanford, and Charles Markham, official delegates, and W. H. Coble, C. S. Hooper, and Miss Marguerite M. Herr, who was chosen chairman of the newly organized state advisers' group.
A memorable occasion was the school visit of Joseph M. Murphy, founder and director of the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, of which the Hi-Rocket is a charter member. Through the assembly address to upper classmen, personal interviews, informal talks to all city school advisers and officials, Mr. Murphy impressed those he met for the first time as a scholarly, inspiring leader in his field.

The Hi-Rocket submitted last June by J. W. Carr, III and Ned Newsom in the State newspaper contest was announced by E. R. Rankin, director, last fall as winner of the 1939-40 contest.

Of local interest was the program, "Journalism in the City Schools," one of a series of broadcasts
"To Durham Schools" sponsored by Supt. W. F. Warren, in which Raney Stanford represented the Hi-Rocket.

The Hi-Rocket is published biweekly under the guidance of Miss Marguerite M. Herr, general adviser; B. L. deBruyne, business adviser; W. H. Coble, assistant literary adviser, Mrs. J. B. Mason, art adviser; Miss Lucy Thomson, typing director; and R. L. Alfrey, cut adviser. The following students comprise the editorial board: Harris Proctor, editor-in-chief; Betty Poe, news-general; Mariella Hooker, managing literary editor; Raney Stanford, feature editor; Charles Norville, Lewis Gregory, and Marvin Francis, sports editors; Sarah Speed, editorial editor; Susan Buchanan and Carolyn Harward, alumni editors; Charles Markham, junior editor; and Ruth McDonald, Celia Thompson, and Dot Sugg, copy editors. Thomas Harris and Marion Gaddy direct the business staff; Ronald Rose supervises the circulation department; and Sylvia Hoover heads the art staff.

Query: Resolved, That the United States should adopt a policy of requiring one year of military training of all able-bodied men before they reach the age of twenty-three.

The debaters began work in December by entering a practice debate tournament in Greensboro, where both teams and alternates participated. After this, more practice debates were held among themselves in preparation for the annual triangular debate. In this triangle Durham's affirmative and negative teams defeated those of Raleigh and Fayetteville, thus qualify-
ing for the finals at Chapel Hill. In the finals the negative team won the highest award possible, the Aycock Cup; and the affirmative team won honorable mention. The Aycock Cup has been won three times before by Durham High School since 1912.

In April the debaters entered a tournament in informal debate, oratory, declamation, and impromptu speaking at Wake Forest College. Both the affirmative and negative teams advanced to the finals in debating and won honors in declaiming, oratory, and impromptu speaking.

## Student Librarians Assist

Examining the pattern of the finished cloth, one can distinguish the minute thread of our school library. Each assistant plays her part in the making of the library pattern, devoting some period of school time to such duties as circula-
tion, checking attendance, typing, preparing books for the shelves, shelving books and periodicals, assisting fellow-students in reference work and in book selection.
Into the hands of the library staff, composed of Miss Florine Levter, the librarian, and seventeen student assistants, falls the pleasant task of directing research and general reading of the students, and of making available to teachers needed material for class work.

Following the game with Greensboro the Bulldogs were again tied by a strong team from Wilson. The game ended in a 14-14 $^{-14}$ deadlock.
The Bulldogs next entertained Rocky Mount on the Durham field and lost to the Blackbirds by a score of $14-7$. Closing the season with one of the oldest rivals in the "Old North State," Durham High School played hosts to Raleigh. The score was $13^{-0}$ in favor of Durham High.

## Varied Machines in Schoal Shop

## R. S.

Imagine a mechanical invention that will measure the breadth of a human hair! The industrial department here purchased an instrument called a meciometer which can measure materials whose thickness is only one thousandth of an inch.

The metal shop has recently purchased some additional power tools, among them the machine pictured at the right. This is a milling machine, which is used to finish rough surfaces, to cut gears, metal shapes of many sides, keyways, turfing surfaces, and boring holes.

A device known as an index center is used with this machine to cut teeth on gears. These gears are placed on their shafts by another new machine known as an arbor press, which, though small, exerts a pressure of three tons when pulled by the hand alone! Other new equipment includes an arc welding outfit, acetylene brazing apparatus, a power saw, and some hand tools. -Courtesy of the Mi-Rocket.
