## Senior Class

The senior class started the year with election of officers, conducted by the Student Conncil. In the race for president, Harvey Rem defeated Bill Alexander, who automatically became vice-president. Kemeth Turner was elected secretary and Earl Jones won the treasurer's job.

The class received a blow when one of its members, Leone Lee, was killed in an automobile accident on December 1.

During the entire year the main topic of discussion was the public-address system which the classes of 1941,1942 , and 1943 had voted to give the school as theirclass gift but which had not been in-
stalled due to a shortage of materials. After much argment as to whether to put in a possibly inadequate system or to keep the money until proper eqnipment conld be purchased, the class voted to invest the monev, about $\$ 175$, in C. S. War Bonds for the duration.

The outstanding social events of the year were the Jmior-Senior Social and Senior Play. Tom Crauford and Dot Murray were elected representative boy and girl of the senior class.

At the next-to-last class meeting it was decided to lave a class remmion in five years. President Rem appointed a committee to arrange for the meeting.

The Aviation Chub, whose main purpose is to further interest and increase knowledge in aircraft, directed its attention this year toward furnishing Durham's quota of model warplanes for government war purposes. 'The goverument supplied the boys with blueprints of current airplanes of the belligerent powers. and asked them to build exact scale model replicas. These miniature planes are to be used for aiding gumers and pilots in recognizing friendly and enemy aircraft from a distance. Precise standards had to be followed, and many models were rejected because of inadeurate dimensions or faulty construction.

Official titles were given to those who successfully completed a specified number and size of airplanes, and certificates of distinction sigued by Secretary of the Nary Frank Knox were presented to those who won such titles. Though the production of suall pursuit ships like the German Messerschmidt 109E, the British "Spitfire," and the American Bell " Airacobra," was the most rapid, some ambitious builders tackled the huge four-motored bombers, especially the far-famed Boeing B-17E "Flying Fortress."

With much satisfactory work completed. Mr. H. K. Collins, adviser to the club, sent several groups of phanes to Washington.

Brewbaker, assisted by Nick Warren and Paul Sykes, built his attack aromnd Rem's flat passes, backed by the rumning of MrLeod and
the sophomore flash, Don Tilley. When the passes clicked, the Buldogs were hot; but on off days the offence sagged. In several games the combination of Remn-to-Barnes saved the day, but sometimes the short passes, working smoothly only in the last quarter, couldn't gain enongli ground in a short time and the Bulldogs bit the dust.



The team opened its 1941 season with triumphs over Roxboro High 14-0, and later over Oxford Orphanage 20-13. These victories were due largely to the smooth passing attack of the Bulldogs. A week later Coach Brewbaker's boys crushed the Harding High School of Charlotte 40-0. In the next game Durham lost $7-0$ to the High Point Bisons who finished the season as $19+1$ state champions. This contest was followed by another loss to Greens-
boro High School 21-0. A 1t-14 tie with Charles Coon High of Wilson ended the losing streak. However, in the following game the Bultlogs made the trip to Rocky Mount, losing there by a score of 13-7. The Durham boys returued to the wiming track with a victory over Portsmouth, Va.. 15-12. Later, Raleigh, the traditional Durham rival, tripped the Bulldogs 13-0. The season was concluded on Thanksgiving Day with a $26-20$ win over New Hanover High of Wilmington.

For the first time ever, the Messenger this year had too many good snapshots submitted by student photographers. 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## BLOW OF WAR MAKES NUMEROUS CHANGES IN DURHAM HIGH

Decremaer 7 affected Dmrham High just as it did the rest of the conntry. Immediate reaction was anger and certainty of victory withont mnch diffientty, but this soon wore off as the school plunged in to do its part.

After a half-year, much progress has been made. Fach class as a whole has invested about $\$ 200$ in War Bonds, and sales to individuals took a sharp jump with the signing in May of pledges to buy war stampes regularly. Senior and junior boys were given a complete physical examination; compulsory physieal education for senion's has begun. Seventy-eight boys have trained as anxiliary firemen; more as fire watchers. Teachers, too, are doing their part. Three have alrealy joined the armed forces, while several more expect to leave this summer. Rationing of sugar and of gasoline fell npon the teachers' shoulders in May; further work of this sort is expected as more shortages develop.

All of this, however, is only a foretaste of what the high school will probably be called upon to do in the finture.

A direct effect of the war was the loss of the three teachers at the left. All were popular; all left many friends. More widespread was the training of over a hundred boys as fire watchers. Their duties are to report fires in their districts during an air-raid. A smaller group were made auxiliary firemen after many hours of instruction (right), with the job of helping the regular firemen in case of an attack. Onc group is assigned to each fire station and all its nembers report there when an air-raid alert is sounded. In the city's first black-out the performance of both groups was praised by city officials.

# LIFE ON THE NEWSFRONTS OF THE SCHOOL War lends note of seriousness to graduation of 350 seniors 

Graduation is the climax of the school year. The diploma is the reward for four years of high school work. Both take on new meaning this year for the graduating class. Though ably led by President Harvey Renn, the Class of ' 42 has broken few records, made few


Renn headlines. It is an average class making progress slowly but surely, with no startling feats to its credit. Having about three hundred fifty members, it is neither the largest nor the smallest graduating class Durhan High School has had. It has the usual quota of scholars and dullards, of stars and plodders, of leaders and followers.
But it is umsual-for it is graduating in a country at war-a country in which young people must become increasingly important. It is more serious-minded, perhaps, more concerned about its future, than its predecessors. It has already been affected by war at home and at school. It knows it will be affected more.

Some of its members plan to join the armed forces soon; some phan to go to college, taking the accelerated war-time program; some plan to find jobs in war industries; fewer than ever before have no plans at all. But for all their diplomas mean the end of one life, the begiming of another. And for all there is one burning question--how can I help?

## ONE THOUSAND TICKETS

Feature of the opening of school was the Hi-Rocket Athletic ticket campaign. Having as a slogan, "Buy one and sell one," the campaign was a great success. Over ane thousand combination subseriptions to the paper and season tickets to all home athletic events were sold at $\$ 2.50$. The Coüps led the way as usual, going $200 \%$, while Kemneth Turner was individual high salesman.

## TOP-RANKING PUBLICATIONS

The 1941 Messenger was perfect! In the competition held by the Colmonbia Scholastic Press Association each fall, the judges awarded last year's yearbook, edited by M:ldred Schulken, a medalist rating, the highest award given, together with a score of one thon-


SCHILLKEN sand out of a possible one thousand points. Commenting that the book was "the best of a strong line," the judges could find no "riticisms, so they filled the criticism sheet with compliments, especially about the theme, "The web of our life is of a mingled yarn, good and ill together."

This year's Hi-Rocket, with Charles Markham as editor, also received a medalist rating in the spring jurging at Columbia and an All-Columbian award in headline writing, as well as a first place in the Sonthern Interscholastic Press Association contest.

## STUDENT COUNCIL

Top-ranking job in the school is usually considered the presidency of the Student Council. Last spring Tom Cranford easily won this office. The faith of the voters seems to have been justified.

Other regular jobs included presiding at all auditorium sessions, and taking charge of the hot lunch line (i.e., seeing that the home rooms go to lunch in the right order). This last job, assumed by the Council two years ago, occupied two members at every lunch period. Co-operating with the ParentTeachers Association, the Council held Friday night socials in the school gym. These were fairly successful, as all who attended proclaimed them fun.

Only trouble with the Council this year has been the apathy of the student body. Each succeeding set of officers makes a few steps in the direction of more selfgovermment, but progress will continue to be slow until all students realize that the officers can't do everything alone.
