The ITi-Rockict, like thousands of other highschool newspaper mombers of the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, responded to the appeal of the United States goverument to use the publication as an active agent for promoting the war effort effectively in the school commumity.

Realizing the need of a continuation of normal educational activities in direct relation to the war effort, the $1942-43 \mathrm{II}$-Rocket retained its coverage of school activities, and enlarged its scope to include all phases of war service in which students are participating. The $I \mathrm{Ii}$ Rocket has published authentic information essential for individuals and groups ; it has explained by pen and picture new courses and activities besides those readapted to timely work; and it has featured the musual in achievement by students, teachers, and alumni in service. This year's staff has endeavored to vary the make-up and types of articles, making each new issue contain something vastly different from the last.

Keeping in step with national rationing of paper and meeting the increased cost of print-
ing, the 1942-4:3 Hi-Rocket curtailed its regular 18 issmes to publish only a roumd dozen. By this sacrifice of quantity the staff has managed to maintain the quality of the publication in keeping with the journalistic standards of former vears.

When John Kerr III, editor-in-ehief, left for the Iniversity of North Carolina to enter the Naval Reserve, the editorship of the 194:3 IIi-Rocket was assmmed by Betty Rezner, former managing editor, while Ralph Rogers, capable business manager, continued in this capacity.

An interview with Wendell Wilkie, 1940 Republican candidate for president, highlighted the host of interviews with famons people presented in the paper this year. Betty Rezner, editor, Carolyn Hooper, and Barbara Barmes were invited to the press conference for Mr. Wilkie at Duke University.

The Mi-Rocket was again awarded the gold medal and, in addition, a Victory star for outstanding war effort and All-Columbian honors at the Cohumbia Scholastic Press Association ammual contest.

Although the Bulldogs had only a 500 pereentage in the total of all then games, they had a very good .800 percentage in Eastern Conference play. The boys opened with a victory over a strong Hilisboro Iligh team. The second game resulted in a $3-0$ setback at the hands of a powerful Oxford Orphanage eleven, The Bulldogs lost three more games to non-conference foes. Durham later came back to polish off the Wildcats twice in a row, however, to win the Eastern title for the sixth straight year.

One of Durham High School's greatest contributions to the war effort this year was their part in the rationing program. The (ommercial Department was called upon on two occasions to ration fuel oil, first in Jammary and again in April.

On the first occasion approximately 4,000 blanks were filled out, and on the last occasion this figure was raised to 12,000 , and the envelopes typed. Assisting in this work were students taking commercial subjects and students having a high scholastic average.

In the first rationing, filling out blanks and typing envelopes was only a part of the process of rationing. Each student, who was help-
ing, counted ration coupons, prepared the validating stamps, and recorded on a single sheet all they had done. The secomd rationing program was very much the same except the students worked in groups of five rather than individually.

This was under the supervision of Miss Ethel M. Solloway, head of the Commercial Department, assisted by the other commercial teachers.

On several other occasions, the faculty of Durham Ligh was called on to help in the rationing of sugar and gasoline. This rationing was done after school hours and by all the teachers.

## Civilian Defense



Durham High's All-Out-for-Victory Campaign to collect scrap netted 90,000 pounds of metal, rubber, paper, and tin cans, thereby exceeding by 30,000 pounds the expectations of Mr. B. G. Stewart. director of the drive in Durham High.

In order to enconrage the salvaging of scrap, a plan was organized along the line of Harold Gray's comic strip, "Little Orphan Anmie.' This system gave each person turning in over ten pounds a rank, these ranks being
based on those of the Army. They range from a Private to a General, turning in ten and five thousand pounds, respectively.

The homeroom turning in the most serap was $4 \Lambda 7$ with approximately 20,000 pounds. 4 A 8 came in second with 15,000 pounds. 5 As led in the tin can collection with a total of 6,0000 cans.

Pat Mnirhead turned in the most for the individual with 17,765 pounds of scrap. Wralter Perry came in second with 14,746 .

## Sale of War Stamps

This year members of the Hi-Y Club have made a notable contribution to the war effort by selling war stamps and bonds dhring activity and lunch periods. To create an interest among the students and faculty, a miqne booth in which to sell the stamps was arramged in front of the sehool office. In the background of this booth was a poster picturing the popular army jeep, which has been
used so much in sponsoring stamp and bond sales thronglout this mation. 'The plan of the club was to sell enough stamps and bonds to buy a jeep and varions other war weapons for onr country.

Each chub member has served loyally and sacrificially in this campaign with the hope that his small part would be a strong link in the chain of victory for the Allied Nations.

## Contributions

"This morning we have been asked to make a contribution to. . . .' These words of the teacher are familiar to all students by the time they reach the high school. Due to the war these words are heard even more frequently. Durham IIigh has provided ample opportunity for the students to share in the rumning of the war. In turn, the students are planning and carrying out various campaigns, among them the War Bond drive.

The Chinese War Relief was the newest cause this year, and therefore, probably, was less publicized than the others. This may account for the fact that only $\$ 12.43$ was gleaned from the students' pockets. This year' the call of the Community Fund was more urgent than ever before, due to the number
of agencies that are closely comnected with the war effort receiving aid from the fund. The cash contributions of the teachers surpassed those of the students; the quantities are, respectively, $\$ 137.50$ and $\$ 122.17$. The teachers also pledged a sum of $\$ 66.50$.

There are two funds whose receipts are used to heal sick bodies. These are the March of Dimes for polio and 'The Christmas Seal Campaign for tuberculosis. Their high-school contributions this year amounted, respectively, to $\$ 37.99$ and $\$ 61.45$.
