The Hi-Rocket again accepted the challenge of United States govermment officials to help carry vital information or necessary appeals on the war effort to the high school students here. This service was requested of all school newspapers for the duration as the contribution of the school press to the national defense program.

Anxious to serve effectively, the staff planned each issue with adequate space for timely news, features, and editorial comment. The news releases from the government were edited for this school; drives and campaigus were explained, and their programs and results covered. Suggestions from the Sehools-at-War program were used to illustrate or explain graphically news of importance or general interest (to the school community).

The local war efforts of the school as a whole, and of students and faculty, working individually or in groups, were featured and the results tabulated as evidence of achievement in Durham High. The ahumi page. dedicated to those who have achieved distinction, carried in every issue the news of the whereabouts and activitics of the graduates
in service and of those in training for war work.

The ILi-Rocket, like the school it represents, had to make adjustments due to the war conditions. The scarcity of materials and the increased cost of publication curtailed some plans. When Thele Sam called the etlitor-in-chief and the business manager. Charles Syduor and Walton Parker of the II-Rocket Staff, Ruth Evans and Martha Fowler as coeditors aut Ed Ipelurch as business manager assumed their responsibilities.

In spite of handicaps, the newspaper has appeared twelve times on schedule and the standards set up for high school journalists have been uniformly kept by the whole staff.

The Ili-Rocket had two articles: a poem by Ruth Evans and an editorial on the tuberculosis campaign by (harles Sydnor, printed in the February issue of the School Press Revieu, official organ of the Columbia Schotastic Press Association. These were selected as outstanding contributions from the many high school newspapers examined, as outstanding and timely journalistic work.
