
Our three years of English in the Senior High School are most important, for it is by our speech and writing that we are known.





All of the courses in this department are popular electives. The boys who learn the industrial arts are in a very practical way preparing themselves for life in the Machine Age—and enjoying the process.




Physical Education Department

Coöperative Class







As the ink dried on the last issue of the *Hi-Rocket* for 1945-46, Durham High School's publication completed twenty-six years of service to school and community.

A group of enthusiastic journalists, led by their editor, Roger Davis, now a member of the Durham High faculty sent to press the infant four-page edition of the *Hi-Rocket* in the fall of 1920. Today the paper boasts a record of twenty-six school years of continuous publication.

The Columbia Scholastic Press Association, the largest and most powerful organization of its kind in America, has been a decided factor in the advancement of our school paper. The *Hi-Rocket*, a charter member of this or-

ganization, received a bronze feather in 1935 for ten years of valuable membership.

One of the greatest services of the C.S.P.A. is its annual rating contest in which thousands of high school papers are judged by experts. Since 1929 when the project was begun, Durham High's publication has climbed from third place to the highest rating, medalist, which the *Hi-Rocket* has merited for ten years. Local delegates to the 1946 convention at Columbia University remed with a first-place rating of which we may be proud, considering the post-war restrictions which faced this year's staff.

The *Hi-Rocket* eelebrates its twenty-sixth year with an enviable record in journalism which future staffs must work to surpass.



In the two season matches, only one point was racked up against the Bulldogs, that by Maury High of Norfolk, Va.


