A group of enthusiastic joumalists, led by their editor, Roger Davis, now a member of the Durhan High faculty sent to press the infant four-page edition of the Mi-Rocket in the fall of 1920 . Today the paper boasts a record of twenty-six school years of continuous publication.

The Columbia Scholastic P'ress Association, the largest and most powerful organization of its kind in America, has been a decided factor in the advancement of our school paper. The Mi-Rocket, a charter nember of this or-
ganization, received a bronze feather in 1935 for ten years of valuable membership.

One of the greatest services of the ('.S.P.A. is its ammal rating contest in which thousands of high schook papers are judged by experts. Since 1929 when the project was begun, Durham Iligh's publication has climbed from third place to the highest rating, medalist, which the Mi-Rocket has merited for ten years. Local delegates to the 1946 convention at Columbia University reroed with a first-place rating of which we may be proud, considering the post-war restrictions which faced this year's staff.
