

Social Science Department







Business Education Department





Physical Education Department



Inside Cafeteria




Though we were new to Durham High, we Sophomores believe we have begun a successful high school career. We lost no time in learning our way around the school, meeting new classmates and participating in many activities.



As customary for Athenians, we completed another successful year with coöperation from everyone. Each of us now has a much better appreciation of good literature which we know will benefit us the rest of our lives.





This year we contributed a great deal to the students of Durham High. We kept the library clean and the books in place so that they could be easily found.


