## DISTRIBUTIVE EDUCATION CLASS




THE D.E. CLUB, under the leadership of Mr. Stanley I. Craft, brought its third year to an eventful close.


AFTER winning the 1949 State Championship, our main goal was to maintain the clean record that we held.
