## Seniar Class Histary

At Graduation we bid farewell to those wonderful seniors who'd helped so much to get us acquainted with Durham High.

Singing ' Auf Wiederselsen,', we came back next September, much more experienced now in matters eoncerning Durham High. Now we were more than ever a class, instead of separate individuals. Again we sold that stationery !
'The first big activity was Homecoming, ant again we nominated Liz for Queen. It was exciting as ever, but this year it had an extra special touch-the state championship was depending on the game. We came through on top that time with a perfect season, but few of us will soon forget that cold December night when the State Championship game was played. We lost to Reynolds, but win, lose, or draw, we still thought our team was best!

We found ourselves having more to to with
preparations for the Christmas dance. The theme this year was "Wiuter Wonderland."

Junior Talent Show! Just those three words were enongh to bring fear to any junior's heart. Could we do it? Would it be a wonderful success or a dismal flop? We used the theme "Under the Big Top" and it was a wonderful success. We made over five hundred dollars, which we knew would mean a grand .JumiorSenior Prom.

Sure enough, come May 15, the Junior-Senior came off in expert style, and we felt it was a true tribute to our class. After days of planning and decorating, the gyon showed the "touch of genius." Our theme, "An Enchanted Evening on an Enchanted Island,', was carried out with South Sea Island murals, a hula dancer, a mammoth lei, and a giant silver seashell throne for king and queen Edgar Fisher and Margaret Ann Kornegay.

The seniors entertained us with their play, "'Double Door,', a tense mystery drama super'bI.y carried out.

We eleeted our class and Student Council officers-the ones whose pictures dot this book. Finally, graduation rame upon us again. We couldn't believe that now we were the seniors, and would be the next to wear those fateful caps and gowns!
