Sunday
June 18, 1899
Having outfilled at Nueva
Casas Grandes on last Thurs
at 2 P.M.
on above date in the morning
^ Made. Crossed the dry
to Casas Grandes River,
short in sight on old ruins
about 1/2 mile above the Mex.
town & then made for the
barren hills to the westward.
The wagon road led us
directly to Colonia Juarez
where we stopped overnight
with Mr. Harper, one of the
massive colonists. He says
about half the old ruins are
later out Mexican - particularly
about papers. In the morning
a dozen or more young men
& women came in & played
for the day, saying & men repeated
afternoon. This colony
is about 12 years old.

the town laid out in regular
streets + most of the houses are
small, neatly made brick
cottages (sometimes 2 story)
+ surrounded by peach, apple
+ pear trees + other small
fruits were cultivated + have
remained a local factory. The
~~town~~ town has no saloon or
billiard room + one of the yg.
men said that the prosperous
character of the colony was due
to the absence of saloons + gambling
so that the money earned by the people
was utilized for home improvements.
The showing for the period spent
here - the tree shaded streets +
thriftly orchards is an admir-
able one. The 12 years has evidenced
more thrift than the town of
Casas Grandes has produced
by its centuries of Latin-American
occupation and is a striking
object lesson.

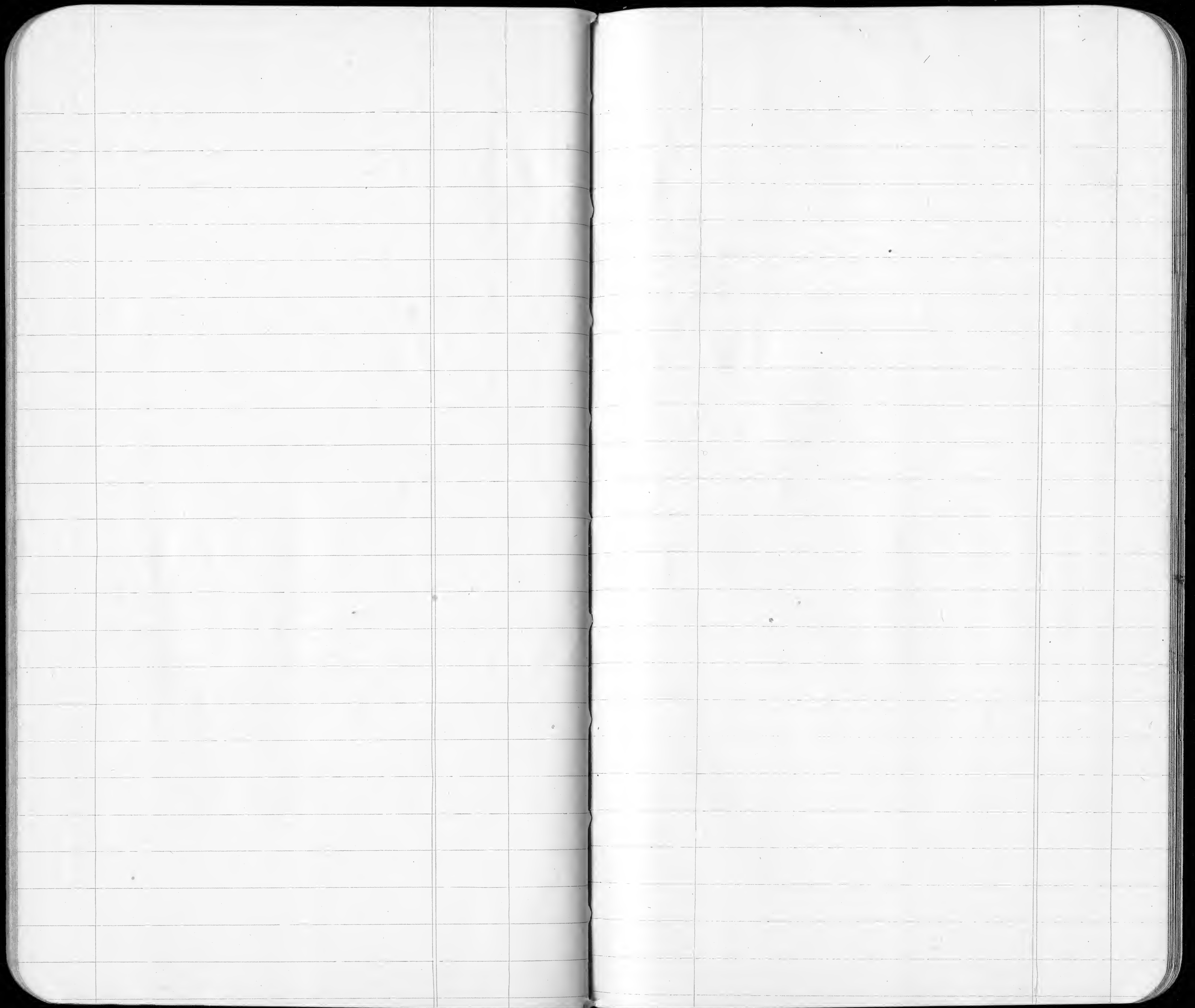

1899 Misc. Notes

The most prominent vegetation on the hillsides where the rut sheep were killed near upper end of Lake Sta. Maria were Echinocactus, Opuntia, Dacy-livion, Gramma grass, Ocotilla, Small juniper (6397) Sage brush (plant with seeds bunched along tip stems in club shaped masses) and just along the upper border of Larrea mex. From stains on horns & heads of sheep it seemed evident that they were eating the red fruit of the Opuntia. which

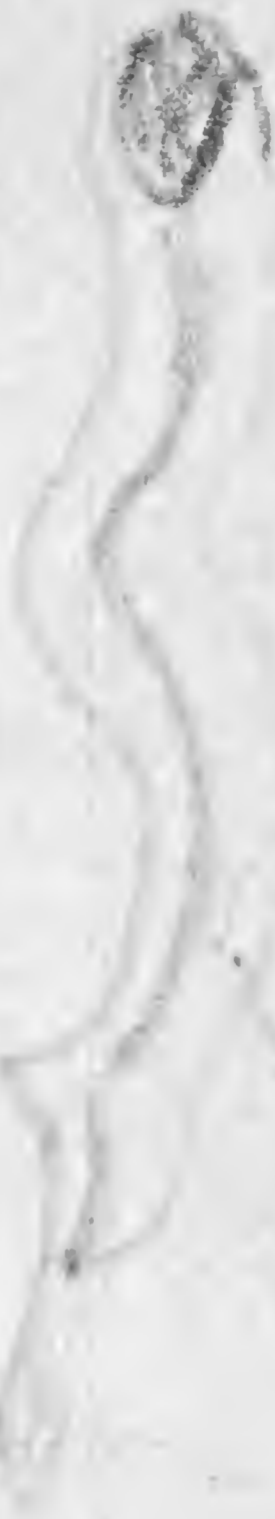
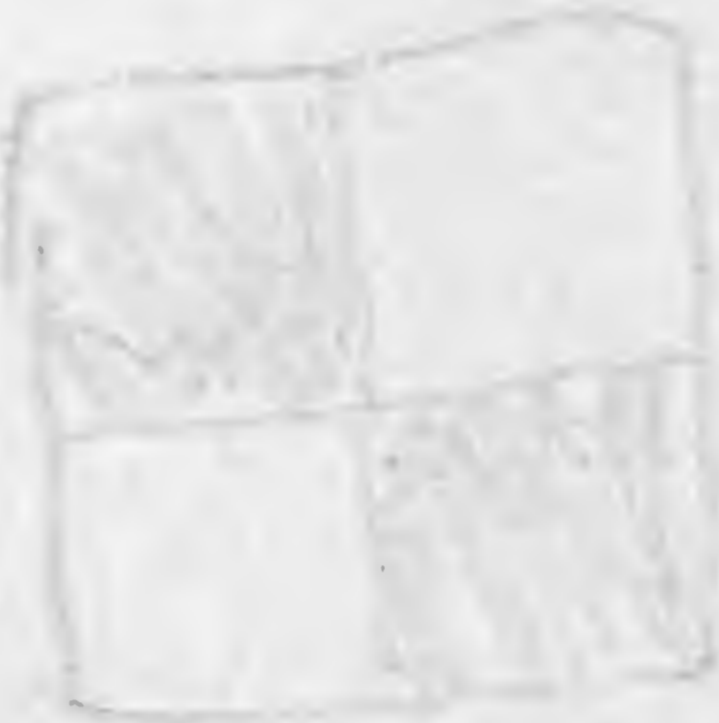

 a section of cliff
 about 10 ft long & 7 ft high
 was unimpaired over a
 row of 6 rounded walls
 built at base of cliff -
 They were down from
 5-8 ft in length
 & about 5 ft high, with
 walls about
 7 ft high. Excavating down
 here shows that a local
 ledge has a slope across
 the floor of the ravine

over a section of cliff
about 10 ft long & 7 ft high
was immediately over a
row of ~~6~~ mudwalled rooms
built at base of cliff -

These rooms ~~averaged~~ from
5 - 8 ft in ~~average~~ length

mud plastered walls about
7 ft high. Excavating down
here shows that a burial
had been made under
the floor of these rooms
