

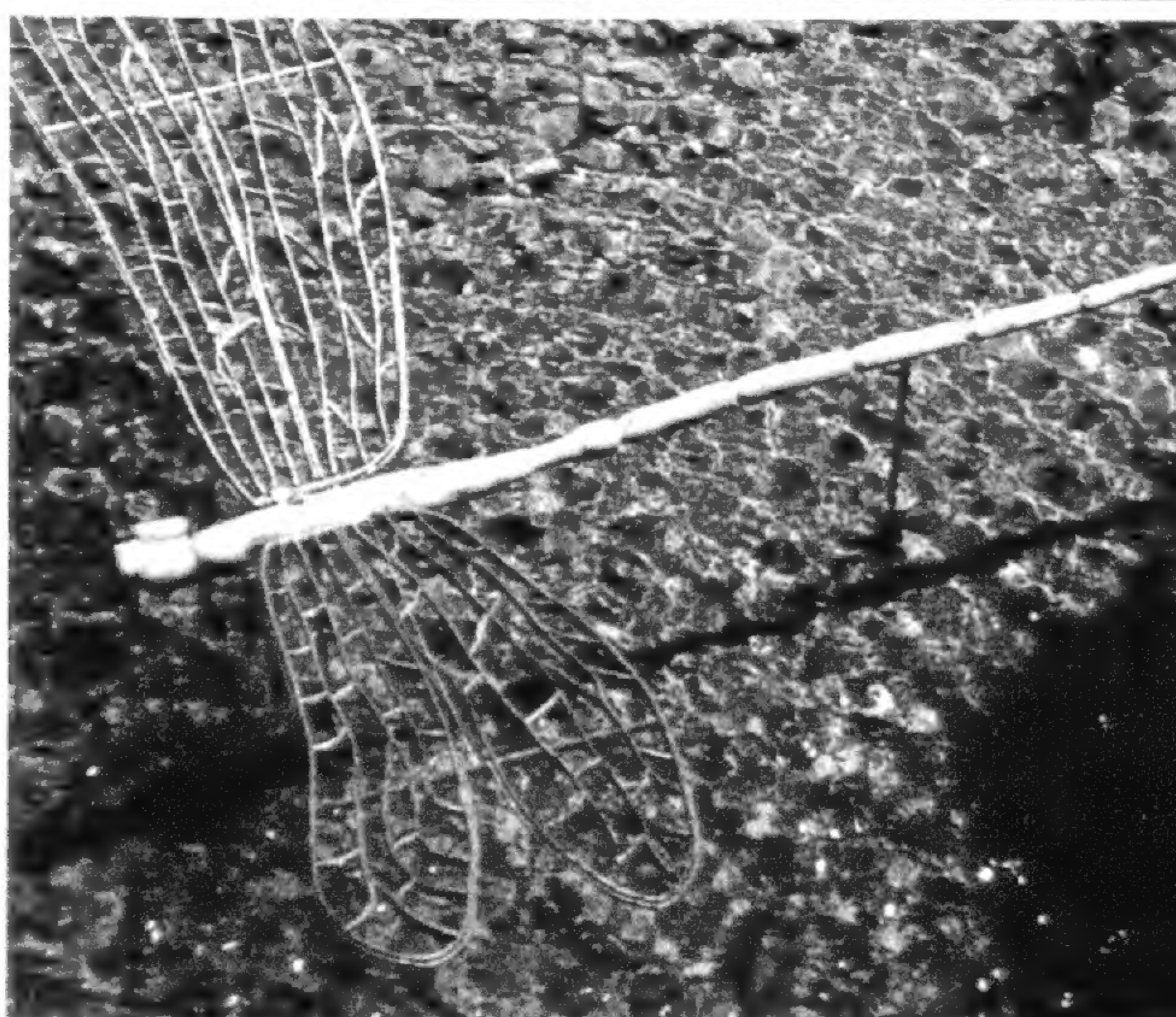
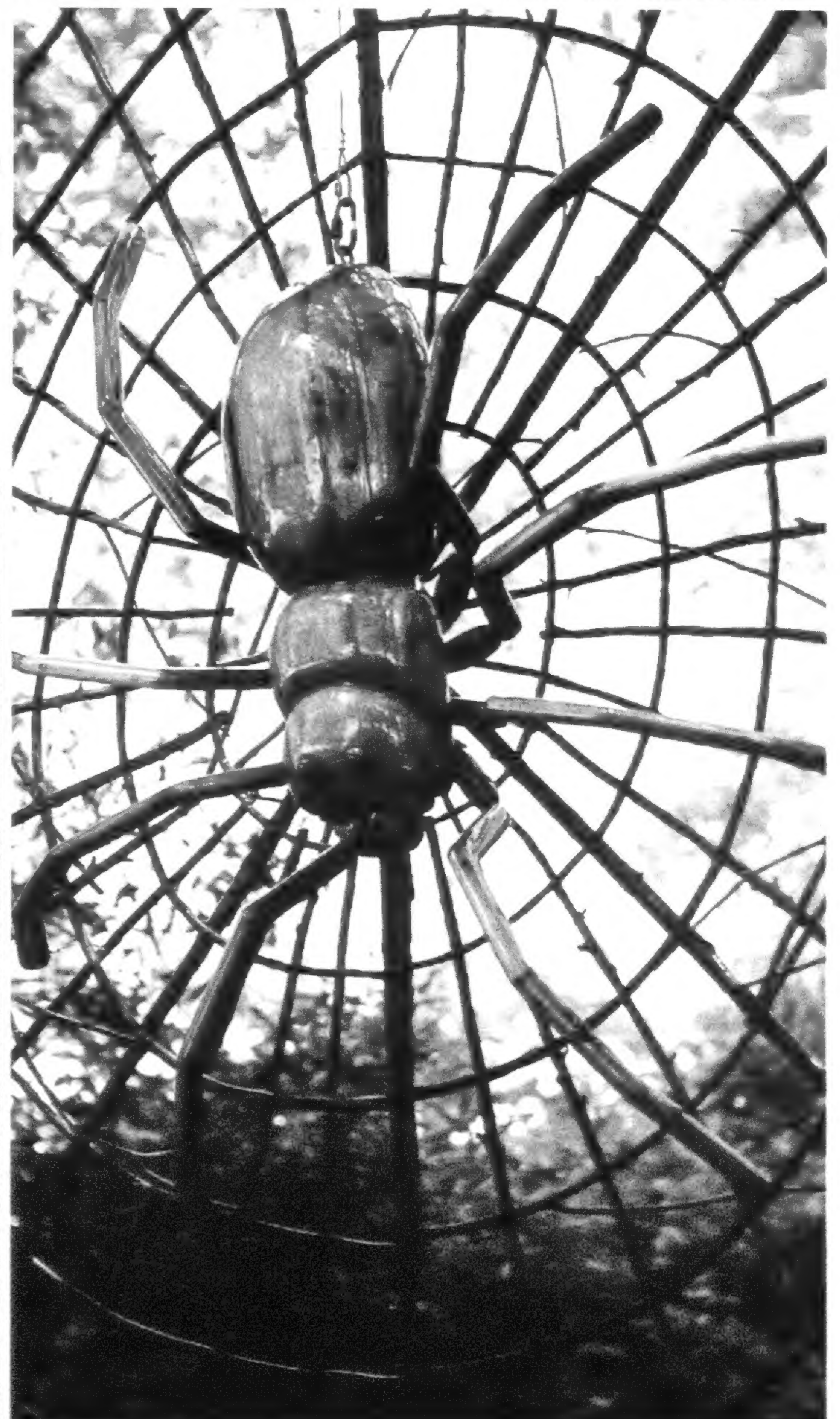

What we have is such an exciting and boundless place to work, visit and be part of that our future is only limited by our own creativity.

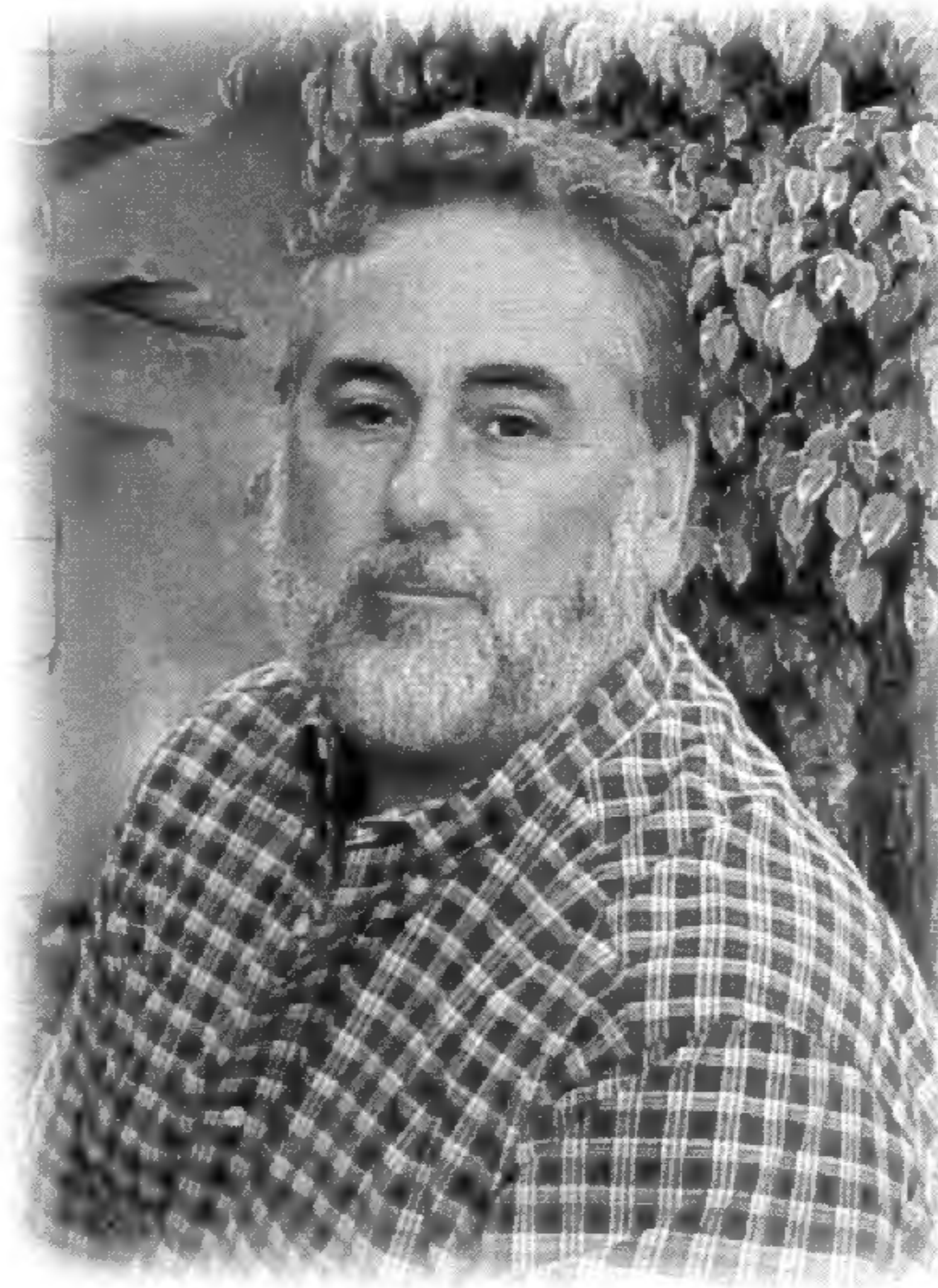

WORDS FROM
GEORGE A. BRUMDER,
NEW FOUNDATION PRESIDENT

This is an important time for The Arboretum: Now under the joint direction of the County and the Foundation, with Peter Atkins serving in the new position of Arboretum-wide CEO and with a far-ranging and aggressive new Five-year Plan recently approved by the Foundation's trustees and, we believe, moving toward approval by the County Board of Supervisors, *The Arboretum has entered a new era of creativity, enthusiasm and growth.*

A few words about The Arboretum's Five-year Plan:

- The Plan — which touches all aspects of The Arboretum - declares The Arboretum an educational institution, thus putting education first and foremost at The Arboretum.
- The Plan also envisions substantial investment in infrastructure, extensive renovation of existing facilities and gardens, innovation in all areas, and renewed efforts to reach out to the entire Southern California community and beyond.
- In carrying out its mission, The Arboretum will be an active advocate for the world of plants, for increased public understanding of the importance of plants, and for sound conservation and ecological policies and practices.

You'll hear more about the Plan as we move forward.

A word about staffing at The Arboretum: I am most pleased to say that, after a period of budgetary stringency at the County, The Arboretum is now looking to fill as soon as possible a number of positions in the gardens and on the grounds. In addition, we are building our fundraising capacity at The Arboretum. With a

strengthened staff and more funding, you should be on the lookout for further improvements around The Arboretum.

A word of thanks to my predecessor, Donivee Nash.

We all owe Donivee a large debt of gratitude. During her time on the Foundation board, and especially as board president for the last three years, Donivee personally played a leading and, in fact, critical role in bringing about two historic changes at The Arboretum - first, the arrangements under which the County and the Foundation share equally in the governance of The Arboretum and second, the creation of the position of The Arboretum-wide CEO, now held by Peter Atkins. These changes, which represent a turning-point at The Arboretum, have built a solid foundation for strong, positive developments at The Arboretum. I also note that our Five-year Plan had its birth during Donivee's term as board president.

Please join me in enthusiastic applause to Donivee to thank her for her role in these accomplishments and for all her other good, focused and effective work for The Arboretum!

I am both honored and pleased to be the new president of the Foundation board of trustees. I look forward to working with my fellow trustees, with the County and with Peter - and with all of you - *to help The Arboretum become a leader among the world's botanic gardens and arboreta and a truly world class arboretum for Southern California.*

A stellar lineup of speakers from the Mediterranean and from Northern and Southern California headline this two day event sponsored by Pacific Horticulture Symposium and The Arboretum of Los Angeles County. The lineup includes:

- Alessandra Vinciguerra, Supervisor of the Gardens at the American Academy in Rome, will speak on contemporary Italian gardens.
- Nick Turland, of the Missouri Botanical Garden, will introduce participants to the horticultural treasures found in the floras of the Mediterranean basin.

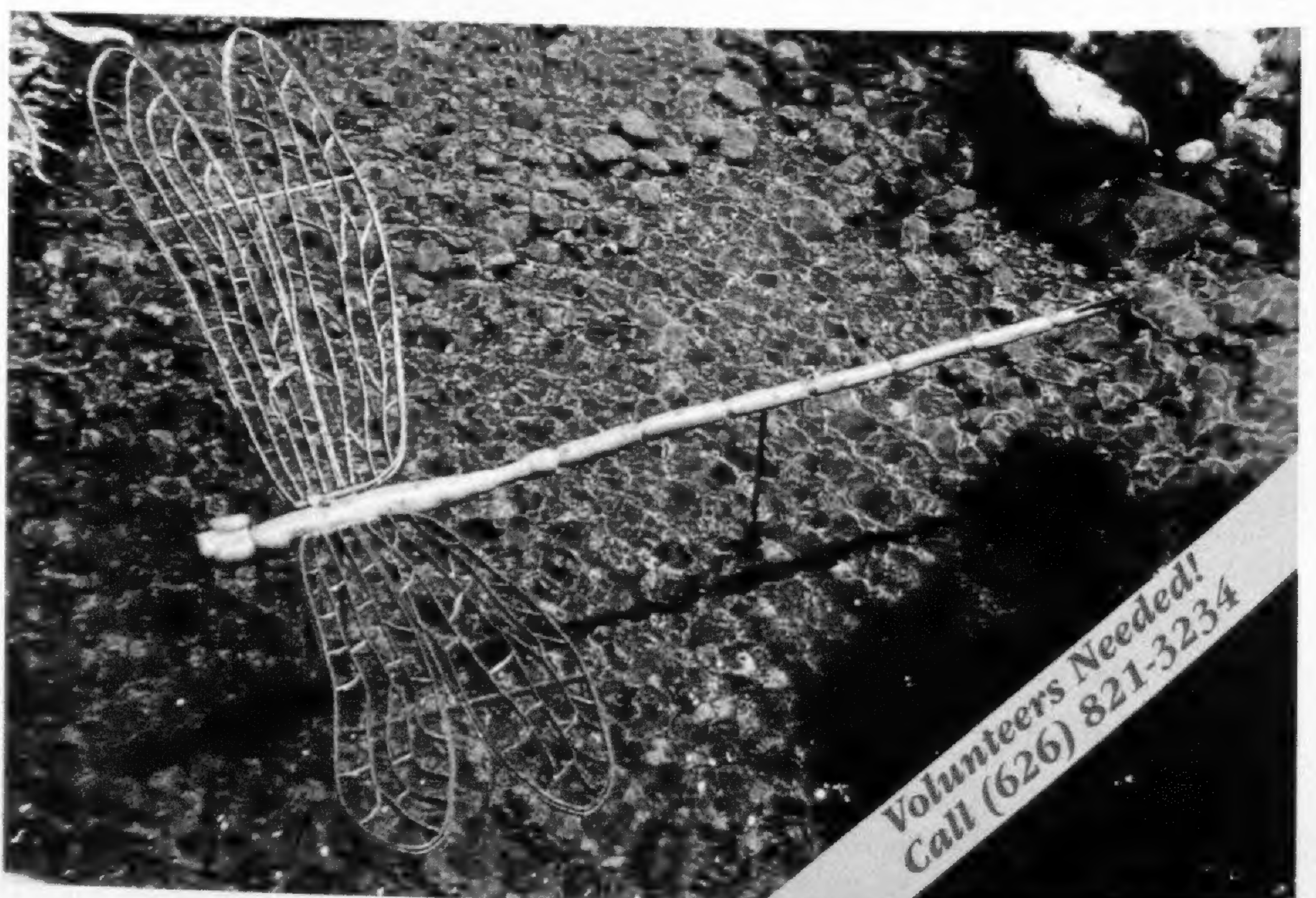

WHAT'S IN BLOOM? AUGUST & SEPTEMBER

The following plants will be in bloom over the next few months:

CRAPE MYRTLE (*Lagerstroemia*), a small, multi-trunked tree covered with large clusters of crimson, magenta, lavender, bright pink, or white flowers according to which of our 22 different varieties you see.

BELLADONNA (*Amaryllis belladonna*) is located under the Crape myrtle west of the Bauer Pool.

CHAMELEON VINE (*Combretum fruticosum*) has spectacular brush-like flowers that turn from greenish-yellow to orange. It can be found on the Nursery fence and in the Tropical Rain Forest.

CHINESE FLAME TREE (*Koelreuteria bipinnata*) is now starting to show its pink seed capsules. Seven of these beautiful trees grace The Arboretum, one located near the Peacock Cafe.

THE GOLD MEDALLION TREES, blooming since mid-June, are excellent trees for long lasting mid-summer color. We have seven of these trees, many on Tallac Knoll.

LILY-OF-THE-NILE (*Agapanthus*) Arboretum introductions include 'Queen Anne' and 'Rhapsody'.

NASTURTIUM BAUHINIA (*Bauhinia punctata*) is a tropical and subtropical African relative of the Orchid tree.

KAHILI GINGER (*Hedychium gardnerianum*), on the north end of Baldwin Lake, abounds in and around the Tropical Rain Forest. Seven other species of *Hedychium* are located in various protected locations around The Arboretum.

HARPULLIA ARBOREA, near Meyberg Falls, is a cold-hardy native of India and Malaysia recognized by its bright orange seed capsules and shiny jet-black seeds hanging from its canopy.

SEA SQUILL (*Urginea maritima*) is a summer-dormant bulb plant that is native to the Canary Islands. It comes into bloom with 3-4 foot spikes of white flowers just before fall. Look for it in the African Section.



HAEMANTHUS COCCINEUS'S crimson red flowers grace the African section.

LYCORIS varieties bloom along the road near the intersection west of the Bauer Pool.

ORANGE JESSAMINES (*Murraya paniculata*) just to the west of Meyberg Falls.

HIBISCUS ROSA-SINENSIS is in bloom at the top of Tallac Knoll. Also at the top of the knoll, growing on the rim of a bowl-shaped area, *Coffea arabica*, the Coffee plant, can be seen covered in fragrant white blooms.
