OUR EVOLUTION CONTINUES... JOIN IN!

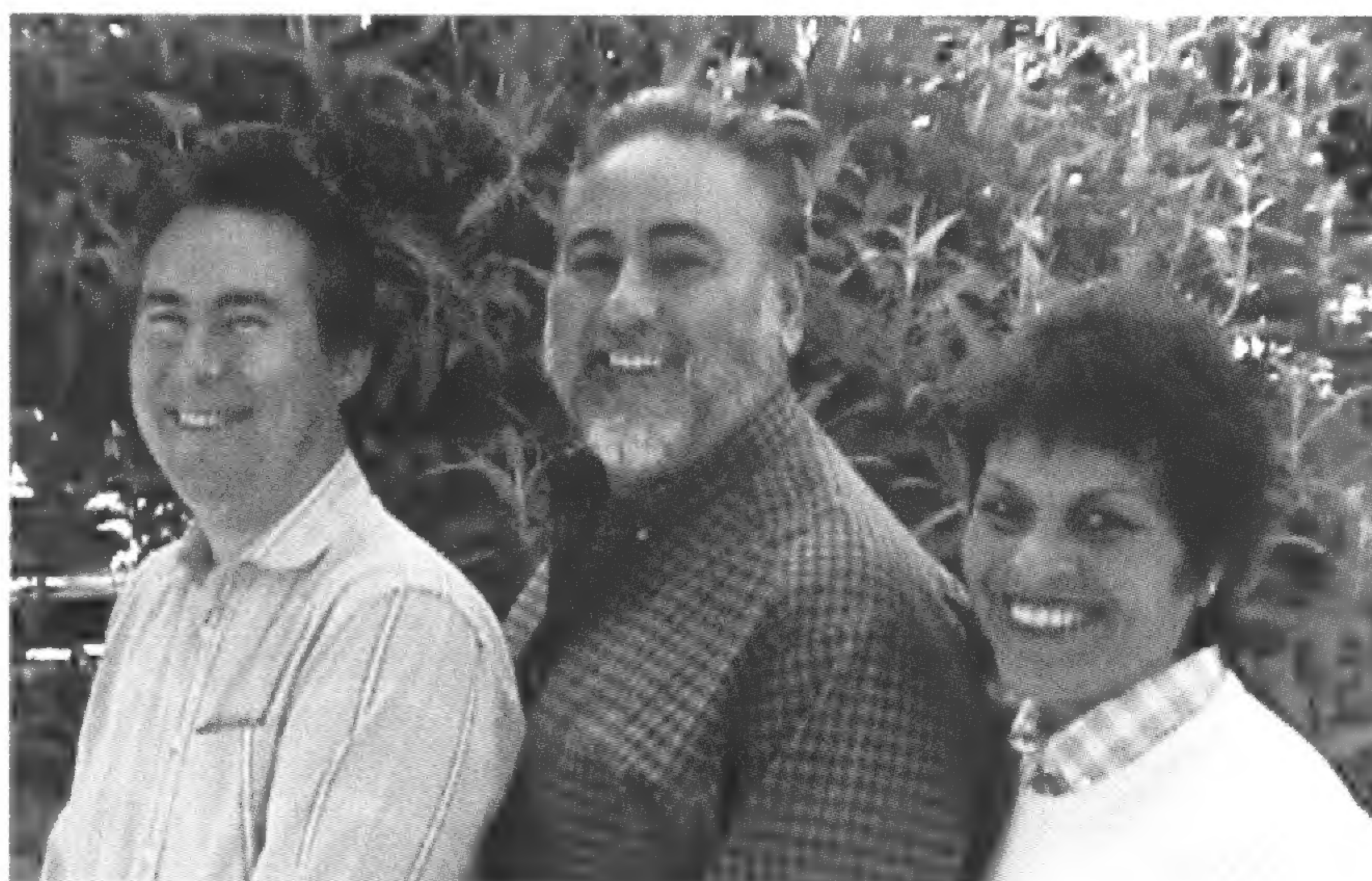

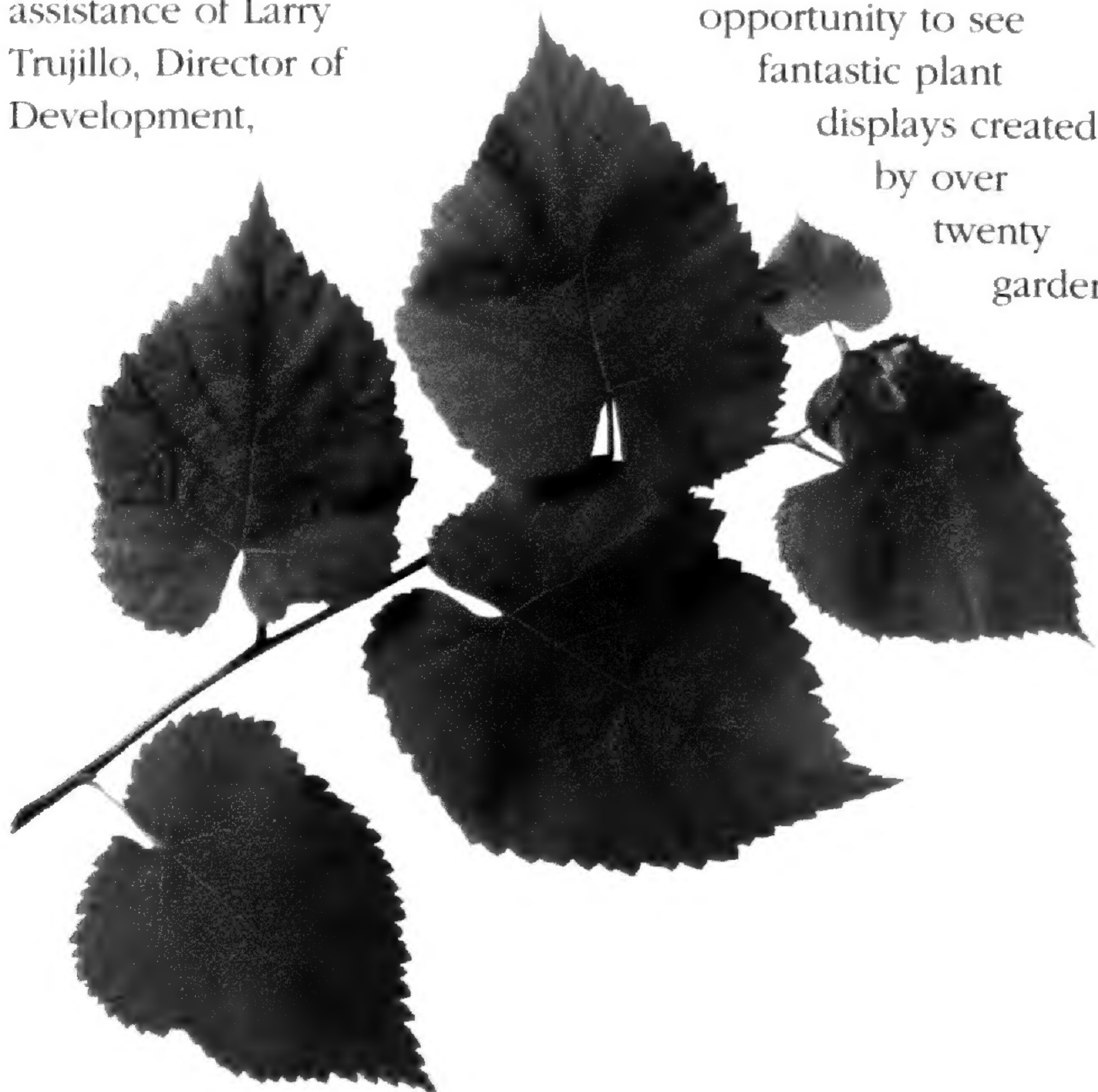

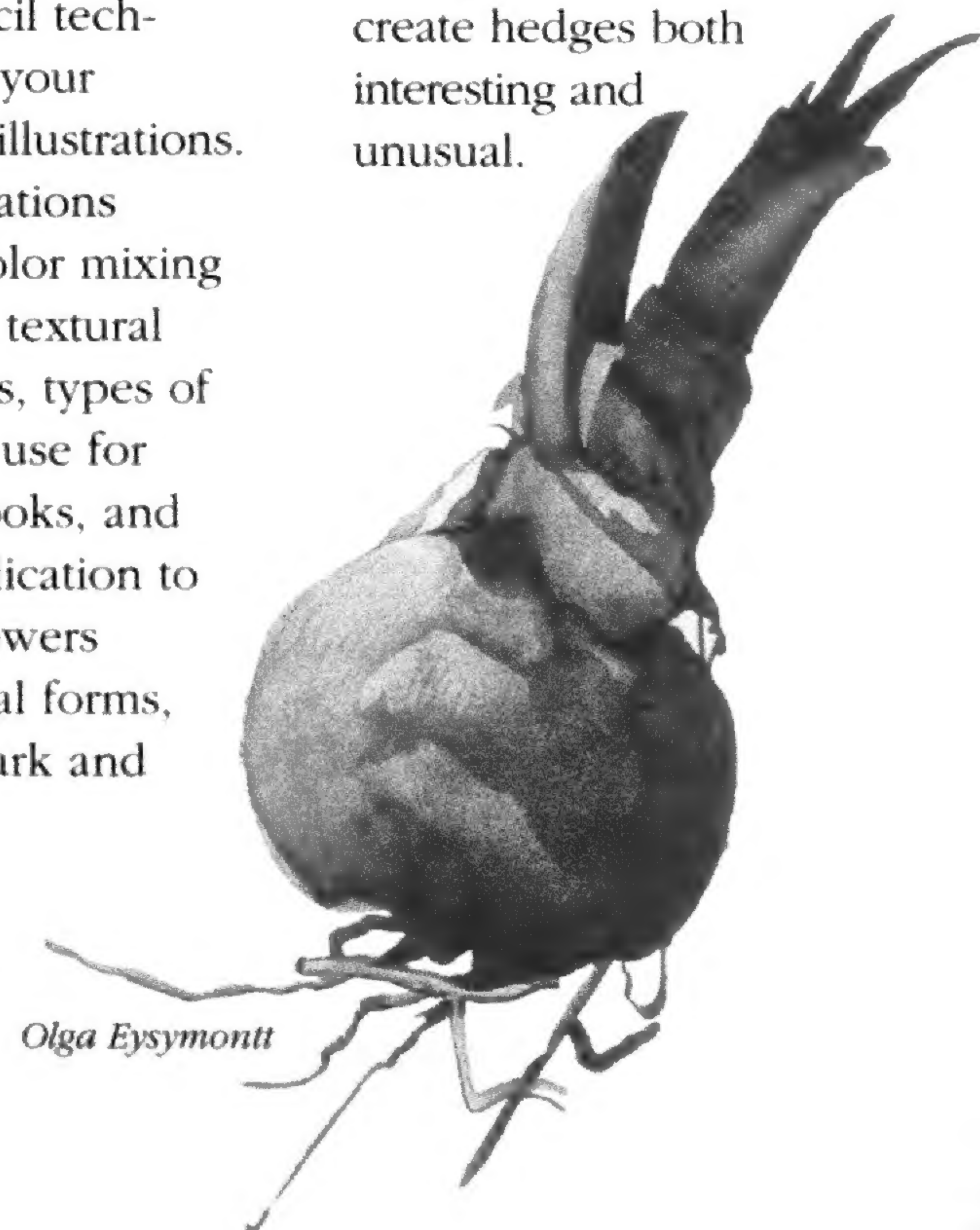

When you think of hedges, does a boring expanse of boxwood flash across your mind's eye? Think again! Hedges have many roles, from defining boundary lines to creating garden rooms, and an almost endless variety of plants can be used, depending on one's need. Trees, shrubs, vines, even annuals can be drafted to provide protection, establish parameters (solid or psychological), add color, regulate traffic flow, or offer seclusion. Jill Vig will not only provide cultural information on the care and pruning of hedges, but she will also examine a wide variety of plant materials, including drought tolerant and shade loving plants, that can create hedges both interesting and unusual.

Through lectures, demonstrations, and laboratory studies, you will learn to recognize major common families, plant parts, and plant growing stages. This course will greatly enhance the accuracy and integrity of your botanical drawings and paintings.

Instructor: Dick Rauh is an instructor and illustrator at The New York Botanical Garden. Dick illustrated *A Guide to Winter Wildflowers* by Carole Levine, published by Yale University Press, and the line illustrations for the signage in the Haupt Conservatory.

THE "ORGANIFICATION" OF THE ARBORETUM

The roles of public gardens, which include both botanical gardens and arboreta, throughout the world are being redefined to reflect the changing cultural and environmental needs of our modern societies.

Public gardens have become multi-faceted botanical institutions, incorporating into their missions, conservation, research, passive recreation, and last but not least, education (cultural, botanical, horticultural, environmental and so on). In addition, concerns about devastating environmental degradation in our communities are forcing public gardens to alter their chemical heavy practices which they have become so reliant upon. Instead, public gardens are now becoming centers for sustainable urban horticulture.

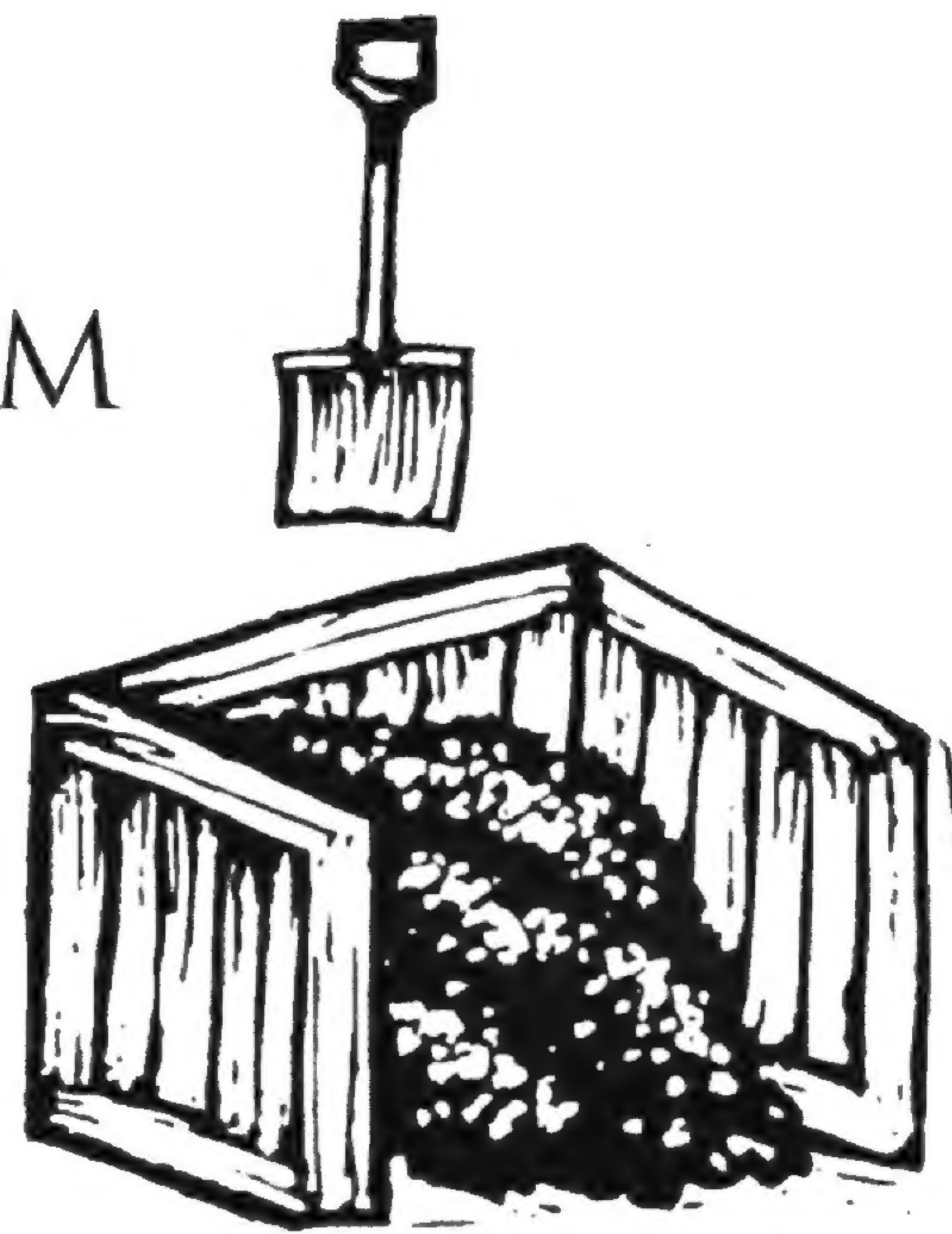
With this in mind, current horticultural practices at The Arboretum are being evaluated and within the next year many so called "accepted" practices will see their end. A "least toxic/best practice" approach to grounds care and maintenance will be implemented, otherwise known as integrated pest management.

Also, a "green waste recycling" composting program is being implemented. The green waste composting facility will be able to handle up to five hundred cubic yards of green waste at any given time. This means The Arboretum will no longer be paying to have grass clippings and other organic

wastes hauled away.

Instead, we will be incorporating the green waste back into the collections in the form of composted mulch. Composted mulch will return essential nutrients back to the soils, aid in water conservation, inhibit weed seed germination and add to the aesthetic appeal of the entire Arboretum. In a sense The Arboretum will become 100% biomass efficient.

The "organification" of The Arboretum has begun, with the best practices/least toxic approach to Arboretum care being slowly integrated

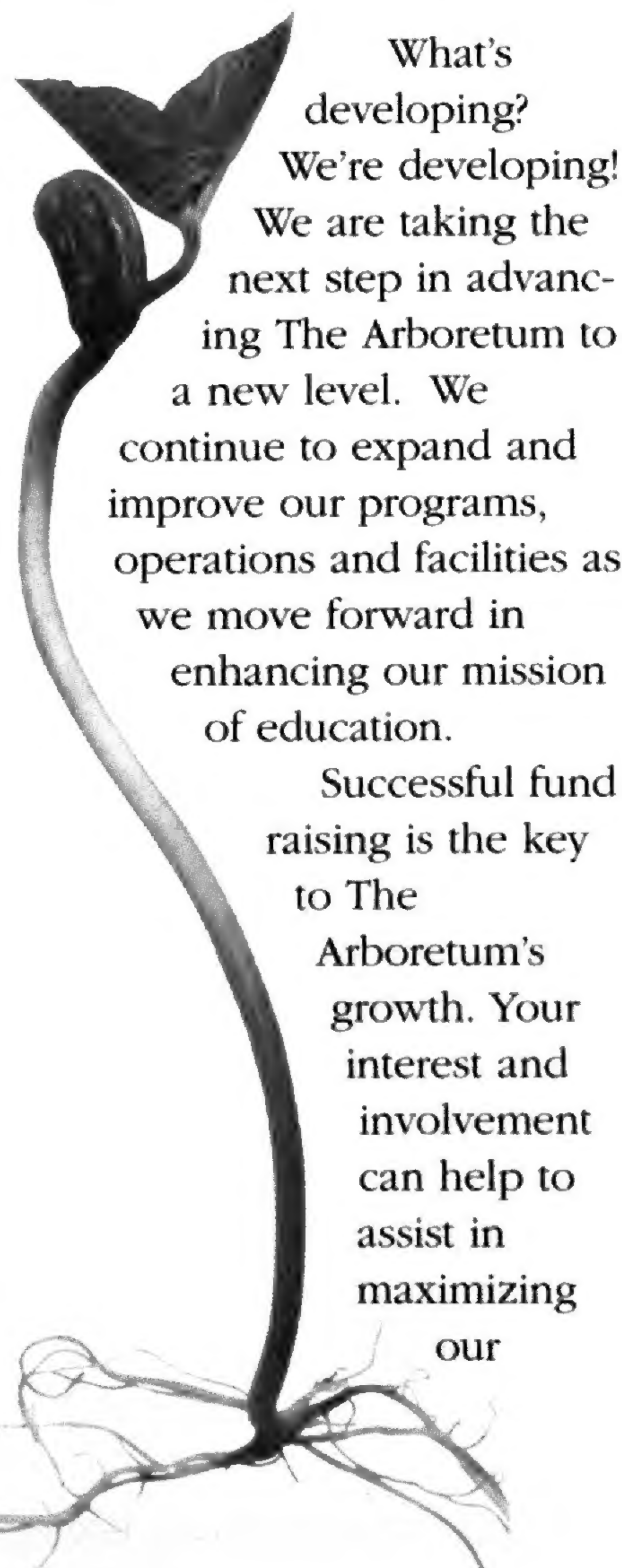


into our institutional practices. The concept of an "eco" garden needs to be conveyed to the community we cater to, with hopes that what is practiced within will be applied outside our institutional walls.

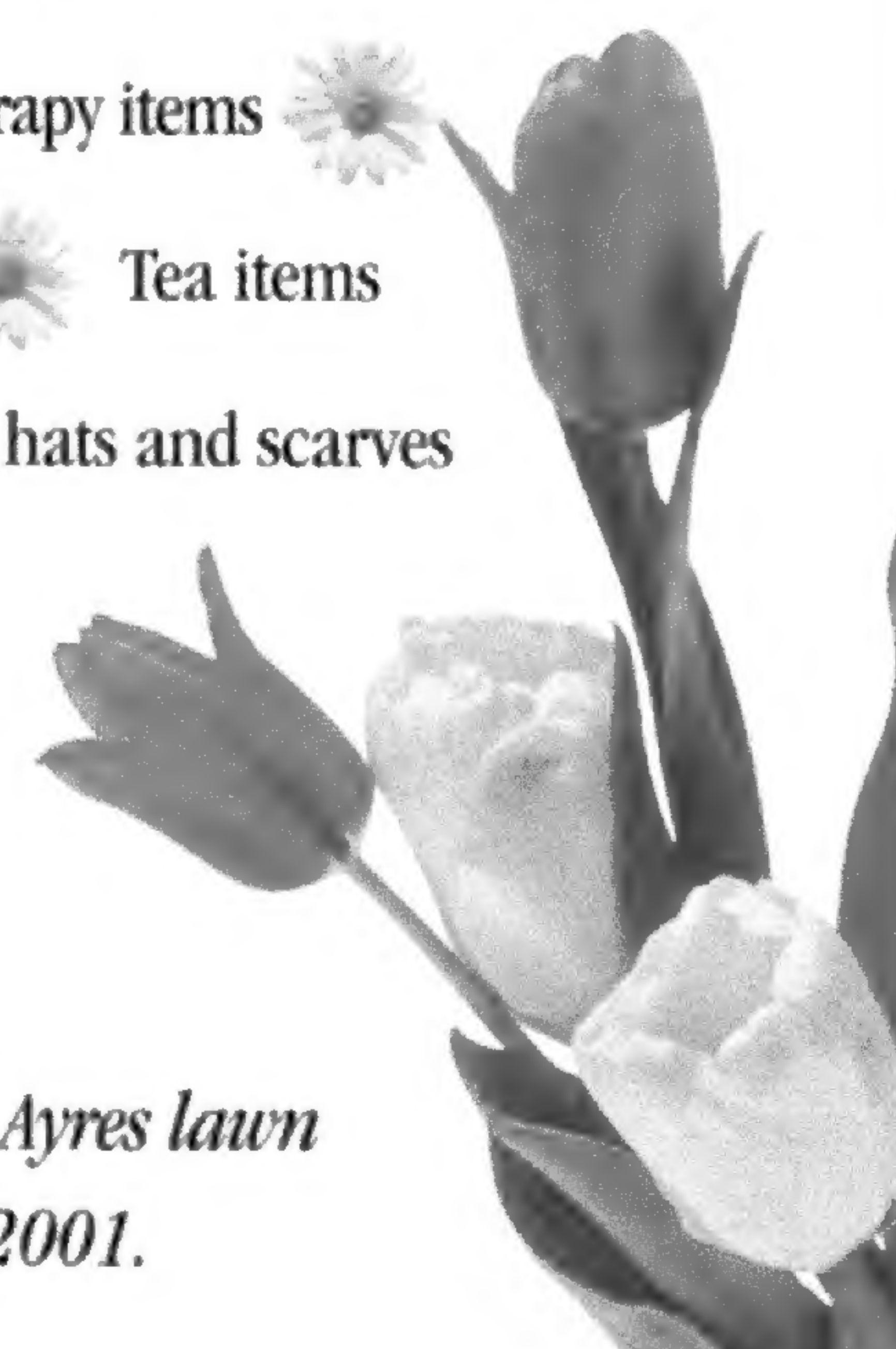

ENJOY OUR BLOOMS

APRIL

Located in the Water Conservation Garden, the native Bush Poppy (*Dendromecon rigida*), has spectacular lemon yellow flowers.

The Meadowbrook area hosts several species of the Princess Tree (*Pau- lownia tomentosa*) with its fragrant blue trumpet-shaped flowers which awe all who first see them.

The Sweetshade (*Hymenosporum flavum*), another fragrant favorite with yellowish blooms, is found in the Australian section.

On the west end of Tallac Knoll, the Purple Orchid Tree (*Bauhinia variegata*) sports profuse orchid-like blooms.

The red-flowered Spear Lily (*Doryanthes palmeri*), related to the yucca, can be

found in the northern part of the Australian section.

MAY

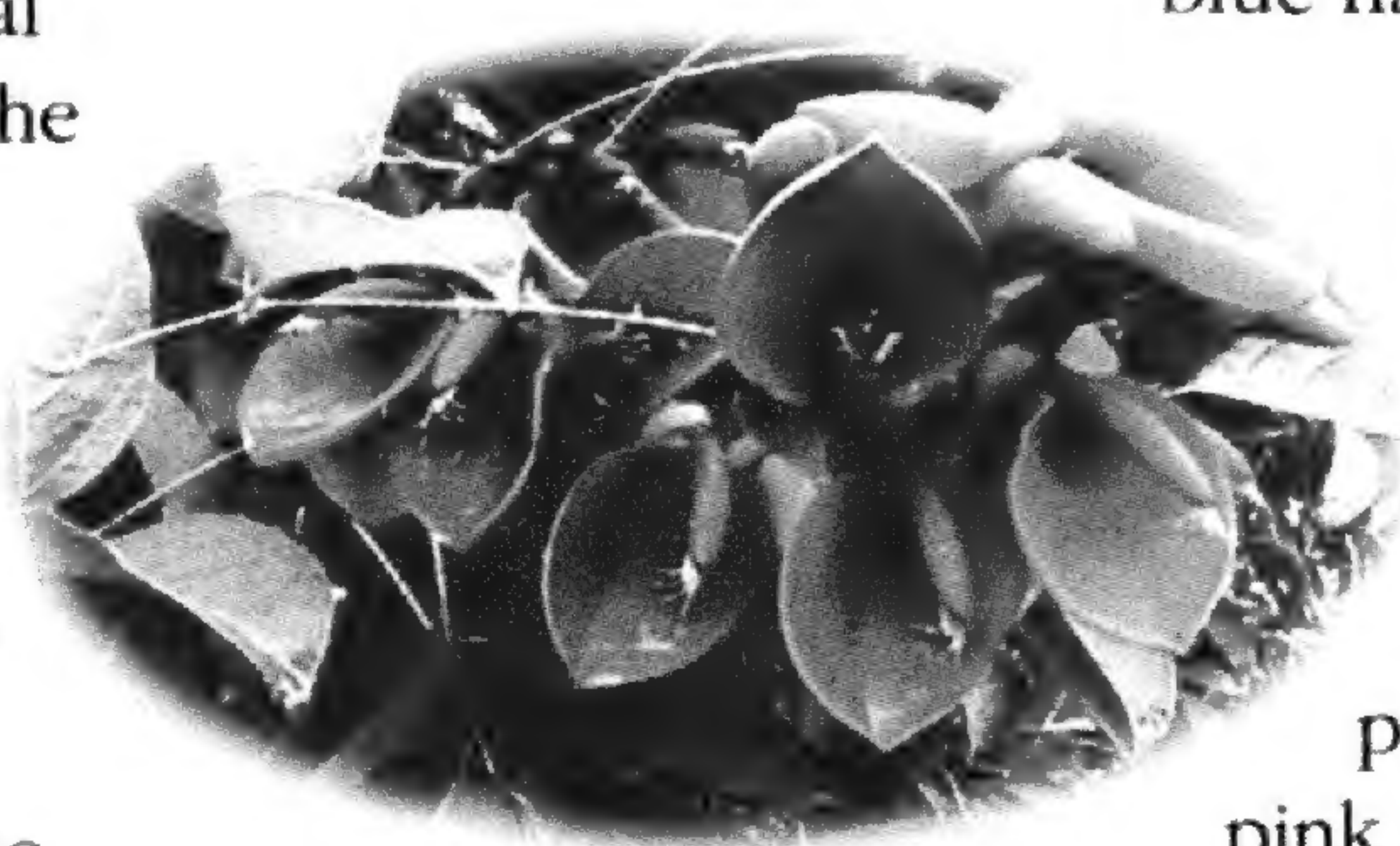
Found throughout the Arboretum, the Jacaranda Tree (*Jacaranda mimosifolia*) lights up like large lavender blue flames.

The Butterfly Bush (*Buddleia davidii*) boasts white, purple, and pink spikes of

flowers and can be seen in the Kallam Garden, Meadowbrook Area and the Water Conservation Garden.

Look for Kangaroo Paws (*Anigozanthos flavidus*) with furry flowers of gold, yellow, and pink throughout The Arboretum.

A grove of Cockspur Coral Trees (*Erythrina crista-galli*) that produces crimson-red blooms for a long period can be found near Roots and Shoots.

"Ancient Wisdom and Modern Medicine: Ethnobotanical Exploration in Central America and the Pacific", presented by Dr. Michael Balick of The New York Botanical Garden, will be the first lecture in this new series presented by The Arboretum. The lecture will start promptly at 7:30PM in

Ayres Hall on The Arboretum grounds on April 15.

Dr. Balick, Director and Philecology Curator at the Institute of Economic Botany at The New York Botanical Garden, is a renowned expert in the field of ethnobotany, the study of relationships between plants and people.

Trained at Harvard University, Dr. Balick did research on the native oil palms of South America. Since 1987 he has been working under contract with the National Cancer Institute to screen bulk samples of higher plants as potential anti-AIDS and anti-cancer therapeutics. This work has been based in Belize, Central America, where Dr. Balick helped create the Ix Chel Tropical

Research Foundation to study traditional medicine and ethnobotany of the region.

Other recent projects have included work in Brazil, Haiti, Thailand and India. He will bring copies of his latest book on traditional healing, *Rainforest Remedies*.
