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












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












### Long Range Plan Phases 1 & 2 Enthusiastically Received at Advisory Board Inaugural Meeting

The May 20th inaugural meeting of The Arboretum Advisory Board, established to assist The Arboretum with its development, concluded with an enthusiastic and positive response to the first two phases of The Arboretum's Conceptual Long Range Plan. All phases of the plan are expected to be completed by the end of 2002, or in early 2003. County administrative personnel, Arboretum staff and volunteers, foundation trustees and several other community leaders also attended the meeting.

### **Plan Phases Reviewed**

An exciting visual presentation by Victoria Pakshong and Bill Hardman, of Nancy Goslee Power & Associates, summarized the goals of the plan and outlined a careful study of the history of and present conditions at The Arboretum — including the strengths in its collections, its views, its natural water elements, its historic components and its unique and impressive potential.

Phase 3 preliminary plans for the "arrival experience" at The Arboretum were also unveiled along with evolving concepts for a children's discovery trail and for making the entire Arboretum an ethnobotanical center — focusing on the essential and fascinating connection between plants and people as the informing theme for future development of The Arboretum.

### 5-Year Plan

The Arboretum's current Five-year Plan identifies eighteen major programs and facilities initiatives ('projects') anticipated to be developed at The Arboretum over the next several decades. The Conceptual Long Range Plan is intended to guide The Arboretum's development for the foreseeable future — ensuring that development will be done in a well-thought-out, cohesive, harmonious and organized manner, with appropriate infrastructure and amenities — to be sure that the result is excellent in all respects.

### **New Advisory Members**

Peter Strauss and Dr. Eric T. Haskell recently joined the Arboretum's Advisory Board.

Mr. Strauss is best known for his leading role in the TV mini-series "Rich Man, Poor Man" and many made-for-TV movies and mini-series such a "Peter Gunn", "Masada", "Kane & Abel", and "The Jericho Mile", for which he received an Emmy. However, it is his love for the garden that has brought him to our Advisory Board. "If life is a process of wearing you down", says Peter, "then gardening is a way of staying even." Mr. Strauss's own garden is a botanic paradise including spiny and succulent plants, an orange grove, a Mediterranean garden, a native plant preserve and rose gardens.

Mr. Strauss is also national spokesperson for The Scotts Company Miracle-Gro®, the leading brand in plant foods.

Dr. Haskell, Professor of
French and Humanities at
Scripps College and Director of
the Clark Humanities Museum
also joins the Advisory Board.
Recently honored as the guest
speaker for the Millennium
Meeting of the Garden Club of
America, Dr. Haskell's distin-

guished career is equaled by his gift for informing and delighting his audiences. A frequent guest lecturer, Dr. Haskell has delivered over 300 lectures in twenty-two states and in nine foreign countries.

Dr. Haskell's publications, in English and French, cover a wide range of topics from nineteenth –century poetry to


garden history. His most recent book, Le Notre's Gardens accompanied an exhibition he curated at The Huntington Library, Art Collections & Botanical Gardens.

The Arboretum's Plant Science Librarian, Joan DeFato, was recently chosen by the international Council on Botanical and Horticultural



### "DISCOVERING CHINESE MEDICINAL HERBS"

The Arboretum continues its focus on ethnobotany as a major theme for education, interpretation and future development with two new lectures this fall and winter.

On Tuesday, October 1, Robert Newman, licensed acupuncturist and herbalist and former curator of the Chinese herb garden in the Nanjing Institute of Botany, Jiangsu Province, will talk about Chinese herbal medicine and Chinese medicinal plants as part of The Arboretum's continuing Ethnobotanical Series. The lecture. "Discovering Chinese Medicinal Herbs," will start at 8:00pm in Ayres Hall.

Mr. Newman will discuss basic history and concepts of Chinese herbal medicine, the doctrine of signatures (function follows form), various types of herbal preparations, and some well-known Chinese herbs, some of which can also be used as food. Live herb plants will be displayed and seeds of a few Chinese medicinal plants may be available for distribution.

Nelson Holmes provides an introduction to and overview of The Arboretum. Because The Arboretum segregates its collections geographically, you will also travel from one continent to another. Discover the bowl at Tallac Knoll; understand that Baldwin Lake is actually a sag pond, created by an earthquake fault; hear about wonderful and rare trees living here. View now-common flowering trees that were actually introduced by The Arboretum over the last fifty years.




