



# A BEHIND THE SCENES LOOK...

Our members and visitors rarely have the opportunity to visit and get a first hand glimpse of The Arboretum's greenhouses and nursery facilities. The importance of these facilities to the operation of The Arboretum is immense.

Our greenhouses and nursery are used to propagate, grow, and nurture plants for the many collections we currently have and future collections still being planned. Plants obtained for the collections may have arrived into the nursery in the form of seeds, vegetative cuttings or live plants. Often the material comes from private collectors, other botanical institutions, and even from native habitats around the world.

# Thousands of Plants Grown

There are literally thousands of plants being grown in our facilities. Some, such as the *Ceratonia* oreothauma, a close relative of the Carob tree, are nearing extinction or, even worse, are now extinct.

Often, arboreta and botanical garden nursery facilities have become the Noah's Ark for the plant world.

#### **Tropical Plants**

At the moment, we are working on developing a collection of culturally significant tropical plants that will eventually find their home in our Tropical Display Greenhouse. These plants are now merely pampered seedlings and/or recently rooted cuttings. Once these plants mature, they will be added to the Display House collections.

#### Orchids

Six of our greenhouses are home to one of the largest collection of orchids in the western United States. With approximately 10,000 plants, this collection is of world-class stature and provides blooming plants that can be seen year around in The Arboretum Rotunda and Tropical Display Greenhouses.

# RAINFOREST CONSERVATION AND THE SEARCH FOR NEW JUNGLE MEDICINE

On Wednesday, December 5th Dr. Mark J. Plotkin, prolific author and award winning environmentalist, will present his lecture 'Rainforest Conservation and the Search for New Jungle Medicine' in Ayres Hall at 8 pm. This fourth and final event in the 2001 Ethnobotanical Lecture Series is co-sponsored by The Arboretum and Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden.

#### Conservation

The declining cultural and biological diversity of rainforests has long been known to be the result of the expansion of our technology driven society. Ironically, technological advances in medicine have scientists clamoring for new natural products that could provide treatments for incurable diseases. This lecture will focus on a new approach to protecting indigenous cultures and the medicinal plants that they use. Called Biocultural Conservation, this method links biological and cultural diversity that exists inside the rainforest ecosystem.


# A "Hero for the Planet"

Named by Time Magazine as the "Hero for the Planet", Dr. Plotkin has spent much of the past 20 years working with and learning from the traditional shamans of Central and South America. He has served as Research Associate in Ethnobotanical Conservation at the Botanical Museum of Harvard University, as Director of Plant Conservation at the World Wildlife Fund, and as Vice President of Conservation International

in Washington, D.C. Dr. Plotkin currently serves as Research Associate in the Smithsonian Institution and as Executive Director of the a non-profit organization dedicated to protecting cultural and biological diversity in the tropical rainforest.

For over a decade. Arboretum volunteer, Ken unigley has spearheaded the enormous project of archiving The Arboretum's Aplin Collection, which was acquired by The Los Angeles Arboretum Toundation in 1989.

The Aplin collection houses some 40.000 color slides and an unknown number of black and white slides of plant species and landscapes that were photographed by Bill Aplin Aplin was hired by Irancis Ching, former Director of Arboreta and Botanic Gardens in Los Angeles County to photograph The Arbore rum plants and gardens.

Starting out as a pile of slides in boxes, today the collection slides are precisely mounted. specifically identified and arranged neatly in archival files thanks to Ken Quigley and his volunteer team of Carol and Hal Libby Mary and Toni Conrow, Berry Hoyr. Mitzi Gill and Kathy Liu.

While the future use of the Aplin Collection is vet to be determined, high on the list is use of the collection for education and publishing programs.



# New "Gardening in a Mediterranean Climate" Class

Mention mediterranean gardening and romantic images spring to mind. The Mediterranean is, after all, that "cloudless clime of starry nights" that Byron rhapsodized over while in Italy, and the sunny beaches of Spain and France where Sara and Gerald Murphy practiced living well.

A mediterranean climate does not only exist in those countries that border the Mediterranean Sea (and which include North Africa and Israel). Parts of Chile, western Australia, South Africa, and our own California, also enjoy a mediterranean climate. characterized by hot, dry summers and cool, wet winters. It is perhaps the finest climate for growing more varieties of plants than anywhere else on earth. This class will focus on the dual aspects of gardening in a mediterranean climate.

#### **Native Plants**

First, there are the native plants from mediterranean climates around the world that offer an exciting palette of textures and colors for the garden. From Elephant Foot to Erythrinas, ice plants to 'Sticks on Fire,' potato vines to proteas, they offer sizzle to the California gardener in a landscape that will use significantly less water than the traditional English cottage garden.

# Synonymous Plants

At the same time there are plants that, while not native to mediterranean climates, have become synonymous with that ambiance. Who can picture an Italian villa without seeing clouds of roses scrambling over the sunbaked walls or weaving

through plantings of lavender. This class will focus on the new Generosa and Romantica roses coming out of Provence, similar in appearance to the David Austin roses but bred in a climate better suited to California than are the English roses, which tend to get leggy in our balmy weather.
