
Your favor of the 6th inst. came to hand in due time; please accept my thanks for your kindness.

No. 19 and 25 were found 8 miles from Benson, Arizona.

I send you today by mail a pack of plants
No. 22, 29, 30 and 31, all of which I found in the vicinity of Benson. No. 30 is probably *Mamillaria* *rightii* and 31 probably *Agave geminiflora*. I will thank you very much for your identification.

Near Benson we found all of the following, *Cereus giganteus*, *Opuntia fulgida*, *Opuntia leptocaulis*, *Opuntia arborescens*, *Cereus engelmanni*






Enclosed find two boxes

C. goveniana No. 1 grows chiefly
in gulches near the creek and
I have seen trees 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet in
diameter and 40 feet high, stand
2000 feet above the level of the
sea associated with *Atem gonglani*,
Pinus ponderosa etc.

C. Macnabiana No. 2. grows on
exposed hill-sides, very gnarled
and on that account very prominent,
20 feet high, 6 inches 1 foot in
diameter, associated with
~~the same tree as above~~

about here.


I have a collection sent now

I take the liberty of sending
to you today some samples of
California Oak. I desire to study
up the Oaks of Lake Co. and
should like very much to have
you help me out, as I am
in doubt about some of them.

I also send you a
few branches of the 2 Cyprons
which seem to me still distinct.
No. 6 grows along creeks only
and it is a large tree, generally
with twisted trunk. The cones
grow more along the branches
in larger clumps and very
much hoarred. No. 7 grows
only on dry hill sides, very glaucous
foliage. Cones round and




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

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

I send to you today
a package by Mail, con-
taining Specimens of a pine,
similar to *Pinus tuberculata*,
but it grows in localities
about here where it seems
out of place, along Hill
Sides, in Ravines, and odd
localities. Trunks 2 to 3 feet
in diameter, 50 to 70 feet
high. The Cones I send, the
flowers and young cones
are all from the same branch.
Can you make out any
difference in it from
Pinus tuberculata?
