mouth I was encamped at Scorpion Harbor
Santa Cruz Island & found plenty of the sea
grass of which you now have a specimen. It
was without flower for the month was the same
in which my specimen was gathered 2 years
ago. Floating in deep water & occasionally
on the beach I found fragments of the
Phyllospadix, but never a complete stem
& leaf, those two leaves which I found must
have been torn up with large bunches of
Kelp & then become separated. I have never
seen it growing in the water & believe that the
shore of the islands is too exposed to rough
seas to allow it to grow in accessible depths; nowhere
in fact down here, except in the friendly shelter
of the Kelp.

And now as regards the oaks, I believe
since you give its height as from 5-8 feet
that I have classified and appreciated it



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many a time as "cussed" chaparral & I will
do my best to procure you the desired specimen
from the Tahiguas Ranch about 30 miles from
here. The oak which grows on the mesa near the
town & in it must be familiar to botanists.

Would you like some seeds of the Yucca
plant & do you know the tree which is called
by the vulgar Malva tree? It grows in gardens
here, wild on San Miguel Island & I have seen
it in San Francisco & Angel Island in S.F. Bay.

By the way, uncle Eugene Hilgard had
just returned from a short botanizing expedition
when last I saw him & he may be able to give
you "points" as they say in stock & board.
