At South Coast the Los Angeles Bay-Harbor District Garden Clubs (8 clubs) are taking on the program and have given \$90.00 for specimen trees to be planted on Arbor Day.

Descanso Gardens will be planting a <u>Podocarpus elongata</u>, gift of the La Crescenta Women's Club Juniors, and will have John Scott Trotter of musical fame as Master-of-Ceremonies for the program.

The Arboretum is fortunate in having as Mistress-of-Ceremonies, Mrs. V. T. Gil-christ, State President-elect of the California Garden Clubs, Inc. Three varieties of Hawthorns will be given to the Arboretum by the Aero Mayflower Transit Company, Inc. in honor of the hawthorn blossoms decorating the name on the Pilgrims ship, Mayflower.

Cassia <u>leptophylla</u> seedlings are being grown by Monrovia Nurseries to be given to the expected 3,500 children who will attend the Department's Planting Ceremonies.

Youth Workshops: The regular winter program is well under way. South Coast is having two school trips per week and has an enthusiastic bunch of twelve 4th and 5th grade boys and girls involved in a Plant Propagation Workshop, directed by Lydia Birt. Three top-flight volunteers are doing all this, and Joy Leighton is the "communication center" and a very good one. Phyllis Norris and Charlotte Rowland are taking the school trips.

Tak Niiya is enjoying some volunteer help at Descanso Youth Education from Glendale Junior College. Also, Mrs. D'Autremont continues and enlarges her work of Scout Counseling at Descanso. The Roosevelt School Handicapped Children are producing better plants than ever before. Tak is carrying five workshops and still manages to find

time for improvement - this time a small much needed lath house.

### Resume of Departmental Instructions No. 3-A

Subject: Absence and Illness Policy

- 1. Whenever an employee must be absent from his job for any reason other than sickness or emergency, he must obtain his supervisor's approval at least one week prior to the anticipated absence.
- 2. When an employee is absent due to sickness or emergency, his supervisor should be notified prior to 8:30 a.m. on the <u>first</u> morning of such absence and <u>no later</u> than 11:30 a.m. If the Department received no notification of absence, the employee shall be presumed to be taking an <u>unauthorized absence</u>. In addition to contacting his supervisor on the first morning of his absence, the employee must call him on each succeeding Monday until back to work.
- 3. If an employee has over 3 consecutive unauthorized work day absences, he will have a "break in service." This means:
  - a. Employees continuous service date (anniversary date) will be changed to the date of his return and he will not receive a step advance until one year from that date.
  - b. All earned sick leave is lost.
  - c. He will have no 75% or 50% sick leave benefit until he has been back to work for a period of 2 years.
  - d. All earned vacation for the current calendar year is lost. Carry-over vacation earned but not taken off is not lost.
  - e. An employee will not receive 3 weeks vacation until he has worked 5 years following his return from an unauthorized absence of over 3 days.
- NOTE: Employees should realize that change in service dates is a serious matter.

  An employee's status would revert to that of a new employee with the possible exception of retaining his higher step level and his retirement benefits.
- 4. All employees who are absent due to illness or personal injury (not an industrial accident) or due to death in their <u>immediate</u> family must fill out and sign a report of Illness or Injury form (No. 76R335) at once on his return to work and give to his supervisor.
  - a. Employees who are off work due to illness, 3 days or less, should have the report of Illness or Injury form signed by a physician, or a competent person acquainted with the facts (wife, husband, close relative).
  - b. Employees off work due to a longer illness must have the report of Ill-ness or Injury form signed by a physician.
  - c. In certain cases, at the discretion of the Department Head or his supervisors, the employee will be required to have his attending physician sign the Report of Illness or Injury Form. Such cases as extensive history of absence, absence that lasts longer than one week, two weeks; where the employee has used up all 100% sick leave benefits and is taking 75% or 50% sick leave even though his absences may only be for a one day period.
  - d. No employees will receive 75% or 50% sick leave benefits until all accrued and current 100% sick leave benefits are exhausted.
- 5. All employees having 6 months of continuous active service may use their 100% sick leave for non-emergency medical or dental care. 75% or 50% sick leave may not be used for this purpose.

## Arbor Day

Your Department has just been host to 2,645 children in honor of Arbor Day and Conservation Week.

On Saturday, at South Coast Botanic Garden, 225 people heard Supervisor Kenneth Hahn speak with great conviction on the multiple values of trees. Myron Floren, a new resident of Rolling Hills, also spoke briefly, and with his five young daughters led the way to the gift tables of Dodonea seedlings donated by the Yata Nursery of Torrance. The District Garden Clubs of the area gave a check of \$109 for the trees planted at the ceremony. Don Woolley and his entire staff were gracious hosts, and Mrs. Frances Young greeted the guests and the assemblage on behalf of the Foundation.

Descanso reports a particularly smooth program on Monday afternoon. The band was terrific and the crowd of 870 was interested and responsive. The Men's Garden Clubs of America gave a "Sarvistree" and the La Cresenta Women's Club Juniors gave a Podocarpus to the Gardens. These were planted by Tak's garden students. John Scott Trotter emceed. Supervisor Warren Dorn and other Guests of Honor spoke briefly. Tabebuia seed-

lings and Edison Tree Books were given out to children.

LASCA had a good time too! Monday afternoon 1,550 children and Youth Leaders assembled in the forecourt to hear the Foothill Junior High Band and the imposing list of VIP Guests, each of whom made a meaningful presentation. Deputy Supervisor Joseph Covell read an original poem he had written for the occasion. Dr. Armen Serafian, Vice-President of California Conservation Council, challenged the youth to keep their country clean and green.

The Arboretum District Garden Clubs gave an Arbor Day Tree Contribution Box for

year-round use and initiated it with a check for \$25.

The Aero-Mayflower Transit Company, Inc. gave three specimen Hawthorns. Hawthorn's common name in England is Mayblossom or Mayflower for which the Pilgrims named their ship. Don Herman's greenhouse and garden students did a fine job of planting the Hawthorns and an onstage demonstration showing how the seedling trees should be planted.

Cassia seedlings were given out with the Edison Tree Books. Rosedales gave the

seedlings for both Descanso Gardens and the Arboretum.

These three public programs are due to the care and cooperation of a tremendous number of people. Special "thanks" to everyone of you!




#### Staff News



## Youth Education

Population explosion is featured around the Upper Lagoon these days. Swans, Canada Geese, Coots, and Mallards are nesting. Humming birds are ready to leave the nest and Vireos about to hatch a new family. The Orioles are back at the feeders and White Crowns and Juncos leaving for the north.

Sunday, March 27, the Children's Workshop "Plant Propagation" from South Coast Botanic Garden visited the Youth Section at the Arboretum. Their instructor, Lydia Birt, and their parents came, saw, and were completely conquered. They want more workshops down there - and soon!

Plans are moving ahead to complete the children's greenhouse and establish a permanent outdoor work area by summer.

On April 26 and 28 curriculum personnel from six Bay-Harbor Districts will visit South Coast Botanic Garden to audit a school field trip and make evaluations in respect to the needs of their next year's programs for school trips.

At Descanso the gardens for the handicapped children show more growth than ever before and Tak's workshop gardens are a credit to all. He has recently built a small lath house, a much needed addition to the facility.

At the Arboretum Don Herman is having classes plant small plots of cereal grasses for observation. Pumpkins and cucumbers are up and eggplant, peppers, and okra are putting up a good fight against birds and smog.

#### From the Business Office

Beginning with the May 25, 1966 pay check the Auditor's office will determine the amount payable to each employee. Hitherto it has been the responsibility of the department Payroll Clerk to figure all deductions for every employee and report the amount to be paid on an Earned Salary Advance (ESA). From now on, the Payroll Clerk will not have any responsibility for employee deductions. If there is any question as to deductions the Auditor's office will be the one to contact. Only the gross amount will concern the Payroll Clerk.

In the near future each employee must complete a new W4 Form (a statement of the number of exemptions claimed for Income Tax purposes). All of this is necessary due to a new system of withholding Federal Income Tax from wages which will go into effect on May 1, 1966.

The rates at which taxes are withheld have been changed to more closely approximate the amount that must be paid so that employees will not have to pay so much at the end of the year. Although deduction rates may increase slightly for some employees, there is no tax increase and any over payment will be refunded at the end of the year. More about this later.

#### From Lee Wakeman

I should like to call your attention to the new benefit approved by the Board of Supervisors regarding the \$5.00 plan for all County employees beginning June 1. This may be the beginning of a fully-subsidized plan in the future.

Some pertinent facts about the "Overtime Authorization and Report" form being used in our department.

- 1. Should be filled out by the employee's supervisor who assigned the work.
- 2. Should then be signed by the Division Head as approval.
- 3. Should be sent to the office of the Executive Assistant for reviewing to make certain form is complete.
- 4. Written authorizatiom must be had before overtime work may be performed and must also be had before the overtime can be taken off.

# Mewsy Notes


Bob Gonderman and his bride are on a honeymoon to the Carmel area, so this reporter learned.

Lee Wakeman would like to call attention to the following:

In a memo to all Department Heads Mr. Hollinger called attention to certain legal regulations governing unauthorized absences or action of County employees, in particular he indicated:

- 1. An employee who fails to report to work at his assigned station without advanced approval of his assigned supervisor cannot legally be paid for such absence, and will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action. This includes the temporary leaving of a work assignment, as well.
- 2. Any employee who reports for work and fails or refuses to perform his assigned duties during regularly assigned work hours cannot be paid and will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Further, Mr. Hollinger was concerned that many employees may not be aware of the effects of any unauthorized absences on their status as employees and the benefits they may derive therefrom. The County Salary Ordinance indicated that any employee who is absent from his duties without leave for more than 3 consecutive calendar days (including weekends and holidays) has broken his continuous service and automatically:

- l. Takes a new anniversary date and must begin again to earn his niext step advance if not already on the 5th step.
- 2. Loses all current year full and part-pay sick leave.
- 3. Loses all earned vacation if he has less than one year service.
- 4. Loses his credit toward the 3rd and 4th week of vacation if he has had no prior break in service.

Each of the above mentioned losses is mandatory under the law and cannot be waived. Should you have further questions or have need for clarification of Mr. Hollinger's remarks, please contact your Personnel Officer.
