

THE CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

Our student-faculty government is positive rather than negative. There are certain standards for first, second, and third classes. The student's freedom varies according to her classification. The college students are classified every six weeks; the high school every three weeks. The system is based on 100 points, divided as follows:

25 points on grades

15 points on effort

5 points on neatness of dress and room

5 points on participation in school activities

50 points on deportment.

THE STUDENT-FACULTY COUNCIL

The 1935-1936 term will be the third for the student-faculty government in Montreat College. A committee of teachers is appointed the first of the year to serve on the council. Three officers have been elected from the student body for the council of the next term. Each semester two representatives from each of the college classes, one from each of the upper high school classes, and one from the two lower classes combined are elected members of the student council. The monitors in the dormitory are members of the council during their time of appointment.

STUDENT-FACULTY GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

The Government Association is founded on the belief that our students should learn to observe not only the ordinary rules and proprieties of life, but also to cultivate that general bearing becoming in a Christian. To this end, Montreat College has its rules and regulations which the students observe; but to this end it has in greater measure, a spirit of honor in upholding Christian standards of action. The ideal of the Association is that we go beyond the mere letter of the law and carry it out fully in spirit.

"Be ye doers of the Word."

PLEASE REMEMBER:

Members shall at all times conduct themselves as befitting students of Montreat College, thus maintaining the high standards of the school.

Every student shall be expected to keep her room in order. Each room is supplied with an electric light bulb at the beginning of the year. Extra ones must be paid for by the students.

In case of absence from meals, students shall notify the Dietitian by registering in a book provided for that purpose as far in advance as possible. Permission for absence must be obtained from the Dean or the Nurse.

Students shall observe a quiet hour Sunday afternoons from two to four. No callers are received on Sunday, except relatives who have no other opportunity to call.

Permission for visiting or receiving callers must be in writing, and must come from parent or guardian, and must be filed in the office of the Dean. Callers, if identified, may see the student upon whom they call, but may meet no other student without an introductory letter to the Dean.

Chapel exercises are regarded as an essential part of college work, and attendance is required of all students on the same basis as regular classes.

No visiting during study hall. No conversation in bathroom during study hours.

The privilege of spending the night in another girl's room is reserved for first-class students on Saturday night.

Our standards do not permit smoking, dancing, or card playing. Shipping offense, absolutely.

All absences from classes must be passed upon in writing by the Dean.

Laundry may be sent out each week as desired, or a student may do her own laundry; the school

provides irons, which may be used as the student wishes upon the payment of \$.50 a semester or rented for \$.10 an hour.

What To Bring With You To Montreat

Each student should provide herself with sheets, pillow cases, towels, bed spreads, blankets, dresser scarfs, curtains, tumbler and teaspoon to be used in room, and a flashlight.

Every student must be supplied with heavy walking shoes, galoshes, umbrella, raincoat, and sweater. All articles of clothing should be marked with owner's name.

Books, writing pads, ink, pencils, and notebooks, can be purchased at the College Book Store.

The real purpose of our Y. P. C. is the development of Christian character and training for leadership in Young People's Work.

Emphasis is placed upon life enrichment, missions, enlistment and training for service, evangelism, stewardship and comradeship.

Vesper services are conducted by the Y. P. C. each Sunday evening, using the Kingdom Highway plan, which offers to every student training for Christian service.

Volunteer groups meet two evenings each week (Tuesday and Thursday) for definite Bible study.

Nearby mission Sunday Schools offer to a limited number, an opportunity to teach on Sunday Afternoons.

An outgrowth of the Y. P. C. is a Christian Service Band for those who are interested in full-time Christian service.

THE SUN DIAL

The Sun Dial is the publication of Montreat College students and is issued in three copies during the year. The subscription fee is included in the \$1.00 which is payable by each student upon matriculation for student activities during the year. The purpose of the Sun Dial, while it recounts the outstanding events of the school year, is to encourage school journalism, and each student may hand in contributions. The last issue, commonly called the "senior issue," serves the purpose of an annual. In it are printed the major activities of the senior classes and commencement program— together with senior pictures, class histories, prophecies, wills and poems. The May Day pictures and one campus scene are always in the May issue which at the end of the year is bound in a blue and gold binder with the first two issues and are distributed to those who have paid the activity fee.

ATHLETICS

The Athletic Association was established in the school year of 1933-34. Its purpose is to create interest and encourage good, wholesome play and sportsmanship in all recreational activities. The executive board of this association, with the physical education director, Miss Smith, has charge of the various athletic activities of the year. Every student of the school automatically becomes a member of the association.

The hour from four to five every afternoon except Sunday and Monday is known as "Walking Period," but many activities besides walking are engaged in during this time. This is a period reserved to enjoy the baseball field, skating, the hiking trails, Lake Susan, and the facilities of the gymnasium, which contains a tennis court, a shuf-

fleboard court, an indoor baseball field, and a basketball court. Last year the outstanding athletic event was a basketball tournament which was conducted in the gymnasium between the various teams of the school, and this year it is expected that tournaments in basketball and also tennis and bowling will be conducted in their respective seasons. Although a very free choice is allowed to each girl in her respective recreational activities, everyone is required to participate in as great a variety of sports as possible.

It is also expected that this year the Monogram Club will be reorganized. This organization will be composed of girls who have received monograms for outstanding work in various extra curricular activities for the entire year. Come prepared to join us. You'll find it lots of fun!
