



ADVICE FROM OLD TIMERS

Friendships wisely made are your best college investment. Make enough of them so as to be able to live happily with all of us. We are a friendly lot—try our friendships.

Students can fall into two bad habits; let me warn you of them. They are loafing and spending money too freely. We don't advise that you spend all your time studying, but use all of it constructively. There are too many such ways of taking care of this "nothing to

do' problem: athletics, campus activities, reading, fellowships, and incidentally studying.

The folks at home still love you—write to them. Learn the *Alma Mater* and stand when it is being sung. Do some independent thinking—we won't think you queer. Take good care of library books and property. Give your room, your roommate, and your teachers a fair trial before you try to change everything.

PLEASE REMEMBER:

First class students may spend one week-end every six weeks away from the college. For this it is necessary that the student obtain written permission from her parents or guardians stating destination, mode of travel, and length of visit. *This permission must be filed in the Dean's office.* When students are planning to be away for a week-end, they should notify the assistant dean on the preceding Thursday.

First class students may go to Asheville on Mondays once every six weeks, or twice if no week-end is spent away from college. Lending of clothes or money is done entirely at the lender's risk. The college assumes no responsibility for losses so incurred. Money and valuables should be deposited with the dean; otherwise the college cannot be responsible for their loss. A simple banking system is kept for the student's convenience.

No electric irons, stoves, or other electrical equipment, except lamps and radios, are to be used in the student's room. Each room is supplied with an electric light bulb at the beginning of the year. Extra ones must be paid for by the student. There are not to be more than two lights in one room.

Students shall observe quiet hour Sunday afternoons from two o'clock until four in their rooms.

Permission for receiving callers must be in writing and must be filed in the office of the dean. Callers may see the student upon whom they call but may meet no other students without permission. Students are not permitted to go riding on Sunday afternoons except with parents or guardians. *Please do not embarrass the authorities*

or yourself by asking for this permission.

Students may go out for meals on Sundays if permission is given by parents or guardians.

Chapel is regarded as an essential part of college work and attendance is required.

Our standards do not permit smoking, social dancing, or card-playing.

Pay your student activity fee in the dean's office when you register. It is not to be included in the check for your tuition, but must be paid separately. This fee is used principally for the student publications.

Laundry may be sent out each week as desired, or a student may do her own laundry work; the school provides irons which may be used in the places designated by paying a rental fee of 50c a semester or 10c an hour.

WHAT TO BRING WITH YOU

Each student should provide herself with sheets, pillowcases, towels, bedspreads, blankets, dresser scarfs, a drinking glass and teaspoon to use in her room, a flashlight, and a rug if desired. Window curtains and a wardrobe curtain may be brought, though many students prefer to purchase these after they have seen their rooms and consulted their roommates.

An alarm clock proves convenient.

Suitable clothes (jodphurs or slacks) for hiking, a tin or enamel cup, a spoon, pocket knife, and a small plate should be brought in order to get the maximum enjoyment on numerous hikes. Tennis racket and balls may be desired. Students are asked not to wear shorts on the campus or in the buildings, but only on the tennis fields, athletic field, or when hiking up one of the surrounding mountains.

Every student should be supplied with suitable walking shoes, tennis shoes, galoshes, umbrella, raincoat, and sweater. All articles of clothing should be marked with the owner's name.

The regulation physical education suits, books, writing paper, ink, pencils, and notebooks can be purchased at the College Bookstore.

STUDENT-FACULTY GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

In order to give the student body a "hand" in its own governing, and believing it to be the best way of learning to observe, cultivate, and put into practice the rules and proprieties of life which make the individual a responsible and useful member of society, we are a body known as the Student-Faculty Government Association of Montreat College. As soon as one has registered, she becomes a member of the Association and thereby assumes the responsibility of conducting herself, to the best of her ability, according to the rules and regulations laid down by this Association.

This Association is composed of three divisions: the Senate, which is made up of representatives from each class; the House of Representatives who are the monitors from each hall; and the Cabinet whose members are the student body officers, the dean, the assistant dean, the president of the Athletic Association, the president of the Y.P.C., the house mothers, and a representative from the faculty.

Our student-faculty government is positive rather than negative. There are certain standards for first, second, and third classes, and a student's freedom varies according to her classification. The college students are classified every six weeks, and the high school every three weeks.

The system is based on 100 points divided as follows:

- 25 points on grades.
- 15 points on effort.
- 5 points on neatness of dress and room.
- 5 points on participation in school activities.
- 50 points on deportment.

Students who receive 90 points or more are on first class; those receiving 85-89 are on second, and those receiving 80-84 are on third. Those who receive less than 80 are restricted to the campus.

The ideal of the association is that we go beyond the mere letter of the law and carry it out fully in spirit.

RELIGIOUS ACTIVITIES

The Young People of the Church of Montreat College offers to the students a four-fold program of worship, instruction, recreation, and service. By means of Sunday Evening Vespers, through-the-week activities, service projects, and other avenues, character, initiative, and leadership are developed, enabling the students to advance in effective Christian living.

Prayer groups, with leaders chosen by the students, meet twice a week. These are entirely optional.

A Life Service Group, composed of girls interested in definite Christian work, meets twice a month. Miss Nannie G. Watkins is sponsor of the group.

The general officers of the Y.P.C. for 1939-1940 are: president, Bernice Stroup; vice president, Josephine Martin; secretary, Rae Pattishall; treasurer, Mary Ruth Redd. Mrs. Dorsey and Miss Rachel Henderlite are the adult advisors.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Athletic Association with the following officers welcomes you: president, Mary Mellette; vice president, Virginia Outlaw; secretary, Mary Maner; treasurer, Gertrude Gilmore. Miss Cooper is the Association sponsor.

The Athletic Association wishes to continue the splendid sports program of last year and also to begin a new and better program to carry forward the ideas and ideals of the students of Montreat College in the realm of athletics. The attainment of this goal depends upon you; so with your help and co-operation we are going to make 1939-1940 the most successful year that Montreat has yet had.

"M" CLUB

The height of athletic success is membership in the "M" Club. Its requirements are sportsmanship and participation in enough athletic activities to be a well-

rounded good sport and proud wearer of our Blue and Gold.

Members enjoy a program of special activities sponsored by the club. It's really worth your trying—so make your athletic goal "M" Club membership. Miss Margaret Smith is sponsor.

STUDENT PUBLICATIONS

The *Sun Dial*, which is issued in May, is the college annual. Its publication is directed by a staff chosen for literary and leadership ability.

Under the supervision of the same staff of officers and reporters there is published the news sheet, *The Dialectte*. Its purpose is to keep the student body posted on current happenings and to express the student view of school policies.

From both we extend to you sincerest wishes for happiness in our college. May you enjoy it, and it enjoy you.

Both of these publications are dependent on the Student Activity Fee of \$2.00. Please pay yours early!

STUDENT CLUBS

Hobby Club

The Hobby Club meets twice a month for a period of forty-five minutes, during which time the girls may pursue their hobbies or develop skill in the field of arts and crafts. Leather work, knitting, crocheting and flower making, are engaged in. Miss Helen Miles is the sponsor of this club.

The Lydians

The Lydian Club was organized by the Commercial Department of Montreat College for the purpose of promoting interest in the business world of today and to acquaint the students with commercial terms and experiences. The club is the namesake of the Biblical business woman Lydia, who was a seller of purple. The

social program is based on "educational fun". Trips are taken to business centers, interesting outside speakers are invited to speak to the club, and the Linotype, the club paper, is published every month. The club, sponsored by Miss Marie Burton, meets twice a month.

The Music Club

The Music Club is composed of students taking piano or voice from Miss Mary P. Lord and Miss Elizabeth Woodhouse. The purpose of the club is to teach a deeper appreciation of music and to give students a chance to participate in musical programs. The meetings are held monthly, and the programs consist of instrumental and vocal numbers. Two formal recitals were given in public this year.

The Nightingale Club

This club was started by girls who were planning to become nurses. The purpose of the Nightingale Club is to draw closer together the girls of Montreat who are planning to become nurses. Its aim is not only to get a preliminary view of what is ahead of them, but to better their personal health and that of their school. The motto of the club is: "To love; to serve; to better." Miss Henrietta Bedinger is sponsor of this club.

Science Club

The Science Club was organized to promote interest in those phases of science which ordinarily aren't included in the curriculum. The club has been one of enjoyment both in the program hour and the social hour. Miss Smith is the faculty advisor of this organization.

The Stamp Club

The Stamp Club has been organized for those who are interested in collecting and studying stamps. The club has bi-monthly meetings, at which time programs are presented and stamps exchanged among the members. Miss Webb is sponsor of the Stamp Club.

The United Youth Club

The United Youth Club was organized by the French, Spanish, and Latin Departments to give the foreign language students an opportunity to learn informally of the customs, language, and literature of those nations. This club meets once every three weeks.

Literary Societies

There are three literary societies, and each girl is a member of one of them. The college societies are the Philaethia and the Tritonia; and the high school society is the Delta Beta. The purpose of each society is to provide a social hour for one Saturday every three weeks. Officers are elected at the close of each semester. For the first semester of 1939-1940 the presidents of the societies are:

Philaethia—Mary Claire Allen.

Tritonia—Margaret Barringer.

Delta Beta—Margaret Sullivan.

Dramatics

Instead of a Dramatic Club we have a class in dramatics which meets for an hour twice a week. A study is made of the voice, the body, characterization, and stage technique. Several plays are presented during the year. A fee of 50c is charged. Miss Elizabeth Hoyt is teacher.

MONTREAT CHURCH CHOIR

The regular Montreat Church Choir, under the direction of Miss Elizabeth Woodhouse, who is voice teacher, is open to all college students with a pleasing voice and a true ear who are appreciative of cultural advantages.

THE GLEE CLUB

The Glee Club is composed of students in the High School Department who have a pleasing voice and true-ness of ear, and who are interested in learning to sing choral music. Part singing is stressed and good musical literature of different types is studied. The Glee Club

appears on various programs during the year. It is under the direction of Miss Woodhouse.

CUT SYSTEM

Absences from class, except for sickness, are regulated according to the system described below.

The *number* of cuts means the number each semester; the student's *grade* means her scholastic grade for the previous six-week term in the college and for the previous three-week term in the high school. No cuts are to be taken during the first six weeks.

In the college department, the number of cuts in any subject depends on the student's grade and upon the number of hours credit allotted to the subject.

Sophomore College Students

For a grade of *A* or *B* in a two-hour subject, *two* cuts; for a grade of *A* or *B* in a three-hour subject, three cuts; for a grade of *C* in a two-hour subject, one cut; for a grade of *C* in a three-hour subject, two cuts; for a grade of *D* in any subject no cuts.

Freshman College Students

First semester (second semester same as sophomore college.)

For a grade of *A* or *B* in a two-hour subject, one cut; for a grade of *A* or *B* in a three-hour subject, two cuts; for a grade of *C* in a two hour subject no cut; for a grade of *C* in a three hour subject *one* cut; for a grade of *D* in any subject, no cuts.

High School

For a grade of *A* or *B*, three cuts; for a grade of *C* two cuts; for a grade of *D* one cut.

Note:

No cuts are to be taken in the same six weeks in which student has been absent the number of times described above on account of sickness. No more than two consecutive cuts are to be taken in any subject. Attending another section than her own does make up

a cut, but a student may attend another section if the teacher permits. Cuts the day before or the day after a holiday count double.

Absences because of illness are to be excused when the student presents to the teacher a printed excuse signed by the school nurse.

POINTS FOR STUDENT OFFICES

In order that no student shall be over loaded with extra curricula duties, the point system listed below has been devised.

The maximum number of points for Senior College is thirty, for Junior College twenty-five, for Senior and Junior High School twenty, and for Sophomore and Freshman High School fifteen.
