Constitution of the Student Government Association

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be the Student Government Association of Montreat College.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of this organization shall be to develop the highest standard in personal honor and to develop a friendly spirit of helpfulness both here on the campus and in the days after college life.

Section 2. Government. This organization shall have its government based on the honor system. The honor system requires truthfulness and honesty in personal life, social rules, and academic work.

Section 3. Reporting. Each member of the student body shall make reporting a matter of personal honor. Any student who violates the regulations must report to the cabinet within twenty-four hours.

ARTICLE III

Pledge and Requirements for Membership

Section 1. Each student must sign the following pledge of honor.

"As a member of the Student Government Association of Montreat College, I accept my responsibility to uphold the regulations of the Association, to maintain the highest standard of personal honor, and to help others in carrying out the purpose of Student Government."

Section 2. Each student shall familiarize herself with the Constitution and regulations and on the 4th Saturday after entering college must stand an examination on the regulations.

Section 3. Each student shall be an active member of the Association, and must conform to its regulations as long as she is in college.

Section 4. Each student shall become a self-governing student *only after she has taken the pledge of honor and passed the examination on regulations.*

ARTICLE IV

Cabinet Member Officers

Section 1. The Cabinet shall consist of the following: President and Vice President; Editor of the Sun Dial; Student Christian Association President; Athletic Board President (all Seniors); Secretary (Junior or Senior); House Presidents (Juniors or Seniors); Assistant House Presidents (Sophomores); and Class Presidents (according to classes).

The Cabinet members may come from other classes than those named, if the Cabinet considers such a change necessary.

Section 2. Qualifications:

The President of the Student Body must have been on the Cabinet previous to the time of her election to this office.

Each officer is obligated to uphold the standards of Montreat College; to attain to high ideals in her personal life; to have a record of scholastic ability; and to promote the school spirit in general.

An officer must have in her last semester in the previous year and first semester of year elected an average of B, with the exception of the Secretary and the Assistant House Presidents, who may have a C+ average.

Section 3. Duties:

(a) President—The President shall preside over all meetings of the Student Cabinet and Student Body. She shall represent the Student Body whenever necessary. She shall have charge of elections. She may call meetings of the Student Body or the Student Cabinet at any time.

(b) Vice President—The Vice President shall perform all the duties of the President in case of her inability to act. She shall have charge of Freshman Orientation. She shall keep a record of all offenses and shall, with the help of the Secretary, make out notifications for girls who are being campused.

(c) The Secretary—The Secretary shall carry on all correspondence of the Association. She shall keep a record of all proceedings of the Association and of the Student Cabinet. She shall notify any girl who is being campused, and she shall assist the Vice President in keeping a record of all offenses. She shall notify any girl whose offense has warranted an appearance before the Student Cabinet.

(d) House Presidents—The House Presidents shall preside over all weekly house meetings and may call house meetings when it is necessary. Each House President shall be in charge of the monitors in her particular dormitory and shall instruct them of their duties. She is responsible for the conduct of her dormitory. The Assistant House Presidents shall assist the House President.

Section 4. Term of office:

All officers shall serve from the time of Cabinet installation in April of one year until the installation in April of the following year.

The President of the Student Body shall remain a Cabinet member until the end of that school year.

ARTICLE V

Elections

Section 1. The officers shall be elected according to qualifications as set forth in the Constitution. Nominations shall be by a straw vote of the Student Body.

Section 2. The names of 2 or 3 nominees will be sent back to the Student Body by the Student Cabinet after being approved by a majority vote of the Cabinet and their Advisor.

Section 3. The Student Body shall then elect its officers from the list of nominees. To be elected, a nominee must receive a majority of the votes cast.

Section 4. The Student Cabinet shall decide the order of elections each year.

ARTICLE VI

Meetings

Section 1. All students shall attend the meetings of the student body.

Section 2. Regular meetings of the Student Body shall be held each Saturday.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the President of the Student Body.

ARTICLE VII

Advisors

The Dean of Women shall act as advisor to the Student Cabinet and shall approve all appointments and nominations.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

By recommendation of the Student Cabinet or by petition of one-fourth of the members of the Association, amendments to the Constitution may be proposed to the Cabinet. Such amendments may become a part of the Constitution when ratified by two-thirds of the Association.

The Campus

The campus includes and is bounded by the following: the lawn in front of Alba and Anderson Auditorium to the bridge below the dam, including the tennis court; the paved road around the lake but not below the foot bridge across the dam; the road back of Gaither by the Infirmary, College Hall and to Lookout Lodge.

The extended campus has the following limits:

Main road by the store to the soccer field, the road back of the store, road by Dr. Anderson's house, Kentucky Road to South Carolina Road and Graybeard Road to the second bridge.

POINT SYSTEM

To prevent a small group of students from holding most of the student offices a point system has been worked out.

College Regulations

Standard rules for all classes:

(See class privileges for other Regulations.)

Smoking, Dancing, Card Playing, and Drinking are not allowed.

STUDY HOUR

1. All dormitories shall be quiet during study hour from 7:30 to 11:00 p. m., except during recreation period.
2. Leave a note on your door when leaving your room at night.
3. Every girl must be in her own dormitory by 10:15 p. m.

VISITING

1. Girls spending the night out on Saturday night must be in their own dormitories by 9:00 a. m. on Sunday morning.

2. Guests are to abide by the rules of the school.

3. Girls may spend Saturday and Sunday night in another room or dormitory. They must leave for the dormitory immediately after the dormitory bell rings.

The Saturday night dorm. bell is at 10:00 p. m. and the Sunday night bell at 9:30 p. m.

4. Any visiting after 11:00 p. m. or before 7:00 a. m. is considered the same as spending the night out.

5. Girls visiting or permitting visiting against rules shall be penalized.

DINING ROOM

1. Students are expected to appear neatly and appropriately dressed for meals.

2. Plaid shirts, sweat shirts, and tennis shoes are not to be worn in the dining room at any time.

DATES AND OTHER VISITORS

1. See class privileges for the number of dates.

2. Sign up in the office before having dates. All dates shall leave by 10:30 p. m. except on Saturday nights when they may stay until 11:00 p. m.

3. A student may entertain her date in the living room of her dormitory.
4. A student may walk on the immediate campus with her date during the day.
5. A couple walking on the extended campus or for longer hikes must be chaperoned by someone on the approved list; more than one couple may do so unchaperoned.
6. See class privileges for leaving campus with date.

DORMITORY

1. A student is not to enter another student's room when the occupant is absent unless accompanied by a member of the cabinet or the house mother.
2. Keep room in order. Do not abuse walls and furniture. The rooms are inspected and graded.
3. Electric light bulbs for overhead lights are furnished; students must buy others. Students are asked to turn out lights when leaving room.
4. Lamps and radios may be used in the student's room. Other electric equipment must be left in House Mother's room, and used by special permission. No matches or candles are to be used.
5. Dormitories must be quiet from 11:00 p. m. to 7:00 a. m.
6. Quiet-hour on Sunday is from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m.
7. Following a concert or program the dormitories are to be quiet on week nights.
8. Radios may be played till 11:00 on week nights if they do not disturb those in other rooms.
9. Dormitories are to be kept as quiet as possible on Sunday mornings.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE CAMPUS

1. Girls are not to trespass on any private property in Montreat.
2. Students may go to the Montreat store when convenient according to class regulations. Sign on your card when leaving and returning.
3. No sun baths are to be taken on Sunday. No jeans or shorts are to be worn on Sunday.
4. Students are subject to college regulations on all trips to Black Mountain and Asheville.

PERMISSIONS

Students may have "general permission" if it is the wish of their parents or guardians. This permission must be sent directly from the parent or guardian to the Dean of Women. Such permission includes week-end visits, having dates, riding with friends if chaperoned by one on the approved list or if a mature person is in group, and participation in any group activity or trip permitted by the college authorities.

TELEPHONE

Calls are to be made only by permission of the House President or House Mother.

WEEK ENDS

When going away for the week end, a student must sign up in the office of the Dean of Women. This should be done by the Thursday preceding the week end.

See Class Privileges for number of week ends that may be taken. See Faculty Regulations For Class Absences for number of absences that may be taken.

No week ends will be carried over from one semester to another.

When going away for the week end, a student must be back by 10:30 p. m. on Sunday night; or if the student has no Monday classes or is cutting Monday classes she must return by 7:30 p. m. on Monday night, or later by special permission when signing up to go away for the week end.

Students who have a D average or less will have one less week end in the second semester.

CHURCH CUTS

A total of four cuts a semester may be taken in Church, Sunday School, or Sunday evening vespers or a combination amounting to four cuts. Students must sign up on dormitory card before taking cuts. No chapel cuts are to be taken.

CLASS PRIVILEGES

These privileges will be automatically withdrawn if abused.

SENIORS

1. Observe all general regulations.
2. May visit a Junior or Senior during study hour. If one of the occupants of the room is a lower classman, may visit under same regulations as underclassmen.
3. May walk farther than extended campus in groups of three by signing out, but may not go beyond the residential section of Montreat.
4. One Senior may go to the store.
5. One Senior may go to Asheville and return to the campus by 7:00 p. m.
6. One Senior may go to Black Mountain.
7. Two Seniors may go together to the first show four times a month. Special permission must be gotten for attending second show.
8. May take week ends at own discretion.
9. "Lights out" at own discretion during week. "Lights out" for the week end under general regulations.
10. May have dates unchaperoned on any week-end night and two dates during the week in the period of a month.

JUNIORS

1. Observe all general regulations.
2. May visit during study hall under same regulations as the Seniors.
3. Three Juniors may walk beyond extended campus, under Senior regulations.
4. Two Juniors or a Junior and a Senior may go to Asheville together.
5. One Junior may go to Black Mountain.
6. One Junior may go to the store.
7. Three Juniors may go to the first show three times a month. Those on honor roll may have an extra time. Special permission must be gotten for attending second show.
8. May take three week ends the first semester and four week ends the second semester, in addition to the long week ends.
9. May have a date during the week once a month. May have dates on any week-end night.

10. "Lights out" at 11:30 p. m. and four late "unlimited lights" during a month. "Lights out" for the week end under general regulations.

11. May not leave the campus with date first semester unless chaperoned by one on the approved list or dating with another couple.

12. May date unchaperoned the last semester.

SOPHOMORES

1. Observe all general regulations.

2. Remain in own room or library during study hour. Necessary communicating between rooms may be done with permission of the monitor.

3. One Sophomore may go to the store.

4. To be chaperoned to and from Asheville in groups of four by someone on the approved list.

5. Sophomores may go in groups of four to the first show in Black Mountain two times a month.

6. Two Sophomores may go to Black Mountain during the day.

7. May take two week ends first semester, and three week ends second semester, in addition to the long week ends.

8. May have three dates a month on week ends, but none during the week except with special permission.

9. "Lights out" at 11:00 p. m. and "late lights" until 12:00 p. m. four times a month.

10. Sophomores may walk on the extended campus or in the residential section in groups of three on Sunday during quiet hour.

12. May not leave the campus with date unless chaperoned by someone on the approved list.

FRESHMEN

1. Observe all general regulations.

2. Study hour regulations. See No. 2 under Sophomore privileges.

3. Two Freshmen may go to the store.

4. May go to Black Mountain if chaperoned by a student on approved list.

5. May take one week end a semester besides the long week end.

6. May take two week ends away from college during second semester.

7. Beginning second semester, three Freshmen may go to the first show at night once a month, with chaperon.

8. Honor roll Freshmen may go to the show two times a month with a chaperon.

9. Must be chaperoned by a person on the approved list when leaving the campus with date.

10. May have dates two times a month on the week end; dates on weekdays only by special permission.

11. "Lights out" at 11:00 p. m. and four "late lights" a month until 11:30 p. m.

12. Five Freshmen may walk on extended campus on Sunday afternoon.

SPECIAL PRIVILEGES FOR STUDENTS ON THE HONOR ROLL

Those students who make all "A's" and "B's" on their report cards and who receive not more than three majors are placed on the Roll of Honor for that term. During the next term such students, if they are not campused, may have the following privileges:

1. May attend the first show at night in Black Mountain two extra times under class regulations.

2. May take an additional week end away from college.

3. May have an extra "date".

Honor certificates are awarded at commencement to those students who meet the following requirements: receive an average grade of B on each subject each semester, with no term grade or examination below C (the B grade cannot be an average of two B's and a C); receive not more than five majors a semester.

Scholarship pins are awarded to those who are entitled to certificates for three college years, on the above basis.

I. PENALTIES

1. Students will receive three majors for breaking a STUDY sign, and two majors for breaking a DO NOT DISTURB sign.

2. Students will be campused for the accumulation of five majors in a semester.

3. All majors are dropped at the end of the semester.
4. If a girl is campused three times she will be considered on restriction and must give up her honors on the campus.
5. Major slips will be handed out each time a major or minor is recorded.
6. Violation of standard rules will be considered a matter for Cabinet decision and may be referred to the faculty committee.
7. Campusing for major offenses is equal to an F on department.

II. REGULATIONS FOR CAMPUSED STUDENTS

1. May not go to the store.
2. May not visit in Montreat.
3. May not go to Black Mountain or the show.
4. May not go to Asheville.
5. May not have dates.
6. May not spend the night out.
7. May not take a cut for Church, Sunday School, or Vespers during this time.

LIGHTS

1. All lights are to be out at 12:00 p. m. on Saturday nights and at 11:00 p. m. on Sunday nights.
2. See class privileges for "late lights" and "lights out."
3. No visiting between rooms after room bell on Saturday and Sunday night.

Students are held responsible for any changes or additions in rules. Such changes will be posted.

"A HINT TO THE WISE IS SUFFICIENT"

The first four weeks will be considered a period of Orientation for Freshmen or transfers, who in order to become self-governing must prove themselves capable of such a responsibility. At the end of the four weeks period, each student will sign the pledge of honor and pass an examination on the regulations.

Remember we do not know all you can do, so show us by going out for all college activities.

The Student Government is to help you, not to catch you.

Remember that we have all been Freshmen ourselves, and don't hesitate to call on us. If you don't know, ask. Curious Freshmen make wise Sophomores.

The faculty is waiting to like you, so give them the opportunity.

This is the place to make friends, so don't go around with one girl exclusively.

Honor is too dear to be compromised for popularity, or for the fear of being unpleasant.

Remember that your health is important; take care of it.

Pay on time all dues. You are not a full fledged member of any organization unless you do.

Remember to read the bulletin boards each day.

Help to keep the college and the grounds in order.

Absolute quiet and attention is expected in chapel and in vespers.

Formal or semi-dress is expected for concerts and special Saturday night programs.

Be sure to read the constitution and the pledge of honor.

We would appreciate your playing only classical music and hymns on Sunday.

Faculty Regulations Regarding Absences From Classes

Absences are recorded from the first day upon which classes meet. Students who register late incur class cuts. Students taking cuts without adequate reason are reminded that a certain number of quality points are necessary for graduation.

Students are to report to the Dean of Women when they are planning to take cuts.

If a student absents herself with adequate reason from an announced or an unannounced written lesson, she may make it up by paying a fee of \$1.00 at the college office. She must present her instructor with a receipt from the office stating that such a fee has been paid before the work is made up.

If a student absents herself without adequate reason from a test announced a week before, she receives a grade of "F" on that test without the privilege of making it up.

If a student absents herself without adequate reason from an unannounced written lesson, she receives a grade of "F" on that written lesson but such a grade is not to count more than 1/20 of the term's grade.

1. A permanent committee on absences has been appointed, consisting of the deans and three other members of the Faculty.
2. The following excuses for absence are valid:
 - a. Certified illness.
 - b. Illness, death, or wedding in immediate family.
 - c. Representing a college organization at a conference.
 - d. Other officially approved activities.
3. Students must bring to the instructors of classes they have missed an excuse signed by the nurse or by the Dean of Women.
4.
 - a. Cuts before and after a holiday, including long week ends, shall count double. Cuts on the day the holiday begins are single.
 - b. There will be no cuts during the first term. Instructors will hand in tentative grades at the end of the first six weeks.

- c. Cuts will be based on grades for the most recent term or semester of the current year.
 - d. Cuts will be based on the student's record by subjects, not by a general average.
5. Three excused absences from one class will cancel one cut.
 6. The schedule of cuts is as follows:
 - A—3 cuts in every 3 credit hour subject; 2 cuts in every 2 credit hour subject; 1 cut in every 1 credit hour subject.
 - B—2 cuts in every 3 credit hour subject; 1 cut in every 2 credit hour subject.
 - C—1 cut in every 3 credit hour subject.
 7. The following classes may not be cut:
 - a. Tests announced a week ahead.
 - b. Laboratory work.
 - c. Remedial work.
 - d. Subjects in which the student is making a grade below C.
 8. The grade of a student will be lowered one letter for each excessive cut.

Special Infirmary Regulations

Please come to the Infirmary during office hours except in cases of emergency. Office hours will be posted in each Dormitory. At night report first to your house mother and follow her instructions.

Please report all injuries to the infirmary regardless of whether or not you think they are important.

If unable to attend meals for any reason, report to the Infirmary office as long before the meal as possible. Also if you are not able to attend classes, report immediately to the Infirmary.

Sore throat, rashes, temperature, etc., are always to be regarded as emergencies and should be reported promptly.

If put to bed in the Infirmary you will need kleenex, towel, bath-cloth, soap, pajamas, bath-robe, slippers, tooth brush and paste, and a card to write your mother. If you remain in for any length of time exceptions may be made. Other things needed must be obtained through the Infirmary Office.

Constitution of the Montreat Student Christian Association

ARTICLE I. NAME

This organization shall be called the Montreat Student Christian Association.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

The Montreat Student Christian Association, affirming faith in God the Father, in Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour, and in the Holy Spirit, Revealer of Truth and Source of power for life and service, according to the teaching of the Holy Scripture and the witness of the church, declares its purpose to be:

1. To lead students to faith in God through Jesus Christ.
2. To lead them into membership and service in the Christian Church.
3. To promote their growth in Christian faith and character, especially through the study of the Bible.
4. To influence them to devote themselves in united effort with all Christians to making the will of Christ effective in human society and to extending the Kingdom of God through the world.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1.

Membership shall be divided into two classes: Associate members and members in whom is vested the right to vote and hold office.

Section 2.

Any member of the College institution may become an associate member of the Association.

Section 3.

In order to conserve the purpose of the Association, the members in whom is vested the right to hold office must be members of a Christian Church, and thereby are already admitted to the fulfillment of the purpose of the organization.

Section 4.

The membership fee shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per annum and shall be included in the Student Activity Fee. For students entering the college the second semester the fee shall be fifty cents (\$.50).

Section 5.

Every member of the Association shall be expected to participate in the life and to share the direction of the Association, but only students shall be eligible to hold office.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

Section 1.

The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer. They shall have the usual powers and duties pertaining to such offices. They shall be elected at a call meeting of the Association in the second semester and shall go into office the first Sunday in April. They shall work jointly with the old Council for two weeks after election, and shall in joint session outline the policies of the work for the coming year.

Section 2.

If any vacancy occurs in the list of officers it shall be filled at a special meeting of the Association called for that purpose.

Section 3.

The four officers with the chairmen of all groups, the assistant to the Vice-President, the President of the Life Service Group and the President of the Student Body, ex-officio, shall constitute the Council of the Association and shall have general management of the Association.

ARTICLE V. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1.

At a call meeting of the Montreat Christian Association, nominations for the incoming President shall be made by written ballot.

1. Nominees for President shall be members of the Senior Class.
2. The two students receiving the highest number of votes, if approved by the Advisors and Deans, shall be considered nominees.

Section 2.

The Montreat Student Christian Association at a later meeting shall vote by written ballot on the two nominees. The nominee receiving the majority of votes cast shall be declared President.

Section 3.

There shall be a nominating committee, appointed by the retiring President, of five members, two members from the Council, two from the membership at large, and the Advisor. This committee shall present nominees for Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. GROUPS

Section 1.

The President upon her election shall in conference with the other officers and the advisor appoint chairmen of such groups as are found necessary to direct the activities of the Association. They shall serve for one year. The President in consultation with the Council shall appoint associate chairmen and members of the groups and may with the Council at any time make such changes in the personnel of the groups as may be deemed advisable.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

Section 1.

Notice of proposed amendments to this constitution shall be given at a previous regular meeting and shall require for their adoption two-thirds affirmative vote of the members present, except this Article and Article II and Article III, Section 3, which may not be altered or repealed except by the two-thirds votes of the Association for two consecutive years at its annual meeting.

ORGANIZATION AND ACTIVITIES

The Student Christian Association is made up of the entire student body of the College. The Council acts as an administrative body of the organization. The students are divided into the various groups and through these smaller divisions of the organization more efficient work can be done. These groups are divided at the beginning of the year and thus each person has an active part in the Student Christian Association.

Vesper services which are planned and carried out by the students are held each Sunday night. The aim is to have each girl participate in these programs. Sometimes we have outdoor programs, at other times candle-light services, and quite frequently missionaries and other guest speakers are secured.

By wholesome recreation and fellowship the S. C. A. seeks to aid students in Christian living. Play does a great deal to foster Christian Fellowship and establish good will and friendliness on the campus, and in so doing it is as definitely "religious" as any other activity of the S. C. A.

INFORMATION

Each student upon registering automatically becomes a member of the Athletic Association. The purpose is to develop physical efficiency, to create interest, and to encourage wholesome play and good sportsmanship.

Your athletic board is made up of the executive committee, the college heads of each sport, the tribe chiefs, together with the faculty committee on athletics.

The entire Athletic Association is divided into tribes. Each tribe has a chief, who looks after the interest of her tribe, and two cheerleaders. Intramural tournaments are held among the tribes in basketball, soccer, volleyball, softball, and other sports. The tribe who has won the most tournaments at the end of the year receives a cup as an award.

Membership on the teams is based on athletic ability, sportsmanship, and physical ability. Awards of numerals, letters, and chevrons are given to those deserving them.

The "M" Club, one of the most active clubs on the campus, is composed of the girls who have won their letters.

The Hiking Club is for the girls who enjoy hiking. There are moonlight hikes, breakfast hikes, and special fall and spring hikes for the members. So join the Hiking Club and have a good time.

For your sports equipment you will need shorts, sweaters, jeans or slacks, heavy jackets, thick-soled walking shoes, tennis shoes, badminton racket, and tennis racket and balls. These are good assets for the most enjoyable recreational program, and you can make a good beginning by having them the first of the year.

Constitution of the Athletic Association

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this association shall be the Athletic Association of Montreat College.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

The purpose of this association shall be to create interest in athletic and recreational activities among the students as a means of promoting physical efficiency, scholarship, good fellowship, and sportsmanship.

ARTICLE III

Colors

The colors of this association shall be royal blue and gold.

ARTICLE IV

Membership

Section 1. General Membership.

All students of Montreat College are members.

Section 2. Athletic Board.

The Athletic Board shall consist of the major officers, heads of sports, publicity manager, tribe chiefs, and cheerleader.

Section 3. The Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers and the tribe chiefs.

ARTICLE V

Duties

Section 1. President.

It shall be the duty of the president to call and preside over all meetings of the Athletic Association and the Athletic Board, to appoint all committees, and to be an ex-officio member of the same, and to perform all other duties incident to the office.

Section 2. Vice-President.

It shall be the duty of the vice-president to perform the

duties of the president in her absence, and to serve as chairman of the program and recreation committees.

Section 3. Secretary.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep a record of all the meetings of the Association, to keep a record of all meetings of the Athletic Board and attendance at same, and to attend to all correspondence of the Association. It shall be her duty to serve as a recorder of points.

Section 4. Treasurer.

It shall be the duty of the treasurer to have charge of all the funds of the Association, to be in charge of all the sales of pennants, stickers, and so forth, to keep a permanent record of all receipts and expenditures, and to pay out money belonging to the Association only on order of the president or faculty sponsor.

Section 5. The Executive Committee.

It shall be the duty of the executive committee to attend to the business of the Athletic Association between regular meetings.

Section 6. The Athletic Board.

It shall be the duty of the Athletic Board to have oversight of the business of the Association and to act in all matters pertaining to the interest of the Association.

Section 7. Tribe Chiefs.

It shall be the duty of the tribe chief to assume all responsibility for her group, and to cooperate with the heads of sports in arousing interest in and advertising all games of her sport.

ARTICLE VI

Elections

Section 1. Nominating Committee.

A nominating committee, consisting of the president, the sponsor, two members from the Athletic Board, and four from the Association at large (one representative from each class) shall be appointed by the president before March 1. Each executive officer as elected shall become a member of the committee also.

Section 2. Officers.

The nominees for president shall be obtained by the nominating committee, taking into consideration a straw

vote of the Association. These nominees will be presented to the Association and will be elected by a simple majority. The nominees for vice-president, secretary and treasurer shall be selected by the nominating committee. These nominees shall be presented to the Board for discussion and elected by a simple majority.

Section 3. Board Members.

All heads of sports and cheer leader tryouts shall be as follows: Nominees shall be selected by the nominating committee, composed of the four new executive officers of the Board, the former president and the sponsor. The names selected shall be presented to the whole Board for discussion and the selection made by a simple majority.

The tribe chiefs shall be elected by their own tribes, the nominees being approved by the Board.

The head cheer leader shall be elected by the Association from the three girls selected by secret ballot and by a simple majority.

Section 4. Vacancies.

Any vacancy in any office, except tribe chief, shall be filled by special election of the Board. The vice-president does not succeed the president unless elected to do so. Any tribe chief vacancy shall be filled by special election by the tribe.

Section 5. Eligibility.

A girl who has been or is on restriction is not eligible for election or appointment. A girl who is restricted is automatically dropped from the Board.

ARTICLE VII

Section 1. The Association.

A meeting of the Association may be called by the president at any time.

Section 2. Athletic Board.

a. There shall be a meeting of the Athletic Board whenever necessary, at which the Board members should be present.

b. At least one member from the faculty committee on athletics shall attend each of these meetings.

ARTICLE VIII

Quorum

Section 1. The Association.

Two-thirds of the members of the Association shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. The Athletic Board.

Two-thirds of the members of the Athletic Board shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

Amendments may be made to this Constitution by a two-thirds majority vote of the Athletic Board.

CONSTITUTION OF STUDENT PUBLICATIONS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. Name

The name of this organization shall be The Staff of Student Publications.

Section 2. Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to edit and publish a yearbook which shall be called the *Sun Dial*, and a student newspaper, which shall be called the *Dialette*.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Editor-in-Chief

The chief executive shall be the editor-in-chief, whose principal duty shall be to supervise the publication of the *Sun Dial*; she shall give any needed assistance to the associate editors. She shall preside over all Staff meetings, shall call special meetings of the Staff when deemed necessary, and shall represent the publications on the Student Cabinet.

Section 2. The Business Manager

The duties of the Business Manager shall be to take charge of the financial records. She shall also act in capacity of secretary at the meetings of the Staff.

Section 3. The Associate Editors

There shall be two associate editors, one chosen from the high school and one chosen from the college, whose chief duties shall be to plan and supervise the publication of the *Dialette*, and to give any needed assistance to the editor-in-chief.

Section 4. The Advertising Managers

There shall be two Advertising Managers. They shall be responsible for obtaining advertisements for the *Dialette* and the *Sun Dial*.

Section 5. The Literary Editor

The duty of the literary editor shall be to assist the editor-in-chief in preparing copy for the *Sun Dial*.

Section 6. Other Staff Members

The duties of other Staff members shall be to assist in the publication of the *Sun Dial* and the *Dialette*.

ARTICLE III

Section 1

Before April first, the Editor shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of four members from the Staff and two members (one representing College and one High School) from the student body at large. This committee shall choose nominees for Editor-in-Chief and Business Manager, taking into consideration the results of the straw vote by the student body for election. These shall be elected by a simple majority of the vote.

Section 2

The Associate Editor from college, the Literary Editor of the *Sun Dial*, and the Advertising Managers shall be elected by the retiring executive staff and the new Editor-in-Chief and Business Manager.

Section 3

Other members shall be elected by the Staff when considered necessary.

Section 4

The Editor-in-Chief, Business Manager, Associate Editors, Literary Editor, and Advertising Manager shall assume their duties April first. However, the retiring Editor and Business Manager shall continue their duties in regard to the *Sun Dial*. The new Staff shall assume complete responsibility for publication of the *Dialette*.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1

Meetings of the Staff shall be held at stated intervals in accordance with the schedule of student activities. These

meetings shall be held at a certain hour and place, as designated by the Editor.

Section 2

Special meetings may be called by the Editor when deemed necessary.

ARTICLE V

The Constitution of the Student Publications shall be amended by a two-thirds majority vote. Prospective amendments shall be presented to the Staff at the regular meeting previous to the one at which the vote shall be taken.

BY-LAWS

1. Nominees for Editor-in-Chief and Business Manager shall be notified prior to their presentation to the student body for election.

2. Members shall be automatically dismissed from the Staff when more than two scheduled meetings are missed without reasonable excuse.

Other Student Organizations

The Music Club

The Music Club is composed of students taking piano or voice. The purpose of the club is to instil in the students a deeper appreciation of music and to furnish opportunities for participation in musical programs consisting of instrumental and vocal numbers. Any who are not studying music may join as associate members.

Montreat Church Choir

The regular Montreat Church Choir, under the direction of Miss Elizabeth Woodhouse, who is one of our voice teachers, is open to all college students with a pleasing voice and a true ear who are appreciative of cultural advantages.

Kappa Pi Beta Club

The Kappa Pi Beta Club is a literary club, membership in which is granted upon the presentation and approval of some original story, poem, or essay. The object

of this organization is to encourage the appreciation of good literature and the development of creative work on the part of its members.

"M" Club

The Monogram is the honorary athletic organization on our campus and is really the most fun of all. To become a member, all you have to do is be a good sport and go out for all athletic activities. So, come on girls, let's join the proud ranks and wear the Montreat "M".

Dramatics

Instead of a Dramatics Club we have a class in dramatics which meets for an hour twice a week. A study is made of the voice, the body, characterization, and stage technique. Several plays are presented during the year. A fee of five dollars is charged.
