## A Retrospect of The Commercial Co-ed Club

It was seven years ago when an ambitious young teacher, fresh out of North Carolina College with a B. S. Degree in Commercial Education came to Mary Potter to organize a Commercial Department.

This teacher, Miss Margie C. Morris, full of new ideas and motives to portray an added atmosphere of cultur. I refinement and to give a practicable use for the classroom instructions, established a club, and it was given the befitting name of "The Commercial Co-ed Club."

The charter members of the Club established its activities by publishing two issues of "The Black and White Dispatch." The amilitions of the members were not satisfied until they sponsored a "Manless Wedding" and a play entitled "A Day In An Office," written by members of the Club. Toward the close of that school year, the members realized that some recognition should be given to the most industrious and ambitious student in the organization. After determining specific qualities, the member was selected to become recipient of their scholastic award. That year also marked the beginning of the traditional Spring hike at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth R. Chavis, proclaimed the Mother of the Club.

The ensuing year was more or less a repetition of the first. That year, the "Mantess Wedding" was supplanted by a "Womanless Wedding."

Very few of us were here when the C. C. C's. presented to the faculty and student body an original play entitled "A Night In The Dormitory," typifying scenes of boarding school life. In checking our treasured memoirs, we find that this event dates back to the senior class of 1948-49, which is-this year-the class graduating from college. That class was quite talented in originality for it was they who demonstrated, in eight scenes, "The Incorrect and Correct Thing To Do," in the theater, church, dining hall, and school.

Many thought that some one was due to have some praise, and since Miss Morris was continually being patted on the back because of the increasing successful endeavors of the club, it was unanimously decided to thank our mothers with a "Mother's Day Program." During that year, there was quite a debate in the minds and hearts of many as to which program was taken more serenely, the Mother's Day or the Thanksgiving. The first related gratitude and praise to cherished mothers, and the latter reviewed the origin of the occasion. Both served the momentous times flawlessly. It was also during that year that personalized Christmas greeting cards were introduced within our folds.

Just as mortgages are burned in thankfulness when the final debts on real property are paid, so did the Club celebrate their thankfulness when they buried the devil during a colorful ceremony referred to as "The Devil's Funeral." Unlike anything ever presented here, The Devil's Funeral was quite an attraction for the adults as well as the students. We all rejoiced in knowing that Old Satan or better known as "Lucifer Redhorn Devil" could no longer torment those with good intentions of walking the straight but narrow path. The close of that eventful year was met in the form of a "School Closing Program." We will always associate the graduates in the class of 1950-51 with these two particular activities.


