Three trips were taken by the team this year, one to Davidson, Monroe, and Winston-Salem. The first was the opening game when North was downed 27-6. The Mustangs met defeat at the hands of Monroe and Winston-Salem Gray, the last two games of the season. The battle at Monroe provided a thrilling first half with the Mustangs ahead at its close. A series of end runs in the final two periods, however, proved to be the "straw that broke the Mustang's back." The season ended with an exciting game against Gray in Winston-Salem when the opponent managed to score early in the first period, and from then to the final gun, it was a contest of defense. Paul Biggers was elected "Lineman of the Week" for his outstanding defensive play.

Harding team. After holding their own in the first half, Myers Park gave in to the superior strength and reserves of their city rival.

The Mustangs entertained six teams this year, five of them at Memorial Stadium and one at Griffith Park. The latter was their Homecoming contest, which ended in a 13-13 tie with a highly-spirited Mooresville team. Their opening game in the stadium was with Reidsville, a team which finished the season undefeated and won the state AA Championship. After leading through the first half, the "second half blues" allowed the visitors to score twice on long runs. The Mustangs finished on the short end of a 26-14 score. John Black was voted "Outstanding Back of the Week" for his fine work in this game. The
following week the Mustangs downed East 20-7, a game highlighted by excellent running and blocking. After falling to Harding, the team defeated Hanes of Winston-Salem 19-13 on October 9. Because of his outstanding line play against Hanes, Burwell Shore was picked "Lineman of the Week" by The Charlotte Observer. The next week, Myers Park routed West 26-0, a guarantee for second place in the GCAA. The last game in the stadium was a $26-0$ loss to a strong Albemarle eleven.

The feature of the ' $54-$ ' 55 squad was David Busbin, all-city halfback who led this area in scoring and rushing. This year thirty-five boys won monograms; of this number twenty-one were sen:ors, nine juniors, and five sophomores.




These awards are made annually to the three outstanding players as voted by the team itself. Due to a tie in the voting, two trophies were given to outstanding linemen. Pop LeNeave, who makes the most valvable player award possible, was on hand to present the trophy.

The 1955 Mustang basketball team, coached by George Powell, brought Myers Park its first championship by winning the Greater Charlotte AA championship with a 7-1 conference record.

Led by co-captain, John Stafford and Bobby McClure, the one-two scoring punch, and Mike Braswell, the speedy playmaker, the team started slowly. They dropped the first five games to Central, Gastonia, Albemarle, Columbia, and Gastonia a second time, although the AAA Gastonia had to go all out io shade the Greenies in the last minute.

The squad picked up speed in beating Albemarle, and after a loss to Spartanburg, Coach Powell's boys won three in a row as Ken Owen bagan finding the range and John Eddie Hill's play improved. After losing to Central, the Mustangs took Harding, West, East, North, and Wadesboro before being ups $\equiv \dagger$ by West and losing to Spartanburg.

On February 22 an overflow crowd of thirteen hundred (1300) watched the Mustangs, tied with Harding for the conference lead, decisively defeat the Rams for Myers Park's first championship.

The Mustangs placed John Stafford on the all city-county team, while McClure was a second team selection. Stafford led the scoring, closely followed by McClure and Owen. Hill, Braswell, and Conrad picked up a majority of the remaining points. Hill and Braswell, two of the most underrated players in the city, led the team on defense, while Braswell teamed with Stafford and McClure to lead the playmaking.

The bench, headed by Black and Conrad, turned in sterling performances in the clutch. This season has established Myers Park as one of the AA basketball powers in North Carolina for years to come.
