If you have not renewed please take a moment now! If everyone does their bit we should be able to complete our logo in no time.

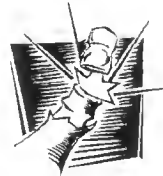
More you can do!

OFF THE BEATEN TRACK

Easter at Marich Pass

Friday 2- Wednesday 7 April

The Marich Pass is a deep, rocky cleft carved where the Moruny river emerges from the Cherangani Hills onto the dry plains of the Lake Turkana Basin.

Two kilometres from here is the Marich Pass Field Studies Centre (MPFSC) from where this safari will be based. All meals and overnights will be at MPFSC.

Marich Pass is at an altitude of 3000ft. Birdlife in the area is prolific and in early April, migration of palearctic species should be at its peak. Elephants are also regular visitors.

Travel to Marich Pass. It is 520 kms from Nairobi to MPFSC, about 8 - 9 hours drive.

We would like to keep the itinerary as flexible as possible as there is so much that can be done from Marich Pass. Rather than an itinerary we list the activities we anticipate for our trip.

- ✓ Ethnobotany and birdwalks.
- ✓ Visit local homesteads, visit traditional markets or even try gold panning.
- ✓ Whole day walk to the dome of Koh up the Cherangani Hills

- ✓ Hill walk to rock shelters and caves and up Mt Mtelo.
- ✓ Visit the Turkwell Gorge hydro - electric project 50 kms from the centre.
- ✓ Picnic lunch at the Nasalot National Reserve which is enroute to the Gorge and is home to a variety of bush game, including elephant, buffalo, lion and antelopes. Entry fee about 100/- per person.
- ✓ Drive 35 kms to the South Turkana National Reserve in dry and rugged hill northeast of the Centre, domain of Turkana herders. Entry fee unknown.
- ✓ Visit the Irrigation Schemes of the Wei Wei Valley about 45 minutes drive from the Centre.

Accommodation at the Centre varies from bandas to dormitories and camping with rates varying accordingly. Facilities available include clean drinking water, latrines, showers, firewood. Mattresses and blankets are also provided. Lighting is by kerosene lamps.

Members should come prepared for a variety of weather conditions. You should have mosquito repellent although mosquitos are not a serious problem at Marich. Also sunglasses, sun cream and hat as there is intense sunlight.

Fuel is available from Sigor, 7 kms from the Centre. Although we will travel in convoy, directions will be available to all participants. Road conditions are good.

Costs for the 5 nights:

MUSEUMS AND MUSEUM SITES

With presentation of the Society membership card, members benefit from free entry to Museums and sites of the National Museums of Kenya that are open to the public.

This month we begin to profile these museums and sites.

Jumba la Mtwana

Located 20 kilometres north of Mombasa, this site represents the remains of a 13 century Swahili settlement. Abandoned about a hundred years after its foundation, Jumba still contains standing remains of domestic houses, mosques and tombs. The domestic houses are rich in carved vidaka (or niches) and arched doors, forming part of the decorative motifs.

James Kirkman first excavated the site in the 1970's. A National Museum team led by George Abungu carried out several small scale excavations and made a comprehensive survey of the site in 1991.

Located on a beautiful stretch of sandy beach where marine turtles nest, Jumba is a popular picnic venue for residents and tourists alike.

Access to Jumba is easiest by car. After passing Mtwapa trading centre along the main Mombasa - Malindi road, there is a large sign indicating a turn-off to the right; from there, you follow a dirt road for about three kilometres until reaching the site.

There is a small site museum exhibiting some archaeological finds, as well as local corals. There is a space for camping, as well as shower and toilet facilities. Cold sodas are available at the ticket office.

There is a nominal charge for those wanting only access to the beach for picnics.

Reporting on the Waterbird Counts

The 1999 January waterbird counts are in progress.



At Manguo, Limuru, Afrotropical Ducks and Geese were recorded in high numbers, over 500. In lakes Bogoria and Nakuru, flamingos were the most abundant. Lake Bogoria had the highest number of Flamingos, over 1.07 million. Lake Nakuru recorded a lower number of flamingos compared with the previous counts, 12,257.

WORLD BIRDWATCH 1999

Saturday 2 & Sunday 3 OCTOBER

From Finland to Ecuador, Hong Kong to Ghana, people will be taking part.

Kenya participants - all volunteers - will be leading walks at Important Bird Areas, and trying to get a long list of species for the weekend.

We need you to participate in any of the following ways: by going out and seeing the birds, leading the bird walks or raising funds for transport and food.

We also request donations of binoculars, bird books and slide projectors for the IBA sites.

In 1997 our efforts in Kenya resulted in the highest list worldwide with 781 species, and collected locally over 300,000/- for printing a bird guide for schools.

So look out for future correspondence on this event - you'll want to be part of the action!

IN THE NEWS

Protests at coral harvest

Environmental lobby groups in Malindi ...protested at the heavy destruction of corals by foreign investors licensed to export live aquarium corals to Europe.

The lobby groups asked Malindi DC Claire Omolo, the Kenya Wildlife Service and the Fisheries Department to propose cancellations of the licences.

More than 100 workers have been hired by the companies owned by Italians to break and pack more than four tonnes of corals for export every day off Malindi, Watamu and Mamburi coastline.
