I commend to your notice this collection, which I believe to contain many of the best novelties of the season offered at prices in keeping with the times.

They have been tested two or more years, thus proving their merits. The flowers of all are solid, large and double. Their habit strong and robust, and the set contains nothing of a weak or sickly nature.

- Mrs. M. R. Parker, Jr. A seedling from Ada Spaulding and Ivory, combining all the good qualities of its parents. Dwarf, robust habit, with unusually strong stem and fine foliage. Flowers seven and a half to eight and a half inches in diameter, with broad cupping and incurving petals, the inner surfaces of which are a rich deep pink, reverse light silvery shade, forming a bright contrast. Flowers developed and cut October 4th, fully ten days in advance of Mrs. E. G. Hill, grown side by side and under same conditions. The first large early pink in market; in fact, the first large flowering variety of any color. Awarded certificate at New York by the Chrysanthemum Society of America.
- Miss Georgie Crompton. Magnificent pure self-colored deep golden yellow, as intense a shade as Golden Wedding or Dailledouze. Broad flat petals, which incurve and cup with age, forming a large round solid ball; fine foliage, stiff stem, good keeper and shipper.
- Marie Valleau. A beautiful bloom, of large size, very nearly spherical in form, petals broad, thick and heavy, cup-shaped and finely incurving, rich, soft cameo pink, shading deeper towards the center. Habit the best, stiff and erect stem, covered with most luxuriant foliage.
- Latest Fad. A wonderful curiosity and peculiar freak of nature. A mammoth bloom, borne on stiff, erect foot-stalks, with ribbon or cord-like petals, eight inches and upwards in length, gracefully falling around the stem like a soldier's plume. Solid to the center. Color rich yellow, at times mottled striped, and slashed with bright crimson and bronze. Of all the "oddities," this is the most curious and best. A grand single stem pot plant and magnificent exhibition bloom.

Mrs. J. H. White. One of the largest rich crimson varieties, shade of Cullingfordii, reverse bright gold, large reflex bloom, when fully developed showing only the crimson. Extra dwarf, stiff short-jointed stem, with heavy handsomely cut foliage close up to the flower. Awarded first prize at Boston for best dark seedling.

Mrs. Higinbotham. An enormous rich bright pink, broad spreading Japanese variety, with extremely wide cupping and incurving petals, which are covered with glandular hairs. Was shown at Chicago, exceeding eleven inches in diameter, and reported as the largest and best hairy variety ever exhibited. Habit, stem and foliage perfect without any of the weakness usually accompanying hirsute varieties. Awarded certificates at Chicago and Philadelphia.

Camille d'Arville. Large white Japanese bloom; on first opening tinted salmon, as in Silver Cloud; upright dahlia-like petals, forming a nicely rounded flower, of great substance and lasting qualities. A fine grower, with good foliage and strong stem; shipping qualities perfect.

Jennie Falconer. An immense deep bloom. self-colored, bright lemon yellow; same shade as in E. Hitzeroth. Dwarf habit, with good foliage and stiff stem, broad cupping and incurving petals, absolutely no eye. Certificated by Chrysanthemum Society of America at New York.

Marion Abbott. Extra large clear self pink, color of La France rose, petals broad and cupping, incurving to center, forming a high round and deep bloom. Symmetrical in shape, and fine for exhibition purposes.

Brigand. A magnificent broad slightly reflexed Japanese bloom, deep rich crimson, as bright in every respect as Cullingfordii, the flower being over twice the size of that popular variety. Very dwarf and perfect habit. Awarded Columbian medal at Chicago for best dark seedling.

Diavola. An immense broad spreading Japanese bloom, with built up center, lower and outer petals somewhat spatulated; color a strange combination of delicate lemon, white and red, the under petals being cream white, shaded pale lemon, while those towards the center are heavily marked and striped with red. Large and effective bloom, suitable for exhibition only.

Helen Bloodgood. A striking variety. Unquestionably the most meritorious pink introduced to commerce, being the first true clear pink without a trace or shading of purple or magenta. In form a globe-shaped Japanese, of largest size, with strong and robust habit. Certificated at New York in 1893, and this season by the Chrysanthemum Society of America at New York and Philadelphia.

Dr. W. A. Wakeley. A massive rich chrome bronze, with inner surface of petals shaded red; immense in size, spherical in form and very distinct; a pleasing shade, with the strongest of stems and foliage, unexcelled in this color for exhibition purposes.

Esther Heacock. A sport from Ada Spaulding, with same sturdy-form and habit: rather dwarf, with stiff erect stem, large full and solid-bloom, clear bright yellow, shading from base to center. A grand companion to its parent, an easy grower and good keeper, with commercial and shipping qualities all that could be desired.

Experiment. Broad spreading Japanese bloom, with narrow delicate shrimp pink petals, similar in shade to H. Balsley, the upper or inner ones twist and intermingle in a fantastic form, while the lower ones, on which they rest, stand out straight and flat. Medium to talk habit, with stiff stem.

Miss Gladys Spaulding. One of the best whites extant. A grandt spherical Chinese; an improvement on Mrs. R. Craig, both in size and texture of petals. An exceedingly well built flower, a charming variety, with perfect habit and unusually stiff stem. Awarded Chrysanthemum Society of America's certificate at New York and Philadelphia.

Bronze Giant. A mammoth incurved Japanese bloom, of perfects habit; one solid mass of petals, without an eye. Color rich golden, yellow, heavily shaded and intermingled with deepest crimson. A most; striking, bright and effective combination for exhibition, and the best; in this color for commercial use.

Autumn Leaves. A novelty that will be appreciated by exhibition growers as well as amateurs, on account of its fine form and peculiar, shadings. Flower of large size, eight to nine inches in diameter, with full solid center, petals flat, creamy white, mottled striped and splashed with red, the tip of each being deep cream or light yellow, without markings. A showy and striking departure of dwarf habit.

Emma N. Crosby. Bright and deep pure golden yellow, of perfect dwarf habit, large, solid, full and round bloom, lower petals reflexing close to the stem, forming a perfect ball; when first opening covered with a hairy growth, which disappears as the bloom matures. Fine commercial or exhibition variety.

Eva Knowles. A grand English novelty, of fine habit, which has been tested here two years and proved to be all that is claimed for it. Large spreading golden bronze Japanese, style of E. Molyneux, with broad incurving petals. Inner surfaces bright red, reverse rich gold; rather early flower, being at its best about October 20th. Awarded certificate wherever shown, having received five in the fall of 1893.

Edith Smith. The earliest large white reflexed Japanese to date; beautiful incurving Ivory white, with broad flat petals, outer ones reflexing closely around the stem, the center building up full, forming a plumy globe. Healthy and strong variety, of easiest culture and dwarf growth, opening about October 10th, has been kept in perfect form until November 20th. A fine shipping and commercial variety. Received special mention at New York.

Lottie Alter. Superb large incurved Japanese bloom, purest snow white, high flower, solid to the center, without an eye. One of the best late varieties in commerce, perfecting its bloom the end of November to learly December.

Octoroon. A perfect incurving dark Japanese bloom of great size; extra broad incurving petals, perfectly double, forming a massive ball. Color bright ox-blood red, reverse a shade lighter. Habit dwarf and robust, stem stiff and erect. A perfect exhibition bloom, filling a long felt want in this shade.

Dean Hole. Very large incurved, massive flower, with broad petals. White with a beautiful soft shade of pink on the outer side, changing to pearly white with age. One of the best varieties of this year's introductions. Good, stout stem and fine foliage. In season about 6th to 10th November. 3½ feet high. 



















