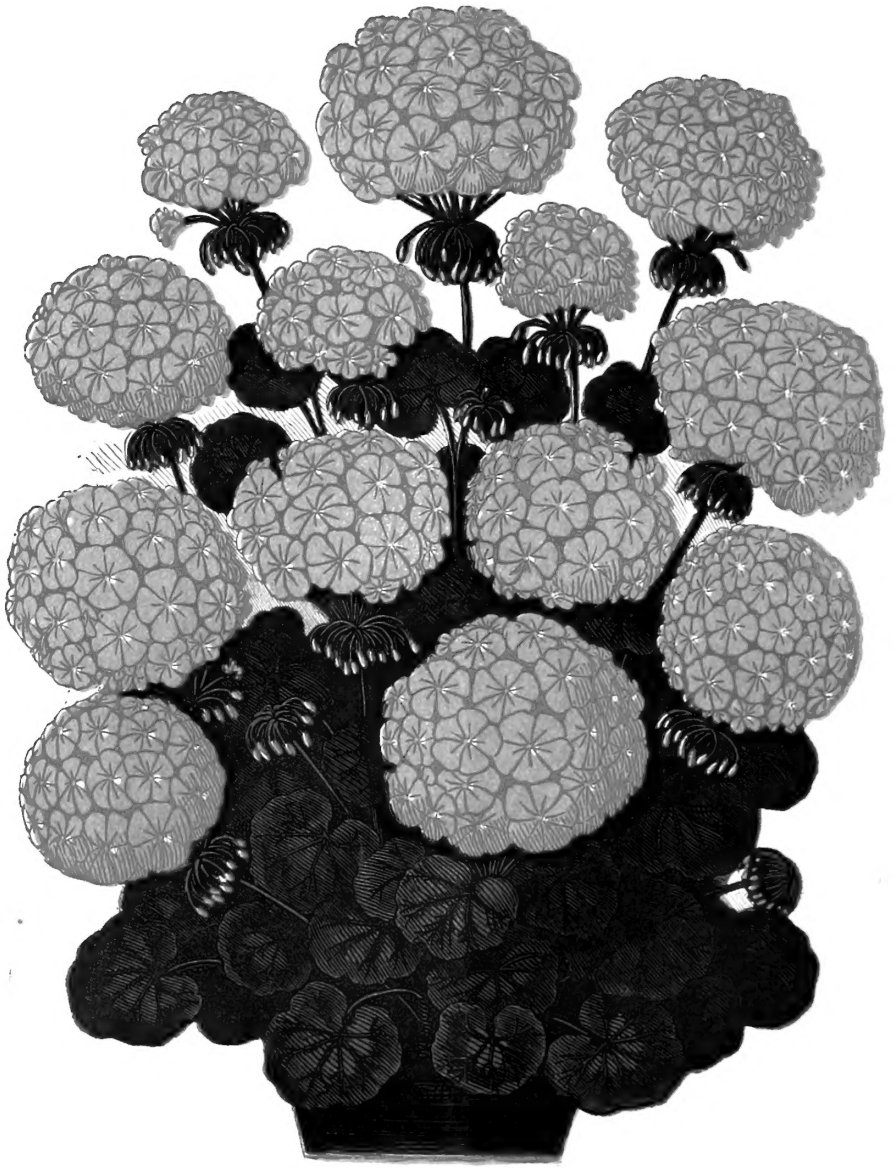

We again take the pleasure of inviting your attention to our extensive assortment of rare and beautiful Plants and Flowers, comprising both old and new varieties. In its extent and in the production of healthy and vigorous plants, our establishment ranks among the best.

Our system of packing is so complete and thorough, that notwithstanding our immense shipments of Plants, extending to nearly every State and Territory in the Union, we rarely ever receive a complaint, but on the contrary many commendations. We make no charge for boxes, packing material, packing and delivering at Express and Post Office, or Railway Depot, either at retail or wholesale, on green-house plants.

We invite particular attention to the extent of our green and propagating houses, thirteen in number, averaging but little less than 100 feet each in length, and ranging from 12 to 25 feet in width, with one exception. We also use a large amount of glass in cold pit, hot-beds, &c. Particular attention is devoted to the ornamental department of our nursery. The Queen of Flowers, the Rose, receiving its due share of attention; of this we are propagating 100,000; among them many new varieties imported from the best European growers.

The greater part of all the plants offered, when smaller sizes are desired, can be forwarded by mail at the prices quoted, postage paid by us, on orders not less than \$1. As soon as received they should be potted and placed under glass or in a green-house to recover from the effects of the removal. Large orders for plants, or plants of large size should be ordered by Express.

TERMS. *Cash must in all cases accompany the order, unless from known correspondents.* When ordered, forwarded by mail, *we pay postage and warrant the plants to reach the purchaser in good condition.* In ordering plants by Express, it is far better to advance the full amount than to order part sent C. O. D., as the return charges of money must be paid by the purchaser, our prices being so low that there is no margin for drawbacks of any kind. Post Office orders, registered letters, and drafts on New York, at our risk.

Cut flowers, bouquets, wreaths, and other floral ornaments furnished.

All goods will be delivered at railway station, Express or Post Office, free of charge.

We quote the price of our plants as grown in various sized pots. We usually have plants of larger sizes than quoted, charging for them at their comparative or relative value. A twelve inch pot occupies thirty-six times the space of a two inch pot. We find that some people expect Roses in bloom in good shape for retailing in 2½ inch pots, whereas it requires at least a 4-inch pot to grow a good, vigorous, stocky Rose bush.

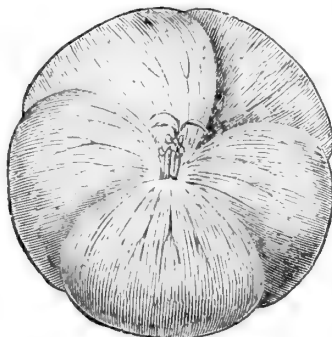

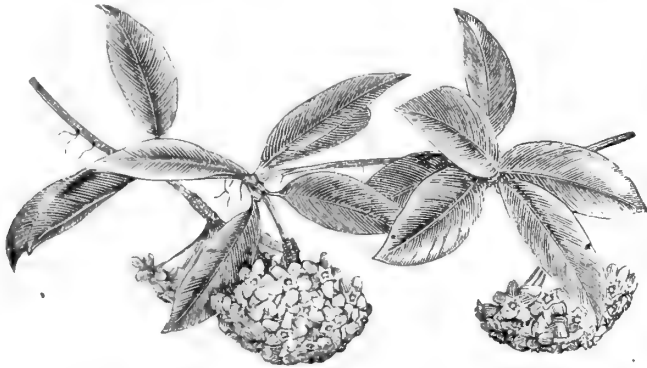

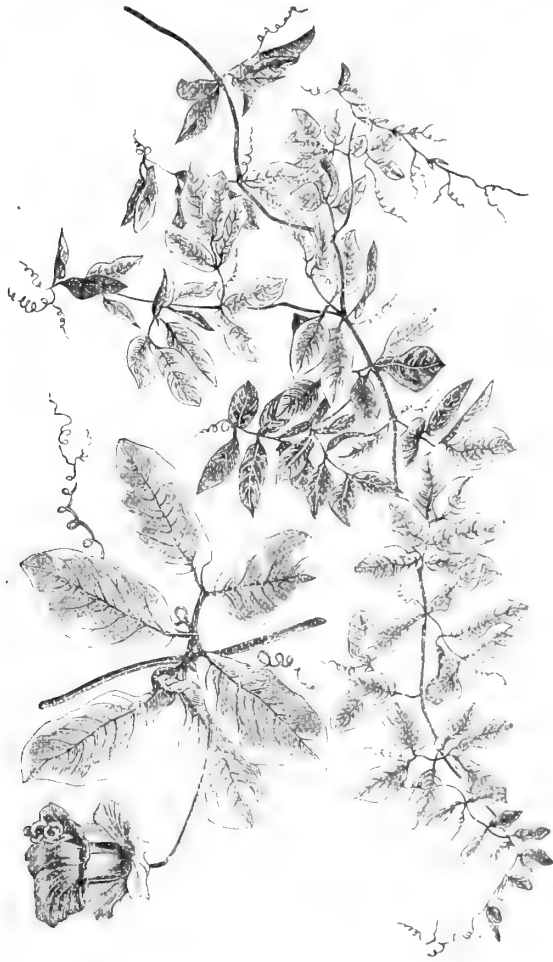

Is done in the most perfect manner, plants being rolled up nicely with moss in paper (oil paper if the plants are destined for a long journey) and then packed in close, tight wooden boxes or pasteboard and well wrapped with paper and strongly corded.

The safe arrival, in good condition, of plants to any post Office on or near any railway within 2000 miles of here. Complaints to be made immediately on receipt of plants if at all. ON ARRIVAL,

The plants, if in the least wilted, should be placed with the paper about them in shallow pans with water comfortably warm to the hand where they should remain twenty minutes to half an hour, this restores their vigor, revives their leaves and increases their vitality.



THE SOIL

For potting should be composed of rotted sods about two-thirds and one-third well rotted cow or horse manure, thoroughly mixed together, where rotted sod cannot conveniently be procured, good, rich garden soil with the addition of one-third or one-fourth well composted manure thoroughly incorporated together will answer a very good purpose.

THE POTS,

If new, must be thoroughly soaked, and if old, well washed before being used, and should be but one size larger than the pots in which the plants were originally grown. Usually three inch pots are much preferable to larger ones for the first potting, and as the pots become filled with roots the plants should be re-potted at intervals. Do not entirely fill the pots with earth but leave sufficient space to hold a good supply of water for the plants. When packed full of earth the water all runs off instead of penetrating to the roots.

WHEN POTTED

They should be shaded from the sunlight three or four days and water gently sprinkled over the leaves morning and evening, being careful not to get the soil too wet and soggy. Avoid extremes, as both over watering and over drying are alike fatal to fresh potted plants. If the sun does not shine to exhaust the plants keep the covering off, but if it does one or two thicknesses of paper covered over them will keep the plants fresh.

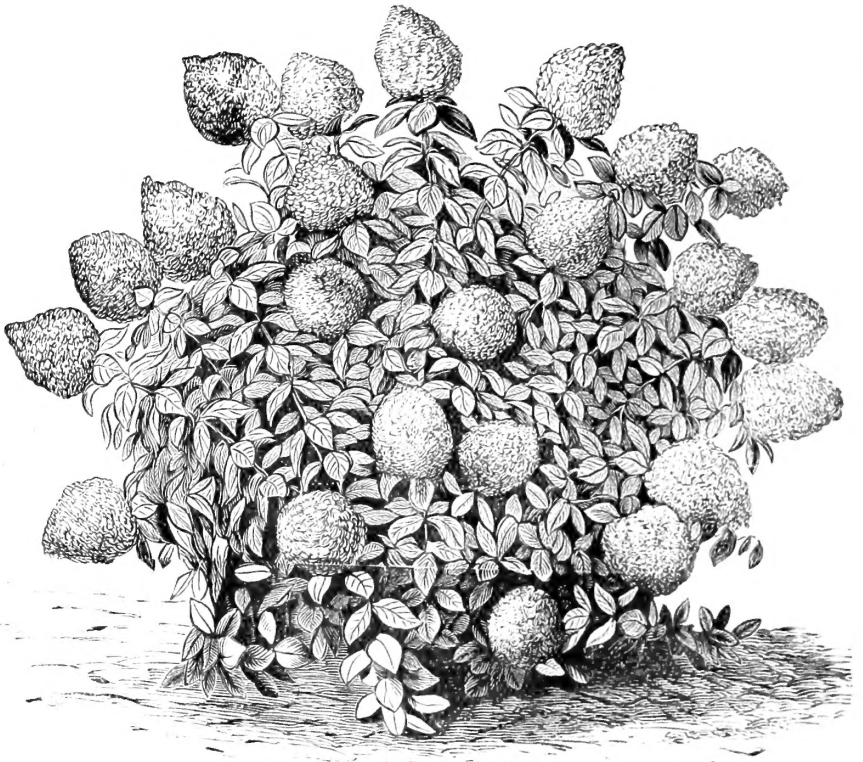
