

OFFICIALS CHARGED WITH THE FNFORCEMENT OF FOOD LAWS IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA.

[Revised to July 1, 1912.]

INTRODUCTION.

The widespread interest in food legislation during the last few years has led to the recent enactment of laws in a number of States where such legislation had not previously existed, and to the enforcement in other States of earlier legislation for which no appropriations had previously been made. As a result, an increasingly large number of inquiries are received for the addresses of officials charged with the enforcement of the laws in different States and the names of chemists and other officers engaged in various capacities in the same work. It is to meet this want that the present circular is issued.

At the present time a serious attempt is made in 44 States and in Hawaii, the Philippine Islands, and Porto Rico to enforce more or less extensive regulations relating to the purity and wholesomeness of food. The growing interest in this matter is well illustrated by a comparison of these figures with those of 1905 when, in addition to Hawaii and Porto Rico, only 25 States really enforced food laws. These numbers do not include the States in which laws have been enacted without appropriations for their enforcement. In addition to the Territory of Alaska, which comes within the provisions of the Federal food and drugs act, there are only two States which have not enacted special laws regulating the manufacture and sale of adulterated and misbranded food and only three States in which appropriations have not been made for the enforcement of their laws. The funds appropriated by the several States for the enforcement of the food laws are increasing, which fact results in a larger corps of employees and more efficient inspection.

The information in the succeeding pages was obtained from replies to a circular letter sent to the authorities charged with the enforcement of the laws in the several States. The list of municipal chemists was compiled from replies to a circular letter sent to the boards of health of cities having a population of 30,000 and over. If this information is incomplete or in any respect erroneous, corrections are requested from any who notice such defects, in order that future editions may be free from such inaccuracies.

Acknowledgments of data furnished for this circular are made to Mr. Theodore L. Cole, Washington, D. C., and to the food commissioners of the various States. The collection of the data and their compilation are the work of Miss N. A. Parkinson, of the Division of Foods.

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ENFORCEMENT OF FEDERAL LAWS.

The United States laws relating to the food supply are enforced by the Department of Agriculture and the Treasury Department, and the Secretaries of these two departments, together with the Secretary of Commerce and Labor, are empowered to make uniform rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of the food and drugs act. Appointments of officials for this service are made from an eligible list established upon examination by the United States Civil Service Commission, and are permanent. These laws are enforced in the several bureaus of the two departments as follows:

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

BOARD OF FOOD AND DRUG INSPECTION.

The board of food and drug inspection, appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture and reporting to him, is charged with the administration of the food and drugs act of June 30, 1906. The personnel of the board is as follows: R. E. Doolittle and A. S. Mitchell.

BUREAU OF CHEMISTRY.

The Bureau of Chemistry is charged with the preparation of the data on which the execution of the food and drugs act is based, including the collection of samples and the examination of the same. This act forbids the manufacture and sale of adulterated or misbranded foods and drugs in the District of Columbia and the Territories, their importation into the United States, their exportation from the United States (unless the substance conforms to the laws of the foreign country to which shipped), and their shipment and delivery for shipment in interstate commerce.

COMMISSIONED STATE OFFICIALS AND COLLABORATING CHEMISTS.

The food and drugs act states in section 5 that violations of the law may also be brought to the attention of the district attorney by the health or food or drug officer of any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia. In section 4, however, it is pro-

vided that the examination of specimens of foods or drugs shall be made in the Bureau of Chemistry or under its direction and supervision. For the purpose of better enforcing these provisions of the law State officials have been commissioned by the Secretary of Agriculture in the States enforcing food laws and authorized to take samples of foods and drugs according to the regulations of the United States Department of Agriculture, to procure the analysis of such samples from collaborating chemists (who are commissioned to work in the several States in collaboration with the Bureau of Chemistry), and to transmit the cases to the Secretary of Agriculture with such other information as may be necessary to provide a basis for prosecution. BUREAU OF ANIMAL INDUSTRY.

The work of the Bureau of Animal Industry relating to the supervision of food products is carried on under that portion of the agricultural appropriation act of June 30, 1906, commonly known as the "meat-inspection amendment," which provides for the inspection of cattle, sheep, swine, and goats slaughtered for human consumption and of the carcasses and meat food products thereof which are intended for export or which are the subjects of interstate commerce, and for the sanitation of establishments at which inspection is maintained; also under that portion of the act approved May 9, 1902, which provides for the sanitary inspection of all renovated or process butter factories, their products, and the materials going into the same, and for the marking of the product for identification on the market; and under the several appropriation acts which authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to construe the provisions of the act of March 3, 1891, as amended March 2, 1895, "to include process or renovated butter intended for exportation to any foreign country."

TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

BUREAU OF INTERNAL REVENUE.

The Treasury Department, through the Bureau of Internal Revenue, is charged with the enforcement of certain fiscal laws and regulations which have to do with the purity of foods. These are as follows: The act of August 2, 1886, amended by the act of May 9, 1902, taxing oleomargarin, renovated butter, and adulterated butter; the act of June 6, 1896, taxing filled cheese; the act of June 13, 1898, taxing mixed flour; the act of October 1, 1890, allowing the use, free of tax, of grape brandy in the fortification of pure sweet wines; and the act of March 3, 1897, allowing the bottling of distilled spirits in bond.

CONNECTICUT.

DAIRY AND FOOD COMMISSIONER AND STATE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION,

The dairy and food commissioner's department is charged with the enforcement of law against violators, and the commissioner can take samples of food or drugs wherever he or his deputy thinks it advisable. The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station at New Haven is charged with the chemical work in connection with the enforcement of the law, the examination of foods, and publication of results. The station is authorized to take samples of food wherever the director thinks it advisable. The experiment station was established in 1877. The commissioner was first appointed as dairy commissioner in 1886. Food inspection began with the enactment of the present food law in 1895, although much work was done by the experiment station in the investigation of foods before that time. A new food and drug law passed by the general assembly went into effect January 1, 1908. At the 1909 session of the legislature the office of dairy commissioner was changed to that of dairy and food commissioner. The dairy and food commissioner issues a biennial (even year) and the experiment station an annual report to the governor.

ORGANIZATION OF OFFICIAL FORCE.

The dairy and food commissioner is appointed by the governor, the deputy commissioner by the commissioner, both for a term of four years, which will expire May 1, 1914. The members of the experiment station staff are appointed for an unlimited period by the board of control.
