






E.L. Lafferty, Academic Dean





"Anatomy studies the structure; physiology, the function, of the most wondrous of all structures -- the human body."

In 1907, the educational institutions at Banner Elk were jointly operated by the local community, the county, and the Presbyterian Church. In this year, the local schools were granted a charter by North Carolina as the Elizabeth McRae Institute for Girls. Mrs. McRae, for whom the new school was named, was very interested in educational opportunity for mountain children. Through her influence and the efforts of Mr. Tufts, the Institute was enlarged and the term was extended. Mrs. McRae, agreat church worker from Maxton, North Carolina, is credited with founding the Woman's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, and with teaching in several mountain schools during the summer months. She is not known to have taught at Banner Elk but did serve in nearby schools.



The Plumtree School for Boys was formed by Rev. Mr. Tufts and his brother-in-law, Mr. Joe Hall. This school was a parallel institution with Lees-McRae Institute for Girls. When the Plumtree unit was destroyed by fire in 1927, the students were brought to Banner Elk and the Institute became co-educational.

When Mrs. S.P. Lees of New York gave a significant gift of money to the enlargement program, her name was added to the Institute, thus Lees-McRae Institute was created. Mrs. Lees remained a loyal friend through her life time, and the Lees Foundation continues to contribute to our scholorship program. Her assistance came at a time when the Institute needed enlarging to care for the increasing numbers of girls who were seeking admission. It was at the insistence of Mr. Tufts that her surname became a part of the official title making it Lees-McRae Institute for Girls.





"Far away in a beautiful valley" opens the college song. The first music and art teacher, Miss Lulu Arrowood, now Mrs. Plexico, wrote the poem and adapted it to Thomas A. Becket's Columbia Gem of the Ocean. Through more than fifty years this Alma Mater has served as a fight song at athletic contests and as a hymn for convocations. The song mentions the college colors-Green and Gold, and says the motto is "Not less than the best!" The colors have been retained, but the motto has replaced with "In montibus, ex montibus, pro montibus."

In montibus, ex montibus, pro montibus declared the Rev. Mr. Tufts on many occasions. A lover of Latin, it was only natural for him to write the institution's motto in that language. Since his day, every president and every member of the Board of Trustees have declared their desire to see Lees-McRae serve "in the mountains, of the mountains, for the mountains." This motto is a part of the official seal of the Edgar Tufts Memorial Association and Lees-McRae College.




The Edgar Tuft's Memorial Association was created in 1923 to memorialize the founder, Rev. Edgar Tufts. The healing, sheltering, and teaching ministries of Mr. Tuft's were consolidated into a single association, the Edgar Tuft's Memorial Association, with three departments: Lees-McRae Institute, Grandfather Home for Children, and Grace Hospital. This incorporation is now controlled by a twenty-five member Board of Trustees. Eight members are elected at large, one by the Lees-McRae Alumni Association, eight are approved by Concord Presbytery of the Synod of North Carolina and eight are approved by Holston Presbytery of Appalachian Synod. Both Synods are in the Presbyterian Church in the United States.


Lees -McRae College was chartered in 1927, being formed from Lees-McRae Institute and the Plumtree School for Boys. Mr. Edgar H. Tufts, who had succeeded his father as president, formed the junior college in 1927 and through the thirties high school work was gradually dropped until only college curricula with some vocational courses remained. Mr. Edgar, as he was affectionately known, built the permanent buildings on the main campus and created the college reputation for excellent vocational preparation. The Medical Secretarial Courses and other terminal educational programs were begun under his administration. The first college class graduated in 1931.

Five presidents have served Lees-McRae College. Rev. Mr. Tufts began his work in 1898. Following his death in 1923, his son, Edgar H. Tufts became president of the Institute and the Edgar Tufts Memorial Association. Dr. W.C. Tate, long associated with the Tufts-father and son-took the presidency when Mr. Edgar H. Tufts died in 1942. Dr. Tate was also Director of Grace Hospital. Dr. Roswell Long was elected President after a long period of service on the Board of Trustees and served for one term-1946-47. Upon Dr. Long's resignation, Dr. W.C. Tate held the office at the request of the Board of Trustees until a successor could be named. In 1949, Dr. Fletcher Nelson was secured as president of the college, and in 1951 he became president of the Edgar Tufts Memorial Association.







The Lees-McRae College Alumni Association, Incorporated, was organized in the very early days as the Lees-McRae Association of Alumni and Friends. The official title of all the local chapters of this association in Chapter of the Lees-McRae College Alumni and Friends. The Certificate of Incorporation and the Constitution declare the purpose of the Alumni Association to be the "creation and maintainance of interest in the welfare of Lees-McRae College, and the promotion of fellowship and mutual aid among the alumni."

In 1956, Lees-McRae College was authorized to create a Department of Development and Public Relations. Already an Enlargement Program was under way with some of its objectives completed. Other buildings and programs to be completed by 1962 include a boys¹ dormitory, additional scientific laboratories, an increase of \$500,000 in endowment funds, and improved athletic-physical educational facilities. The Department of Development and Public Relations maintains the alumni files, the speakers¹ bureau, the information services, and student and fund solicitation activities. The Pinnacles, the Association¹s house-organ, is issued by this department.






#### MAY DAY




