## EAST OF THE MISSISSIPPI

Lees-McRae College, located in Avery County, North Carolina, high in the Blue Ridge Mountains, proudly boasts of its "Campus in the Clouds" as it was first described some two decades ago by a Readers Digest writer. Banner Elk is 4,000 feet above sea level and enjoys a delightful and invigorating climate the year around.

Most aerial photographs are taken from an airplane, but to gain a cloud-high view of Lees-McRae you need only to climb Beech Mountain to be provided with a spectacular view of the college, the town of Banner Elk, and a large portion of Avery County. The college and community are located in a valley surrounded by such towering skyscrapers as Grandfather Mountain, the Beech, Hanging Rock, and the Sugar Mountains.

Today this far western corner of the state is easily reached from NC 105 which runs from Linville to Boone past Grandfather Mountain where 184 leads four miles west to Banner Elk. West of the village is 19E which goes across the near-by Tennessee border to Johnson City, forty miles away.

## 5 <br> CAMPUS IN THE CLOUDS ENJOYS ACADEMIC GROWTH

The college is Presbyterian Church-affiliated and operates under the Concord and Holston Presbyteries. It is an active member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the American Association of Junior Colleges, the North Carolina College Conference and the Presbyterian Educational Asso-

ciation of the South. Its work is recognized and accepted by colleges and universities throughout the country. The college is co-educational with principal emphasis on the general liberal arts course. This program gives the student a thorough foundation in liberal arts and permits emphasis on any one of the areas of science, social studies or humanities. Terminal courses are available for the students who are interested in terminal education. These courses include Medical Secretary, Medical Record Technician, Secretarial Science, X-ray Technician and Engineering Aide.

## A FRIENDLY CAMPUS

Friendliness is a keynote trait of the small campus where the compact location of dorms, classrooms, and faculty homes brings about a close and cordial relationship between students and faculty. All of the buildings are attractively designed of native stone from Beech Mountain which provides a rustic continuity from oldest to the newest.

A competent faculty, working with small class groups, is able to provide individual attention to the students. With a relatively small student body, an atmosphere of friendliness and personal interest pervades the campus. Opportunities abound for each student to find self-expression and increase his self-

confidence, as well as knowledge. The Administration sponsors a strong counseling program which keeps the students in close touch with faculty advisors. This provides the desired guidance to young people faced with the problems of making far-reaching decisions for the first time.

## LEES-McRAE'S GOAL-IMPROVING JUNIOR COLLEGE STATUS.

At a time when many junior colleges are considering senior status, Lees-McRae has written a very different and ambitious role for itself. Under the leadership of Colonel Max C. Chapman, President of the College, the college is busily working to become one of the foremost junior colleges in the south, offering a superior liberal arts program throughout the year.

The new science building has been completed to house chemistry, physics, biology, zoology, and related subjects as well as some of the administrative offices. The modern structure, named in honor of Adam Bowman, late Chairman of the Board of Trustees, represents an investment of $\$ 300,000$. Five new faculty homes were built last summer to accommodate additional faculty members. The student center and the cafeteria underwent renovation to improve the facilities for the student body. A new dormitory for 135 women will be completed before September of 1964. The campus is comprised of nearly 400 acres which provide ample land for future expansion.

In the summer the college will offer a nine-week summer session for high school graduates, freshmen and sophomore college students. The cool mountain climate makes Lees-McRae an ideal place to pursue extra academic credits. The summer term will begin June 15th.

Plans have been made to expand the faculty, improve the physical plant and make further improvements in the academic program in order to provide quality education to a student body of 500 students by September, 1964.

BOBCATS HAVE FOUR STARTERS RETURNING . . .

Coach Mel Bowling and his Lees-McRae Bobcats sought to improve their conference march in overall record but consistently had their ups and downs during the year. The Bobcats, hot and cold last season, began by losing to Milligan, then defeated the Milligan Quintet in Banner Elk. They were trounced by Brevard 68-56 but mauled Wingate 89-74 after building up as much as 25 point lead in the game. They looked good in defeating Spartanburg 81-69 but lost to cellar-dweller Gardner-Webb 48-47. However, the unpredictable Cats remain as a darkhorse in the hardwood race for the WCJCAC and Region Ten Championship. Bowling faced with a re-building task, suffered two dismal seasons with a 14-29 over-all record, but he has built what area fans and Bobcat rooters hope to be a power house in basketball. For the first time since he has been head coach at Lees-McRae, he has good bench strength. Draper's Wayne Hall, an honor student academically, is a good ball-handler and reserve guard; big Harold Earnhart is a sharpshooter, throwing in 30 points against Milligan College in a Bobcat 86-81 victory; and Bob Cox, a rugged $6^{\prime} 5^{\prime \prime}, 220 \mathrm{lb}$. center from Narrows, Va., gives Bowling rebound strength and added scoring power. Aside from these three Freshmen, Bowling has what area fans and most coaches consider to be three of the best boys in the conference in Joe Farris, $6^{\prime} 5^{\prime \prime}$ center, Don Rich, $6^{\prime} 3^{\prime \prime}$ forward, and fireball Steve Lytton, a guard and playmaker for the Cats. With these three seasoned veterans leading the way, Bowling is considered as having one of the finest teams in the Western Carolinas Junior College Conference.

## ACTIVITIES

Activities constitute an integral and important part of college life. After attending classes, struggling through the routine of the day, college students want to spend an evening together. Classrooms, while theoretically their doors should be closed, seem to come alive after dark. Behind these doors, policies are being reviewed and plans are being laid for activities and campus functions, in meetings of various campus organizations.

The Student Parliament is a vital part of Lees-McRae's activities. The purpose of this organization is to unify the Student Body in the common motive of self-government in order to assume responsibility in dealing with matters of student affairs, to perpetuate the traditions of the college, and to strengthen co-operation among students, faculty, and administration.

The Demosthenean club wisely chooses representatives to attend the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and when the first sign of spring occurs, they begin making preparations for their annual party for the boys of Grandfather Home.

The Phi Theta Kappa busily plans movies on literary and education subjects, while at the same time, ponders over the prospects for the one hundred dollar scholastic scholarship.

The Council of the Christian Association designs a monthly calendar,
(listing daily events) to be presented to each individual. It also assists with Vespers each Sunday night.

Working together, the WAA and the Monogram Club provide transportation to athletic events away from the college, in addition to sponsoring several sock hops throughout the year.

The May Dance and the Homecoming Dance are the two main projects of the School Board, but long hours of preparation and toil are employed, just as are spent by the Sullivanian Sorority on the Christmas and Valentine Dances.

These numerous meetings remove the student from his studies for a while, allowing him to relax and develop an area of interest and incentive outside of his regular class schedule.

Activities provide for the individual student an opportunity for participation and leadership. An individual needs the group; the group cannot exist without the individual. A spirit of organization, cooperation, competition and devotion exists when groups of individuals work together with mutal interests.

Through the participation of the students, activities aid in building character and developing personality. Clubs and organizations promote fellowship and service among the students, so that the ideals and standards established by these clubs will continue in other students.


The primary purpose of the Order of the Tower is to serve Lees-McRae College and the administration in a leadership capacity and to promote the general welfare of the college. The Dean of the College and the Director of Public Relations sponsor this organization which is composed of not more than twelve students.

The members of the Order of the Tower assist in orientation programs for freshmen and new students, serve as marshals for special programs and graduation, serve as hosts for visiting groups and dignitaries and assist the Admissions Department in the testing programs for prospective students. When called upon by the Admissions office, they conduct tours on the campus and entertain parents of prospective students. They promote good relation in all areas, and serve as advisory council to the faculty.

The annual Halloween Carnival is sponsored by the Order of the Tower, with other clubs on campus participating.

The clubalso assists the faculty each year in a selfstudy program of college.
