## PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

The Twentieth Century is a time of great unrest and turmoil, between individuals and nations. Sheer survival, and certainly the leadership of the future, belongs to young people who prepare themselves now to grapple with the uncertain problems and opportunities which await us all.

Good education is not satisfied when survival alone is assured, however. As a Church-related College, Lees-McRae seeks to bring men and women to awareness of their total responsibilities both to God and to mankind. When you, our students, are on the road toward developing keen minds, strong bodies, and responsible, reverentattitudes, our purpose is realized.

If you are eager to probe deeply into academic frontiers, to be challenged to surpass your present achievements in mind, body, and spirit; if you will work long and hard in order to grow stronger in preparation for responsible living, we welcome you as a participant in our College community.

## "WHO RUNS THE PRIVATE COLLEGE?"

If you were to stop a faculty or staff member on the campus and ask the question, "Who runs Lees-McRae College?", the reply would be: "A dedicated group of trustees, capable administrative leaders, a competent faculty, and an energetic student body."

His remarks would be proud, candid, and well-founded because the first thought to flash through his mind would be "Who is responsible for the PROGRESS both to the educational program and the physical plant of Lees-McRae?"
PROGRESS is the keynote word on the Lees-McRae campus. No faculty or staff member or student can discuss Lees-McRae College without first referring to the remarkable progress and growth made at the college in the past four years.

The campus, the community, the faculty and the student body have undergone growth and change at a rate that is a bit staggering, even in the space age. The student body has jumped from 285 students, in 1961, to a record enrollment of 600 students this fall. A new science building, modernly equipped, representing an investment of over $\$ 300,000$, is serving the students now. The Grace Hartley Hospital has been renovated and serves as a girls' dormitory and the other buildings on campus have undergone renovation and improvement. Additional land has been purchased and a new modern four-story men's dormitory opened its doors to house 208 male students this fall. The administration is seeking funds to erect a new library and a combination student union-cafeteria building is on the drawing boards for construction in the near future. As impressive has been the growth and physical changes on campus, LeesMcRae's growth, educationally, has been just as dramatic. Many new offices in administrative service have been created, the faculty has increased from 21, in 1961, to 35 faculty members this year. The curriculum has been broadened in many areas. The college instituted two years ago, along with its regular summer session, a "College Preparatory Program," designed to improve the background of students whose high school record and achievement predict difficulty in their first year of college. Lees-McRae in its lifetime has had some truly good teachers on its faculty. Such is certainly true today. They are academically well-qualified and are a very interested, dedicated and attractive faculty group.
The program for the future, as outlined by the present administration, is a challenging one.

## THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The College Committee of the Board of Trustees is chaired by Dr. Lee G. Davy, Executive Vice President, Development, for Tennessee Eastman Corporation of Kingsport, Tennessee. Through Dr. Davy's and each Board member's untiring dedication and loyalty to Lees-McRae, the College Committee has worked diligently and unselfishly for the welfare and progress of the college. They give of their time and talents to help the college meet the challenges that confront an educational institution of today. The Board with a distinguished group of dedicated men from all walks of life offers the proper guidance and direction for Lees-McRae. Members of the College Committee of the Board of Trustees are: Dr. David W. Baker of St. Davids, Pennsylvania, minister and doctor of medicine; Admiral Cato D. Glover, Camden, South Carolina, U. S. Navy, retired; Dr. Ferguson Wood, Johnson City, Tennessee, pastor; Mr. J. H. Carson, Charlotte realtor; Dr. Frontis Johnston, Dean of the Faculty of Davidson College; and Mr. L. Young White, Mooresville construction contractor. Every two years an alumni representative, who has served the two previous years as President of the Alumni Association, serves on the Board of Trustees of the College. The incoming Alumni Representative is Mr. Al Dresser, Architectual Engineer from Charlotte.

## THE PRESIDENT

Since Colonel Max C. Chapman assumed the duties of President in August of 1961, the college has witnessed rapid growth and progress. He has been instrumental in making changes beneficial to the college and its students during his term as President. Colonel Chapman's primary interest is operating the college on a sound financial basis. He seeks to raise funds for improvements to the campus facilities and educational programs. Aside from his tireless efforts in fund raising he also guides the college community with a sound economic philosophy. The college, under Colonel Chapman's direction, is operating presently on a budget of $\$ 825,000.00$. The operational budget in 1961 was $\$ 375,000.00$. The program being pursued under President Chapman is an ambitious one and the college stands on the threshold of greater achievements.

## THE ACADEMIC DEAN

As the business affairs of the college are directed by its President, the educational program is the primary responsibility of Dr. Robert G. Newman. Dr. Newman received his Ph.D. degree from Drew University last year, and, after a year's experience on the faculty and in the capacity of College Chaplain, took office this summer as Academic Dean. Under the guidance of Dean Newman, the faculty offers sound and competent instruction to Lees-McRae College students. To its liberal arts graduates the college awards the student an introductory foundation in liberal arts and permits emphasis on any one of the sciences, the social studies, or the humanities. The educational programs are planned for those who continue their education at a senior college. Seventy per cent of Lees-McRae graduates continue their education. A course of terminal study is provided for those who plan a career as secretary, medical record librarian, medical secretary, or x-ray technician.

## DIRECTOR OF STUDENT SERVICES

The student personnel program is under the direction of Mr. Leroy McCaskey. As Director of Student Services and Admissions, he is responsible for the recruitment and testing of prospective students, the admission and matriculation of each student that enters the college. Under his leadership the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Registrar, and the entire student affairs organization perform the varied and numerous tasks of student services. Proper guidance, direction, and counsel are offered to the students through his office.

## STUDENT GOVERNMENT

With the help of Student Service Director, Mr. McCaskey and his assistant, Miss Eleanor Osborne, the Student Parliament maintains Lees-McRae College's tradition of efficient student government. The Associated Student Body's purpose is to unify the student body in a common motive of self-government and it stimulates the traditions of the college and strengthens cooperation among students, faculty, and the administration.

Mr. Renegar graduated from Maryville College, Maryville, Tennessee, in 1947 with a B. S. degree CUM LAUDE, and received his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary in 1951. He was awarded the Master of Theology degree at Louisville in 1956, and studied two years in Louisville College of Pharmacy and a graduate of Moody Bible Institute.

He taught one year of beginning Greek at King College, Bristol, Tenn. He has held the office of permanent clerk of Louisville Presbytery, stated clerk of Guerrant Presbytery, and secretary
of standing committee on the Minister and His Work of the 1956 meeting of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. He has held pastorates in the Guerrant Memorial Church, Jackson, Kentucky, and Fairmount Presbyterian Church, Bristol, Tenn. Before entering the ministry, he was employed for several years by Alcoa, as a Chemical Analyst. He was married in 1940 to Miss Anna Louise Hall, of Louisville, Kentucky. They have four children: Ruth Anne, Robert Davidson, Susan Alice (who is a freshman at LMC), and Stephen Edward. His hobbies and special interests are reading, billiards, chess, and all sports.

## ACTIVITIES...

The Christian Council strives to bring better spiritual aspects into campus life. The Council stimulates Christian thought, study and service within the student body.

The Sullivanian Sorority and the Demosthenean Club are related organizations. Their members sponsor dances and other social activities, as well as serve the college in other small capacities. The WAA and Monogram Club are also related organizations. These two are composed of the athletes on campus, who try to put forth an athletic environment for those who desire such.

Delta Psi Omega is organized for the students who prefer a more dramatic life. The organization entertains the whole student body as it gives different presentations during the year. The BOBCAT TALES is the college informer in print, giving journalistic minded students an opportunity to display their talent.

## BOBCAT GRIDDERS ENJOY BEST SEASON IN YEARS

Sandy Creed recovers fumble. Assisting on the play is Frank "The Tank" Wright (56) and Bill Query (66). The defensive unit of the Cats turned in their usual sterling performance. The outstanding line play of England, Wright, Ratcliff, Teeter, Bollick, Creed, and Withers held the Panthers at bay. On four occasions Ferrum penetrated Lees-McRae's 20 yard line only to be stopped by fierce line play by the Bobcats. The Cats made a tremendous goal-line stance.

Rossello scores against Ferrum. Ronnie Rossello crashed over from the one-yard line. Lees-McRae was the only team to score against Ferrum on the ground this season. The Bobcats held the nationally ranked team to 84 yards rushing. The Panthers had been averaging over 200 yards per game rushing. They had only been scored on twice in the season and each time on passes. Three passes from Mike McCall to Sizemore ate up 29 yards and the 46 yard drive was climaxed by Rossello's 3 yard plunge



BRAVES DOWN L-M 23-6
In the opening games with Chowan the Bobcats received the opening kickoff, but failed to make the necessary first down. Don Lambert's booming punt was ruled dead at Chowan's one foot line, and the LMC defensive team went to work, Chowan's first offensive play proved to be the first score for the Bobcats, as an alert tackle for LMC, Bob Lyons, pounced on a Chowan fumble in the end zone for a quick six points for his team. The extra point failed to split the uprights, and the Bobcats had to settle for a 6-0 lead. Before the first half ended, however, Chowan had scored and made the extra point, sending the Bobcats to the dressing room at halftime with a 7-6 disadvantage.
Disaster struck when LMC was pushed back to her own five yard line and forced to punt. Chowan scored a safety when Lambert lost control of the ball and was tackled in the end zone. At this point, the defense weakened and the Braves from Murfreesboro managed to slip through for two more touchdowns in the later stages of the game. The final score was 23-6.

BOBCATS RUSH BY APPALACHLAN JV'S 26-0
The Bobcats found a game with the JV's of Appalachian State to be an excellent chaser after the belt from Chowan a week earlier. Returning to Banner Elk with a $26-0$ romp over the Mountaineer's Junior Varsity, the Bobcats had proved themselves to be a $100 \%$ improved team over the one that had made the long trip to Murfreesboro earlier in the season.
Quarterbacks Fritz Riebe and Mike McCall both did fine jobs on that afternoon of September 17. Riebe led one long march down the field for a score. The touchdown came on a run by Pat Phelan. The next touchdown was made by Arnold Freeman after he intercepted a pass and ran fifty yards for the tally. McCall then took the team down the field on two occasions, one of the scores coming on a Ron Rossello run from the four yard line and the other tally being the result of a pass to Gary Vick.

## GARDNER-WEBB SPOILS HOMECOMING

The Gardner-Webb Bulldogs, who shocked the Bobcats by going to the air, spoiled Lees-McRae's Homecoming by scoring a 6-0 victory over the Bobcats before more than 2,500 fans.

Gerald Mathis scored the Bulldog's lone touchdown in the second period on a 1-yard plunge. Lees-McRae's big tackle, Roger Teeter, broke through the

## BOBCATS LOSE BY NIGHT IN SHELBY: 19-6

The Gardner-Webb Bulldogs unleased a grueling ground attach to defeat the Lees-McRae Bobcats, in the Blanton Memorial Stadium in Shelby under the hghts, to the tune 19-6.
Behind the running of Gerald Mathis and Malcolm Singleton, after a short punt to the G.W. eleven, the Bulldogs moved the ball 17 -yards. A five yard penalty moved the ball inches out for the score. Sandy Creed blocked the try for the extra point and the Bulldogs led 6-0.
The second Gardner-Webb touchdown came when Pinckney Guerard was back in punt formation and the ball was snapped far over his head. What looked like sudden disaster turned into a 90 -yard touchdown run. Guerard ran back to pick up the ball on the 10 -yard line and began to pick his way through the Lees-McRae defenders, and stumbled into the end zone for the touchdown. The kick was good and Gardner-Webb led 13-0.
In the fourth quarter Lees-McRae's Gary Chenevey intercepted a pass on the Lees-McRae 30 -yard line and raced to the Gardner-Webb five yard line before he was pulled down from behind. But the $65-y a r d$ run with the intercepted pass was all in vain as McCall fumbled on the first play from scrimmage and Gardner-Webb took over to halt the Bobcat threat. Gardner-Webb scored midway in the fourth quarter on a ten yard run. Gerald Mathis, on a drive that started on the 40 -yard line of Lees-McRae Bobcats after an intercepted pass, crashed through the line for the touchdown. With four minutes remaining to play Mike McCall hit Gary Chenevey on a 40 -yard pass play for the Bobcats lone touchdown.

Gary Vick, used sparingly all year as a ball carrier because of his ability as a blocker and valuable pass receiving talent, broke loose from his new fullback position for long gains and a 17 yard scoring gaunt to lead Lees-McRae to a $12-0$ victory over Hargrave Military Academy at Banner Elk

Vick was the total offense rushing leader with 64 yards on the ground and 75 yards on passes from Quarterback Mike McCall. Pat Phelan, freshmen speedster, rushed for 71 yards and was on the receiving end of a 12 yard aeria from McCall.
Arnold Freeman picked off a low Hargrave pass behind the line of scrimmage and dasheduntouched into the end zone from 27 yards out for the second score Frank Wright's two attempts for the extrapoints failed. Cecil Ratcliff was the workhorse on defense for the Bobcats. Ratcliff broke up several screen passes set up by the Hargrave Tigers and constantly crashed the line stopping Tiger backs. With first string halfback Gary Vick injured on the second play from scrimmage and with halfback Ron Rossello ejected from the game in the second quarter after a brief melee that developed when tempers flared several plays after a Bobcat touchdown, the Bobcats found running room behindDavid Ahles and a staunch defense bowed its back and stifled previously eíghth-ranked Chowan 7-0 in Banner Elk.
England, Ratcliff, Teeter, Wright, Creed, Street, and Sizemore stayed in Chowan's backfield all day, harassing quarterback Clarence Murphy, who led the conference in passing, and held Joe Manring and Chowan backs to minus eight ( -8 ) yards rushing, a team who had averaged 185 yards rushíng per game before the Saturday contest
The Bobcat drive started on the 29 after Chowan's Murphy had boomed a 46 yard punt that rolled dead there, and two plays later Ahles and Rossello moved the ball 20 yards and two first downs. A 33 -yard pass play from Mike McCall to end Gary Chenevey moved the ball to the 18 -yard line where McCall faded
back and hit Iron-Man Sizemore who carried two men into the end zone for the only TD of the game. Frank "the Tank" Wright boomed the extra point kick through the uprights and the Bobcats led 7-0.

The game was plagued with injuries as each team was hitting fiercely. Gary Vick received a knee injury on the second carry for the flashy Bobcat back. Doug Davidson was injured and had to leave the game. Several Chowan players were helped from the field. Frank 'the Tank" Wright collided with Chowan's great halfback, Joe Manring, and Manring was addled temporarily and Wright had to get a new headgear after his was crushed--induring the head-on collision.

Gary Chenevey, George Drake, and Frank Sutton put in sterling performances in the secondary as they held Chowan to 43 yards thru the air on 21 attempts and only 4 completions. Chowan had averaged 105 yards per game in the passing department and Murphy had connected on 41 passes in 83 attempts Chenevey had 3 interceptions to his credit.

The Bobcats launched the first part of their season with seven victories against one defeat. They lost the next five games but regained their poise and ended their season on a winning note with a 14-10 over-all record and a 6-6 conference mark. This boosted head coach George Litton's over-all record, since taking over at the helm to $32-19$ over-all record and an enviable $16-9$ conference record. The Bobcats were a team of character and determination - holding their head high in victory as well as in defeat. In a letter from tournament officials, the following statement was made by the chairman of the tournament committee: 'The leadership and training which the young men were given was demonstrated at the tournament. Also noted was the good sportsmanship, the courage, the stamina, and the courtesy of your team. We were also greatly impressed by the support that your fans gave to the team. The manly way in which the team took defeat and victory was outstanding.'

Gary Chenevey, who led the Bobcats to a thirdplace finish in the regular season play and to a third-place finish in the WCJCC Tournament held at Forest City, has received many honors since he first pulled on a Lees-McRae basketball jersey

Last year as a freshman, Gary was voted to be a member of the all-conference team. As a sophomore, Gary repeated this honor and added several more to his list. Gary provided stiff competition for the spotlight honors in the scoring department for the conference this year, he led the conference in rebounding, and was the high scorer in the conference tournament when he scored 77 points in the three games. Gary was rewarded for his supreme efforts by being selected for the all-tournament team as well as the all-conference team.

Perhaps the greatest honor of his entire basketball career was awarded to Gary when he was named to the five-man all-region team, selected by the coaches of the Western Carolina Conference, the Cavalier Tar Heel Conference, and the four independent teams that play with these conferences. Only five players from 22 colleges are chosen for this 'Dream Team,' and Gary was one of only three players to be chosen unanimously.

Gary wouldn't quit until he had rewritten the record books in two departments here at LeesMcRae. He broke the previous record for the most points scored in a single game when he swished 40 points through the nets against the opposition of Emory and Henry's JV's. Gary also broke the record for the rebounds that night with the most in a single game by pulling down 33 rebounds with Emory and Henry.

For the 1965-1966 Basketball season, Gary averaged 21.5 points per game with 18.2 rebounds. He was second in the conference in the scoring department, and was voted "Most Valuable Player" this year. Also, the Captain of the 1966 Bobcats, the services of this $6^{\prime} 4^{\prime \prime}, 195$ pound sophomore are being sought by several senior colleges.

The freshmen-laden Lees-McRae Cindermen faced a rugged schedule in '65 as they opened with a dual meet with Brevard and Wofford Colleges. They entered the Piedmont Relays at Furman University and met Gardner Webb and Wingate twice before entering the WCJC Conference at Brevard. Despite the fact that the Bobcat Thinclads had several outstanding athletes, they dropped far back in the tournament with 21 points. Riebe took first place in the tournament in the 880. McGowan took first place in the high jump to take the only big honors for the Bobcats at the tournament meet. Sam Prevette set a new school record of 51 seconds in the 440 as he came in second to Brevard's great Carroll Maxwell, who shattered the conference record with 41.0 time for the event. McGowan tied the school record in the low hurdles with 25.8 time, but could only manage a second place in the conference meet. Riebe shattered the school 880 record set by Ken Sullivan in 1959 but was still off the conference record. High scorers for the tournament went to Brevard's Maxwell and Earl Holbrook of Gardner Webb with 10 points each and Jim McGowan of LMC who scored 9 points. Stanley Clark broke his own record of $11^{\prime}-3$ " when he cleared $1^{\prime}-9^{\prime \prime}$ in the pole-vault to establish a new school record.

Offering educational opportunity in a Christian environment, it strives to give meaning to its belief that Christian ideals and a trained intelligence are essentials for abundant living. Lees-McRae's determination is that students shall leave this 'campus in the clouds" with minds agile enough to use, with character strong enough to hold.

A well-qualified faculty of 35 members and staff of 21 members devote their time and talents to the student body both in class and in personal conferences, enhancing the academic atmosphere with excellent relationships between the teachers and the students. These people assist the college in planning an academic program which will train the intelligence, strengthen the body, and provide a rich spiritual and social life leading to wholesome personal living.

The College Board of Trustees, chaired by Dr. Lee G. Davy, works diligently and unselfishly for the welfare and progress of Lees-McRae. It offers valuable guidance and direction which is essential for an educational institution confronted with the challenges and complexities of a jet-age society and jet-propelled education.

Lees-McRae College represents an idea which is not realized in the stone of its buildings, nor in the accumulated wisdom of its library or faculty, but in the minds of the young men and women who attended the "campus in the clouds". Lees-McRae is the students; the students are Lees-McRae--not as they exist one by one, but as they are unified by the idea that is contained within them.
