Lees-McRae Hopes To Return To Prominence Of '62 and '63 Power When They Won Crown Two Years In A Row And Established A Conference First

The LMC Cross-Country team, featuring inexperience with fine freshmen on the seven-man squad, came in third in the conference meet at Brevard college behind Brevard and Wingate. The score was Brevard 16, Wingate 55, Lees-McRae 69, North Greenville 102 and Anderson 127.

John McGowan and Jack Mauk made All-WCSC Cross-Country team by finishing seventh and eighth respectively at the conference meet.

The conference meet finished the season for the Cats with a 2-2 regular season slate and 2-3 overall. The Cat harriers were all inexperienced with Sid-

The Cat victories were over Asheville-Biltmore 25 to 30 and over Gaston College and Mitchell 25 to 42 and 60 respectively. The defeats were a loss to Wingate 26 to 38 and another loss to Wingate 20 to 39.

Brevard Represented Region 10 and the WCJC Conference in the Nationals and finished sixth behind five teams including Ricks College (Idaho) who won the meet among some 25 Jr. Colleges that entered.

Team work is essential to the success of any team, and, after watching Lees-McRae teams in action, it was obvious that each player contributed to the winning of a game.

However, there are always outstanding players and especially was true of Ronnie Rossello, Honorable-Mention All-American in Football, Dave Ahles won All-Conference acclaim as did Glynn Thompson. Rossello's and Ahles' laurels were made possible by a light and ir experienced freshmen line that played the game to win and hustled until the final whistle. Thompson anchored the defense that likewise was young and inexperienced but determined. Freshman Joe Johnston was the standout on the hardwood and led the Bobcats all season. Johnston received ample support from Captain Jim King, a mainstay for the 'Cats and a hot-handed shooter. Don Johnson, probably one of LMC's greatest netters, returned to star for the 'Cats. He was All-Conference in tennis and most valuable his freshman year. He was one of the main reasons Lees-McRae won the conference and received a berth in the Nationals held in Ocala, Florida.

Of course, not enough can be said for the men who labor diligently to direct and produce the teams at Lees-McRae. Often scoffed and ridiculed for bad judgement and poor coaching, these men continue to work for a proud tradition in LMC athletics.

A college's athletic program can only be as good as the President's interest in such. President Max Chapman supports athletics at Lees-McRae on a sane basis. An avid sports fan, he is one of the Bobcats' most energetic rooters. He works closely with Athletic Director George Litton for a sound, well-rounded sports program at LMC.

Colonel Max C. Chapman (USMC retired) assumed the duties of President of Lees-McRae College in August of 1961. Colonel Chapman, a graduate of Clenison College, has been instrumental in Lees-McRae's rapid growth and progressed in the last five years. President Chapman seeks to make Lees-McRae one of the finest Junior Colleges in the South. He wants excellence in academics and in all phases of college life. This includes athletics. His energetic spirit is reflected in the student body and his drive and determination offers a challenge to the students of the college.

George Litton has been Athletic Director and Head Football Coach since the fall of 1962. In 1964 he took over the helm of the Lees-McRae basketballers and directed them to a first place championship in the WCJC Conference and runner-up in the Region 10 Conference. Last year he guided them to a third place finish in the Conference and a Consolation Victory in the WCJC Conference Tournament.

A native of Big Stone Gap, Virginia, Litton attended East Tennessee where he captained the Buccaneers his senior year and was an All-OVC Selection at end. Before becoming the Head Mentor at Lees-McRae, Litton served as a Graduate Assistant on East Tennessee State University's Athletic Staff.

Ironically, Litton did not play basketball at ETSU but was an outstanding end and captain for the Buccaneer gridders. He was hired at Lees-McRae as football coach and Athletic Director. Chuckling about his success in basketball he states, "We have hired a basketball coach and a good one, in Jack Lytton. He will assist me this year and it is hoped that he will take over the reins next year."

Jack Lytton, a native of Surgoinsville, Tennessee, was a star guard for the Appalachian State College team and was a graduate assistant to Coach Bob Light at ASTC.

Assistant Football and Head Track Coach Jerry Kirk was an All-OVC center two years in a row at ETSU. Kirk is considered by many as one of the best centers ever to play for State.

He served as student coach under Coach Charlie Bradshaw at the University of Kentucky, 1963-64. The Bobcats under Kirk and Litton posted their best season since 1960 with a 6-4 record.

Don Baker, Tennis Coach, a graduate of Lees-McRae College and East Tennessee State University, has served as Director of Public Relations and Publicity at Lees-McRae since 1960. He has been Sports Publicity Director for Region 10 of the NJCAA since 1962.

His tennis teams have compiled a 32-17 won-loss record, and two WCJC Conference Championships and two second places. Last year they represented Region Ten and the WCJCC in the Nationals in Florida.







BOBCATS UPENDED IN SEASON OPENER

The Bobcats jumped out to a 26 to 7 lead over Chowan early in the third quarter, but were unable to hold the lead and lost on a fourth period TD and extra point.

The Bobcats led by Ronnie Rossello's three touchdown runs had a lead of 19 to 7 early in third period after a 12 to 7 half time lead. On the kickoff following Rossello's third TD Sam Reed picked up a fumble and rambled 19 yards to give the 'Cats a 26 to 7 lead. However, at this point favored Chowan started its winning comeback, marching to two consecutive TDs before the close of the third stanza. They then scored the winning marker in the fourth period to send the Bohcats down to defeat.



FINAL QUARTER COMEBACK WINS FOR 'CATS



BULLDOGS MAUL 'CATS WITH FEROCIOUS DEFENSE

The Gardner-Webb Bulldogs' defense scored 16 points, as the Bulldogs mauled the Bobcats, at a postponed homecoming game, 24 to 6.

The Bobcats' Tom Ulmer had a punt blocked in the first quarter and GW's John Taylor ran it in for a TD as the Bulldogs jumped off to an early lead. After GW had stretched its lead to 13 to 0 Mike McCall hit Rod Kittrell with a 44 yard bomb as the half ended with the Bobcats behind 13 to 6. The second half was a defensive battle with GW's defense scoring on an intercepted pass and two safeties. LMC ROMPS TO WIN OVER FURMAN FROSH

Freshman Woody Wimer caught two TD passes from Mike McCall to lead the Bobcats to a 25 to 7 romp over the Furman Frosh.

The other Bobcat scores came on a line plunge for six by Bernie Storer and on a 48 yard punt return by Sam Reed. The Reed score was set up by a vicious block by Al Savill.

Again the Bobcats' defense was outstanding as they stopped the Baby Paladins time after time.

FOOTBALL

The BOBCATS, inexperienced and outweighted, came through with the best season enjoyed by LMC gridders under Coach George Litton and the best record since 1960. The 6-4 record not only marked improvement but also raised hopes for next year as 21 freshmen lettered. The Bobcats began the season with nine returning lettermen. The returnees are Bob Lyons, Ronnie Rossello, Dave Ahles, Bob Julian, Mike McCall, Terry Loggans, Pat Withers, Dick Bolick, and George Drake, The Cats' LIGHT BRIGADE on offense consisted of Bolick or Chris Corriher at strong end. Woody Wimer or Rod Kittrell at split end, Barry Farmer and Lyons at the tackles, Greg Pierce and Jim Hodnett at the guards, Terry Gentle at center, Ahles or Dave Bower at halfback, Bernie Storer at fullback, Rossello at tailback, and McCall and Danny Copenhaver at the quarterback slot. The defensive LIGHT BRIGADE was manned by Don Rogers, Barry Weiser and Al Savill at the ends, Glynn Thompson and Harry Anderson at the tackles, Pat Withers, E. G. Shepherd, and Scott Swing at the linebacker slots, Loggans at cornerback, Sam Reed and Julian at halfbacks and Harry Turner and Drake at safety. The Bobcats had a genuine asset at punter in Tom Ulmer who had a 42 yard average despite having four punts blocked. The Cats' best season in six years, plus the returning lettermen for next year, gives LMC something to look back on in pride and to look forward to with great anticipation.



The football coaches of the Region 10 Conference of the National Junior College Athletic Association selected members to represent their schools on the Region 10 team. Lees-McRae coached by George Litton and co-champion Hank Norton's Ferrum Panthers and Norman Harris' Gardner-Webb Bulldogs placed three men each on the "dream team." Chowan coached by Jim Garrison had two members receive a berth on the mythical Region 10 squad.

mythical Region 10 squad. Unanimous choices were tackle Lou Santospago, guard Joe Cappola, and tackle Willard Arthur of Ferrum. Gardner-Webb had end Roy Thompson and guard John Taylor as unanimous choices and Lees-McRae placed three unanimously in Ron Rossello, a tailback, Dave Ahles, a halfback, and Glynn Thompson, a tackle. Unanimous choices for Chowan were tackles Gerald "Tiny" Matthews, and Lawrence Edwards. Gardner-Webb's Tom Gillis also made the eleven man squad. Ronnie Rossello, a sophomore from Atlanta, Georgia, led Region 10 in rushing for the second year in a row and was voted "Back of the Year" in Region 10. Rossello, the Bobcat captain, led the team, which started 16

Rossello, the Bobcat captain, led the team, which started 16 freshmen out of the first 22, to its best record in six years. He rushed for 791 yards in 202 carries for a 3.9 average and 3 TDs, hehind a freshman line. In addition to this valuable rushing and blocking. Becaula are been been been at the star reshing and blocking, Rossello ran back punts and has 10 pass receptions for 95 yards and 1 TD.

David Ahles was a unanimous choice to the Region 10

dream team. Ahles, a halfback for the Bobcats, was one of the deciding factors in the best season Lees-McRae has had in years.


Ahles came on to replace the injured Rod Kittrell, who was leading the Region 10 pass receiving statistics, to take the lead of the early games, but he came back to take over at halfback and caught 26 passes for 372 yards in 47 carries for a 2.7 average.

Ahles, a sophomore, added a stablizing unit to the predomi-

Ahles, a sophomore, added a stablizing unit to the predomi-nantly freshman Bobcats, leading them to a 6-4 record. Big Glynn Thompson proved to be one of the most valuable transfers to Lees-McRae in years. He transferred from South Carolina where he played freshman ball. Thompson, who stands 6 feet 6 inches tall and weighs 265 pounds, was the stalwart in the Bobcat line. He led a defen-sive unit which improved steadily until the last game of the season he led the line charge which held Carolina Military Academy to a minus 14 rushing.

Thompson played outstandingly in every game, coming up with big plays in each of them. Against Chowan he blocked and intercepted a pass, and against defending champs Ferrum he led the Bohcats in tackles as they held the Panthers to 70_yards lead than their average rushing.

Thompson was second in tackles on the Bobcat squad, having 97 assists and 22 solos for 119 total tackles.


Rocky Rossello breaks loose from a would be Chowan tackler and romps to one of his three touchdowns scored against the Braves.



Four Add Names to Bobcats' Record Book

Four Add Names to Bobcats' Record Book Four LMC football Bobcats added their names to the record book by breaking or tying records in the Bobcats' game with Carolina Military Academy. Ronnie Ros-sello tied the record for most yards gained rushing in a single game by picking up 130 yards in 20 carries. 












BASKETBALL

The young Bobcats, starting four freshmen, launched their season with resounding victories over Steed 97 to 69, Warren-Wilson 90 to 74, Brevard 76 to 61, Wytheville 103 to 73 and Palmer 138 to 37. This early season streak carried LMC to fourth place in the Conference and a 16-11 overall record. Included in the victory column was a late season upset over Conference champs Gardner-Webb, 80 to 66. It was the only Conference defeat the champion Bulldogs suffered. The Freshman-laden Cats were sporadic in their performances all season. Williams, King, Gibson, and Smith had flashes of greatness but never performed consistantly. Frosh sensation Joe Johnston found difficulty in performing consistantly from night to night. He has a season low of 10 points against Brevard as the Bobcats lost, 74 to 62, to a team they had beaten 14 points earlier in the season. His 50 point output against the Appalachian State JV's earned him a new school scoring record and tied the WCJC Conference record. His 50 point barrage bettered the 40 point total of Gary Chenevey against Emory-Henry's JV's. Johnston tied Asheville-Biltmore's Dan Goolsby who scored 50 points against Warren-Wilson in 1964. With a total of 583 points in 27 games Johnston set a new school scoring record for the season. The previous record was held by Jack Campbell in 1958 with 544 points in 28 games, Gary Chenevey last year had 516 points in 24 games for a 21.5 average. Johnston is destined to rewrite the record books again next year. He is in hot pursuit of Bob Patchett's 1953-55 two year scoring record of a 1,005 total points. Despite the season performance the Bobcats finished with a better than .500 record. With new replacement coming in, and with four returning veterans next year, Bobcat rooter's will have something to cheer about.





The Bobcats had a short season with only five meets in track last spring. In the regular season the Bobcats split a pair of meets with Gardner-Webb, they defeated Wingate, and they lost to Brevard. The Bobcats placed third in the WCJCC tournament at Brevard. Brevard won the tourney with 90 points, Gardner-Webb placed second with 61, Lees-McRae had 42, Anderson 31, Wingate 25, and North Greenville 5.

The track team proved itself to be as good as could be expected due to the conditions that prevailed. Weather conditions prevented workouts, the short season hampered conditioning, and the lack of field facilities made workouts tough. Even with these factors against them, the track team has set twelve new school records in the last three years. This season the pole vault record was set by George Drake who vaulted at 12 feet, the Javelin record for the school and for the WCJCC was set by Arnold Freeman, who threw for a distance of 173 feet, the triple jump record was set by Fritz Riebe who jumped 40'11", and the 300 yard intermediate hurdle record was set by Gary Chenevey who ran it in 43.0 seconds. Chenevey was also the leading scorer for last season.

In the conference meet Fritz Riebe was high scorer for LMC with 10 points. Five places were awarded in each event, and medals were given for the first three places.


BOBCATS DEFEATED BY BULLDOGS IN OPENER

Gardner-Webb provided the Bobcats' closest opposition with 60 points; Brevard had 36. Wingate 27, and Anderson 13.

In the first number doubles match, LMC's Don Johnson and Charlie Noe, both all conference selections, defeated Jennings Neely (another all-conference choice) and Harry Crosby of Wingate, 7-5, 7-5.

The final match of the day provided the most excitement as Rod Dulaney and Ed Madsen of Gardner-Webb beat Ron Rossello and John Weaver of Lees-Mc-Rae, 6-4, 14-16, 6-4.

Top seeded Larry Smith of Brevard won the No. 1 singles division by defeating third-seeded Don Johnson of Lees-McRae 6-4, 6-4. Johnson advanced to the finals as he plaved inspired tennis by defeating Jennings Neely of Wingate, second seeded, 6-3, 7-5, Neely was the WCJCC defending singles champion. Smith's record of 7-1 bettered Neely's 6-1 mark for top seeding. Johnson was 4-3 in conference play.






Among these projects the ASB promoted the "hour-change" for girls' dorm hours which was one of the biggest projects accomplished this year.



Bobcat Gales LEES-MCRAE COLLEGE

"TALES" IN TWENTIETH YEAR...

Published monthly by the students of Lees-McRae, THE BOB-CAT TALES covers school events in news articles, features, and editorials. The newspaper, under the direction of Mr. Carl Herckner, has given interested students training in management, advertising, and journalism.

Through the efforts of the Editor Troy Rexrode and the advisor, THE BOBCAT TALES has maintained high publication standards and has attempted to establish a good journalistic style at Lees-McRae.

The BOBCAT TALES, the college newspaper, was first sponsored by the Demostheneans. Calvin Criner, who taught at LMC from 1955 until 1961, edited the first edition of the Tales as a student in 1942. It succeeded the earlier campus newspapers, the Lem Me C News and the Mountain-Ear. Interrupted by the war, its place being taken temporarily by the Cabbage Patch, sponsored by the Sullivanians.

With the end of the war in 1947, the BOBCAT TALES again appeared on campus, although appearing in an informal pamphletform. At this point an immensely overtaxed filing system broke from the stress as no record has been retained concerning the sponsors of the '47, '48, and '49 issues.

With the coming of the fall semester of 1950, Miss Annie R. Morre, a modern language instructor and librarian, assumed the responsibility of Faculty Advisor. She served in this capacity for two years when succeeded by Dr. Laura Bland. In 1953, Miss Bland was joined in co-sponsoring the Tales by Mr. Ivan Stafford.

Beginning in 1954 and extending through 1958, an English and Psychology professor, Dr. Mary Eliason, worked in this rather thankless post of advisor. She relinquished her position in 1959 to Mr. Eugene A. Fernette, a professor of journalism.

The next year, 1960, marked the return of Mr. Donald R. Baker to the Lees-McRae campus. After receiving his A.A., he attended the University of North Carolina's school of journalism from September 1957 through January 1959. He then received his B.A. from East Tennessee State University. Afterward he served Lees-McRae as Dean of Men (for two years). He now teaches art, directs publicity and public relations, and Alumni Affairs. He was joined in 1963 by Mrs. Max C. Chapman as Tales co-sponsor.

Miss Eleanor Osborne, the Assistant Director of Student Affairs, was granted the not so "coveted position" during 1964.

In 1966. Mr. Carl Herckner stepped into the limelight as official Tales consultant. As if this position were not sufficiently time consuming, he also fulfilled the multitude of duties as Assistant Director of Student Services.

The success of last twenty years, offering tremendous variety,

has been due in great part to the devotion of these dedicated persons. We herein pause to recognize, and to offer a sincere "thank you" for a splendid past. All the while we are hoping, dedicating ourselves to, and foreseeing equally as bright a future.






ADMINISTRATION AND FACULTY...



CURRICULUM ...

The faculty and staff are dedicated to the task of education. The administration strives to provide leadership during a period of great expansion and change in this modern age. The staff administrators labor to create a better college family and is dedicated to a friendly Lees-McRae.

A well-qualified faculty of 34 members devote their time and talents to the student body, both in the classroom and in personal conferences, enhancing the academic atmosphere with excellent relations among instructors and students. These people assist the college in planning an academic program which will train the intelligence, strengthen the body, and provide a rich spiritual and social life leading to wholesome personal living.

The character and reputation of college, its standing in the educational world, the measure of its influence on those who live and study on its campus, is determined in large measure by the dedication and devotion of its faculty. For us, as for many generations of Lees-McRae students, this spirit, this quality of dedication and devotion is most fully expressed in our administration, staff, and faculty.

Through the talents and interest of President Chapman, Richard Jackson, and Charles Ramsey, who handled the paper work, the college acquired lab equipment for physics, chemistry, and fine arts, as well as making application for other financial assistance in supplementing the educational equipment at Lee-McRae through federal grants. The Academic Affairs Committee labored under Chairman Lewis Hall to investigate and acquire those programs needed at Lees-McRae to strengthen the educational system. Various studies and surveys, as well as decisions on policy were handled through the Academic Affairs Committee. Last year the Fine

Many long hours of study, investigation, and frustration, are rewarded with excellence through achievement. Through discussion, depression . . themes and theocracy . . . analysis and assemblies . . . socialization and statistics . . . The student perceives, inquires, and eventually suffices himself. Arts Department instituted an Art History course and afer a year of trial, it has been placed in the curriculum to be offered each semester. Two new faculty members were added this year and six replaced those who left the college for further study or for positions elsewhere. The college instituted a new degree in the Associate of Science, thereby offering Associate in Arts Degree, as well as Associate in Science and terminal courses. Students are expected to achieve and exhibit scholastic progress toward the fulfillment of the curriculum leading to the A.A. or A.S. Degree. Such progress is indicated by the accumulation in each semester of a minimum of ten semester hours and a minimum of twenty-four quality points.

Lees-McRae College offers to every student the opportunity to understand reality and to orient himself within his environment in order that he may progress toward mature realization of humanity. Through participation in the community of scholars, the student is exposed to the discipline of investigation, analysis, and creative assimilation of the heritage of learning. The faculty requires every student, therefore, to pursue the basic liberal arts of Language and Literature, Mathematics and Natural Science, Religion and Social Science, and Physical and Social Culture. These subjects areas comprise the core curriculum designed to give the student a basic, liberal orientation and a firm preparation for further study.

The college transfer curricula emphasizes the core of liberal arts which will qualify the student for advanced standing in a senior institution and permit some concentration upon a chosen subject area. The terminal curricula require a basic liberal arts orientation and offer courses of professional preparation.

Quiet, comfortable facilities, found in a scenic and picturesque mountain valley, with rustic stone buildings and calm, peaceful surroundings, make Lees-McRae conductive to good study.


