Over the years it is estimated that better than 80% of Lees-McRae graduates have gone on to institutions of higher learning. One of the unique programs at Lees-McRae is the tutorial services. Many of us have taken advantage of the skills clinic and is available to all who need it. Many of us found that we could use the skills clinic and the developmental courses to enable us to use our potential ability. Lees-McRae's medical secretary and secretarial science program have received wide acclaim. These courses provide a young woman with the opportunity to earn an A.S. degree which permits her to further her education if she chooses. If not, one may still have acquired the tools and skills necessary to enable them to become a top-notch medical or executive secretary. Since Lees-McRae is an unique institution, it stands to reason that our education program would be unique also.



# DIVISION OF DEVELOPMENTAL STUDIES


The philosophy behind the Developmental-Tutorial program at Lees-McRae is first of all to recognize that there are indeed, many who are not suited or inclined to enroll in a college curriculum program. There are, however, those who could enroll, benefit from, and achieve in the college institution even though their high school scholastic records do not point to the conclusion. The aim essentially is to provide the situation and staff which will substantially raise that self-concept, operate to build and sustain adequate motivation, and train the students in successful study habits.

The clinic is staffed by three developmental instructors, three adult counselors, four peer counselors. The entire staff undergoes an extensive program of training in the diagnosing and training, study skills, techniques and motivation. Incoming students are tested in skills, tutored in individual subject matter, and trained in the skills of good study habits. Special study sessions are conducted in various subjects and skills classes are also held in such areas as note-taking and exam-taking techniques. Programmed materials are prescribed in some subjects with achievement tests being given to determine their success or lack of it.










# ORDER OF THE TOWER


### BOBCATS SLIDE PAST WCU JV'S

Lees-McRae spotted the Duke JV's 14 points, then fought back to 14-9 before succumbing to the Impish onslaught of a talent laden JV squad to drop their second loss in a row 41-16 at Durham. The second quarter the Bobcats shut down the Duke attack limiting the Imps to 27 yards rushing and one completion for five yards passing. The 'Cats stormed back on a pass from Hamilton to Canja that covered 11 yards and Talley booted the extra point to make it 14-7. An indecisive Imp took a Talley field goal attempt in the endzone, ran out to the 1-yard lina, changed his mind and went back into the endzone giving tha Bobcats a safety. QB Walker was again substituted into the game and a few sparks flew as he rushed for 21 yards in four carries, completed six of eight passes for 47 yards including a TD strike to tight end Chris Canja from 10 yards out. Canja grabbed four passes for 59 yards and two TDs.

### U. T. JVS BUMP BOBCATS, 24-13

The University of Tennessee JV Volunteers broke open a close game in the fourth period to hand Lees-McRae their third straight loss, 24-13, at Knoxville.

Amid the awesome confines of Neyland Stadium, Lees-McRae gave up 10 points in the fourth period to see their hopes for an upset victory diminish as U. T. mustered two long drives, one resulting in a 27-yard field goal and the other on a short TD run. The fourth period saw the Bobcats able to account for only eight offensive plays, six rushing plays that resulted in only seven yards gained and one pass completion for two yards. The Baby Vols used 19 rushing plays for 80 yards and connected on one pass for 15 yards for their big fourth quarter plays.

The Bobcats set a school record in fumbles lost as they coughed the ball up ten times and lost six. LM had tied the fumbles lost record earlier against WCU JV's losing five; against Nassau they lost six. The slippery ball was hard to handle and resulted in LM tieing the record of most fumbles in e game with 10 and tieing the

LEES-MCRAE RALLY FALLS SHORT, CHOWAN WINS, 29-20

Chowan, unable to move the ball on the ground except for the "big play" went to the airways to devastate the Bobcats with 216 yards passing and burned LM backs on two pass plays of 39 and 24 yards. The first half Chowan would have been in the minus column rushing had they not had a 28 and 51-yarder by Danny Days who picked up the slack and rushed for 123 yards in 19 carries, 79 of his total coming on two TD runs. The Bobcats kept C. W. Wilson, the conference's leading scorer, out of the endzone but the big fullback picked up 88 yards in 17 carries.

The Bobcats showed some outstending offense of their own as McKenney picked up 131 yards in 19 trips. Walker had 106 yards in 15 rushes and scored one TD. Beebe gathered 44 yards of real estate in 11 carries end one TD. Walker showed brilliance but also had to accept the responsibility of four turnovers as he threw three interceptions and fumbled efter a 70-yerd march.

Bobcat defense got stalwart performances from Penland who turned in 4 solos, one OB sack and 13 assists for a total of 18 tackles. Lou Coviello had 5 solos, 2 OB sacks and 11 assists for e total of 18. Stein had 16 tackles, Nelson 12, Branton 11, and Bailey turned in 6 solos and 5 assists for a total of 11. Hudson was elso in double figures as he came up with one seck of Chowan's OB, one solo and 8 assists for a totel of 10 teckles. record of most fumbles by both teams, 17. Fumbles resulted in setting up two Nassau scores end killed several Bobcat drives.

Penalties were also abundant as the Bobcats were flagged 13 times and set back 102 yards. Nassau was penalized 19 times for 164 yards.

In the second quarter Nassau gave the Bobcats a golden opportunity to score just before the half when Brock Braswell recovered a Lion fumble on the Nassau 10. Beebe, McKenney and Walker nefted six yards in three running plays but Walker's fourth down pass fell incomplete and Nassau took over with 19 seconds remaining the first half.

The third quarter saw Gary McWherter, a converted running back, playing his second game at cornerback, turn in a sterling performance with two interceptions and four passes batted down,

The Bobcat defense held the Lions on a goal line stand and also put them out of field goal range on two occasions. Nassau missed three field goal attempts.

BOBCATS KICK CATAMOUNTS INTO SUBMISSION 20-14

Two lightning quick first quarter TDs and two field goals by torgotten kicker, Paul Talley spelled disaster for the Potomac State Catamounts who had light workouts all week in preparation for their "breather" with Lees-McRae.

Talley had devoted his time to kickoffs and point after TD kicks this season having connected on only one field goal (20 yarder) in 10 attempts. However, Paul returned to the golden toe Talley of old Saturday es he booted field goals of 34 and 46 yards and sent his kickoffs sailing into the endzone.

It wasn't all defense Saturday either. The Bobcat offense amassed 286 yards rushing behind Paul McKenney's 123 yards and Joe Curro's 110 yerds. Frankie Walker unloaded a perfect 54-yerd TD strike to big, ellconference tight end Chris Canja and McKenney had a field day in return yardage. He returned 5 punts for 47 yards and 2 kickoffs for 51 yerds returned.

FERRUM DEFEATS LEES-MCRAE 37-7

Lees-McRae drew first blood but Ferrum's third nationally ranked Panthers wore down a valiant Bobcat football team as they turned in the "big plays" to whip Lees-McRae for the 14th time in 17 years and locked up the Coastal Conference Championship 37-7 at MacDonald Stadium in Newland

The Bobcats got on the board following the opening kickoff when QB Craig Fuquay fumbled on the initial play and Lou Coviello recovered on the 19-yd line. McKenney picked up four and big fullback Joe Curro rambled 15 yards, breaking tackles and running over people, to carry tackler into the endzone to score with only 1:20 elapsed in the game.

Ferrum's rushing, averaging over 300 yards a game, was shut down by the Bobcat defense in the first half mustering only 50 yards in 20 rushes, holding Ferrum's six running backs to minus four yards.

Mike Hamilton, switched from quarterback to cornerback on defense, because of injuries to key defensive players, was then forced into punting for LM after Jim

Schletzer was sidelined with knee surgery. Ironically Hamilton went out in the first half with a knee injury and Bob Price was in to punt from the Bobcat seven. The fourth period was all Ferrum. The Bobcats held for three quarters forcing

Ferrum's QB to the air as he completed 10 of 30 passes. As the Bobcat defense began to expire, the Panthers began running their stable of backs in and out of the game. They rolled up 98 yards on the ground in 20 rushes in the final stanza.

Paul McKenney was the workhorse again for the Bobcats as he rolled up 94 yards in 15 carries with the pigskin. He had one pass reception for 12 yards, ran four kickoffs back for 84 yards, and played defensive halfback turning in seven tackles and batting down one pass.

Rocky Beebe had 12 attempts for 44 yards. Linebacker Charles Stein turned in a sterling performance on defense and got able assistance from Tom Branton, Richard Penland, Brock Braswell, Jimmy Nelson, Lou Coviello and newcomer Tim Lucas who had six solo tackles, one assist and two passes broken up.

BOBCATS COME FROM BEHIND TO DOWN BEACONS 14-10

Linebacker Charles Stein blocked a Deacon punt on the 26 and raced in for the score midway in the 4th period and the Bobcats launched a 61 yard march with Frankie Walker crashing over from the 1 to take the lead 14-10 over the Wake Forest JV's.

The Bobcats then had to hold off the Deacons who drove 91 yards in the final 2½ minutes of the game on 20 offensive plays. The game ended as Tim Lucas and Paul McKenney stopped Wake's mammoth end on the one foot line as time ran out.

The Bobcats were inside the 5-yard line 6 times but were unable to score but once. The Bobcats' final TD was set up on a 40 yard pass from Walker to Tight End Chris Canja who was pushed out on the one-yard line, Walker crashed over for the go ahead TD.

Walker was the leading Bobcat rusher with 105 yards in 12 carries. Paul McKen-

ney, the Conference's leading rusher, carried only 55 yards in 16 attempts, had 2 punt returns for 16 yards and had 2 kick-off returns for a 13 yard average. McKenney also had an outstanding day on defense turning in 7 tackles and along with Lucas making the game saving tackle

Rocky Beebe managed only 50 yards in 12 carries and Joe Curro accounted for 11 yards in 4 rushes.

Stein, the Bobcats premier Linebacker, turned in a stalwart performance with 5 solos, one OB sack, and was credited for with 14 assists. He knocked one enemy aerial and scored the first TD after blocking a punt and racing 26 yards to paydırt. Stein's efforts ignited the Bobcats offense as they later marched 61 yards for the final tally and the go ahead TD.

The 1977 Bobcat offense fumbled 37 times and lost 24 in 8 games. The school record for fumbles in a season is 44. The school record for fumbles lost in a season was 22 and that mark was passed by the 1977 Bobcats with 26.

The Lees-McRae Bobcats witnessed one of their best openings in over 27 years as they ended their basketball wars at Christmas break with an 8-2 record and rested on their laurels until the second half of the season began. In their first ten games of the season they held a 65 point defensive scoring average. When they resumed play second semester, they soon ran into league leading Anderson who snapped their winning streak and the Bobcats picked up eight losses in the second half of the season to finish the year, 15-10. At the WCJCC Tourney they won their opening round against Brevard, a team that had beaten them twice during the regular season, then lost a heartbreaker to North Greenville, 83

80, in the semi-finals. Miles hit 75% from the free throw line while Haskins hit 73%. Ondra Richardson was third in the team scoring with a 11.3 average connecting on 54% of his shots. Richardson led the team in rebounds with 10 per game.

# NEW YORK, TAKE SIXTH PLACE IN NJCAA TOURNEY THERE



The Lees-McRae Ski Team finished in the middle of the heap in the NJCAA competition at Whiteface Mountain, Lake Placid, New York. The national ski championships ended March 4th with Lees-McRae taking overall sixth place among eleven teams.

In the men's alpine with 56 racers representing eleven teams North Country Community College, Saranac Lake, New York, took first place with 124 points followed by Champlain (VT) Community College with 123.5 and in third place was Morrissville (NY) Community, 101.5. Lees-McRae was fifth with 75.5 points with Lees-McRae's John Lamprinakas 13th with a time of 103.95. LM's Johan Kinck finished 22nd with 107.79; Mark Goslen, 27th, 108.97; Bill Kabrich, 39th, 115.00; and Greg Hampton 42nd, 117.73. North Country's Dave Verner took first place with 95.3. Colin Mead of Champlain was second and Mark Hangen of Corning (NY) Community College was third.

In the giant slalom Morrissville captured first place with 146 points followed by Adirondack (NY) Community College and North Country Community College with 128 points. Lees-McRae was fifth with 96 points. The top three winners were Steve Armstrong of Morrissville, 1:57.44; Bob Higley, Adirondack, second; and Rick Weidel, Morrissville, third. In 9th place was Lees-McRae's Greg Hampton, 2:03.72; 22nd, Johan Kinck, 2:13.56; 29th, John Lamprinakas, 2:19.14; 34th Harlan Cato, 2:23.37; 39th, Mark Goslen, 2:41.58.

In the slalom it was North Country first, Morrissville second and Adirondack third. Lees-McRae finished sixth. Morrissville's Armstrong repeated as champion followed by Mark Hangen of Corning in second and North Country's Bob Bear in third. Lees-McRae skiers John Lamprinakas finished 20th, Harlan Cato 25th, Bill Kabrich 30th. Johan Kinck and Greg Hampton did not finish.

In the combined alpine North Country captured first place followed by Morrissville and Adirondack. Lees-McRae finished sixth.

In the nordic events of three-man teams in the 3kilometer relay, Lees-McRae finished sixth in eight teams and finished 8th in the 15-kilometer race with Johan Kinck taking 19th place, Jim Hawlk 40th, and Mark Goslen did not finish.

In the women's alpine Lees-McRae finished seventh overall among eight teams. The alpine was won by Champlain Community College with Morrissville second and the Community College of Oregon third. In the downhill Lees-McRae's Cindi Ingram finished 14th, Julia Perley 18th, and Leesa Whiteside 22nd among 45 skiers representing eight teams.

Champlain won the giant slalom with 91 points edging out Morrissville with 90 and Morris (NJ) Community College was third with 74. Lees-McRae finished 8th with 29 points. Sue Cummins of Morrissville took first place in the giant slalom followed by Kerrie England of Oregon in second and Joan Skinner of Morris third. Cindi Ingram of Lees-McRae finished 20th, Julia Perley 27th, Ruth Pickel 32nd, and Laurie Beucus, 33rd.

In the slalom Joan Skinner of Morris led her team to first place followed by Cindy Smith of Adirondack in second and Kerrie England of Oregon in third. Lees-McRae's Leesa Whiteside came in 23rd, Cindi Ingram 24th, Ruth Pickel 25th, Dorothy Royster 30th, and Julia Perley.



## BOXING

#### BOBCAT BOXERS TAKE TKE TOURNEY AT ASU

After 35 years Lees-McRae Junior College has returned to prominence in the pugilistic art of competitive boxing. Irish Joe Kelly won the MVP award in the TKE tournament at Appalachian State University and captured the middleweight championship by defeating Andy Pate of Columbia, S.C. in the finals.

Mark Harris of Lees-McRae defeated Robert Giles of Charlotte, and Joe Williams of Lees-McRae, in the heavyweight division, tied K.C. Godwin of Chicago, the returning ASU heavyweight champion. Other Bobcat boxers were Mike Sheaffer in the welterweight division and Dane Mastin in the super heavyweight.

From 1929 until the second World War Lees-McRae sponsored several outstanding boxing clubs and had several golden gloves champions from tournaments in Charlotte, Greensboro and other southern cities. The last boxing team at Lees-McRae was dissolved in 1941 as all mens' intercollegiate sports were dropped at the Banner Elk institution during the war years.

Joe Kelly, who graduated from Lees-McRae in December, began fighting in South Philadelphia, his hometown. He fought on the national championship team at West Chester State College before transferring to Lees-McRae. He returned to West Chester as a middleweight on West Chester State's team and was scheduled to fight 10 matches. Kelly formed the LMC team and was assistant coach along with Carroll Williams, faculty member at Lees-McRae. The Lees-McRae Student Government Association furnished the uniforms for the boxing club.




### LAST YEAR GOLF TO BE OFFERED AS INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORT






Hayes Smith clears the high jump at 6'.







### NOTED NBC NEWSMAN PROMISES '78 GRADS "NO ROSE GARDEN"

Noted NBC news commentator, Frank Blair, and Dr. Harvard A. Anderson, Moderator, 117th General Assembly, Presbyterian Church, U.S., brought a consensus theme to the Forty-Eighth Graduating Class of Lees-McRae College and that theme could be echoed as a popular song. "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden."

Both men warned the graduates and audience that there are darker days ahead and far-reaching problems with no easy solutions.

Dr. H.C. Evans, Jr. and Vice President for Academic Affairs, James Stonesifer, conferred 144 degrees upon graduates at one of the largest commencement-convocations of Lees-McRae College in its forty-eight year history.

After congratulating the graduating class on their achievements and exhorting them on their accomplishments, Blair challenged the Class of '78 to hold on to their "common sense and values." Blair warned the class of a foreboding and darkening future. A time of complexity, staggering problems and dizzying progress; that it will become less and less possible to find the really meaningful satisfactions in life in the years ahead. "You must hold on to your common sense and maintain your values."

"What I hope to see in the next ten years is the kind of life that started developing two hundred years ago in this country. Our forebearers fought then for the right, as independent men, to find a little piece of land, to build a home and hearth, to raise families in security, preserving the values by which free men have tried to live.

"The spirit of '76, I hope and pray, will be as strong in the majority of Americans as it was in those who fought for our freedom more than 200 years ago and that spirit must prevail." Blair concluded, "It can and will if we realize and accept the responsibilities of the individual in our society. And, as individuals, we must be able to communicate in a free society — one to the other and beyond."

Dr. Anderson did not offer a rose-tinted fantasy for the '78 Graduating Class. "You can't go back in time and you can't just wait for the future — our temptation is to want to wait for a better time when things will get better."

"I have heard of a definition of the 'Great American Dream' that goes like this: 'Of a glorious past, a promising future, and a lousy present.' We often feel like this, that there might be better times in the future but not now in the present. I submit to you who are of another generation from my own that this is a great day of opportunity for you. It is a great day of opportunity because we have some problems, some great problems, and we haven't solved them in my generation and the generations which preceded mine. We have not only created some problems but we have intensified some of the problems. And, here's another generation which has been handed problems, and I submit to you that without problems, life would be bland. There is a great day of opportunity because of our problems. There is a great challenge ahead for you."

"You are confronted with some problems of great magnitude: the problems of ecology — energy crisis, world hunger and the problem of world peace. We must strive for the security that



humanity will not destroy one another or itself. The field of human rights is another problem you face. The resurgence of the lack of human rights in this world makes it a continuous problem that must be confronted."

"I have no solutions to offer to these problems; it is a great time to be alive because there are problems and, secondly, I have said that I think that you can solve them, and you will."

"The future is as you wish it to be."

"I am reminded of a story of a young man who wished to challenge the wisdom of the aged prophet. The young man told a friend 'I will catch a bird and I will carry it in my hands to the old man and I will ask him, what do I have, and if he says a bird, I will ask him, is it alive or dead. If he says it is dead, I will open my hands and release it and it will fly away. If he says it is alive, then I will crush it and show him that it is dead.' So he confronted the wise man, 'What do I have in my hands?' he asked. I see feathers sticking through your fingers,' said the wise man, 'It is a bird,' Is it alive or dead?' asked the challenger. The wise man paused and stared out into space for some time, then turned to the young man and said, 'As you wish it.'"

"And, this I say to you: It is your future. As you wish it."



























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Sunday, May 14th, was Mother's Day. It also marked the 48th Graduation Exercises of a proud, mountain institution, Lees-McRae College.

Any "Mother's Day story" warms the hearts of its readers and just such a story was acted out at Lees-McRae. It could only happen at a small, informal, friendly, Christian campus, where everyone, students and faculty alike, really "care" about each other.

A first occurred at Lees-McRae during the 48th Commencement Exercises when Shane Oakes, age 11 months, crossed the stage with his mother, Rita, to receive the Associate in Arts degree conferred by Dr. H. C. Evans, Jr., President.

Shane, dressed in the graduation regalia (miniature cap and gown) seemed as though he had rehearsed the performance several times and he should be adept since he has been in college all his life.

Rita, who resides in Newland with husband Bobby and 9-year old son, Reggie, is an honor student and barely made it through exams her freshman year before Shane was born. When he was two months old she began working in the office of public relations at the college. Shane was either at work or in the girls' dormitory while Rita was in class. The coeds literally fought over who was to babysit young Shane. Shane became a permanent fixture on the Banner Elk campus and was adopted as a mascot by the student body.

While Rita was being a part-time secretary and a full-time wife and mother, she managed to maintain her Dean's List status, take part in extra-curricular activities, and be elected to "Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges." She graduated with honors but the greatest tribute was the award she received last spring and captured the hearts of the student body, faculty and staff alike at Lees-McRae, young Shane Oakes.

Lees-McRae has not lost sight of its purpose if it exists to help a young mountain woman work her way through school and graduate at the top of her class while performing the dual role of student and homemaker. It can only speak highly of the caliber of student Lees-McRae is getting when a young woman is willing to work hard and make the sacrifices necessary to gain an education. Probably the one to reap the most benefits from this success story is Shane Oakes. Shane helped his mother receive her diploma on "Mother's Day."

Now friends, that's a Mother's Day story - and a success story.

An American flag that draped a soldier's coffin and a "Medal of Merit" were recently returned from Norway to the United States. How the flag and medal arrived in Banner Elk, North Carolina, is a unique story.

Sunday, May 14th, was the 48th graduation ceremony in the proud history of Lees-McRae College. Among the honor graduates was a young man named Johan Kinck of Oslo, Norway. Johan found his way to Banner Elk through a relative that married into the Kinck family. And the flag and medal arrived because of Johan's success story at Lees-McRae.

Thirty-five years ago, Johan's great-uncle, George Norgoaad, was killed while performing his duties as a soldier of the United States Army. He had become a naturalized citizen while living in Brooklyn, New York, where he taught music from 1929 until his death in 1943. Since his only living relatives were in Norway, his body was returned there for burial under military escort and the American flag and "Medal of Merit" were presented to Mr. Norgoaad's mother.



Years later Norgoaad's grandnephew, Johan Kinck, arrived in Banner Elk with the assistance of his parents' sister-in-law, Vivian Faw Kinck, Vivian was the wife of Hakon Kinck, brother of Johan, Sr. Vivian's borther, H. Jack Faw, a prominent Hickory businessman, had established the Reuben E. Faw Scholarship which enabled Johan, Jr., as recipient, to attend Lees-McRae. While at Lees-McRae, young Kinck excelled on the ski slopes and was a member of the Lees-McRae Ski Team that twice competed in the national ski championships, and became an honor student. He was a member of the Phi Theta Kappa, national scholastic fraternity; a member of the elite Order of the Tower; and won the Fred I. Dickerson Award for the outstanding scholar-athlete as he maintained a 3.7 average and competed in skiing. He was also named to "Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges." At the national convention of Phi Theta Kappa in Orlando, Florida, Johan was the recipient of the Zetta Theta Foreign Student Award. This award is given to a junior college or community college foreign student in the country. As a result, Johan won an institute scholarship to the Honors

Institute held in Durango, Colorado, June 3-11. Through the emotion and excitement of what American and Lees-McRae, in particular, had done for their son, Johan and Inger Kinck insisted on returning the American flag and medal to this country. "An honor that is overwhelming to me," stated Dr. H. C. Evans, Jr., President of the college, who accepted.

A general and his staff from Fort Bragg had planned to be present to receive the flag and medal on behalf of the United States Army but fog and rain made it impossible for their craft to land at the Banner Elk airport, and, while they circled in the sky, Dr. Evans performed the duties of accepting this token of appreciation from the Kinck family.

"This is a great event in the history of Lees-McRae College," stated Evans. "I am indebted to two people who have shaped the future of Lees-McRae College through their dedication and support, Jack and Sadie Faw of Hickory, and those others responsible for today's memorable events: Vivian Faw Kinck, with whom Johan, Jr., makes his home while going to school in the United States, and the most instrumental person in bringing Johan to America. Finally, the people who are responsible for Johan, Mr. and Mrs. Johan Kinck, Sr. This will be a gift that we will cherish forever," Evans concluded as he accepted the American flag and medal.

It took thirty-five years for the flag and medal to return home and the turn of events that brought it here is another success story in the life of Lees-McRae College.
