The Lees-McRae Bobcats, with a motto of "Fine in '79", bowed in an opening barnburner with a heartbreaking 24.23 loss to the Western Carolina J. The Bobcats roared back to win five straight. They crushed Wesley 42.0, downed the Eagles of Carson-Newman in the rain $27-7$, and knocked off powerhouse Nassau 16.7 at Homecoming. They blanked the Chowan Braves 7.0 and pounded the Purple Palladins of Furman University 28-14. The Bobcats' old foe nemesis, Ferrum, came up for the Halloween trick or treat weekend and tricked the 'Cats 30-7 treating thernselves to the Coastal Conference crown. Lees McRae, stunned by the Ferrum loss, was upset by Westchester the next weekend as the New Yorkers won their first game of the season, 12.9. The talented toe of Russ Carpentien and the Bobcat defense gave Lees-McRae a 13.0 shutout of Potomac State. The Bobcats ended the season on a sour note being upset by Newport News Ap. prentice 27-17.

Lees-McRae's football tradition dates back to 1929 when the first Bulldog team took to field under Coach Dick Flinn. Charles Zimmerman assumed the reins in 1930. A decade later the team changed its mascot to a Bobcat and was still winning under Coach Johrs Mackorell. Don King had a three-year tenure following Zimmerman untii 1933 when a man who became a "legend in his oun time" returned. A star of that 1929 team. Fred I. Dickerson, returned to establish an enviable and unequalled record. Dickerson-coached teams were the perennial power in the Western Carolinas Junior College Conference, a league he was instrumental In forming. He won nine football champions and Lees-McRae went to three junior college post season bowl games. George Litton took over the reins when Dickerson retired and in his seven-year tenure directed the Bobcats to a conference championship and two bowl games: the NJCAA Championship Bowl game in Savannah, Georgia and the El Toro Bowl in Yuma. Arizona. Litton's assistant. Jim Osborne, succeeded him and served for a year followed by another assistant. Mike Cook, who was elevated when Osborne left. Cook directed the Bobcats to a victory over Wesley in the Tall Cedars Shrine Bowl in Annapolis. Maryland. and when Cook accepted a position at Wake Forest, Warren Klawiter, an assistant at the University of Virginia, was named successor. Klawiter directed lees-McRae to a Region X championship and the Shrine Goober Bowl in Murfreesboro defeating Chowan in a barnburner, 17-16. Klawiter was succeeded by former assistant to Litton. Cole Proctor. Proctor served as head football coach for three years and in 1979 Bill Bomar was named the eleventh LeesMcRae coach.

Virtually a "farm club" for four-year colleges and universities, Lees-McRae has sent players to institutions in practically every state in the country. Among the pro ranks, Clark "Super" Gaines, ruming back for the New York Jets, has the most starstudded credentials. Gaines was the first rookie ever to be named by his teammates as MVP for the Jets. He led all ronkie RBs in the NFL in rushing and had four 100yard rushing days in that season. He finished fourth in the voting of the Associated Press and UPI's All-Rookie Team.
lees-McRae has had 32 JUCO All-Americans since 1956 when such junior college All-Americans were first recognized LMC guard Allison Richardson ('56) was the first NJCAA All-American and played in the East-West game that year.

## Bobcats Post 20 Wins

Undefeated seasons in basketball are virtually unheard of and most coaches consider it quite a plume in their cap if they produce a 20 -game win season. The hectic schedule of basketball, which starts in November and runs through March, usually takes its toll of the best of teams. However, these gruelling seasons have produced some outstanding ball clubs at LeesMcRae over the years. John Mackorell's 1941-42 team posted a $19-6$ record and Fred I. Dickerson's ' 47.48 team ended the year with a 19.6 mark. Dickerson-coached teams in 1950-51 posted a $20-5$ season with an $18-4$ regular season record and a 2-1 toumament mark. In ' $51-52$ they went $21-4$ with an $18-2$ regular season and had a $3-2$ post season record. In ' $52-53$ the Bobcats had a $22-6$ record with a $19-4$ regular season finish and a $3-2$ tournament record. George Litton, who coached only one year of basketball, came up with a $20-10$ record in 1968-69, but was $18-9$ during the season and $2-1$ in post season play. Carlisle Hostetter had a 19-9 season his first year.
The Lees-McRae College Bobcats completed the first 20 -win season in the school's history by rolling to a $111-52$ victory over Haywood Tech. The Bobcats ended their season, 20-7. The Bobcats led at the half, 54-23, and widened the margin as Carlisle Hostetter went to his bench freely as everyone got on the scoring board for the night.

In addition, Carpentier completed ten field goals for the season to tie the record set by Paul Talley in 1976.

## BOBCAT INFIELD INTACT FOR COASTAL CONFERENCE ALL-STAR GAME

Lees-McRae's backfield was intact for the seventh annual All-Star game in Memorial Center, ETSU campus, as quarterback Scot Srodes, halfbacks Bryan Moore and William Brownlee, and fullback Ron Owens were in the South's backfield. Brownlee has been Lees-McRae's leading rusher for two years and has a career mark of 1,051 yards and 4.9 average per carry. Moore had several electrifying long runs this season for the Bobcats and is second in team rushing with 553 yards and 7 TDs. Owens, a bulldozing fullback, has been the bread and butter ball carrier for Lees-McRae this season, picking up tough yardage and important first downs in Max Bowman's wishbone attack.


Lees-McRae's offensive tackle, Frank Brown, was named "Offensive Player of the Year" in the Coastal Conference.

The offensive line play of Frank Brown, at $6^{\prime} 4^{\prime \prime}, 230 \mathrm{lbs}$., was responsible for the Lees-McRae team to post a $6-3$ record. An unsung hero in the trenches, he never missed an offensive play in nine games.

Lees-McRae captured second place in the Southeastern Collegiate Ski Racing Association's meet at Appalachian Ski Mountain, as Lees-McRae's Andy Dulin captured a third place finish. Fred Voigt was sixth and David McManus was eighth among the top ten collegiate skiers. Enic Milne finished 12th and Robert Strange 15th for the Bobcat skiers, as Lees-McRae scored 46 points behind first place winner Appalachian State University with 56 points. ## LEES-McRAE OBSERVES 50TH GRADUATING CLASS

Lees-McRae College President H. C. Evans, Jr. and Vice President for Academic Affairs James A. Stonesifer conferred one hundred forty-five degrees upon the 1980 Graduating Class and marked the golden anniversary of Lees-McRae graduates.

Dr. Fredenick R. Stair, Jr., President, Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Virginia, delivered the moming address at the 11:00 a.m. convocation before an overflow capacty crowd in Williams Recreation Center. The honorable Lamar Gudger, Congressman, 11th District, North Carolina, addressed the graduates at the 2:00 p.m. ceremony.
U.S. Representative Gudger of Asheville said he felt "a mixture of awe and envy" for the graduates and encouraged the class to consider public service as an occupation and relayed the experiences he had had in working with interns in his office in Washington, D.C.
"Despite the modern cymicism that we are a self-indulgent country looking after ourselves first, I don't feel the concept of public service is dead," Gudger said. "Otherwise, why would so many young people throng to Washington each year? I know that each and every intern has found the experience rewarding and valuable and something they will remember for the rest of their lives."
Gudger stated that the thought he wished to leave with the graduates was "that the idea of helping your fellow human beings is not some cliche, not something to be left within the Sunday school rooms, not just some cornball cliche to be verbalized and then forgotten. If you can find a life that some way contributes to the well being of others," he said, "I think you can go through life without experiencing that feeling of frustration or even malaise that seems to affect so many people."

Gudger concluded, "A college commencement is an exciting time for all concerned, students and parents, faculty and administration, but it is not the ending of something, only the springboard into what I hope and pray for all of you will be a life filled with excitement and enthusiasm because you will be taking part in your own generation's rendezvous with destiny."

Dr. Frederick R. Stair, Jr., President of Union Theological Seminary in Virginia, challenged the graduates to understand and live by the religious meaning of integrity. "We want it to be said of you that you are persons of integrity. That there is something about your character and your conduct that is the same - that you can make it with the walk and you make it with the talk - that your being and what you do comes from your integrity. The religious meaning of integrity has to do with relationships. Your relationships with your folks and your friends, your college and your future, your relationships with each other, your relationships also with God in Christ and with the futures that we all have in Christ."

Stair pointed out that Christ is the example of integrity, that He is the model. "One of the most important things that can be added on to your integrity is a sense of purpose," he continued, "a sense of mission, of goals." He pointed to the life of Edgar Tufts, the founder of Lees-McRae, with his sterling example of a mission and purpose in life. He summarized that mission and the contributions to the three instituations that exist today as memorial to his life's work.

Stair concluded with the wish and hope that all the graduates could "live lives of integrity."
