Lees-McRae strives to produce students that are liberally educated, and of a well disciplined mind. In its fully accredited program the college offers degrees in Associate in Arts and Associate in Science. Major emphasis is placed on the university parallel program but Lees-McRae also offers excellent two-year terminal programs in Secretarial Science and Medical Secretarial Science. The superior student finds at Lees-McRae great challenges through such features as: An honors seminar for Dean's List students, North Carolina's oldest chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (National Honor Fratemity), and opportunities to do extra study in his own field of interest
with the help of concemed members of the faculty. Lees McRae College, in Avery County, North Carolina, high in the Blue Ridge Mountains, proudly bears the title "Campus in the Clouds" given it more than twenty years ago by Reader's Digest. Set in the village of Banner Elk, over 4,000 feet above sea level, the winters are cold and the summers cool.

## Bobcat Gridders Post 7-3 Record

The young Bobcats, under the tutelage of first year coach Clyde "Soupy" Campbell, posted a 7.3 season record. The Bobcats, a question mark under a new coach, and with several freshmen in key positions, opened the season with two easy wins over the $A S U J V_{s}$ and the Western Carolina University JVs, but then were shocked by Newport News Apprentice as the Shipbuilders upset LeesMcRae, 17-3. The Bobcats, still in a tailspin from the Apprentice loss, traveled to New York to post a 17.28 loss to the Nassau Community Lions. The Bobcats bounced back with a surprising victory over highly favored Chowan at Homecoming, 21-14. The Bobcats thrilled the Homecoming crowd with a staunch defense and an offensive outburst that thoroughly dominated the favored Chowan Braves. It would be the first loss for Chowan, who came into the game 5.0 and sporting a win over the Ferrum Panthers the week before. The Bobcats went on a scoring spree against the Carson-Newman JVs. 24-6, romped past the N.C. State University $\mathrm{JVs}, 30 \cdot 0$, clobbered Coastal Conference opponent Westchester, 26-0, and shellacked the Potomac State Catamounts of the Coastal Conference, 49.6. Ferrum burst the Bobcats' bubble with a 10-6 victory at Ferrum which earned Ferrum a tie for the Coastal Conference championship and the right to host the East Bowl. A Bobcat victory would have insured Lees-McRae of the East Bowl or kept them in the national bowl picture. It would have also been the Bobcats' first share of the conference crown.

The Lees-McRae Bobcats blasted Haywood Tech in their finale, 119.73, which brought down the final curtain on regular season play. LeesMcRae got double figure scoring from Marvin Petty, Lonnie Smith, James Marshall, Donnie Moore, Dwayne Winston and Derrick Reddish. The Bobcats built up a commanding 68.32 intermission lead and coasted to a 51.41 second half output to mark their 16th victory in 26 starts for Lees-McRae in regular season.
In the opening round of the Western Carolinas Junior College Conference Tournament, the Bobcats held off a last half rally by Brevard to take a 57. 55 victory. James Marshall, Lonnie Smith and Dwayne Winston were keys to that opening round win. Ferrum claimed a share of the Coastal Con ference championship, with a 5-1 league record, with Hudson Valley who was also $5 \cdot 1$. Ferrum would host the East Bowl and Hudson Valley accepted a post season bid to the Coca Cola Bowl. The Bobcats slipped into third place in the league with the loss.
