# THE STALEY DISTINGUISHED LECTURE SERIES FEATURES 

## DR. ERNEST CAMPBELL

The Staley Distinguished Scholar Series is a project of the Thomas F. Staley Foundation of New York. This lectureship was established by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas F. Staley of Rye, New York, in memory of their parents, Dr. and Mrs. Thomas F. Staley and Judge and Mrs. H. H. Hayes of Bristol, Tennessee.
The Thomas F. Staley Foundation is persuaded that the message of the Christian gospel when proclaimed in its historic fullness is always contemporary, relevant, and meaningful to any generation. To this end the Foundation seeks to bring to college and university campuses of America distinguished scholars who truly believe this gospel message and who can clearly communicate to students.

Dr. Ernest T. Campbell, a native of New York City, received the A.B. degree from New York University and Bob Jones University. He received his B.D. and Th.M degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary. He holds doctorates from Westminster College, Grove City College, Drury College, Albright College, and Wartburg College.

From 1946 to 1968 he served as minister of Presbyterian Churches in Pennsylvania and Michigan. In 1968 he became minister of The Riverside Church in New York City. Shortly thereafter he became a minister of The United Church of Christ, and has since been involved in an at-large ministry, working out of New York City. The ministry includes writing, guest preaching, lecturing, conducting retreats and leading workshops for ministers in Homiletics. He currently is a member of the faculty of Garrett Evangelical Seminary.

A frequent speaker on The Protestant Hour and the National Radio Pulpit, he has held preaching missions in Alaska, Cuba, and South Africa. He has authored several books and is a visiting lecturer at Princeton Theological Seminary, P , ${ }_{\text {ittsburgh }}$ Theological Seminary, Fuller Theological Seminary, Claremont School of Theology.

## DR. MARY FAITH CARSON

Dr. Mary Faith Carson, Chairman, Department of Religion, Moravian College, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, joined the faculty in 1967 as an assistant professor. She was promoted to associate professor in 1969 and that same year received the "Distinguished Teaching Award."
Dr. Carson received her B.A. degree in 1951 from Salem College; her M.A. in 1953 from the Presbyterian School of Christian Education; the B.D. degree in 1961 from Union Theological Seminary; and the Ph.D. degree in 1967 from Princeton University.

Her previous assignments include: Director of Christian Education at Fourth Presbyterian Church, Greenville, SC, 1953-56; similar position at Chapel Hill, NC, Presbyterian Church, 1956-59; assistant professor of religion at Queens College, Charlotte, NC.
She was the first woman to be ordained into the Presbyterian ministry in Lehigh Presbytery, First Presbyterian Church, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, in 1979. She serves as an elder in that church.

In the spring of 1976 Dr. Carson preached on The Protestant Hour. She is the author of "Praise God... Worship Through the Year" (John Knox Press).

## BOBCATS END SEASON ON LOSING NOTE IN FERRUM'S COME-FROM-BEHIND WIN, 24-17, BUT POST GOOD SEASON <br> WITH 6-3-1-MARK

Alas! Alack! Things looked good for Lees-McRae. The 15th nationally ranked Bobcats were entertaining ninth nationally ranked Ferrum to decide the host for the Eastern Bowl, and the Bobcats took a 17-10 lead going into the third period, as John Fields and Craig Doctor got Lees-McRae touchdowns. In between, Doug Illing kicked a 28 -yard field goal, and all three scores were set up by interceptions by a stingy Bobcat defense. The Bobcats drove inside the Ferrum ten, with five minutes to go in the final quarter, but a Ferrum interception at the goal line was returned 61 yards to end the Bobcat threat. The Bobcats had a $17-3$ cushion, but Ferrum scored on a 45 -yard touchdown pass in the final play of the first half to cut the Bobcats' lead to 17-10, then the Panthers got even on an 85 -yard TD pass in the third period to knot the score. A Ferrum 48 -yard pass to the Lees-McRae three-yard line set up the final touchdown and winning score to give the edge to the Panthers, 24-17.

David Riddleberger ran for 121 yards and one touchdown as Lees-McRae pinned a 42-21 defeat on the Virginia Tech Jayvees. Virginia Tech took a $13-7$ first quarter lead but Lees-McRae proceeded to reel off five straight touchdowns as the Bobcats went 6 -2-1 and climbed into the 15 th ranking nationally, setting the stage for the Ferrum contest.
The Bobcats opened their 1982 season with a disappointing loss to Fort Bragg, 20-17. The Bobcats bounced back in the second game, defeating Montgomery 14-0, as Tony Campagna found Scott Pearson for a TD toss and Campagna scored on a three-yard run. Defensive standouts in the shut-out were Steve Hensley, Chuck Okey, Donnie Davis, Tony Sweeney, Ed Varnes, Ed Carter, John Turley, and Mike Shawver.

Doug Illing booted two field goals and defensive safety Ed Varnes returned a 69 -yard punt while Tony Campagna hit Pearson on a 32 -yard pass play and Craig Doctor scored from 31-yards out to lead Lees.McRae past the ASU Jayvees, 25-13.

Craig Doctor scored two TDs, Tony Campagna crossed the goal line and Illing booted a 40 -yard field goal to lead Lees-McRae in a $24-14$ victory over Coastal Conference foe Potomac State. Defensively Turley, Okey, Carter, Davis, McClary, Maxwell, McGraw, Varnes, Hensley, Williams and Shawver were outstanding.

Westchester Community College started the game like a house afire, marching 84 yards in 12 plays until the drive was halted on the 12 yard line by John Turley who intercepted a Viking aerial and returned it three yards to the 15. Then Coach Campbell followed "Doctor's orders" and turned a vicious blocking front line loose and unleashed freshman back Craig Doctor who scored four TDs and rushed for 129 yards in leading the Bobcats over Westchester, 45-6.

Hudson Valley surprised the Lees-McRae College Bobcats by playing the conference leader to a stalemate at Troy, New York, 14.14. The blemish dampened the Bobcats' hopes of a first place, giving them a 3-0.1 conference record, 4-1-1 overall. Craig Doctor scored one touchdown on a 97 -yard run and Tony Campanga provided the tieing touchdown on a nine-yard dash.

After the Hudson Valley game the injury riddled Bobcats had to hang on for a $7-6$ win in a hard-fought battle over the Western Carolina junior varsity. Lees-McRae stopped a last gasp two-point conversion attempt by Western as the Catamounts scored with just five seconds left in the game and went for the two-point play on a running attempt which was stopped short of the goal line as time ran out.

Chowan held Lees-McRae scoreless for three quarters and went on to defeat the Bobcats in an important Coastal Conference clash, 27.7. The Bobcats lost three fumbles in their own territory and dropped to 5-2.1 on the season, 3-1-1 in the conference. L.M then hosted VPI Jayvees to improve their record to $6 \cdot 2 \cdot 1$ before meeting Ferrum in the finale of the season.

## BASKETBALL

Lees-McRae ran into arch-rival Anderson College in the first round of the Region X , NJCAA Tournament in Spartanburg, and the ill-fated Bobcats came out on the short end of a 67-58 score.

The Bobcats, who seemed to have left their stamina and effort on Williams Gymnasium floor following their opening round loss to Spartanburg Methodist in the WCJCC Tournament, $70-65$, were never in contention in the second half, after leading $32-28$ in the first half. Lees-McRae, leading by as many as nine points in the first half, saw the

The record-setting $1982-83$ Lees-McRae basketball season is now history. The Bobcats finished 22.8 and for the third time in the past four years they hit the magic 20 -win circle.

Carlisle Hostetter, head mentor of the Bobcats, has now completed his eighth season and his teams have won 147 games during that span which is an average of better than 18 wins per year. His 1979-80 team set a school record for the best winning percentage in the school's history with a 20.8 record, and then the 1981.82 team topped that with a $20-6$ record. Records are made to be broken and this year's team did just that by compiling a 22.6 regular season mark.
"We have been fortunate in having some outstanding players over the years but the real key to our success is that we have had outstanding young men that have been equally successful in all areas of campus life. We lose eight sophomores off this squad and they have been involved in 43 wins over this two-year period. This group of sophomores has added to the great Lees-McRae tradition and we will surely miss them next year," Hostetter stated.
"I am not at all surprised at the accomplishments set by this year's team. I knew this would be a truly outstanding group. They say records are made to be broken, so why not think about winning 23 in 1983-84?" Hostetter concluded.

The Bobcats' number one singles player Jeff Adams, MVP of the Region, and singles champion, reached the NJCAA quarter finals, as did David Siddons who reached the quarter finais in the number two singies flight. Adams and Siddons combined to reach the quarters in the number one doubles. Siddons, above, and Adams at right, were the mainstays in the Bobcat attack aii season.

The Bobcats posted an $18-3$ spring record and were edged for the region championship by Anderson College by two points. The Bobcats, posting a 9.2 fall season for a 27.5 overall record, set a new school record in shut-outs as they won 209.0 matches during the season. A record of 16 whitewashes by the 1977 champion Bobcats was handed out to their opponents on their way to the national tournament where they finished eighth that year. It was the fourth appearance by the Bobcats in the national tournament in the last six years. In Arizona, the 1977 Bobcats finished eighth; in 1981 Lees-McRae finished 23rd, and in 1982 they finished 19th.

Jeff Adams, who won the regional championship in straight sets, defeating Alan Merck of Catawba Valley and Raj Maharaj of North Greenville in the finals, was seeded eighth nationally. Kim Tyler won the fifth singles flight and teamed with his doubles partner Darryl Cummings for a seed in the number two doubles. David Siddons was seeded ninth in the number two singles flight in the national tournament and reached the quarters, falling to Win ston Strozier of Anderson in a hard-fought 7-6 tiebreaker in the third. Siddons had upset the number seven seed earlier, Joe Fish bach of Nassau Community College, to gain the quarter finals.

"Slew Doo": "Nothin' to itl"
"'The life you save may be your own.' God's wisdom says, 'the life you save is the life you'll lose.' The life you clutch, hoard, guard, play safe with is in the end worth little to anybody, including yourself, and only the life given away for love's sake is a life worth living. Go and serve your neighbor; go and make healthy communities in God's name, communities where people are allowed and encouraged to grow to their potential, where people become the agents of transformation for one another. You want wisdom? Then go and heal sick people, go and feed hungry people, go and free the imprisoned, go and clothe the naked, go and be such an advocate for peace that even the roughest nations will lay down their guns and darts, their arsenals of missiles. Go and do these things and you will have wisdom enough to deal with what is new."

McGarry continued, "To drive home that point clearly, God showed us one who dared to love the wisdom of God and He tells us to imitate this one. This one gave his life away to the extent of dying a national disgrace without a penny in the bank or a friend to his name. In terms of human wisdom, he was a perfect fool, and anyone who thinks they can follow him without making something like the same kind of fool of themselves is laboring not under a cross but a delusion. Get wise! But beware, God's wisdom is a risky business, so risky that if your game happens to be status achievement, if you yearn to be popular and well liked, then I'd think twice.
"My friends, God entrusts his world to his fools. So if I were to present a challenge to you, the graduates, it would be 'Be Foolish!' and take your foolishness from Lees-McRae into the various places you go, so that by your life, mirrored in the image of Christ, you can be open to receiving God's blessing, open to living God's new thing. Help to make the communities in which you live healthy and blessed. This is not a message simply for graduates who will leave and go elsewhere, it's a challenge for the whole Lees-McRae community, administrators, teachers, staff people, returning students, new students, 'Be Foolish!' Take this foolishness and practice it here. Seek to recreate Lees-McRae into a community based on trust, where everyone can grow and enjoy the fruit of mutual care. It can be done by us here!

McGarry concluded. "Do you have all the wisdom you need? I can't say much about your futures nor your ability to lead an entire nation. I won't say anything about beginnings and endings. They all
seem rather redundant when brought face, to face with the challenge to 'Get wisdom.' I can't say much except, for in the words of one writer, 'you were led here, step by step, you were prompted for a reason, chosen to keep the small flame of love alight, to nurture the seeds of goodness in this small place, until the day when the sprout sends you out to light other candles in a dark land and plant new seeds on a dry blackened earth.' "

Dr. Henley, as President of the North Carolina Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, stressed the importance of a liber. al arts education.
"A liberal arts education deals in change, teaching and learning, how to cause it and how to accommodate it. A great Greek philosopher pointed out a few thousand years ago that things are always changing while always stay ing the same. Like the flames of a fire or the flow of a river, change is consantly taking place in the ebb and flow of life. But the purpose of education should always stay the same.
"People today seem surprised to learn that goals other than education are not the automatic rewards of a college degree. Jobs are in short supply everywhere, and the critics of education are pointing out, almost gleefully, that a college education alone is not capable of doing what it once did, in terms of careers and income. It does not automatically bring a highpaying job. In the wake of such criticism some colleges and universities are frantically trimming their sails, measuring their every effort by whether it helps in getting a job and earning money.
"But the liberal arts colleges such as LeesMcRae have a higher purpose that just getting you a job and a dollar return on your invest. ment. In these times of doubt and national reassessment of higher education, we have the opportunity to reassert our faith that through the development of intellectual capabilities the liberal arts offer a fuller, more satisfying, more useful life, not just a better way to earn a living. Through opening the minds of students to new ideas, new possibilities, through teaching them to question, to analyze, to be receptive to the full range of the possibilities of life, the liberal arts provide a richness and quality of living not tied to the ups and downs of circumstance or the economy. I have no doubts that LeesMcRae graduates will do as well as anyone, and better than most, in competing for jobs, whether it be now or after further education. This is not, however, the guiding star of the liberal arts.
"At its very best, your education has provided each of you graduates not only the tools for success but also the wisdom and judgment to understand what success should mean in terms of the individual and society. A liberal arts education is not a treasure to be hoarded by the individual, rather it places a broad and awesome responsibility upon its graduates."
