## HISTORY OF LEES-McRAE COLLEGE

Concord Presbytery had called for a workman for this section of the mountains, and Dr. Moore of the Seminary in Richmond had looked about him and laid his hand upon a young man from Georgia, Edgar Tufts. It was only a vacation job then, but as soon as he had finished his work at the Seminary he returned to Banner Elk to give his life in full time service.

In a short time Mr. Tufts had organized a small church for which he was architect, contractor, and one of the builders. Mr. Tufts felt the need of the young people. During the first winter he gathered the boys and girls around his fireside and taught them himself. He saw the possibilities of the boys and girls of this section and decided to build a boarding school for the girls. In 1900 with one teacher and twelve girls the Elizabeth McRae Institute first opened its doors. Another friend, Mrs. Lees, came to the rescue and it became Lees-McRae Institute.

The work was alive and growing, and in 1905 the Boys' Department was established at Plumtree. In 1912 a small power plant was built; and in 1914 the High School was opened.

In the meantime another of Mr. Tufts' goals had been reached. Grace Hospital began its work in 1907; and in 1914 Grandfather Home was opened.

By January 1, 1923, work had begun on the North Carolina building. But when school opened in April of that year Mr. Tufts was not there to welcome his students, for he had passed on, leaving his work to his son.

In 1924 the three departments-school, orp'anage, and hospital-were incorporated into an everlasting monument to Mr. Tufts as the Edgar Tufts Memorial Association.

The Tennessee building was completed in 1925. The following summer Pinnacle Inn had its origin in this building. In 1927 the Virginia building, also for girls. was comoleted. In the spring of that year the boys' dormitory at Plumtree was destroyed by fire and a frame building across the river was built for them.

The Junior College department was started in 1929. Twenty-two boys and girls were registered, and in May, 1931, thirteen diplomas were awarded to the first graduates of the College department.

It is now a four-year Junior College, accredited by the State Department of Education, recognized by the University of North Carolina, and a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges. By Ila Tailor.
