

CLASS HISTORY

Our class members who have been transferred to other schools are Norma King, Eugene King, Charles McCall, and Dorothy Whitmire. Embarked on the sea of matrimony are the following girls—Delma Phillips, Victoria Gillespie, Opalee Masters, Helen Jones, Vivian Morgan, Faye Johnson, Bonita McKinney, Leona Brewer, Pairlee Conner, Irene Lowe.

Thus ends our high school career of the class of '48.






