As sophomores, we had become accustomed to the new routine and we felt as if we were full-fledged high school students. We participated in new activities such as F.II.A. and basketball. And of course, we girls were chosen to serve the delicious food for the Junior-Senior Reception. Fourteen of us returned in '48 as seniors. As in previous years, our time was filled with classes, clubs, class play, "Grandad Meets a Pal," and publication of the second school annual. Again, during the preceding summer, some of the boys and Mr. Bales took another trip, this time to Florida. Even though the boys took the trips, the girls had their fun at school.

We are proud of the fact that our class ranked high in everything we undertook, and we always worked together as one.

Thus ends the class history of the seven boys and seven girls who graduated from Rosman in 1949.
