

INFORMATION FOR CUSTOMERS

How to Send Money Safely

TERMS, CASH

TO INSURE dispatch, the proper remittance must be enclosed with the order. Please remember that admirable and safe as our mail facilities are, some vexatious losses to the senders of letters are liable to occur; that careful as Uncle Sam is, some letters are lost in transit; some mails are burnt up in great railroad wrecks. Prudence dictates that remittances be made so that in case of loss duplicates can be had. Therefore we say money may be sent at our risk, by P. O. Money Order, Bank Draft, Express Money Order, Money (not stamps) in Registered Letter. We will be responsible for the safe carriage of money sent us in any of the above ways, and if lost will give full value.

PLEASE DO NOT SEND STAMPS FOR MONEY; they often come stuck together or stuck to the letter so that they cannot be taken out except by soaking the whole. Silver in small sums, if carefully wrapped, will carry just as safely, and is far more acceptable.

CANADA CUSTOMERS can remit by International Money Order on West Grove, Bank Draft, or currency in Registered Letter. Canada postage stamps have no value here.

We cannot send Dormant Roses or Shrubs to Canada owing to a law recently enacted to that effect, except from March 15th to May 15th, and from October 7th to December 7th, through the following customs ports, where they will be fumigated; St. John, N. B.; St. Johns, P. Q.; Niagara Falls and Windsor, Ontario; Winnipeg, Manitoba. All other goods including *Roses grown under glass*, are admitted at any time.

A Guarantee that Means Something

We guarantee that all plants we send out shall reach their destination in good growing condition; if they do not, inform us by return mail and we will replace at once. When we deliver them to you in good order our responsibility ends.

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We do not guarantee that Roses we send out will not be killed by drought, insects, accidents or frost after they are planted.

Orders by mail are sent postpaid to all post-offices in the United States or Canada, and we guarantee they shall reach the purchaser in good growing condition.

When so directed we ship by Express, or when the order is of a size or character that it cannot be safely sent by mail, the purchaser paying express charges. But we are on the constant lookout to save purchasers all needless expense, and to that end, especially on long distances where goods are ordered by express we send them by mail, knowing that it is to our customer's decided advantage to do so.

We guard against errors in filling orders as carefully as we can, but occasionally, in spite of best care, some mistakes will creep in; when they do, notify us at once, and we will correct them promptly. We cordially invite customers for our goods, and do not intend they shall regret coming to us if we can possibly by fair dealing prévent it. But do not blame us for not promptly filling your order, if you have (as hundreds do every year) given no name or address; if you live in a city please be careful to give street and number. If your letter is lost on the way and does not reach us, it will of course caus delay and often vexation.

Our Roses are all on their own Roots.—Only a few years ago a great authority on Roses said that Hybrid Perpetuals and Mosses could not be grown that way; he was mistaken; we grow all classes of Roses on their own Roots, and such only are sent out.

Our Roses are all grown in pots, in good, fresh soil without stimulants; are strong, healthy plants, kept free from

blooming here by cutting the buds off as they appear, and with any fair treatment on your part will be sure to grow; and the Ever-blooming class will bud and bloom as soon as they start to grow vigorously.

Do not expect all varieties of Roses to be of the same size. Some under the same conditions make much larger and stronger plants than others, but many of the weakest growers produce the most beautiful flowers.

Please Observe Carefully. -In ordering please use the sheet which we provide for the purpose whenever possible. Simply fill up the blanks, giving the number and name of the varieties wanted, with the price; we will understand. Do not interline or make other notations thereon having reference to the order. If you wish to communicate with us at the same time use a separate sheet of paper. Write neatly, giving your name and address plainly. When ordering always state when you wish the goods shipped, else they will be sent you at once. Attention to these details will greatly facilitate our work and prevent confusion, errors and misunderstandings.

Our aim is to do even better than we promise, so when the order will at all afford it, we add to it some plant or plants gratis, that are often choice new kinds; several of the Roses now so eagerly sought after were first introduced to our customers in this way—Presented with their order.

Foreign orders can be sent by mail to the countries with which we have a parcel post exchange. They can also be sent by express, but the party ordering must give the name and address of some one in New York who will receive the goods, prepay ocean charges and forward to them.

When large lots of Roses, Shrubbery, Vines, etc., are wanted for Cemetery or Hedge planting, send us a list of stock wanted to price; growing it in large quantities as we do, we can make for such very advantageous prices.

EXPRESS RATES FROM WEST GROVE, PA., TO VARIOUS POINTS.

E NPRESS shipments continue to grow in favor because we are able to send larger plants, and having more space in which to pack, a goodly portion of soil is left on the roots, so that plants receive no setback in transit and always arrive in first class order. All Express Companies allow us 20 per cent. discount from merchandise rates. The schedule below will enable you to form a close estimate of what the charges on your order will be. Two year old plants from 4-inch pots, when packed, will weigh as follows : 12 plants, about 15 lbs.; 25 plants, 30 lbs.; 50 plants, 50 lbs.; 125 plants, 100 lbs. One year old plants from 20 to 30 lbs. per 100.

You will notice by the schedule that the charges on 10, 15, 20, 30 and 100 lbs. to the most distant points are very inconsiderable. For instance, 20 lbs. to Omaha, Nebraska, or St. Paul, Minnesota, is only 75 cents; Austin, Texas, \$1.15; New Orleans, Louisiana, 90 cents; Chicago, Illinois, 45 cents.

All goods, unless otherwise agreed, are forwarded charges collect, there being absolutely no advantage in having shipments prepaid, unless the ordinary rate exceeds 8 cents per lb, in which case a special rate of 10 cents for the first pound and a half and 8 cents for each additional pound is charged when the shipment is prepaid in full.

-----How to Proceed

The first and primary consideration is to buy good plants, for no matter how careful and attentive one may be, good results cannot come from poor stock. Buy your stock from a reliable florist, and beware of him who would give you something for nothing.

=Outdoor Cultivation of Roses=

Roses may be grown to perfection in ordinary garden soil. Select, if possible, the most sheltered sunny location for planting, avoiding the close proximity of large trees, whose dense foliage and extending roots absorb all the lifesustaining nutrition of the soil; young trees and dwarf shrubbery will not be hurtful.



Should the soil you have at disposal be naturally poor, it may be made fertile by substituting a quantity of loam, which can readily be obtained under the sod by the roadside or from the fields. To still further enrich the soil, and where it is accessible, add to each wheelbarrow load of loam about one-third its bulk of well-rotted stable manure, also some sand, if there be a lack of this constituent. Spade to a depth of twelve inches, thoroughly mixing and mellowing, and having proceeded thus far, a substantial foundation for future good results has been made.


-----Fertilizers------

Fine, well-decomposed stable manure is the best fertilizer for general purposes. If this cannot be obtained, fine ground bone or commercial fertilizers may be employed, but they should be applied conservatively, for if used too freely they are likely to injure the plants. None but such fertilizers that are free from acids should be used. Manure applied in the Fall will serve as a partial protection over Winter; if in the spring it will be beneficial as a mulch.

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Unpacking Plants

When the plants are received, if for any reason it is desired to defer immediate planting, place the plants in the cellar or any moderately warm place, protect from sun, set them upright, admitting the free circulation of air, and water freely from time to time. A slight covering of soil around the roots will be beneficial. Should they have a withered appearance, caused by an unusual delay in transit (which seldom occurs), soak them in lukewarm water for an hour or so before planting, to restore their vitality.



The best time to plant is during the Spring or early Summer months. Those who wish to plant early should observe the homely rule of waiting until after corn-planting time. If you are so situated that you have no means

How to Grow Roses-Continued

of telling when that time arrives, we would advise that planting in open ground be deferred until all danger of frost is past. Having prepared the ground, set the plants about twelve inches apart. Do not hesitate to place the roots well below the surface of the soil, arranging them, as far as possible, in their natural position. Cover the roots, pressing firmly down upon them and in around the stem. After planting, water freely, and if the sun be strong, protect them for a few days with a covering of newspapers or other suitable covering. Water judiciously, that is, not too freely, and daily until they show signs of having become established. Do not plant if the ground is wet, as the soil will become baked and thus endanger the safety of the plants. During the presence of protracted drought the plants should be watered daily in the evenings.

*** -----Pruning=

The different varieties of Roses differ very much in habit of growth; many are neat and compact, requiring little or no trimming, while others of the same class are vigorous and straggling, sending out long shoots which tend to outrun the limits assigned them. Pruning, therefore, is a matter to be governed by the judgment of the possessor of the plants. We will add, however, that **plants of persistent growth** should be trimmed back each Fall or in early Spring about one-half to two-thirds of the season's growth. Where plants, apparently healthy, fail to mature the buds which they bear, remove a large percentage of the undeveloped buds and imperfect blooms and prune severely. Also trim back about one-third when, after planting, they shed their leaves and exhibit signs of weakness; this gives the roots a chance to become vigorous.

⊷≻•≻• ____Roses in Pots or Boxes

The conditions most favorable for growing Roses in pots or boxes are good, rich soil, plenty of sunshine and heat ranging from 50° at night to 75° during the day. If Roses are purchased in the Spring and Summer for Winter bloom, they can be planted in large-size pots-one-year plants in pots whose inside diameter at the top is four inches, twoyear-old in six-inch pots. Plunge the pots in open ground, in some partly shaded place; cultivate and keep healthy during the Summer ; water sparingly and pinch off all buds as they appear. Upon the approach of cold weather take up the pots and remove as much of the surface soil as can be done without disturbing the roots, replacing with fresh soil. Bring into a warm room and water freely. After the period of bloom is over, cut back and remove to a cool cellar: the following Spring they will grow with renewed energy; either in open ground or in larger pots.

Growing Roses for Cut Flowers

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\_\_\_Insects and Insecticides\_\_\_\_

Healthy, vigorous Roses are less liable to the ravages of insects than weak specimens, which do not have the vitality to resist the onslaughts of the pernicious parasites. Our Roses are singularly free from insects, owing to their vigor, but should they become infested, a few applications of a good insecticide will exterminate them at the outset, after which very little or no trouble will be experienced. The following recipes and preparations are good. They should be applied both to the upper and under surface of the foliage by means of a good sprinkler. We can supply the "Tyrian Plant Sprinkler," "The Auto-Spray" and "New Era Sprayer," at prices given in that portion of this book devoted to Seeds and Garden Requisites. (See Index.) All of these are inexpensive and very satisfactory.

Kerosene Emulsion.—To two parts of kerosene add one of slightly sour milk; agitate until the compound unites in the form of a white jelly; dilute with twenty parts of soft water.

**Tobacco Insecticide Soap.**—This preparation is put up in cakes, with directions for use printed on labels. It is a standard remedy, and one of the best. Two sizes. Price, 15 ets. and 30 cts. each; postpaid. (See Index of this book.)



#### —Winter Protection—

This is not deemed of so much importance as formerly, as plants that fail to survive, or whose vitality has been impaired by the rigor of Winter, can now be readily replaced, and at such trifling expense that it is thought by many scarcely worth the time and trouble involved to secure their preservation.

To those of our friends and customers who are, however, interested in the matter of "Winter protection," a few remarks will suffice. As to the classes of Roses that are hardy, and those that are not hardy, this information is given in the introduction of the individual classes. Where it is possible, we would advise that the benefit of the doubt be given by protecting all varieties, irrespective of the class, for it will not be harmful to protect even the Moss or Hybrid Perpetual Rose. Do not cover your plants too soon ; a nip of frost will not hurt them, but will help to ripen and mature them. Such material as leaves, hay, straw, light manure, street sweepings, pine or cedar boughs, corn fodder, etc., will afford excellent protection, Sufficient should be given to prevent the roots from freezing, but considerable light and circulation of air should not be excluded. In the Spring, wait until the weather is settled before uncovering; then prune the plants, taking care to cut off all dead or discolored wood.

Besides which I picked from **Helen Gould** a total of thirty buds, making in all seventy-one blooms in the season. Of **course** the cold weather has killed the buds since then.

AM glad to give you all the information I can in regard to the methods employed in growing my Chrysenthemums. I am an amateur and have gotten splendid results, as the photograph I send will show, and this without the aid of a greenhouse. I hope that the information I can give will

of a greenhouse. Thope that the information I can give will prove valuable to others in cultivating Chrysanthemums, the loveliest flower that I know of, and one that gives a greater reward for pains taken in its culture than any other. Procure good, strong plants from reliable florists about the first of June. Put them in 3- or 4-inch pots at first, in good, rich soil, and plunge the pots in the ground, or, better still, dig a trench and set the pots in it, filling in around with coal-ashes. This keeps the worms out of the pots and keeps the roots nice and cool. Chrysanthemums require lots of water, and should never be allowed to become dry. Evening or early morning is the best time to water. Water and shower thor-oughly, as one good watering is worth half a dozen if only half done. Repot the plants about twice, first in a 6-inch and lastin an 8-inch pot. Make the soil a little richer each time

the plants are repotted. The plant can also be mulched with manure, which answers the double purpose of keeping the roots cool and moist and also furnishes food for the plant. As soon as the buds form in the Fall it is better to add a little manure water when sprinkling, weak at first, but gradually adding more, increasing the watering until it can be used every day. For insects, such as black aphis, use tobacco dust. If large flowers are desired, pluch off all buds and allow only a few to bloom. If a big, single flower is desired, pluch off all the side branches, leaving only the crown bud to bloom. After the frosty nights come in the Fall the pois are taken in the house and kept in a cool room, where the flowers will develop and remain nice for a long time. After blooming, the plants can be stored in the cellar and kept until next year.



To secure moisture to the under-side of the leaf, place a brick in a zinc pan or basin, on which to set the pot, keeping the water in the pan about an inch from the top of the brick. The evaporation reaching the under side of the leaves will keep them in a healthy condition. Do not allow the sun to strike the leaves when wet, or do not over-water. do not over-water.

- Gloire de Vesinet.—Leaves very distinct in shape, deeply indented and sharply pointed. The leaf is steel colored, with dark green center. Underside dull brown red, showing faintly through the upper edge of leaf.
- Isabella Bellon.-Beautiful and odd; sharp pointed leaves, bright silver, quite smooth, with underlying color of

**DERHAPS** one of the most interesting phases of floriculture is the growing of rare plants from seeds. They require careful attention, but amply repay one for the care expended and the interest necessarily attached to their growing. Seeds of the varieties offered below should be sown in nellow soil, about one-fourth saud, during the Spring or Summer. Fill shallow boxes with soil, settling same carefully and have the top smooth. Sow the seeds on the surface, covering lightly with a small quantity of fine soil. Place a pane of glass over the box and keep darkened with the soil slightly moistened until the seeds germinate, when they should be brought gradually to the light and air, afterwards blacing the box in a warm sunny window.



# TURNIPS AND RUTABAGAS

In most localities Turnips are sown during the Summer for a crop late in the Fall, for table use, market and stock feeding. In cool localities choice varieties may be sown early in the Spring for Summer use. For garden culture sow the seed thinly in drills 12 inches or more apart during August. The best roots can be grown by giving frequent cultivation, which will make the flesh grow tender and mild in flavor, with larger roots by reason of their quicker growth.







Sow the seed carefully and evenly in quantities of about one quart to each 300 square feet (15 x 20 feet), or two bushels to the acre; then with a fine harrow or rake cover and give top dressing of animal manure, ground bone or some other good commercial fertilizer. Seeding may be done at any time during the spring, Summer or Fall months; but the best results are obtained by sowing during April, May, September or October; if the work is done during the Fall months, a heavy top dressing of stable manure may be applied; in the Spring, the gross matter may be removed, leaving the surface clean. If manure is used in preparing the soil, in the Spring it should be incorporated with the earth. To renovate lawns where the grass has disappeared in places—with a steel rake scratch the surface earth has been removed or covered by a clayey or sandy subsoil it will be necessary to restore at least a part of the original loam. The use of manures and compost in liberal quantities will be of great assistance. will be of great assistance.


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
