Mae Weathers and Billie Mundy are now nurses at Presbyterian Hospital.

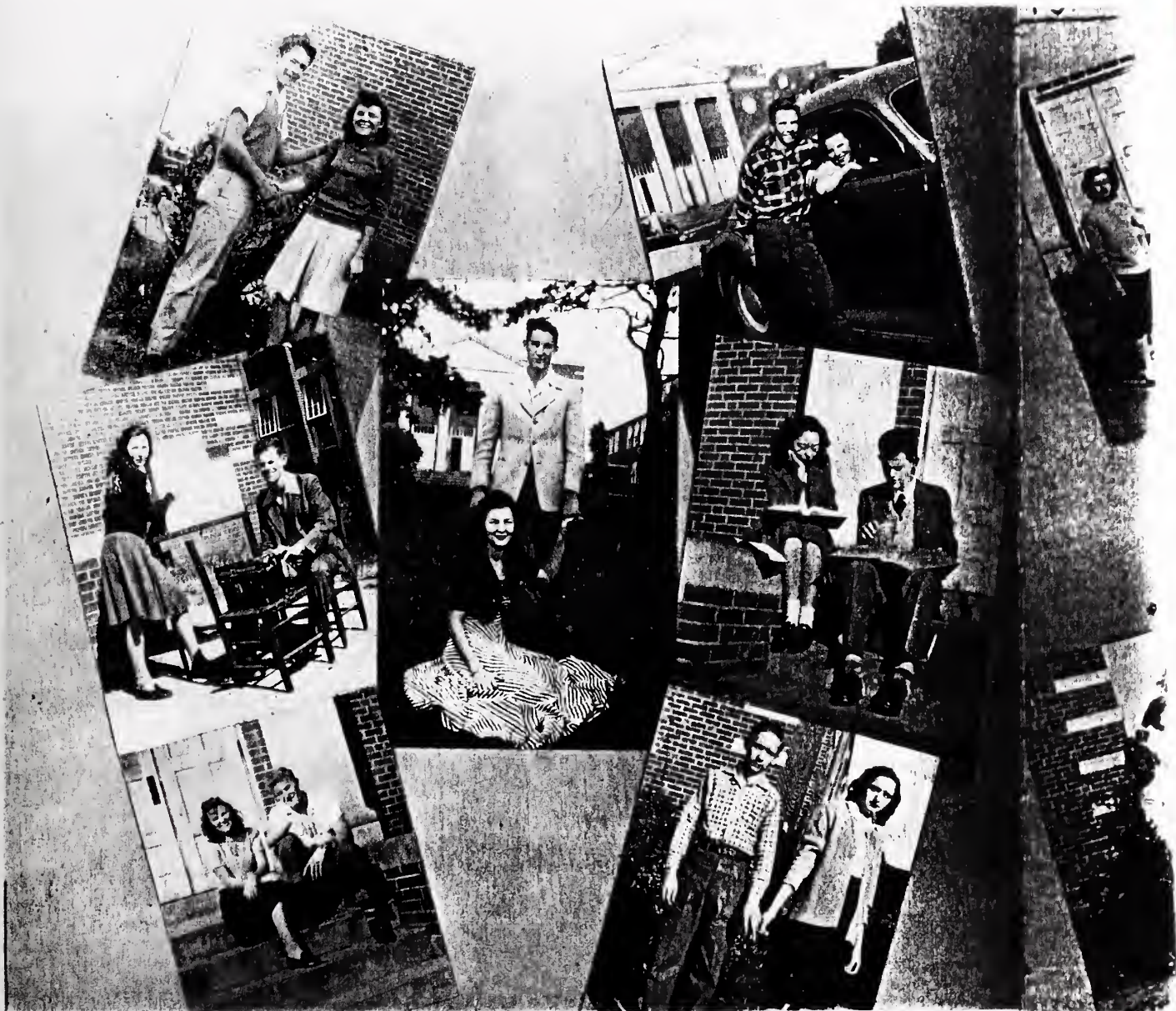
Hazel Swing is an interior decorator. One of her recent successes has been the decoration of the ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria.
