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
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
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

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CENSUS OF PARIS.

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History of Paris.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The town of Paris which lies on the upper course of the Little Androscoggin is one of the most interesting spots in Maine. Up to 1779 the unbroken forest of stately pines, spruce and firs in the lowlands, and of yellow birch, beech and maple giants found on the hill sides and crowning their tops had been undisturbed by the settler's axe. The place was inhabited only by the wild animals who had been left in sole possession by the retreating Indians, except for the few hunters of both races who sought to ply their trade among the luckless bears, deer, foxes, sable and other fur-bearing animals. Of the latter class were one Snow and his companion, Stinchfield, who encountered hostle Indians near Snow's Falls and Snow met his tragic death at their hands. When finally the settlement was begun, it advanced by rapid strides. The men who located here between 1780 and 1800 were generally citizens of the Commonwealth, descended from Puritan stock, and filled with high ideals of social and religious life. They had also, many of them, been schooled in a hard struggle for American independence and had learned to value and cherish political freedom. When the grant, known as Number Four, became incorporated the town of Paris, in 1793, twelve years after the first family

had been planted within its bounds, its population had reached a number probably in excess of three hundred. In 1800 it had increased to 844; in 1810, to 1,320; and in 1820, to 1894.

Paris seems to have been fortunate in her location. When the question of erecting a new county of the northern parts of Cumberland and York was decided, the decision was made in favor of Paris as the county seat, with little opposition. To this is due much of the prestige gained by the town during the one hundred years which have intervened. Again is she fortunate in having included in her area so much of the course of the Little Androscoggin, and its valley. This affords not only several valuable water privileges along its course and much fertile agricultural land, but it was along this river course that the railroad must be constructed that should traverse the uneven surface of Oxford county from Portland, to the upper waters of the great Androscoggin, and to Montreal. The first train to enter South Paris was on Jan. 1, 1850, which was the beginning of a new era for that manufacturing community. And it is to the advent of the railroad that the enterprising village of West Paris owes its existence.

The surface of Paris is broken by many hills of considerable height, but is not so uneven as many of its neighboring towns. Its soil is well adapted to agriculture and stockraising, being fertile and productive, although its rugged nature renders it hard to subdue. Much wealth has been realized from its forests of valuable timber. Paris has also become well known for its rich deposits of mineral wealth.

Paris is a double township. The Little Androscoggin enters near the northwest corner, and flowing southeasterly it approaches the center of the town below Snow's Falls; here it curves gradually to the west and leaves the town again below South Paris village. The East Branch, the outlet of Moose Pond, Stone's and Smith's brooks, and at South Paris, Stony brook, are the chief tributaries which form the drainage system of the town. The only ponds are Moose Pond, near North Paris, and Hall's, near the southeast part of the town.

The principal villages are South Paris, an enterprising manufacturing and commercial center; Paris Hill, near the center of the town, the most elevated village in the county, and made famous as the home of many men who have become prominent in state and national politics; West Paris, a rising manufacturing village, North Paris, which was, during the days of the old stage coach, one of the busy centers; and Snow's Falls, which seems to have been a place of misfortune since the first unhappy event we have recorded.

The varied and beautiful scenery of Paris may not be surpassed in the state. From Paris Hill to the west may be seen one of the grandest views in all New England. As the eye sweeps across the broad expanse of intervening hill and dale, dotted here and there with a silver lake or winding stream, to the unobstructed head of Mount Washington fifty miles in the distance, the beholder is thrilled with that sense of inspired awe and grandeur which has delighted the thousands who have visited this charmed spot for a century past.

LAND GRANTS AND EARLY PROPRIETARY

During the eighteenth century many townships of land were granted by the General Courts of Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York and others of the Colonies to survivors of the Louisbourg Expedition and other French and Indian wars, and to veterans of the American Revolution. In the year 1736 the General Court of Massachusetts Bay had surveyed and laid out into townships a section of land lying between the Connecticut and Merrimac rivers; this they granted to various groups of proprietors, generally survivors of the Indian wars, or their heirs. Capt. Samuel Jackson and the fifty-nine others to whom was granted Number 4, may have been of this class, but no mention is made of it in the grant. During the four years following, several meetings were held by these proprietors, at Watertown, and extensive preparations were made for laying out and settling the new township. But their title to the land became uncertain. There had long been a contest between the Massachusetts Bay colony and the Province of New Hampshire, respecting the line between the two Provinces. This had finally been referred to his Majesty, George the second, who, in 1741, fixed the boundary substantially as at present. The territory claimed by Massachusetts, and which by this decision passed to the ownership of New Hampshire, was fourteen miles wide by fifty long, and included twenty-eight townships. Massachusetts grants of this territory became void, and those townships which were already settled were obliged to make terms with the Mason-

ian proprietors or their agents. Township Number 4 had not been settled and it is probable that no effort was made by its proprietors to retain it.

For nearly thirty years nothing seems to have been done by the proprietors of No. 4. Their next meeting, dated Dec. 26, 1769, was held at Nath'l Coolidge's Inn, Watertown, for the purpose of petitioning the General Court of Massachusetts for a grant of a township in lieu of No. 4. But twentynine of the original proprietors are found in the list of petitioners at this time, the rest being represented by their heirs, or by new men who had purchased their rights. Capt. Joshua Fuller, Wm. Coolidge and Ebenezer Brown were chosen a committee to draft a petition, and later were chosen to present the same to the General Court. This petition signed by Capt. Joshua Fuller and 59 others, was favorably acted upon and Capt. Fuller, Nathaniel Coolidge and Stephen Harris were selected "to take a view and plan of the township granted." From the records of the proprietary it appears that this committee went in company, and acted in conjunction with a committee of the grantees of Phipps' Canada (now Jay and Canton) with the understanding that the grants should be situated side by side, and that the expenses should be divided between the two committees. After the townships had been located and bounded, however, some disagreement arose, the nature of which is not explained, and the committee for the proprietors of No. 4, assumed nearly the entire expense, while the committee for Phipps' Canada went to the great Androscoggin. At a meeting held in Nov. 1771, the proprietors of Phipps' Can-

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ada, relinquished all claim to the two townships surveyed on the Little Androscoggin, and in December Alex. Shepard, Jr., the proprietary clerk was chosen a committee to prepare a petition to the General Court for a confirmation of the grant of a township on the Little Androscoggin, in lieu of No. 4.

The township granted to Joshua Fuller and others, June 11, 1771, in place of the township granted in 1736, had now been viewed and a plan made of it and the grant had been confirmed April 22, 1772, by the General Court in accordance with the plan presented. The committee chosen to lot the township into home lots, soon discovered that a hunter's spotted line had been mistaken for the western line of Sylvester Canada (Turner), and some time was again lost before the township became sufficiently located to lay out for settlement. By the terms of settlement the grantees should settle sixty families within seven years, build a house for the public worship of God and settle a learned protestant minister, and lay out one sixty-fourth part for the first settled minister, a similar part for the use of the ministry, the same for the use of schools and the same for Harvard College. Aug. 5, 1773, Alex. Shepard, Sr., was chosen surveyor to lay out the township into lots and Josiah Fuller, Elijah Livermore, Isaac Gleason, Josiah Bisco, and Alex. Shepard, Jr. were chosen assistants. The committee was also directed to prepare the lots ready to be drawn. On Nov. 4, the final report of the committee was accepted. It was then voted to draw the lots for a division of the township, and Nathaniel Harrington and Jonas Coolidge were chosen a committee

for drawing the lots.

The following is a complete list of the original (1771) grantees:-arranged generally according to the double lots which they drew in the northern half of the township, beginning in the west corner of the town:-Wm. Coolidge and Nathaniel Coolidge, on the north-west line; Eben Stearns, John Stowell, Thaddeus Trowbridge, Wm. Park, Thos. Frost, Wm. Coolidge, Peter Durell, Edmund Barnard, Ezekiel Whitney, Amos Livermore, Wm. Dana, Christopher Grant, Jr., Edward Jackson (on the right of Samuel Jackson), Jonas Coolidge, Joshua Fuller, Jonathan Williams, Jr., Thos. Greenwood, Nath'l Stone, Jas. Dix, Nath'l Smith, Samuel Hide, Daniel Bond, Eben Brown, Stephen Harris, Benj. Bond, Thos. Quiner, Jas. Hay, Thaddeus Trowbridge, David Livermore, Elisha Learned, Samuel Randall, David Coolidge, Josiah Goddard, Josiah Fuller, Geo. Harrington, Samuel Shattuck, Jonathan Learned, Jr., David Sanger, Samuel Jackson (on the right of Samuel Jackson), Nehemiah Mason, Ephraim Burridge, Oaks Angier, Seth Storer, Wm. Park (on the right of Richard Park), Abraham Whitney, Geo. Harrington, Jr., Wm. Coolidge, Josiah Mixer, Nath'l Spring, Daniel Robbins, Jno. Williams, Jos. The town was laid out 777 chains, on a line running north, 14 degrees west, in the shape of a parallelogram. The shorter bounds run south $68^{\circ} 30'$ west, 360 chains. The range lines extend the length of the town, parallel with the town bounds, the lot lines run parallel with the shorter

bounds. Range numbers begin at the south corner of the town, increasing toward the east; the numbers of the lots increase toward the west.

The township was now ready for settlement. Certain lots were reserved for the use of the first settled minister, and the other public purposes specified in the conditions of the grant. But the first practical move toward settlement was made in clearing a way to No. 4 from New Gloucester, which was done in 1774. Mill-sites were surveyed and arrangements being made for immediate settlement when the alarm of the American Revolution sounded throughout the Provinces, and all minor matters were laid aside. From April, 1775, to Sept., 1777, no meeting of the proprietors was held, and none of importance until March, 1779. On the latter date plans were made for immediate action to comply with the terms of the grant. Lapham says, in his History of Paris: "Measures were taken for making roads and building mills in the township, and a committee chosen and made responsible, by bonds and sureties, for procuring the requisite number of settlers, bounties were offered to the first families, and a tax of thirty pounds in silver money was assessed upon each right, to be used for the sole purpose of forwarding the settlement of the township."

The proprietors of No. 4 were among the most substantial citizens of Watertown, Newton, Cambridge, and also of Worcester. They included ministers, lawyers, physicians, merchants, farmers, mechanics and gentlemen of leisure, but only one of these ever settled his right in the new township. The proprietors' meetings were generally held in

Watertown until many of the settlers, having become proprietors, held meetings in No. 4. The last recorded meeting was held at the house of Capt. Daniel Stowell in June, 1795, at which Capt. Stowell was made moderator, and Josiah Bisco, the only original proprietor who settled here, was clerk. This was two years after the incorporation of the town, and their lands were practically all disposed of, so there was little left for them to do but close the accounts of the corporation which had brought into existence and prosperity one of the most enterprising and successful communities ever planted in a Maine wilderness.

EARLY SETTLEMENT.

The committee chosen by the proprietors to procure settlers for the new township on the Little Androscoggin, obtained quite a number from Worcester County, but appear to have been more successful in the Old Colony, in the early settled towns of Plymouth, Middleboro, Bridgewater and Plympton, with a few from Taunton, Raynham and Wareham. Lemuel Jackson of Middleboro, who had a family of grown-up sons, together with his son-in-law, Dea. John Willis, made the first settlers' purchase in Dec., 1779. The following year Mr. Jackson, accompanied probably by his sons, Isaac, Lemuel Jr., and Levi, and Mr. Willis, came to New Gloucester, which was the rallying point for the pioneers of many of the inland settlements; thence they

proceeded to their new lands where they felled trees for a clearing. Elder Jas. Hooper, who prepared a short history of Paris, in 1830, states that Isaac and Lemuel Jackson, Jr., raised the first corn in town in 1780. If this be true the amount raised must have been small for no "burnings" were made to prepare the ground until a year later. In August, 1781, the Jacksons were here and had a camp where Moses Marshall and wife stopped on their way from Bethel, which the Indians had raided. John Daniels is said to have felled the first trees for a settlement in No. 4; this may or may not be true, but surely he was among the first. The lot on which he made his opening included most of the land now occupied by the village of Paris Hill. This improvement seems to have been made on another's right, and Mr. Daniels sold his improvements, we are told, for an iron kettle. The wife of John Willis was the first white woman to come to No. 4 for the purpose of settlement. She was drawn here on a moose-sled from New Gloucester, in March, 1782. The following summer or fall her father, Lemuel Jackson, came with his family, when at least two families became located in the township. Mr. Jackson was a veritable father of the community, as well as of a large family of He purchased the rights of many sons and daughters. other proprietors, erected and managed the first mills in town, for which he received other rights, and was the general man-of-business in the community.

Of the dates of arrival of the settlers following, or of the order of their arrival we have no records, generally. This, however, is of little moment. The settlement increased

rapidly during the next ten years, the pioneers coming, as we have stated, mostly from Massachusetts. The following list of land-owners, taken from the registry-of-deeds in Cumberland county, shows the names of purchasers of lots prior to 1800 as there recorded: Daniel Staples, of Turner, Nov. 17, 1782, probably moved in the following year; Nathan Nelson, formerly of Milford, Mass.; Nathan Pierce. Asa. $\mathcal{G}_{\mathcal{A}} \stackrel{\sim}{\to} \mathcal{G}_{\mathcal{A}} \stackrel{\sim}{\to}$ Perry, Josiah Bisco, the only grantee who came to Paris, made purchases other than his rights drawn; John Jackson, a son of Lemuel, Sr.; Barachias Jackson, of Bucktown; David Andrews, Timothy Smith formerly of New Gloucester; Daniel Whitney of Worcester; Wm. C. Whitney of Worcester; Eben Nelson, Isaac Bolster of Shepardsfield (Hebron), made several purchases of land and removed to No. 4 in May, 1784; Peter Durell, Jr. of Newton, son of one of the Grantees; Asa Barrows of No. Yarmouth; Abijah Warren of Worcester; Abednego Robinson of Stratham, N. H; Reuben Hubbard of Worcester; Daniel Stowell of Guilford, Vt.; Abner Rawson of Sutton; Eben Rawson; Jas. Morse; Abijah and Jno. Hall, of Hopkinton, Mass., Thos. Stevens of Worcester; Seth Morse; Jesse Briggs; Benj. Hammond, formerly of New Gloucester, Asa Dean, formerly of Taunton; Malachi Barrows, Jas. Holmes of Hebron; Jos. Churchill; Joel Robinson of Shepardsfield; John Billings; Silas Maxim of Middleboro, Mass.; John Gray of Worcester; Elias Chase of Sutton; Robt. Wightman of Westboro; Elias Stowell of Worcester; Wm. Stowell of Worcester (settled here before Oct. 1787); Jairus Shaw; Samuel King; Wm. Stearns, formerly of Waltham; Aaron Fuller of Standish; Luther Pratt;

John Woodman of New Gloucester: Jas. Bowker: Jacob Gurney; Abraham Dean; Josiah Smith; Lemuel Perham, formerly of Upton; Barzillai Dwelley; Jos. Swift; Timothy Smith: Lemuel and Jos. Holmes, formerly of Plymouth: Solomon Jordan; Jos. Haven; Samuel Stevens of Plymouth; Eleazer Cole, formerly of Bridgewater; Seth Carpenter of Sutton: Elias Partridge: Uriah Ripley: Caleb Cushman of Hebron; Jno. Bemis; Silvanus Robbins; Jno Shurtleff, Barnabee and Wm. Faunce; Jacob Twitchell; Abijah Paine; Job French, formerly of Taunton; Peter Chase of Sutton; Eleazer Dunham; Wm. Bent; John Caldwell of Hebron; David Dudley of Hebron; Caleb Fuller; Job Lurvey; Daniel Shaw; Solo. Shaw of Bridgewater; Jeremiah Rolfe of Buckfield; Moses Buck; Josiah Bartlett, Jr., of Norway; Ebenezer Hutchinson; Ephraim Field of Bridgewater; and Jas. Brook, a tailor, of Hebron. Doubtless there were some land-owners who neglected to have their deeds recorded, such as Hector Fuller, "a negro man," who sold a lot of land to Sylvanus Robbins in 1799, but no record of his rights to the land is recorded. These are the transfers recorded of sales prior to 1800; most of those whose homes are not recorded were living in No. 4, or Paris, as it was after 1793, at the time of purchase.

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No records of a plantation government in No. 4 have ever been found and it is probable that none was ever organized. The proprietary laid out and repaired roads and bridges, and effected such other necessary improvements as the welfare of the community demanded, as they saw it. There seems, however, to have been considerable dissatisfaction in the settlement because no religious privileges were afforded, nor schools provided. To secure these privileges many of the settlers petitioned for incorporation in 1792. The year prior to this a return of No. 4 was made to the General Court when a tax was levied on the township. The following statistics given at this time are of much value as they show the condition of the community as it then existed. while we have little of an earlier date to throw light on the standing of the settlement.

Statistics of Polls and Property in No. 4, 1791:

Number of polls, 60; Acres of Fresh Meadow, 20; Dwelling houses, 20; acres of pasturage, 200; barns, 20; acres of unimproved lands, 4000; grist mills, 1; No. of horses, 6; saw mills, 1; No. of oxen, 30; acres of tillage land, 70; No. of steers and cows, 40; acres of English mowing, 200; No. of swine, 60.

Total tax assessed on the above property, 185£ 4s 4d.

The petition for incorporation was dated at No. Four, October 11, 1792, and was signed by the following:

To this petition two remonstrances were drawn up and presented to the General Court, and a vote taken by the Proprietary was also presented to that body remonstrating against incorporating No. Four into a town. These petitioners doubtless represented the greater wealth of the township, as well as the greater numbers, their object seems to have been to avert the heavier tax imposed upon a town government. The first remonstrance was signed by the following inhabitants:

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A second remonstrance was placed on file a short time after the first and a few weeks before the passage of the act of incorporation. This was signed by thirty-three inhabitants, many of whom had signed the earlier remonstrance but among whom we find the following new names which we will give to show who were residents in town at that time: Lemuel Jackson, Jr., Joshua Bessee, Jr., Joseph Hammond, Wm. Jordan, Joseph Churchill, Isaac Bolster, Jr., John Boyle, Eben Rawson, Nathan Nelson and Benj. Hammond. Doubtless the petitioners and those signing the remonstrances are nearly if not quite the entire voting populace of the township. Feeling ran high and everyone was forced to take a stand on one side or the other. These names represent 84 voters, which would show the population of Paris, at the time of incorporation, to be around 300.

INCORPORATION OF PARIS

Notwithstanding the number of names on the petition for the incorporation of No. 4 did not represent one-third of the population, and two remonstrances were sent, together with a committee representing the proprietors, to prevent the passage of the act, the General Court saw fit to incorporate the settlement. The following is a copy of the act:

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

In the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-three.

An act to incorporate the inhabitants of a plantation known by the name of No. 4, in the county of Cumberland, bounded on all the parts by the Commonwealth's land, as follows, viz.: Beginning at a hemlock tree, two hundred and fifty-two chains from the south corner of Sylvester Canada, thence north 14° west, seven hundred and seventyseven chains to a stake and stones, thence south 68° 30' west, three hundred and sixty chains to a stake and stones, thence south 14° east seven hundred and seventy-seven chains to a stake and stones: thence north 68° 30' east three hundred and eight chains to the hemlock tree first mentioned, with the inhabitants thereon, be and hereby is incorporated into a town by the name of Paris, with all the powers, privileges and immunities that towns within this commonwealth do or may enjoy. And be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, that Isaac Parsons, Esquire, be and hereby is, empowered to issue his warrant, directed to some principal inhabitant of said town, qualified as the law directs, to assemble and meet at some suitable time and place in said town, and choose such officer or officers as towns by law are empowered to choose at their annual meeting, in the month of March or April.

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WARRANT.

CUMBERLAND ss.—To Jonathan Hall of the Plantation formerly called No. 4, in the county of Cumberland and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, now incorporated into a town by the name of Paris, and one of the principal Inhabitants of said town. GREETING:

You are hereby required in the name of their Commonwealth aforesaid, to notify and warn all the inhabitants of Paris aforesaid, qualified as the law directs, to meet and assemble together at the house of Reuben Hubbard in said Paris, on Tuesday, the sixteenth day of this instant July, at nine of the clock in the torenoon, to act on the following articles, viz.:

First. To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

Second. To choose a Clerk for said town.

Third. To choose all other town officers required by law for towns to choose at their annual meeting in the month of March or April.

Signed, ISAAC PARSONS, Justice of the Peace. Dated at New GLOUCESTER, July 2, 1793.

FIRST TOWN MEETING.

The first town meeting was held in accordance with the above warrant, at the time and place specified. Lemuel Jackson was chosen Moderator for the meeting. Josiah Bisco was then chosen Town Clerk; Messrs. Isaac Bolster, Lemuel Jackson and Nathan Nelson, Selectmen; Messrs. Josiah Bisco, John Bessee and John Willis, Assessors; and

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Daniel Stowell Town Treasurer. The collection of taxes was struck off to John Daniels for three pence half penny on a pound, he being the lowest bidder.

Nine Highway Surveyors were then chosen, as follows: Robt. Wightman, Abijah Hall, Stephen Robertson, Thos. Stevens, Nicholas Chesley, Lemuel Jackson, Merodach B. Smith, Elias Chase and Levi Hubbard. Solomon Bryant was chosen Surveyor of Lumber, M. B. Smith, Surveyor of Shingles and Boards, Thos. Stevens and Caleb Cushman, Fence Viewers; Jno Hall, Nath'l Haskell, Wm. Swan, Benj. Hammond and Seth Carpenter, Tithingmen; Daniel Stowell, Sealer of Leather; Benj. Hammond, Deer Reef; Phillip Donohue, John Daniels, Samuel Durell and Henry Hill, Hogreves; Daniel Whitney, Field Driver; Isaac Bolster, Abner Shaw, John Willis, Seth Carpenter and M. B. Smith, School Committee; and John Daniels, Constable.

At the next meeting, held at the house of Lemuel Jackson, Oct. 21, 1793, thirty pounds was raised for the support of preaching, fifty pounds for schools, one hundred pounds for the repair of highways, and ten pounds for defraying town expenses.

The bounds as first laid out to the grantees, or rather, as corrected for them before the ranges and lots were laid out, were identical with those given in the act of incorporation, unless it be the south-east border line, and the difference here must be in the records rather than the lines. According to the dimensions given, the township contains a little short of forty-four square miles, but the allowance for the "swag" of the four rod chains, together with that for

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lakes and rivers allowed considerable freedom in laying out townships. Several changes have been made in the town bounds since incorporation. In some cases land has been set off and others added, so that the area at present, although slightly increased, is substantially the same as one hundred years ago. The town is about twelve miles long, by six wide, having an area of fully seventy square miles.

The changes in town bounds referred to above have been as follows: In 1817 two lots were set off to Hebron. In 1825 the estates of John Gray, Jr., and John Starbird, being lots numbered six and seven in the east part of Woodstock, according to Smith's survey, were set off to Paris. In 1828 Benj. Woodbury, Asa Thayer, Caleb Cushman, Jr., Bela Farrar and Ziba Thaver, with their estates, were set off from Buckfield and annexed to Paris. In 1838 the westerly half of lot number one, in the first range (south corner lot), was set off from Paris to Oxford. In 1841 two lots were set off to Woodstock. In 1859 lots numbered six, seven and eight, in the first range, were set off from Paris and annexed to Norway. In 1861 all that part of lots numbered six, seven and eight in the westerly range of lots set off to Norway in 1859, which lay easterly and southerly of the following described line were re-annexed to Paris: "Beginning in the northerly line of said lot number eight, and at the center of the old Rumford road, so called: thence following said center southerly till it intersects the road from South Paris to Norway; thence in a straight line through the agricultural grounds to the south-east corner thereof; thence in a straight line to the northeasterly corner

of Titus O. Brown's homestead farm, so called; thence by the easterly line of his said farm to the Little Androscoggin river, and thence by said river westerly to the original line between Paris and Norway." In 1880 the estate of Caleb Fuller was set off from Woodstock and annexed to Paris; this was part of the set-off to Woodstock in 1841.

PARIS MILITARY HISTORY.

Many of the men who became early settlers of the town of Paris had seen service in the American forces during the great Revolutionary war. These were generally residents of the vicinity of Boston where some of them took a part in the opening engagements around that port.

Capt. Isaac Bolster of Sutton, was a Lieutenant at Concord; he later was commissioned Captain. Eleazer Cole of Bridgewater, was a drummer in Capt. Josiah Hayden's company on the march to Lexington, April 19, 1775, became sergeant. Asa Barrows of Middleboro, was a minute-man. Wm. Swan of Woburn was at Bunker Hill. The following also saw service, many of them under several different enlistments during the struggle. Jesse Briggs of Wareham, Edmond Dean of Taunton, Abijah Warren, Ephraim Field of Bridgewater, Amzi Brett of Bridgewater, Malachi Barrows of Middleboro, Benj. Woodbury of Sutton, Samuel Perkins of Middleboro, Peter Durell of Newton, Thos. Stevens of Worcester, Isaac Jackson of Newton, Joseph Bessee of

Wareham, and Simeon Pond of Newton, who had also served in the French and Indian wars.

THE WAR OF 1812.

By the time of the breaking out of this war, Paris had become one of the most flourishing inland communities in Maine. Although not directly affected by the treachery shown by the English seamen as were the coast towns, the sentiments of her citizens were fully aroused and decisive action taken to support the administration in defending our rights. The long list of officers and privates who entered the service for a longer or shorter period, shows the generous and noble response given by the men of Paris. Some of these were in action, but many were marched to Portland for coast defense and were not called to face the enemy.

When the Aroostook War seemed imminent, Governor Fairfield called out 10,000 militia. A draft was made Feb. 26, 1839, in this town, and the enrolled soldiers of the several companies met on the Common at Paris Hill. Twelve men were drafted. On March 3, following, a second draft was made and Sibley Chase, Jabez Buck, Benj. Bird, John W. Deming, Harvey Berry and Ezekiel L. Porter were drawn from this number and instructed to be at the Court House in Augusta, March 6, with Capt. Sampson Dunham. Fortunately the difficulty was decided without a conflict-at-arms, and the militiamen were soon returned home.

The War with Mexico was not generally looked upon with favor, either in Paris or any part of Maine, conse-

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quently no response was shown. Two citizens of Paris only were in the service. Daniel S. Hubbard, who volunteered from a western state; and John Cooper, who enlisted under Gen. Cushing, in a regiment of Massachusetts volunteers, and who, soon after his discharge, came home to die, worn out by the exhaustive marches.

WAR OF THE REBELLION

The feeling in a northern state in 1861 so strongly patriotic and anti-slavery as our own need not be discussed. Nor need we mention the unanimous response given by every town and hamlet in our state of the best specimens of American manhood, given to the cause of union and freedom. All that is a matter of history, familiar to every school boy in Maine and New England. We will only say that the men, descendants of those hardy pioneers who had aided in establishing American freedom, did honor to their ancestry, and their native town. In respect to their bravery and loyalty the military record of the men of Paris is second to no other.

We give below a complete list of the men of Paris who enlisted in the service, arranged nearly in the order of their first enlistments (many of them re-enlisting after the expiration of their first term):

GRAND ARMY POST

WM. K. KIMBALL POST, No. 148, Department of Maine, was organized May 17, 1886 at South Paris, with about forty members. Twenty of these withdrew from Harry Rust Post of Norway. The principal officers then chosen were Capt. H. N. Bolster, post com.; G. C. Pratt, S. V. C.; Leonard Briggs, J. V. C.; Grinfill Stuart, Q. M.; Dr. Isaac Rounds, Sur.; A. F. Barrows, Chap.; and O. A. Maxim, Adj.

The membership of the post at one time numbered sixty but has now decreased to thirty-five. Capt. Bolster, of the 23rd Me. who served also as a recruiting officer in Paris, has held the office of adjutant for fifteen years, succeeding Mr.

Maxim.

The officers for the present year are: Henry H. Maxim, P. C.; Thos. Powers, S. V. C.; Rawson Holman, J. V. C; H. N. Bolster, Adj.; Chandler Swift, Q. M.; W. S. Starbird, Chap.; and Geo. P. Tucker, Sur.

ECCLESIASTICAL ACCOUNT.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH.

The religious history of any community is the history of the several institutions which it has established and maintained. The first Baptist church may be said to have begun with the very settlement of the town, for it was to Deacon Willis that the early church owed much of its strength and activity. Among the early settlers were seven from the third Baptist church in Middleborough who were dismissed to form a church here. Among this number were Lemuel Jackson, Sr. and John Willis. Dea. Willis became a licensed preacher, whose zeal and piety received the highest approbation of Elder Hooper. A meeting was opened and maintained soon after the settlement began, and when they were visited by Rev. Jas. Potter, in 1790, they enjoyed their first revival. Several were added to the church. Mr. Potter visited the church at intervals during the two years following. Rev. Elisha Snow, also visited the parish and united the Baptists here in a church relation, Nov. 18, 1791.

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There were then twenty-one members. The church was aided by several visiting ministers until 1795, among whom was Rev. James Potter. On the 25th of June that year, he was ordained as pastor of the church. He had been elected minister of the town, April 6, preceeding, and was the only Paris minister who ever enjoyed that distinction. He continued as pastor of the church until the ordination of his successor in 1838. Lapham says, "He was not only pastor of the church and minister of the town, but he was an influential and much respected citizen in all that the term implies."

The first meeting house was erected on Paris Hill in 1803. In 1838 this house was removed and another erected in its place. This was built with a basement story, to be used as a town house, the old house having been occupied for that purpose. This house was extensively repaired and remodeled in the interior in 1860, and repaired again in 1875. In 1864 a convenient vestry was added to the rear of the church, and in 1883, Hon. Hannibal Hamlin presented the church with a clock.

Elder Hooper was succeeded in the pastorate, in June 1838, by Rev. Caleb B. Davis. He was a young man, an able preacher and an ardent worker in the temperance cause. He resigned Aug. 23, 1852. Rev. Adam Wilson, D. D. was installed pastor in 1852, and remained until 1857. Dr. Wilson is well remembered as the founder of the Zion's Advocate. The pastors succeeding Dr. Wilson have been Rev. H. S. Ventres, ordained July 8, 1858, resigned Oct. 28, 1866; Rev. Wm. H. H. Walker, from 1867 to 1870, Rev. A.

A. Ford, ordained Nov. 2, 1870, resigned Oct. 2, 1872; Rev.
Hiram C. Estes, D. D., installed pastor, Jan. 1, 1873, resigned July 1883; Rev. Jas. E. Cochrane, 1883 to 1886; Rev. Gideon Mayo, 1887 to 1889; Rev. A. P. Wedge, 1889 to 1895; Rev. H. A. Roberts, 1895 to 1901; Rev. H. H. Bishop, 1901 to 1904; and Rev. E. A. Taylor, the present pastor, installed in October, 1904.

The membership of this church at the present time is 96; 69 of whom are residents. Perhaps no other church in Oxford county has exerted the religious and moral influence that this has enjoyed. Fortunate in its choice of pastors, its career has been one of continual advancement. Many of the churches in the surrounding towns have been formed largely by members dismissed from this church. The property now owned by the society is valued at \$5,500.

SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH-NORTH PARIS.

The Baptist church at North Paris was organized March 11, 1828, with twenty-one members, residents of Paris and Woodstock; many of whom came from the church on the Hill. No settled pastor seems to have been employed until 1836, when Rev. Luther Perkins was settled for two years. Rev. Addison Abbott came in 1846 and remained until 1852. Succeeding pastors have been Revs. Chas. Perkins, 1855-58; M. Lawrence, 1859-60; R. B. Andrews, 1861; O. Richardson, 1862; Wm. Beavins, 1863-64; G. W. Fuller, 1870-71; and Rev. T. G. Lyons, from 1875 to 1877. Following that time, occasional preaching had been maintained up to June 1905, when this church united with the Free

Baptists of West Paris in holding services. The church was built in 1833, together with the Methodists, and is also occupied by the latter society at the present time.

SOUTH PARIS BAPTIST CHURCH.

The Baptists of South Paris united with those of other parts of the town in attendance at the church on the Hill. Conference prayer meetings were held here as early as 1860, attended by Rev. Mr. Ventres, pastor at the Hillchurch. In 1885, when the Paris Manufacturing Company removed from the Hill to South Paris, many members of the church there also removed to the latter village, and on May 19, 1885, organized a church of 29 members. Rev. Jas. E. Cochrane became pastor of this new church in connection with the mother church. The church was received by the Association the following June. A church edifice was begun that year, and dedicated Feb. 10, 1886, by Rev. A. K. P. Small. This was erected at a cost of \$8000, with all its furnishings, but was soon freed from debt. In 1901 a vestry was put under the church at a cost of \$1000.

Rev. W. C. Barrows, a supply, followed Rev. Mr. Cochrane until Rev. Gideon Mayo was installed July 1, 1887. Two years later Rev. Mr. Mayo was succeeded by Rev. T. J. Ramsdell, who became ordained pastor Oct. 30, 1889 and remained twelve years. When he resigned in Dec. 1901, the membership of the church had increased to 160. Rev. Harry Taylor, an evangelist, supplied the pulpit until Rev. H. S. Pinkham was settled in Aug. 1902. He remained until the last Sunday in 1904. Rev. J. Wallace Chesbro

came to the pastorate Jan. 1, 1905. A parsonage was bought in 1902. A society of Christian Endeavor, of forty members; and a Sunday school of 140 members are efficient auxiliaries in the church work. This is now the largest church in Oxford Association, having 194 members. Its church property is valued at \$9,000.

UNIVERSALISTS.

The second denomination to take definite shape as an organized body in Paris, was a society of Universalists, but this society, incorporated as the Paris and Norway First Universalist Society, Mar. 4, 1805, showed considerable more strength in Norway than in Paris. No minister was settled for many years, but occasional services were held by itinerant preachers of the faith. About 1840, Rev. D. T. Stevens organized a church and ministered to it for a time. Rev. N. C. Hodgdon succeeded him in 1844, for a short time. Rev. J. C. Snow was the next regular preacher. He was settled in Norway, but preached in the Court house each Sabbath until the church edifice was erected, and dedicated Oct. 9, 1859. No church was organized at Paris Hill until 1864. Few pastors have been settled here. Many of those at Norway have supplied this church, also, while part of the time no regular services have been maintained. Preachers succeeding Rev. Mr. Snow, have been Revs. W. W. Hayward, Selden Gilbert, N. Gunnison, Zenas Thompson, L. H. Tabor (1872-73), J. C. Church, Rev. Mr. Tabor another two years, J. A. Seitz, W. W. Hooper, Caroline E. Angell (1884, for several years), E. W. Pierce and J. H. Little, of the South Paris

church, until Jan. 1, 1905. Rev. C. A. Knickerbocker, of Arlington, Mass., preached four months during lastsummer. A regular Sunday school is maintained.

FIRST UNIVERSALIST CHURCH OF SOUTH PARIS.

Rev. G. G. Hamilton of Mechanic Falls came to South Paris and held a few services in New Hall, during 1891. In 1900 the Universalist State Missionary, Rev. W. W. Hooper, came here at intervals, and as a result a ladies' society known as the Good Cheer Society was organized, Oct. 19, 1901. A parish was organized in March, 1902; the Sunday school on July 20, following; and the church a week later, with 17 members. Rev. J. H. Little of Canton began his pastorate June 1, following the parish organization.

Immediate steps were taken to secure a house of worship. In October a church lot was bought on the corner of Pine and Stiles streets and the foundation put in that autumn. Work on the superstructure was begun in the early spring and Good Cheer hall, in the basement, was ready for occu. pancy July first. On Jan. 20, 1904, the elegant new church was dedicated. It was erected at a cost of \$7,800, is fitted throughout with electric lights and steel ceiling, and has four handsome memorial windows. It has a seating capacity of six hundred, when the folding doors between the main audience room and the parlors are thrown open. A convenient and modern ladies' kitchen is also well fitted up. The membership of the church society, now numbers fiftyfive. There are 130 families in the parish. A Young Peo-

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ples' Union, a Junior Y. P. U., a Sunday school of 70 members, and the Good Cheer Society are efficient church aids.

UNIVERSALIST PARISH SOCIETY OF WEST PARIS.

The Universalists of West Paris have had services in the Baptist church during the summer for several seasons, but have no church organization as yet. They are now erecting a fine modern church edifice, costing around \$6,000, to be ready for occupancy about May first. All the windows in the church are beautiful gifts of the friends of the society. Rev. F. E. Barton, state missionary, holds services at this village once a month, but it is expected a regular pastor will be located here in the near future. A "Good Will" society of 62 members and a Sunday school of 65 members constitute the social and spiritual life of the parish.

FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF SOUTH PARIS

A Congregational Church of fourteen members was organized at South Paris, Nov. 4, 1812, and a parish was incorporated four years later with nineteen members. The first house of worship was erected in 1818 on the site formerly occupied by the south school house. It is said that no liquor was used at the "raising," which was a remarkable thing for the times in which it took place. Rev. Joseph Walker was the first pastor, settled Dec. 31, 1821 and remained until his death, Apr. 8, 1851. The church was removed to South Paris village in 1835, a distance of about one mile, and erected as before with the addition of a belfry tower, to which Capt. Seth Morse donated a bell. A new bell was pur-

chased in 1845. In 1851 the interior was extensively remodeled and modernized. The organ was purchased in 1855, and in 1859 a vestry was added, and an extension furnishing twenty-four new pews to the audience room was made. A third bell was hung in 1877, and the year following other extensive improvements begun. Recent changes and repairs have been made on the house, and a parsonage located on High street was purchased in 1905. The property is valued at \$6,000. The church membership numbers 210. There is a Y. P. S. C. E. of 67 members, and a Junior C. E. Society of 35 members.

Succeeding pastors with their terms of service, have been Revs. Horatio Merrill (stated supply), 1851; Francis Dyer, Dec. 31, 1852—Oct. 4, 1853; Daniel Sewall, Jan. 3, 1855— Aug. 31, 1858; Alanson Southworth, Jan. 13, 1859, died March 25, 1864; F. S. Southworth (supply), 1865; Jacob Chapman (supply), 1865-66; Francis B. Knowlton (acting), Aug. 1866—Aug. 1867; John B. Wheelwright, Dec. 1867— 1876; C. D. Crane, June, 1877—Jan. 1880; E. E. Bacon, (supply), July, 1880—Jan. 1881; E. C. Ingalls, Jan. 1881— Nov. 1884; A. G. Fitz, Jan. 1885—Oct. 1892; R. J. Haughton, October, 1892—May, 1899; Wm. E. Brooks, Sept., 1899 —May, 1904; and Rev. A. K. Baldwin, June 1, 1905 to the present time.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH-SOUTH PARIS

A Methodist class was formed at South Paris in 1815 by Rev. John Adams. This was connected with surrounding charges for several years. A chapel was erected in 1836-87,

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while Rev. W. F. Farrington was in charge. This edifice was burned in 1848 but was soon replaced by a larger and better one, costing \$2,000. In 1860 this was repaired and enlarged, and a vestry built under it in 1877. A new parsonage was built in 1899; this, with the stable connected were erected at a cost of \$2,800. A new pipe organ was installed in the church about five years ago. The society has about \$5,000 invested funds. The present membership of this church is 120; there is also an Epworth League of 25 members.

The pastors of this church since 1875 have been as follows: Revs. J. B. Lapham, 1875-6; Fred C. Rogers, 1877-9; E. W. Simons, 1880-2; Geo. L. Burbank, 1883; H. E. Foss, 1884; S. Hooper, 1885-6; W. F. Holmes, 1887-9; Thos. Whiteside, 1890-2; H. L. Nichols, 1893-4; Wm. T. Chapman, 1895; Insley A. Bean, 1896-9; Abel W. Pottle, 1900-4; H. A. Clifford, 1904 to the present time.

WEST PARIS AND NORTH PARIS METHODIST CHURCHES

A class was formed at NORTH PARIS about the same time as at the South village, and for many years the two places formed a circuit. In 1833 they united with the Baptists in erecting a house of worship.

A class was formed at WEST PARIS in 1866 by Rev. W.C. Stevens and three members. In 1874 these two churches were united as one charge. A neat house of worship was erected at the West Village in 1878. South Woodstock and Center Greenwood have also become united with this circuit. In 1897 under the pastorate of Rev. A. K. Bryant, a chapel was erected at North Paris, and a neat parsonage at West

Paris. The latter was built by the combined efforts of the entire circuit, which now has a membership of about seventy-five.

Pastors of this charge since 1885 have been Revs. G. B. Hannaford, 1885-6; I. A. Bean, 1887-9; J. W. Smith, 1890-1; F. W. Snell, 1892; A. K. Bryant, 1893-7; R. S. Leard, 1898-9; R. A. Rich, 1900-2; and David Nelson, 1903 to the present time.

FREE BAPTIST CHURCH-WEST PARIS

Under the direction of Rev. Wm. C. Witham a Free Baptist church was organized at West Paris, July 7, 1829. Rev. Mr. Witham became the first pastor, being ordained the day after its formation, and remained until 1839. The church was without a pastor until Rev. Robert Hayes was settled in 1851. He remained until 1860 and was succeeded by Rev. Alex. Hill. In 1876 Mr. Hill was succeeded by Rev. Geo. W. Gould, who resigned in 1878. A neat little church edifice was erected in 1866. Rev. C. T. Keen was the next settled pastor, in 1892, remaining two years. Rev. Z. I. Wheeler then came for five years and was followed by students from Cobb Divinity School. In June 1905, this church united with the Baptists at North Paris in supporting regular services. Rev. A. J. Parker preached for about a year. Since Sept. Rev. C.C. Koch of Bryant's Pond has been the supply. There are now 23 members. A regular Sunday school is held. The church property is valued at \$2,000.

CATHOLIC CHURCH-SOUTH PARIS

In the summer of 1894 Father M. D. Summa of Lewiston began holding monthly mission meetings at the home of J. J. Emeley in this village. These were continued until 1896 or 1897 when the church was erected on Alpine street to which the meetings were transferred. This house was struck by lightning May 14, 1900 and partially destroyed. It was then removed to its present location on Pleasant street. Since May, 1900 this mission has been under the charge of Rev. James A. Flynn, of Yarmouthville, who comes here monthly. The church has about 200 communicants in this village and in Norway, the church being erected to accommodate the Catholics of both villages.

EDUCATIONAL ITEMS.

The inhabitants of Paris saw their need of public schools before the incorporation of the town, in fact this was one of the chief objects for which they sought to gain the authority to raise taxes in town. Nor were they lax in exercising the authority so given. We find that the sum of fifty pounds was voted at the first meeting called in the new town for making appropriations, and this in Oct. 1793. It is to be presumed that private schools or schools maintained by private subscription had been held in town prior to this date. On the date above mentioned, a vote was taken to accept the

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school districts, five in number, as laid out by the selectmen, and that each school district should have the benefit of the amount raised in it for school purposes. It was also voted that each school district should build a school house, or otherwise provide a place for keeping school. Frequent additions and alterations were made to the school districts during the first half of the last century. The amounts appropriated for the support of schools was increased from year to year; in 1803 it had reached \$500 and in 1819, \$750. There were 817 scholars in Paris in 1825, classed in sixteen districts. The town was redistricted in 1828, but the number was not changed. In 1850 the number had increased to 25 at least. Four years later the sum of 50 cents per capita was raised for the support of schools, and the choice of school agents left to the several districts. The population taken this year showed 2,882.

We learn that no houses were built for the accommodation of schools during the first years of the town management, but that they followed the other clause in the instruction given in the vote above recorded by, "otherwise providing a place for keeping school." Generally, in the summer months, some convenient barn or other out-building was used; in the winter, resort was made to some spacious kitchen. In 1800 the first school house in town was built, in the Center district; this was also occupied for town purposes until the completion of the first church four years later. Lack of space forbids any attempt to give a connected account of the development of the present efficient school system from the meagre and uncertain beginning

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with which it was established. But it was through no lack of an appreciation of education that the schools must make a small beginning, it was the need of funds and competent instructors, both of which have come nobly to the relief of the town during the succeeding years.

PARIS HIGH SCHOOL.

The question of establishing a free high school in Paris was for several years postponed by the town. The Oxford Normal Institute, and Paris Hill Academy, furnished excellent local advantages for securing an advanced education at small cost; also a school precinct was formed in South Paris for the purpose of operating a local high school. We have not learned the date on which the town high school became established, but Prof. J. R. Everett, for several years the efficient principal, was probably the first principal after the town assumed control. He was succeeded as principal by Miss Sue A. Thompson, in 1889, for one year. From that time to the present, have been: C. A. Record, came in 1890; Henry Fletcher, 1892; Frank E. Wingate, 1897; L. P. Gerrish, 1898; Hal R. Eaton, 1900; Henry G. Clement, 1903; and the present instructor, Prof. Ernest F. Clason, who came here from Lisbon Falls High School at the opening of the fall term, 1904. A fine new modern building was erected during 1903, costing, together with the three acre lot, the sum of \$10,000. This is said to be the only high school in Oxford county, whose certificate is accepted by the New England Board of College Examiners as sufficient guarantee of scholarship.

The branches taught are arranged in three courses,— College Preparatory, English, and Latin-Scientific. Two assistants are employed, those for the present year being Miss Susie L. Rounds and Miss Florence Jewett. The attendance averages ninety-five.

The rooms left vacant by the high school, in 1903, now give ample quarters to the increasing demands of the Grammar school. The present school buildings at West Paris and at Paris Hill were erected in 1895.

MANUFACTURING.

Although primarily an agricultural town, many important and interesting manufacturing enterprises have been developed in Paris since Lemuel Jackson, Sr., built the first rude saw-mill on Stony brook in 1783. This mill was built for the convenience of settlers, under the direction of the proprietary. Here were sawed the boards for the first framed houses in this town and in Norway. Solomon Bryant was probably the first mill man. The mill has long since crumbled to dust. The first Grist mill was built the following year on the site of the W. B. Royal mill. The first grist was ground by "Miller" Ames. To this mill came the settlers from a wide circle of country, where there were settlers, bringing their home raised corn and rye by spotted lines through the forest. In 1802 Mr. Jackson, who also

built this mill, sold this and other mill property to Elias Stowell. This mill was transferred several times before passing into the hands of Benj. Royal, who was succeeded by Wm. B. Royal until about ten years ago. Since that time it has been owned and operated by J. A. Kenney, in the manufacture of dowels and long lumber. It is now operated under contract to the Mason Manufacturing Co. Another saw mill was erected on Stony brook by Reuben Hubbard and John Daniels, probably soon after Jackson's mill was built, but this was destroyed by fire previous to 1796. A saw mill was built by Capt. Jairus H. King, opposite the site on which Samuel M. King later erected his mill. A shingle mill, built by Mr. Chase, was located higher up the stream.

Lemuel Jackson also built the first dam across the Little Androscoggin. He erected a saw mill on the west side and a grist mill on the east side, above the bridge. In his sale of land to Elias Stowell in 1802, these mills were included, and after this transfer the place seems to have taken the name of "Stowell's Mills." In 1805 Wm. Stowell purchased all the estate between the road and Stony brook, and from the center of the river to the county road on the east. Thos. N. Stowell succeeded his father until 1836, when he sold his property to the Factory Company. The mill property east of the river had undergone several changes. A carding mill and a fulling mill had been erected and operated here. The latter was burned in 1834. Two years later this property was sold to the Factory Company, a new corporation, formed for the manufacture of woolen goods.

The Factory Company was organized with a capital stock of \$10,500, taken mostly by local business men. The old mills were all taken down, the woolen mill built, and soon put in operation. Lapham enumerates their misfortunes, but we can only state in our brief account that the project was a failure. Heavy losses were sustained. The business was continued off and on until 1858, when it was purchased by Woodman, True and Phelps, and converted into a first class flouring mill, with a capacity of 100 barrels perday. David N. True succeeded to the business, and upon his death, the South Paris Grain Co. was organized. In 1901, A. E. Shurtleff, who has been connected with the business almost since its beginning, bought the business. Rodney N. Hall, the head miller, has filled that position since 1874.

A paper mill was erected and operated by Isaac Durell, in 1872, which was run to manufacture brown wrapping paper. This mill was burned and the site purchased in 1880, by S. P. Maxim & Son, who erected their mill for the manufacture of house finish of all kinds. This business has remained under their successful management until the present time, and is doing an immense business. The saw mill on the south side of the river was doubtless built by Jackson, previous to his sale to Elias Stowell. It had many owners prior to 1870, when it was purchased by Whitney & Billings. Ten years later Mr. L. S. Billings became the sole proprietor and has continued a successful lumber manufacturing business. The large flour, grain and feed mill on Skillings Ave., now carried on by A. C. Maxim and W. B.

Russell was founded in 1897 by Shurtleff & Maxim. They are well equipped for an extensive business, and have for motive power a 20-horse power electric motor.

It was at South Paris also, that the famous Hersey Plows were manufactured. This industry seems to have been begun early in the history of the town by David Durell, followed at a later date by Moses Hammond and Richard Morton. The first productions were crude affairs. In 1835 Simeon Hersey and Perez Record joined Richard Morton in erecting a small foundry. The business was soon removed to Stony brook, Mr. Hersey having built a dam. The buildings erected here were burned in 1842, and the dam on which the foundry is now situated, was at once begun, and buildings erected. Alvah, Tristram, and Warren Hersey, brothers of Simeon, were all interested in the business at periods of its developement, and each contributed to its success. Tristram was perhaps longest connected with it before selling to F. C. Merrill. Mr. Merrill continued improving the plow which he manufactured for many years. He continued the ownership of the foundry until his recent decease.

PARIS MANUFACTURING CO.

But by far the largest industry in Paris is the sled, wagon and general wood manufacturing plant of the Paris Manufacturing Co. This business was established in 1861 by Henry F. Morton when he made a few sleds in his kitchen at West Sumner. The business increased, and in 1869 he moved to Paris Hill and organized the Paris Hill Mfg. Co.

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The business increased rapidly, new lines of goods were made, including step-ladders, wheel-barrows, folding tables, etc. Twenty-five men were employed.

For the benefit of better shipping facilities the company purchased five acres of land at South Paris, in 1882, and built a new factory here. The following year the business was removed, and the name changed to the Paris Mfg. Co. In Feb., 1886, fire destroyed the entire plant, except the storehouses. While the work continued in temporary quarters a new factory was built, and during the summer of the same year they moved into it. In 1901a branch factory was established at West Paris where the step-ladders are made, and a part of the stock for the South Paris plant is gotten out. This company owns valuable tracts of timber lands where they cut much of the stock used in the business.

275 hands are employed at the South Paris plant and 45 at West Paris. Both factories are fully equipped to perform every branch of their work in a most workman-like manner. Their goods, by their merit, have acquired a market throughout the commercial world, and comprise a wide and varied line. L. C. Bates is president; Geo. B. Crockett, secretary; Geo. R. Morton, treasurer and manager, and H. A. Morton, superintendent.

Another extensive wood-working plant is that operated by the Mason Manufacturing Co., moved to this village from South Gardner, Mass. The product of this factory is toys and novelties, differing from that of the above company in size, but little in quality or in the remarkable machinery with which it is produced. Diminutive furniture, toys and

wooden wonders of all descriptions to delight the child's eye are turned out in large quantities to supply the increasing demands. The business occupies nearly 20,000 square feet of floor space. The company was incorporated in 1903, with J. A. Scott president and L. L. Mason, treasurer; Mr. Scott is the present manager.

The Oxford County Creamery, established in 1902; H. P. Millett's extensive carriage and sleigh shops where he has carried on a lively manufacturing business since 1890; the large canning factory of Burnham & Morrill Co., built in 1889-90, with a capacity of 600,000 cans annually, and many minor business enterprises give to the village of South Paris the distinction of being a flourishing manufacturing center.

WEST PARIS is also fast becoming a leading manufacturing village. The first grist mill here was built by Samuel B. Locke, soon after the building of the railroad, and was operated by him until his decease in 1870. The Willis saw mill, on the most northern privilege on the Androscoggin in Paris, was built by John Willis, and has been operated by his son, F. L. Willis, in the manufacture of long and short lumber until the present time.

Among the manufacturing of more recent development at West Paris is L. L. Mann & Son's clothes pin and bail handle factory. About 1888 Ellingwood and Ridlon erected a chair shop which they operated for the manufacture of all kinds of wood chairs until they sold to L. L. Mann, about 1891. Mr. Mann began the manufacture of clothes pins at Snow's Falls, then removed to the site of Irish Bros. & Co's

die-block mill, then to Milton where it is still carried on, as well as at Bryant's Pond. The West Paris mill was at once opened and has built up a lively business, employing about twenty hands.

Irish Bros. & Co.'s die-block factory occupies the privilege on the old Fickett farm, formerly occupied by N. J. Cushman for the manufacture of die-blocks and long lumber. This mill was burned in 1900, but was immediately rebuilt. This is a growing business.

Burnham & Morrill Co.'s corn packing factory, erected here in 1889-90 has a capacity of 450,000 cans annually. The West Paris Creamery Butter Co. was organized by local capital in 1885, and the building erected the following year. S. B. Cook was the first butter maker, followed by A. J. Abbott after one year, and he by H. C. Loveland about three years ago. F. L. Wyman is president of the company.

The first mills at NORTH PARIS were built by Ebenezer Hutchinson about 1800. The power here is on the outlet to Moose Pond. A grist mill was erected on the west side and a saw mill on the east. In 1812 Stephen Washburn of Hebron purchased the mills, and the place took the name of Washburn's Mills. The saw-mill is now owned by Jos. Littlehale, but does little business. The grist mill was burned about twenty years ago when a destructive fire did much damage in this village.

At Snow's FALLS an extensive chair factory was erected by the Messrs. Stearns prior to 1850. This was burned Nov. 25, 1855, but was immediately rebuilt and kept in operation until 1875, when it was converted by Wm. Chase

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into a paper mill. This was burned June 5, 1877.

The Exeter Wood Pulp Co. next erected a mill for the manufacture of wood pulp. This was later purchased by the Linen Mfg. Co., John F. Wood, controller. The mill was extensively enlarged and equipped. But the project was experimental and failed to produce the expected results. The mill was soon closed and has not been opened for four or five years. The property is now controlled by Mr. Phillips of Portland.

Other mills have been operated at the different privileges in town, and other manufacturing was carried on in different parts of the town during the earlier days. At Bisco's Falls a grist mill and a fulling mill were erected in 1822. These were succeeded by others of various descriptions and a variety of owners, until the last, a pulp wood mill, was burned in 1883. The Bemis grist mill, on the privilege below Snow's Falls, was erected soon after the incorporation of the town, by Seth and Luke Bemis, of Watertown. This, together with the bridge here, was carried away by freshet about 1822. Several small mills were also operated on Smith's and Stone's brooks during the first half of the last century.

Tanning was an important industry at one time. This was begun here by Elder James Hooper, who was a tanner by trade. Hats, potash, lime, malt and potato-whiskey are also in the list of manufactured products of Paris.

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LAWYERS AND STATESMEN.

Few towns in Maine are the peer of Paris in her honored members of the bar. Being the shire town of the county, many able men have come from other towns of the county to take up their abode at Paris Hill or South Paris. Zachariah Soule was the first member of the bar to settle here. Nathaniel Howe came in 1808, but removed to Bridgton, after two or three years. Albion Keith Parris, who became the second governor of Maine was the next lawyer. Governor Parris was born in Hebron, Jan. 19, 1788, graduated with distinction at Dartmouth in 1806, and was admitted to the bar in Paris in 1809. He rose rapidly in his profession. In the winter of 1817-18 he removed to Portland. He was elected County Attorney, member of the Legislature, Senator, and a Representative to Congress in succession, was elected Governor in 1821, to which office he was four times re-elected. In 1836, President VanBuren appointed him Second Controller of the United States Treasurv. His last public office was Mayor of Portland in 1852. He died in 1857. He was extremely popular and it is probable that more children have been named for him than for any other man of Maine.

Enoch Lincoln, the next lawyer, was also the next governor of Maine. He removed here from Fryeburg in 1819, when he was elected to Congress. In 1826 he was elected governor, and was twice reelected. He died at the age of 41 in Augusta, before the expiration of his last term and is buried in front of the Capitol. He was a scholar, poet and

statesman of much ability and promise. Judge Stephen Emery was Judge of Probate for Oxford county, was Attorney-General of the State under Gov. Fairfield, and filled other high offices. Joseph G. Cole began practice at Paris Hill in 1826 and remained until his death in 1851, at which time he was Judge of the District Court. Levi Stowell filled the offices of Register of Probate, and County Attorney. Timothy J. Carter located in Paris about 1827; he served as County Attorney, and was elected to Congress in 1836. His death in Washington, before the expiration of his term was much lamented. Rufus K. Goodenow came to Paris in 1821 as first Clerk of the Supreme Judicial Court here, which office he held for sixteen years. He served one term in Congress. Charles Andrews removed from Dixfield to Paris in 1846. He died in 1852 while a member of Congress, a brilliant, young and able lawyer. Geo. F. Emery, a son of Judge Stephen Emery, studied with his father, and succeeded him. In 1876 he removed to Boston, to take general supervision of the Boston Post. Gen. Wm. K. Kimball was a brave military officer; he was County Attorney four years, and Clerk of Courts ten years.

Alvah Black removed to South Paris from Gorham about 1849. He was president of the Bar Association, and stood high in his profession. Benj. C. and Enoch L., sons of Simeon Cummings of this town, practiced law here and at Portland. James F. Rawson and Lyman Rawson, natives of Paris, became proficient in law; the former at Bangor, after leaving here.

Geo. A. Wilson, son of Rev. Adam Wilson, D. D., opened

an office at South Paris in 1865 and is the senior member of the bar at this village. He was appointed Judge of Probate in 1884, and has filled other county, and town offices. He has had for partners H. E. Swasey, Freeman T. Crommett, and Victor E. Greenleaf, each remaining but a year or so; and Walter L. Gray, his present partner, who came in 1899. For several years Mr. Gray was superintendent of schools.

James S. Wright removed to Paris Hill in 1873, having been elected Clerk of Courts. In 1883 he opened a law office here, but in 1891 removed to South Paris, where he is yet in practice. He was County Attorney several years. Alton C. Wheeler entered partnership with him in Sept., 1904. Clayton K. Brooks opened an office at the bank in 1901, remaining about two years.

At West Paris, Peter C. Fickett has been the resident and only member of the bar for over a quarter of a century. At North Paris, Chas. P. Benson has enjoyed the same distinction. Geo. M. Atwood, a resident of Paris Hill, is a member of the bar. Others who have practiced law in Paris are Herrick C. Davis, John Goodenow and Benj. W. Bryant.

Of the other men who were natives of this town, or have become identified with it during their careers we should mention Hon. Hannibal Hamlin, son of Dr. Cyrus Hamlin. He served as Governor of Maine, in both branches of Congress with distinction, and as vice-president of the United States during Abraham Lincoln's first term. Governor Sidney Perham, born in Woodstock, was the grandson of Lemuel Perham, Jr., one of the pioneers of Paris Hill. From Clerk of Courts, to which position he was elected in 1859,

he was chosen a member of Congress, and in 1871, was elected Governor of Maine and was twice reelected. Hon. Horatio King, born in Paris June 21, 1811, rose through successive public offices to Postmaster General, which office he held under President Buchanan. Hon. Hiram Hubbard, grandson of Gen. Levi Hubbard, was born in Paris in 1811. He served in both branches of the Legislature, and as County Treasurer, but is best known locally, as the original proprietor of the "Hubbard House," the famous hostlery at Paris Hill. Many other worthy names could be mentioned, but we are unable to include them.

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PARIS PHYSICIANS.

The first practicing physician in Paris was Dr. Isaac Barnard of Sutton, but he did not settle here. Dr. Cyprian Stevens was the first settled physician, coming about 1789. He married Sally Robinson of Paris and after his death, at the age of 38, Mrs. Stevens continued one branch of his profession. Dr. Ebenezer H. Goss removed to Paris about 1804, from Brunswick. Samuel P. Croswell was a young physician who made a short tarry here.

Dr. Cyrus Hamlin of Livermore, was appointed the first Clerk of Courts, in 1805, and removed to Paris the following year. He continued the practice of his profession until near the close of his life in 1829. He was the father of a distinguished family. Dr. Benj. Chandler moved from Hebron about 1811 and became a man of prominence and a popular physician. Other physicians who have settled in town for practice are Dr. Benaiah Hanson, Dr. Asaph Kittredge, who came to Paris Hill in 1815, Dr. Jub Holmes, (1826-34), Jas. M. Buck, Thos. H. Brown of Minot, practiced from 1837 to 1880 and filled many important offices of trust and influence, Dr. Leander S. Tripp, Dr. Gilman Rowe moved to North Paris in 1839, died 1841; Dr. Almon Twitchell of Bethel, Dr. Wm. Appleton Rust began practice at South Paris in 1847. He was appointed inspector of Internal Revenue for the State in 1864 and removed to Portland, two years later he entered a drug business in Boston and became a man of financial influence in that city.

Dr. Chas. Russell settled in West Paris in 1850, Dr. Edwin Green practiced in North Paris from 1865 to 1878, Dr. D. B. Sawyer came to South Paris in 1865, removed in 1875; Dr. Sewall H. Webber began practice at West Paris in 1865, removed to South Paris in 1867, died in 1873; Dr. Octavius K. Yates, the oldest practicing physician now in town, began in 1870 in West Paris where he yet remains. From that time to the present have been Drs. Isaac Rounds (came to South Paris, 1873), Dr. Buck, Francis H. Packard, (West Paris, 1879), Dr. Morse (Paris Hill), Horatio Woodbury (South Paris, 1902), and E. B. Clark and D. M. Stewart (South Paris, 1905). Drs. Yates, Packard, Littlefield, Wheeler, Clark and Stewart are now in practice. Dr. M. M. Houghton (Eclectic), resides at Paris Hill.

PARIS HILL.

Chosen for its magnificent situation and outlook, as well as its central location. Paris Hill became the seat of government for the new county, formed in 1805. The first of the county buildings to be erected was the old log jail, in 1810, replaced by the stone structure, now the Hamlin Memorial Library, in 1823. The court house was completed in 1815, prior to which time the courts were held in the old Baptist church. The building used so long for county offices was erected in 1826, the court house was enlarged in 1823. In 1848 the first attempt was made to remove the county seat, which, after repeated attempts and failures, was accomplished in 1893. Many elegant and historic mansions were erected by the men who located on the Hill during these years, and many of them are still standing, being occupied during the summer months by the numbers who come to this now famous resort.

After the removal of the courts, the old stone jail was conveyed to Dr. Augustus C. Hamlin of Bangor, son of Elijah Hamlin of this town, by the heirs of Jesse Cummings, who had conveyed the lands to the county so long as this should remain the county seat. The interior of the jail was remodeled, the huge stones forming the second floor, being removed, and it was tastefully fitted out as a public library, in 1902. There are now 1900 volumes and many valuable specimens from Mount Mica.

This noted mine, of which we should speak in this connection, is located about one mile east of Paris Hill. Here

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have been found some of the most valuable tourmalines ever mined, as well as many beautiful specimens of other gems. This is worked under the direction of Loren B. Merrill, whose work shop is located in the village. Here Mr. Merrill cuts and polishes all the gems brought from the mine, and this on machines of his own invention.

Paris Hill is provided with a perfect water system. The water which supplies the entire village, comes from springs situated on a hill nearly 200 feet above Paris Hill and about 2½ miles from the village. The system was installed four years ago by the Paris Hill Water Co. Analyzed by experts, this water has been pronounced the purest in the state.

SOUTH PARIS VILLAGE

South PARIS VILLAGE was incorporated as such Feb. 14. 1866. Its bounds were those of School District No. 2: the organization made for purposes of fire protection. The organization meeting was held March 6, when E. A. Wilson was chosen Clerk; Alva Shurtleff, Treasurer; and Gen. G.W. Cushman, Capt. H. N. Bolster and Stephen Richardson, Assessors; and Leonard Shurtleff, Collector. The privilege of choosing special police, providing for electric lighting and a water supply, were exercised later. The South Paris water system is connected with Norway, as also were the electric lights, furnished by the Norway Electric Light Co. for several years prior to Sept., 1903. The Village Corporation appropriates the sum of \$100 annually for the care of Moore Park, which is a charming park situated near the middle of the village, and containing a beautiful fountain and large monument, erected by the town to the soldiers and sailors of the Civil War. The town clock is also cared for by the Corporation. The Norway and Paris street railway operates a fraction over two miles of road, built between these two villages in 1896.

THE SOUTH PARIS SAVINGS BANK was organized March 6, 1873, with Alva Shurtleff, President; Geo. A. Wilson, Secretary and Treasurer; and eight Trustees: Geo. P. Whitney, Oxford; Wallace Ryerson, Sumner; Samuel B. Locke, West Paris; Col. Fred E. Shaw, Paris Hill; and Jas. A. Holmes, Wm. A. Frothingham, Wm. W. Hardy, and David N. True, of South Paris. The banking rooms were first located in

the building now occupied by Wilson & Gray as a law office. In 1900 a new brick block was erected by the Pythian Building Association, in Market Square, and the bank secured quarters and moved in, in November. This has been one of the most successful institutions of its kind in the State. It has enjoyed able management, and aims to treat all patrons liberally and courteously. The present officers are, N. Dayton Bolster, President; J. Hastings Bean, Vice President; Geo. M. Atwood, Secretary and Treasurer; and nine Trustees: N. D. Bolster, John F. Plummer, J. Hastings Bean, Wm. N. Thomas, Wm. J. Wheeler, Albert W. Walker, S. Porter Stearns, Geo. A. Wilson, and H. D. Hammond. The amount of deposits, Jan. 1, 1906, was \$335,696.72, from nearly 2,000 depositors.

This village became the home of the county seat in 1895, when it was decided to remove the Courts from Paris Hill. The elegant county buildings, situated opposite the railroad station, were erected the same season, and are today the pride of Oxford county.

PATRONS OF HUSBANDRY

PARIS GRANGE, No. 44, was organized Oct. 24, 1874, with about thirty-five charter members. Alexander H. Thayer was chosen first Master, and G. C. Pratt, Overseer. Mr. Pratt was next in the Master's chair, and has since been Overseer in the State Grange. Succeeding Masters

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have been Newell Thomas, O. G. Curtis, S. B. Maxim, Geo. F. Hammond, H. E. Chase, W. S. Starbird, Harry Farrar, H. D. Hammond, Chas. Edwards, Elbert H. Andrews, H. E. Tucker, W. E. Twitchell, Richard Gates, O. K. Clifford, and the present Master, Howard Swan. The Hersey plow shop was purchased and made into a fine, modern hall. Meetings are held weekly during the winter and bi-weekly in the summer. Geo. Boutelle is the Overseer for 1906, and Mrs. S. E. Jackson, Secretary.

WEST PARIS GRANGE, No. 298, was organized in Centennial Hall, March 15, 1888, with 27 members. A small hall was erected in 1890, for the use of the Grange. This was sold in 1903 when the present hall was bought by an association composed largely of Grangers. It was purchased for the Grange with the privilege of buying at the cost price, which they have since done. The Masters have been H. W. Childs, 1888; G. W. Berry, 1889; F. L. Wyman, 1890; H. W. Dunham, 1891; W. E. Curtis, 1892; Orra Bird, 1893; W. H. Lurvey, 1894-95; E. E. Field, 1896-97; A. E. Marshall, 1898; C. S. Marshall, 1899; E. F. Barrows, 1900; C. S. Dudley, 1901-02; E. E. Field, 1903-05; and F. L. Wyman, 1906. This Order now numbers 127 members. Meetings are held the second and fourth Saturdays of each month. A. J. Abbott is Overseer for 1906; Mrs. Addie Stone, Lecturer; W. E. Curtis, Treasurer; Mrs. M. F. Field, Secretary.
