In September of that year he became the head of the science department of Asheville High School. His fourth year in Asheville was interrupted by his enlistment in the wat. Eight months of the following two years were spent overseas. Demobilization sent him back to teaching and for seven years afterwards he was superintendent of the city schools of Lincolnton, N. C. In 1926 he came to China Grove. From that time to this he has served as superintendent of schools, high school principal, citizen and friend.
