They were Tommy Garst, the doting father of our character; Sarah Shaw, whom you can blame for the feature section; Suzanne Earnhardt and Betty Jo Hcdrick, who racked their brains over cut lines; Sophia Steffan, copy editor, who had her hands full of "scraps" and trouble; Bean Campbell, sports editor; Heywood Wahburn, engraving editor; Dick Davenport, who filled the offices of janitor, head rib-tickler, and associate editor; and last, Max Thurman, who is just learning the trade.

Two members of the staff to whom we owe much are Alton Ember, who is responsible for almost all the pictures which the Pemican con-

Riehard Crowder was named on the alleonference team with Bill Campbell and played in the first Shrine Bowl game whieh originated in High Point this year. Isom and Campbell were named the most valuable baek and linesman by the popular vote of the eommunity. At the football banquet Jim Allen and Kenneth Yarborough were named eo-eaptains of next year's team, while Bill Campbell reeeived the most valuable player award by virtue of the team's vote.

Continuing their winning ways, the Bisons ran up a string of victories over conference and out-of-the-loop focs, including Duke and Davidson J. V.'s and a highly rated Carolina freshman team. But came the slip and Greenville nosed out the local aggregation by onc point, so the High Pointers brought back the consolation trophy.
