

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

LOOKING BACK

It started with the spirit which led the city fathers in 1859 to allot \$20 for a log school house, and has continued until today, when High Point may point proudly to her crowning achievement in education \(\sigma \) a beautiful, \$750.000 senior high school building, opened in 1927.



school was not opened until September 20, 1897, we find that long before, the need for education had made itself felt. After that first log cabin came a succession of schools. These were out and out subscription schools, but in 1870, High Point could boast of a so-called "Free School." Where the "free"

part came in, we cannot tell, since this happened to be a \$20-a-month, three-month-a-year affair.

ALTHOUGH it had been felt in varying degrees in former years, the need for a public school really started the ball rolling in 1894. I. Elwood Cox, who had built a spacious home around that time on the site of the present post office, was willing to sell it to the city for use as a school. Upon this offer, an election was held on a \$10,000 bond issue. This split the city into two factions; those in favor and those opposed, not so much to the school, as to the city's buying Mr. Cox's "white elephant." Some even opposed the issue on the grounds that it was "communistic," since the government would be creating competition for the private schools in the vicinity. The measure was defeated.



opened with nine grades, a faculty of twelve, including the superintendent, Mr. George C. Crowell, and the principal, Mr. Cobb C. Lane, and an enrollment of 386. The first graduation took place in 1898 with a class of four, consisting of Miss Estelle Curley, Miss Pearl Idol, Miss The student Ada Mpers, and Mr. Albin S. Parker. days had somewhat the same curriculum as the present day scholar, with the exception of music and industrial arts. These departments were introduced later and have become outstanding in the past decade. Our school is said to have the best equipped shop in the state, while music, after its comeback following the depression, has become a credit subject as well as a Tooking back at the last fifty years, we credit to the community. 


WE DEDICATE








Our 15 "Wheels"







Climaxing the activities of the Honor Society each year is the eagerly anticipated Honor Society Service Award, which this year was given to Betty Jo Ring.








Y-Teens

Coaehes Tony Simcon and Carroll Bowen led their charges to a 7-0 victory in the opening game at Reidsville. End, Bill Hunsueker, eaught a pass from T. C. Isom after a drive to the two yard line, while highlighting the game was Bill Ellington's 70 yard punt from behind his own goal line.

In the second start, the local team outplayed a highly favored McCallie Prep from Chattanooga, Tennessee, but fell victim of the "sleeper end" play and had to settle with a 12-12 tie. The following week our team traveled to Durham, bringing back another tie, this one being a 6-6 count.



Burlington's powerful Bulldogs rolled over the Locals 25-6 to score the most decisive vietory of the year. A 55 yard pass from Bill Ellington to Charlie Jones netted the lone touchdown for the Pointers. The next two games were "heartbreakers," losing only by one touchdown to both Lexington and Salisbury.

In the peak performance of the season, the blue clad Pointers seored early and held Charlotte Central, eonference champion, to a 6-6 deadlock in the mud of Memorial Stadium. It was then that they lost the services of T. C. Isom, who suffered an ankle injury. Maintaining their pace, they came back to roll over Asheville 26-12 before a crowd of High Pointers.

Next came our arch-rivals, the Whirlies of Greensboro. The Bison jumped to a 14-0 lead early in the game, but fell vietim to the Whirlie's passing attack and wound up on the short end of a 21-14 score. The scason ended with a decisive 13-0 win over R. J. Reynolds of Winston-Salem.

Many of our players were honored during the season. Riehard Crowder was named on the alleonference team with Bill Campbell and played in the first Shrine Bowl game which originated in High Point this year. Isom and Campbell were named the most valuable back and linesman by the popular vote of the community. At the football banquet Jim Allen and Kenneth Yarborough were named co-captains of next year's team, while Bill Campbell received the most valuable player award by virtue of the team's vote.







The Black Bison, in having the most fruitful season of any local squad, tasted the bitterness of defeat only once in twenty-eight games and this came at the hands of a non-conference foe





at the Mid-South tournament in Greenville, S. C. However in this same tournament the Bison basketeers bounced back to wallop Wilson and bring back the consolation trophy.

Lcd by co-captains Richard Crowder and Billy Ray Hunsucker the local cagers started the season playing championship ball which continued throughout the hazardous schedule, indicating to those fans who knew the sport that this was High Point's year.










The sprinters and distance men proved their merit when, for the second time in as many years, they walked away with top honors in the Queen City Relays held in Charlotte.





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
