

In the curtain-raiser of the '51 campaign, the Black Bison rocked back and forth with an under-rated aggregation of Reidsville and had to settle for a 6-6 tie. O'Kelley's scoring tally from eleven yards out knotted the count and each team then fought on even terms throughout the rest of the ball game.

Opening Western Conference play with Gastonia, the Bison stopped the Green Wave 14-7, with Jarrett and Martin counting each for 6 points.

The Bison travelled to Durham for a non-conference fray with the Bulldogs and promptly chained them 13-7 on the strength of a well-balanced passing attack.

The Black Bison rolled to their third straight victory by solidly trouncing Burlington, 26-0. Jarrett, with two scores, and Harris and O'Kelley, with one each, led the local's efforts.

With O'Kelley, Harris, Jarrett, and Sorrell breaking into the scoring column, the Bison grounded out a 33-6 triumph over Edwards Military Institute.

The locals' next win came at the expense of the Salisbury Yellow Jackets, 19-13. Jarrett and O'Kelley ran for touchdowns while Sorrell gathered in a Jarrett pass.

Charlotte's fighting Wildcats stunned the Bison momentarily, pinning a 18-13 setback on their hands. Sonny Sorrell's 78 yard kickoff return and Harold O'Kelley's 89 yard dash accounted for our tallies.

Recovered from their upset by Charlotte, the Bison blasted the Asheville Maroons, 28-7. O'Kelley crossed

twice, Frye once, and Frye made a pass play to Sorrell which rounded out the scoring.

Guilford County honors were bestowed on the Bison when they white-washed the Whirlies, 13-0. O'Kelley slipped over for the first marker, and Frye tossed to Sorrell for the second as the Bison held a halfgame lead in the Western Conference.

The Black Bison captured Western Conference laurels by striking early and holding on to stave off the Reynold's Black Demons, 14-6. Jim Jarrett "bulled" over for the first score, and "Monk" Falls intercepted a pass and streaked 55 yards to paydirt for the backbreaker.

The Black Bison almost caused heart failure to friends and foes alike before being nosed out by the Wilmington Wildcats, 14-13, for the State Crown. O'Kelley counted on a pass from Frye, and Wood picked up a dislodged ball and galloped 30 odd yards. The extra point was missed and the locals settled for second best in the state.

At the close of the season, All-Conference awards were won by Harold O'Kelley and Jim Jarrett, backs; Sonny Sorrell, end; "Monk" Falls, center; and Tom Wood, tackle. Sonny Sorrell and Jim Jarrett were selected as "All-Staters." Sorrell and Wood participated in the Shrine Bowl at Charlotte, and Falls and Jarrett were H.P.H.S.'s Most Valuable Lineman and Back, respectively.







A determined Thomasville squad upset the locals, 47-36, as the pointers suffered on "off night." O'Kelley hit for 14 points to lead the offense. The Black Bison were nipped, 55-44, after a last quarter rally by the Davidson Junior Varsity Wildcats. O'Kelley potted 28 points to lead both teams.

Traveling to Charlotte, the Bison were downed by the Wildcats, 59-41. O'Kelley sunk 15 points to grab honors for the locals. The Bison scared the Wake Forest Baby Deacons before being nosed out, 49-46; and O'Kelley was again highman for the locals with 14 points.

Although Charlotte posted a 52-36 victory, the locals rebounded by punching Asheville, 63-52. Overcoming O'Kelley's 20 points, Salisbury claimed a 60-52 victory, closing out regular season play.






