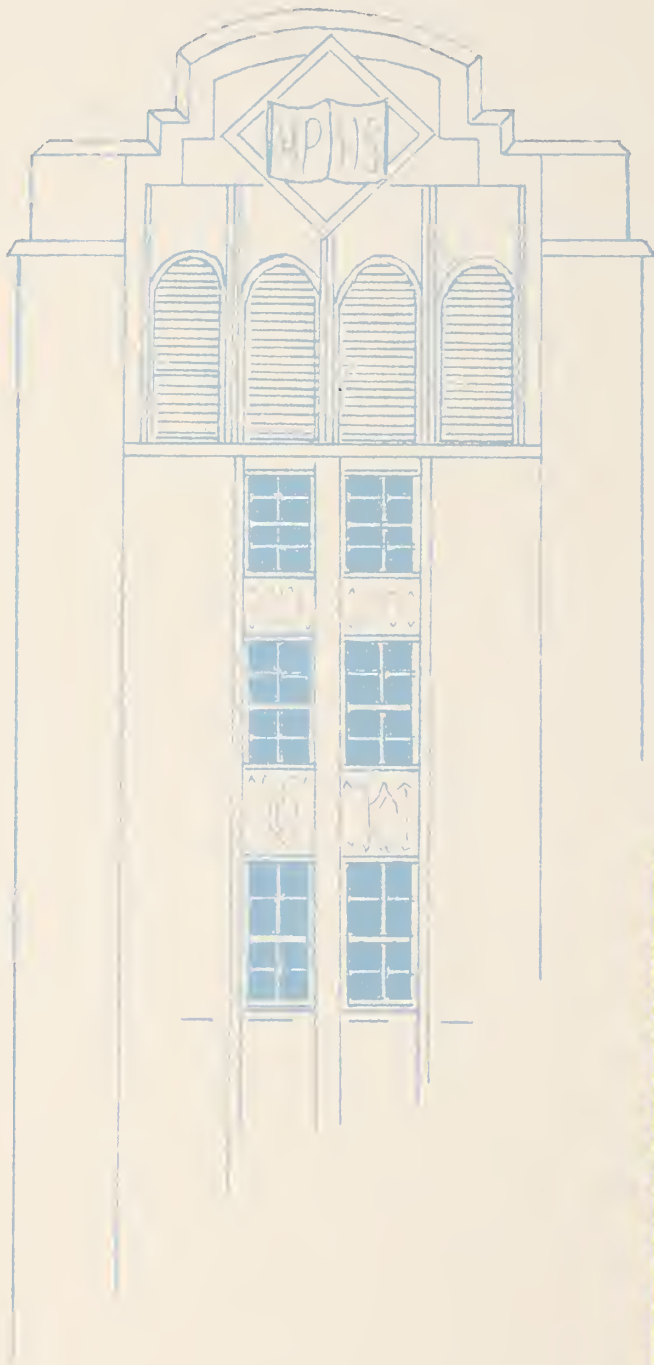

Mixed emotions accompany the tapping of a National Honor Society member. Here John Sherrill leads inductee, Neil Howell.

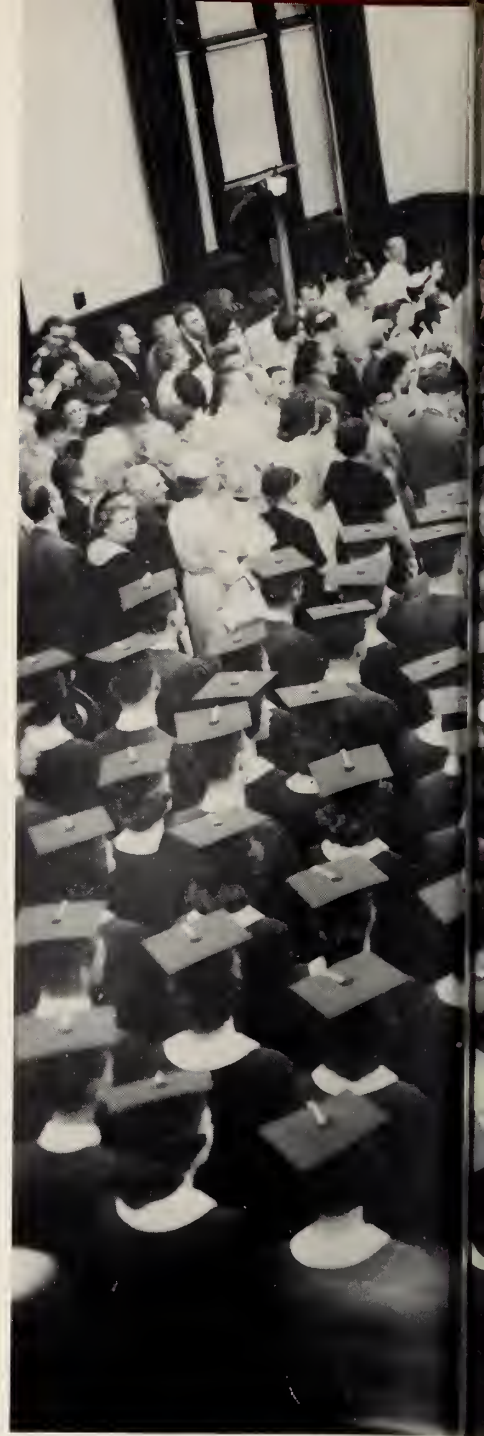

Working without notable publicity or recognition, the High Point City School Board from the conference room at the Administration Building on English Street planned and arranged the many matters coming before them each month.

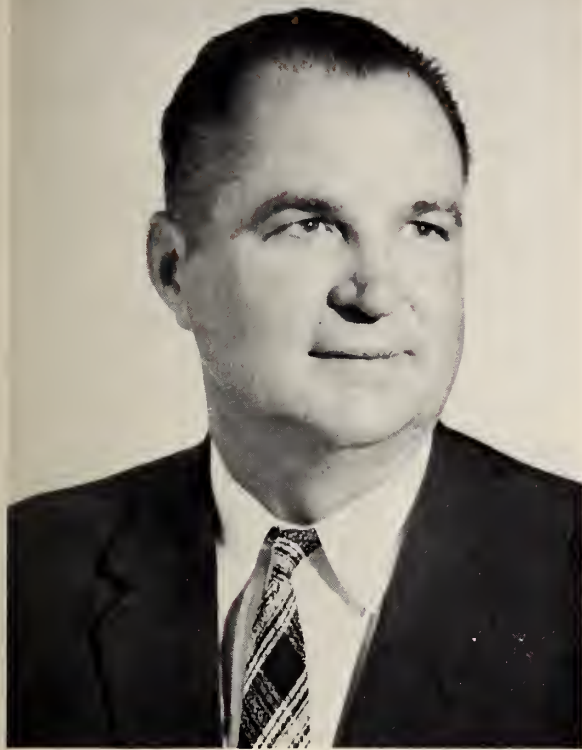

Dr. Dean B. Pruette and Mr. D. P. Whitley, administrative leaders of High Point High School have shown how guidance for problems, successful class work, and directed activity participation yield dividends.

As superintendent of city schools, Dr. Pruette made important decisions concerning High Point's educational system. He worked with the school board and various faculty members to make his decisions to the best advantage.

Mr. Whitley, whose school year began last spring with the registration of students, worked during the summer at arranging a schedule for sixty teachers and 1,700 students. Throughout 1958-59 his days were filled with the duties of advising and counseling to make High Point High School function smoothly.

Mr. Ralph H. Vance, dean of High Point High School, performed a variety of duties during the year. Miss Frances Haywood combined English teaching and counseling. She and Mr. Vance were official and unofficial counselors for every member of the student body.

Although Mr. Vance's primary duty was to issue a list of absences, tardies, check-outs, and truancies each day, practically every pupil depended on him for some added help or service. He was often found assisting Mr. Whitley on important occasions.

As counselor to students, Miss Haywood worked with the administration, teachers, and parents to insure a cooperative and well supervised school. She provided information and advice to inquiring freshmen and sophomores, and gave help to juniors and seniors in their choices of colleges and universities. In addition, she served as sponsor of the senior class.

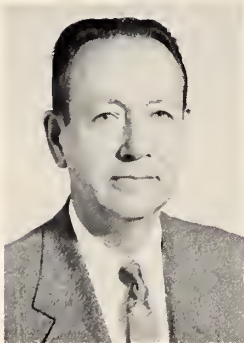

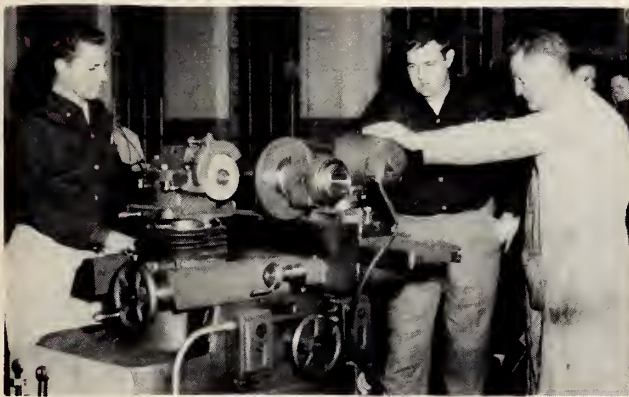

CURRICULUM...

Within each student is embedded a desire to be successful in his life's work. He may occasionally stray from his objective, but all the while he is absorbing the culture of past civilizations and profiting from their successes and failures. There is something in the study of romance languages, literature, grammar, history, and music that satisfies the craving for esthetic enjoyment. For students who have acquired the scientific mind, there is the study of mathematics,

science, and related fields. Those who seek practical skills gain many rewards in the study of home economics, industrial shop, business training, and physical education.

The curriculum is designed to meet the needs of individual students and to train them to be useful members of society. The students who plan to go to college and those who wish to go directly into business or industry find courses at H.P.H.S. to fit their individual needs.

Fourteen English teachers of H.P.H.S. impressed upon the minds of the students the importance of correct punctuation, sentence structure, and spelling. Themes, business and social letters, oral talks, and reading in literature helped to develop skill in clear thinking and effective communication.

Although Caesar's Gallic Wars did not ring a bell in some students' minds, it was of great significance to Latin students. Freshmen and sophomores learned of the customs and legends of the Roman people. A required project each semester supplemented the daily classwork and parallel reading.

Language Day and the State Spanish Examination in the spring challenged the efforts of second-year Spanish students to show their language enthusiasm and skill. First-year "Spaniards" enlivened their regular work with murals, scrapbooks, poster projects, and a "Spanish-style" Christmas party.

French "firsts" marked 1958-59 at High Point High. Sophomores studying French for the first time greatly increased French class enrollments. A long-awaited event was the acquisition of High Point's "twin" school, Lycee - Dupuy - de - Lome, Lorient, Franch, which spurred student correspondence.

College preparatory students struggled diligently through algebra and plane geometry, but only the most industrious tackled the mathematical unknowns of advanced algebra, solid geometry, and trigonometry. Students planning business careers enrolled in general and business mathematics courses.

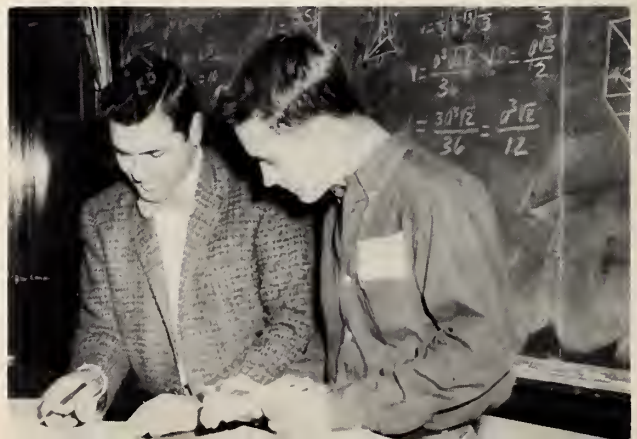

During the fall, sophomores showed their interest in biology by collecting specimen of leaves and insects. Later they dissected earthworms, frogs and fish.

Juniors and seniors turned their attention to chemistry and physics. Taking nothing for granted, they tested theories by experiment and observation. Radar, atomic energy, and the prospect of space travel were everyday topics of conversation. Many students contributed projects to the Science Fair. The interest shown was a clear indication that students realized the importance of science in daily living.

The orchestra room housed the 160 history students who gathered each morning to hear the televised lectures of Miss Lois Eddinger and Mr. Marcus Floyd, and afterward to discuss the main points of each lesson.

The regular classes in civics, history, geography, and problems in American democracy emphasized critical news summaries of newspaper editorials and television newscasts, map construction, and panel discussions led by the students themselves.

Student debates centered around current topics as well as past events. The publications, **Our Times** and **Everyweek**, provided up-to-the minute news for class reading and reports. Supplementary library reading and educational films added enrichment to the program.

This year the business education department at High Point High School offered courses in typewriting, bookkeeping, shorthand and office practice to approximately 600 students, many of whom were eager to make their mark in the business world.

In order to gain practical experience in secretarial work, several students worked on a part-time basis for business firms uptown and in offices of the elementary schools of the city. Other students served as instructors' assistants by cutting stencils and making mimeograph copies of tests and other instructional materials.

Working closely with the Future Business Leaders of America, the students strove hard to prepare for future efficiency in the business world.

The Home Economics department provided a home-away-from-home for the students enrolled in the Home Economics course. The curriculum included clothing care, food and nutrition, personality development, parent-child relationships, and housing.

The fashionable apartment on the first floor provided space for the very useful courses offered in these subjects. The girls gained new skills in cooking, sewing, care and repair of clothing, child development, and home management. Through the development of practical homemaking units, the students learned to solve both personal and homemaking problems. In addition, they learned to plan and work cooperatively and to get along with people of their own age.

A large number of students took advantage of the vocational training courses offered at HPHS during the past year. Such classes as **woodwork**, **metalwork**, **industrial arts**, and **mechanical drawing** were offered in the industrial field.

Activities in these various classes included the construction of **furniture**—small tables, cedar chests, and bedroom suites of cedar, oak, and walnut; **mechanical drawings**—detail drawings, blue prints, and house plans; and **metal articles**—ash trays, service trays, and lamp stands.

This year the shop students constructed the stage sets for the junior and senior class plays.

Students in the vocational classes achieved mechanical skill and at the same time prepared for future vocations.

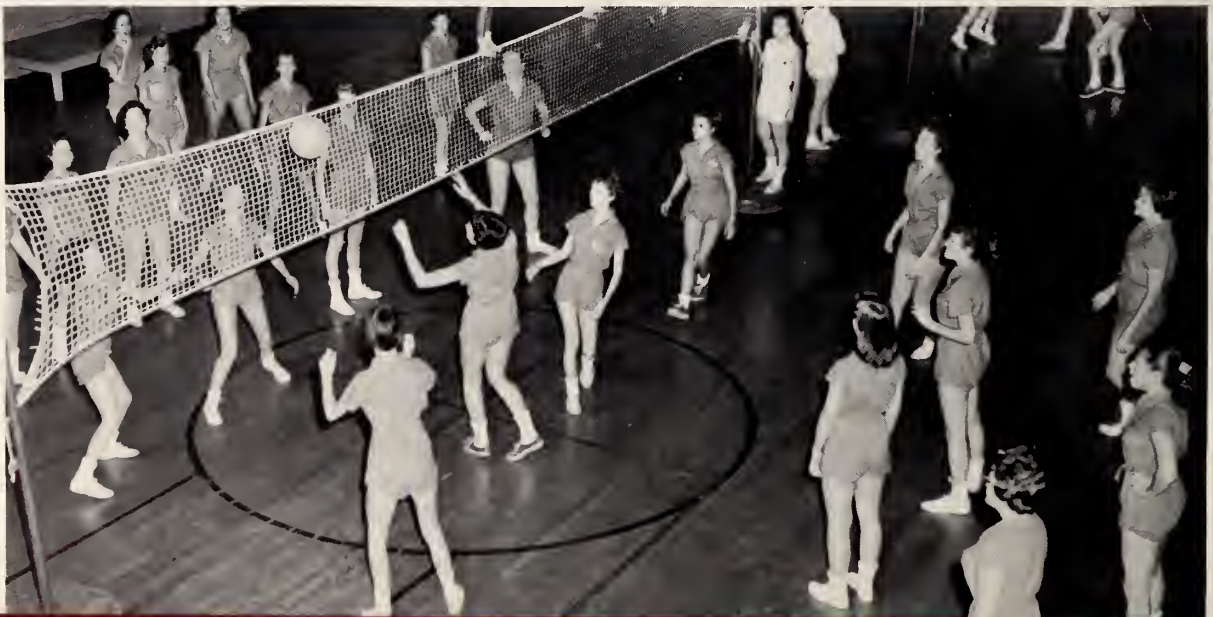
GIRLS AND BOYS BENEFITED GREATLY FROM THEIR

Early in January the freshmen were invited by the sophomores to co-operate in giving a sock hop. The two classes joined together both in the work and in the fun.

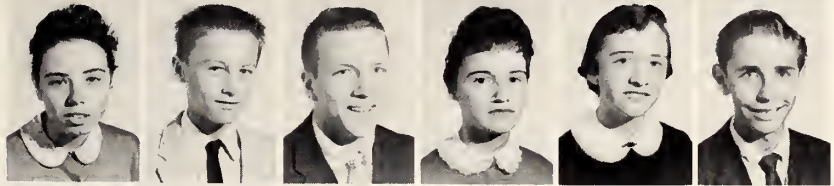

The 1958-59 Student Council of High Point High School reiterated its aims to establish and maintain a higher moral standard, to develop leadership and intelligent "fellowship," to insure a spirit of democracy, to promote a closer relationship between the faculty and the student body, to create a respect and ambition for higher scholastic attainments, and to encourage co-operation and participation of students in all activities. To carry out these ideals, the Council organized several projects for the year.

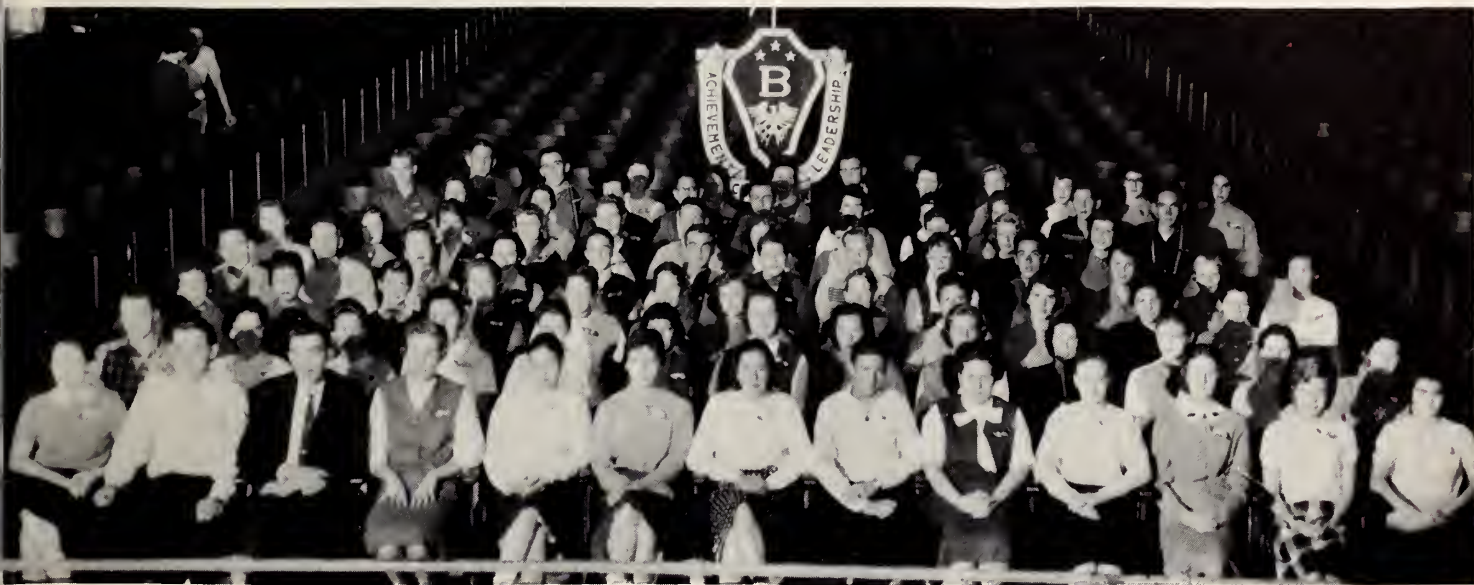

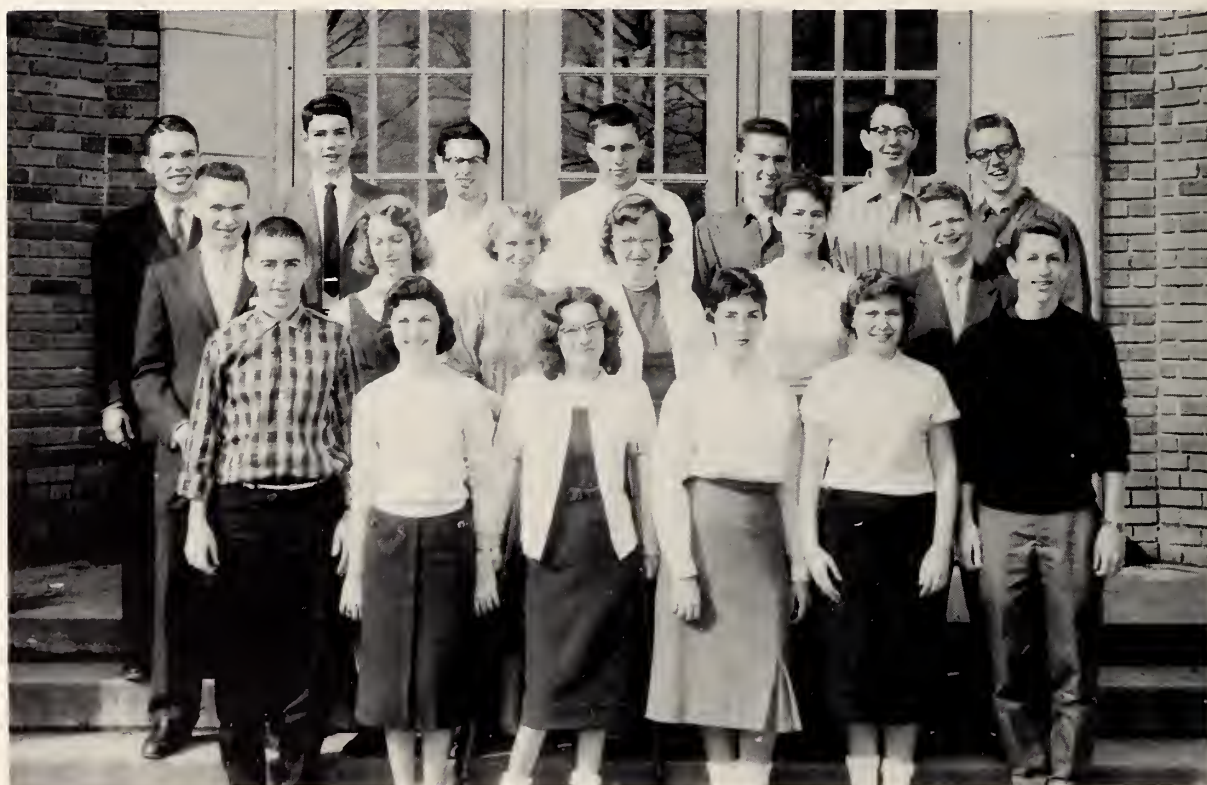

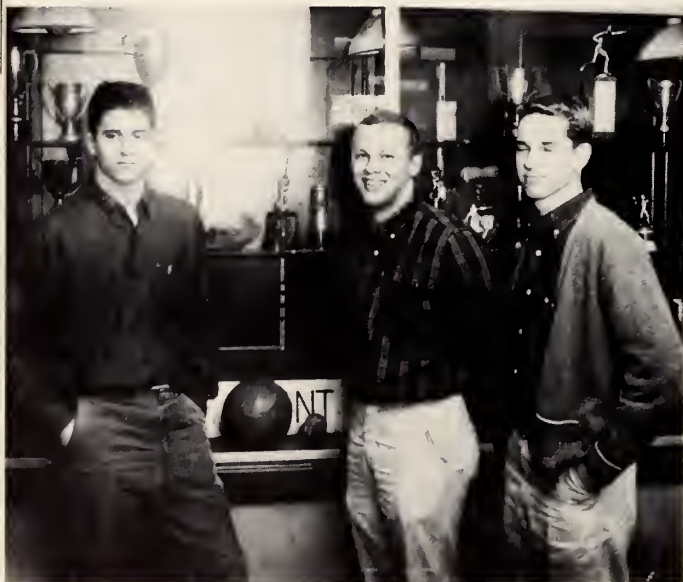

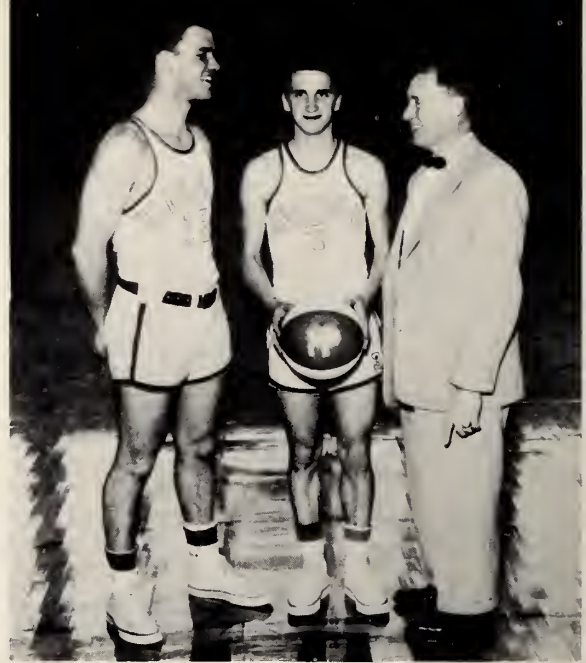

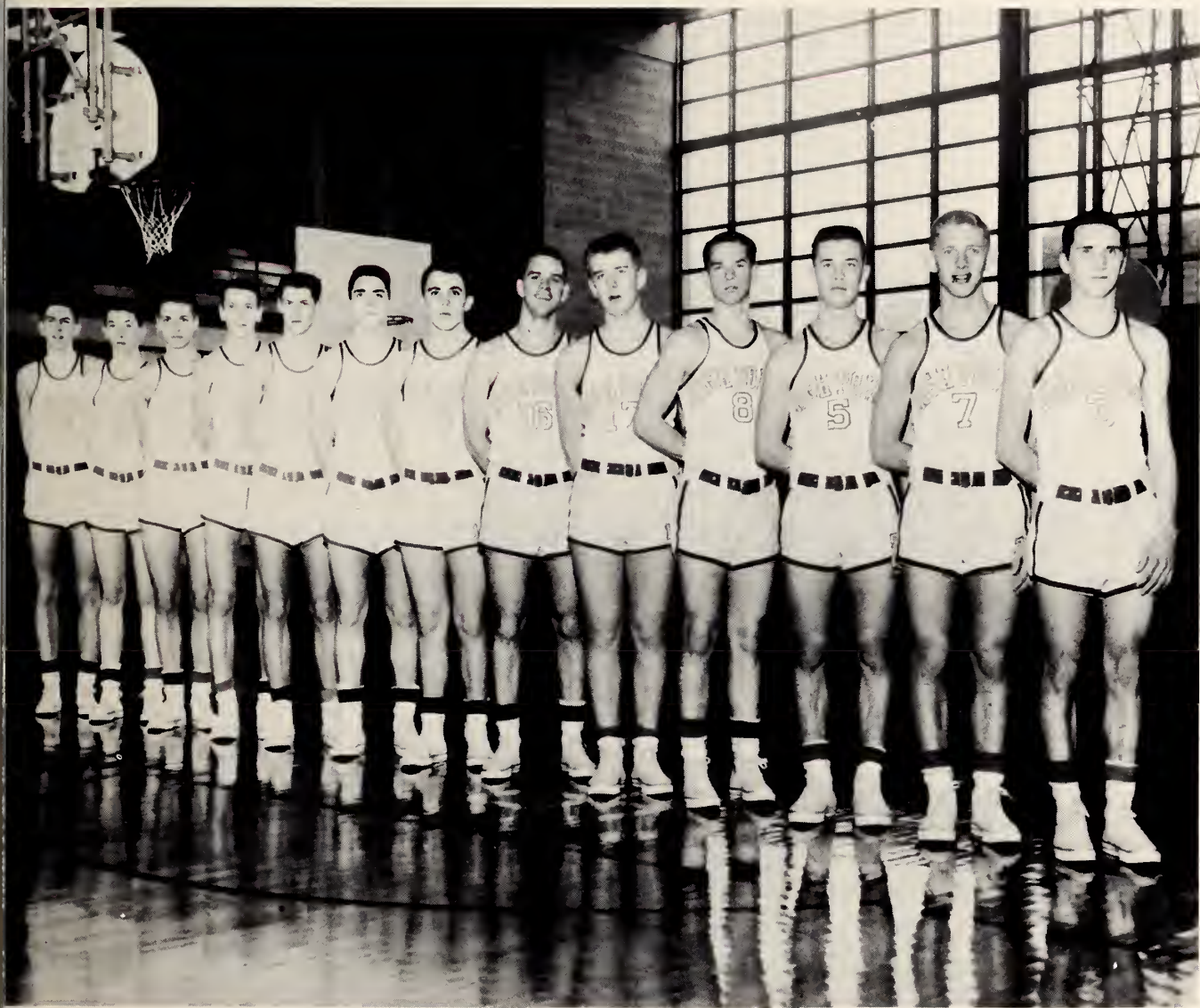

The Bison cagers relied on speed and ambition to make the 1959 season both colorful and successful. Starters for the squad were Tommy Burton and Charlie McPherson, co-captains, and Kendall Farlow, Richard Carmichael, and Lyman Dillon.

GREENSBORO: High Point, going into its first conference game with a 6-1 win-loss record, lost to Greensboro 63-51. Some 2,500 fans saw High Point befuddle the Whirlies in the second half by switching from the 1-3-1 zone to the press. Although High Point had a low 34.5 shooting mark from the floor, they had a 59.1 percentage from the free throw line and copped 28 rebounds. Burton led both teams in scoring by collecting 22 points.

REYNOLDS: By running a 2-3 zone, High Point jumped on the Black Demons and walloped them with a 61-35 score. Excellent defensive play allowed the Bison their first Conference win. High Point hit 44.6 per cent from the floor, with Carmichael and McPherson each collecting 13 points to lead both teams.

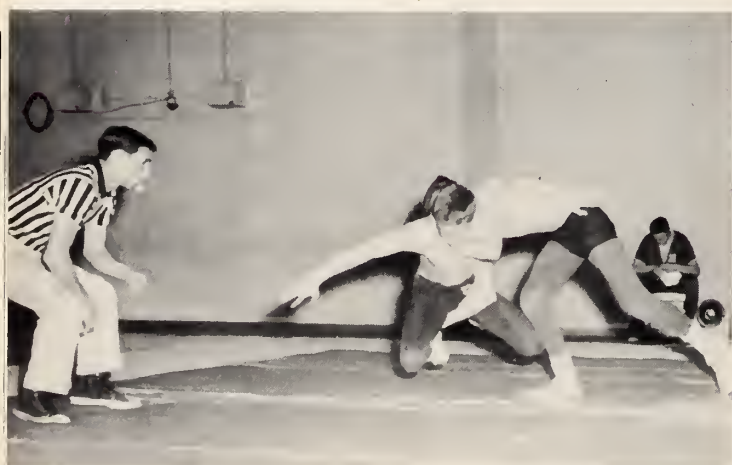

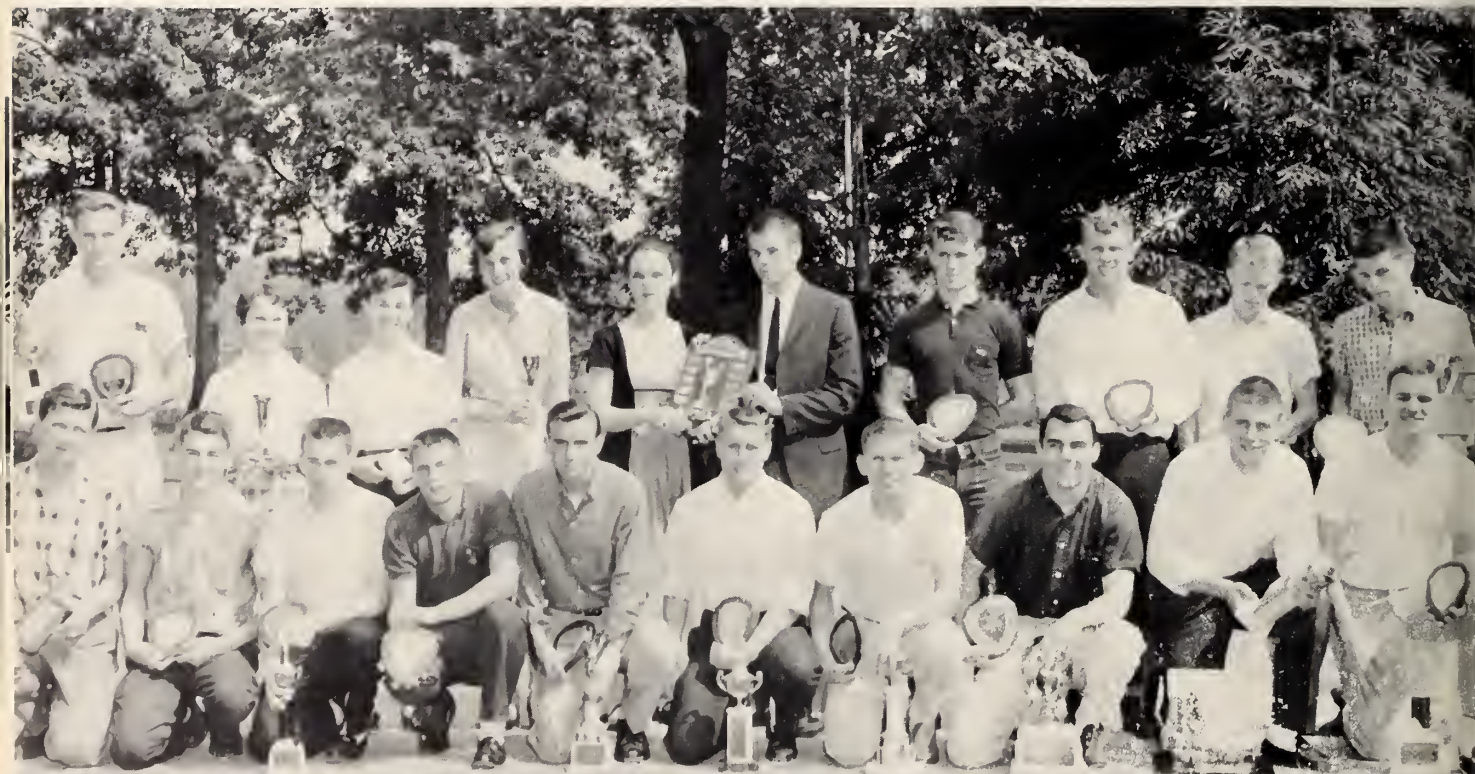
