Leadership of 1,400 students was no easy job, but it was handled expertly by the local administration officials and the high school faculty.

The members of the school board and the superintendent of city schools spent many hours drawing up school schedules and handling the administrative end of the local system.

The school principal, the dean, and the guidance director found themselves extremely busy giving advice and counsel to students.

Teachers expounded their collective knowledge to their pupils for five hours a day, and kept order in a study hall for another 60 minutes.

The faculty, often the least appreciated, is the most important element of any school composition.

## Office Secretaries perform tasks efficiently;

General Office secretaries, Mrs. Johnsie Jackson and Mrs. Doris Teague, were two of the best known personalities at High Point High. They were kept busy the yearround with records, telephone calls, and questions, but they were never too busy to offer a friendly "Hello" to everyone.

Mrs. Jackson supervised the bus drivers, wrote business letters, issued books, and handled the money affairs of the school.

Senior High's faculty comprised over fifty instructors, teaching almost as many different courses. From 8:15 a.m., check-in time, until $3: 30$ p.m., when the final bell rang, teachers were kept busy in the classroom. Most instructors taught five classes each day, and kept order in a study hall.

A teacher's day did not end at $3: 30$. Many faculty members sponsored extra curricular activities. All had papers to check, tests to make out, and grades to average. Each of
these tasks proved to be time-consuming, but devoted teachers did them willingly.

Many teachers participated in the activities of the Classroom Teachers Association and the North Carolina Education Association. A highlight of the year was Business-Industry-Education Day, when faculty members traded visits with local industries. This event was climaxed by a banquet, given by the Chamber of Commerce, in honor of teachers.

In the English classes, students strove to perfect their knowledge of spelling, punctuation, and vocabulary through a never-ending succession of themes, book reports, and term papers. While sophomores discovered the world of Silas Marner, juniors became familiar with American literature. Seniors, looking to college and the business world, found the term a mad rush to learn everything overlooked.

Although the Latin department lost many students of Roman culture with the transfer of first-year Latin to Junior High, the sophomores remained to study and idolize Caesar. Guided by Miss Hunter and stimulated by readings, films on Roman life, and special projects, students found that Latin is the key to understanding English.

Enthusiastic first-year Spanish students tackled challenging vocabularies anu translations, supplementing their studies with murals and scrapbooks. In addition to fol lowing their regular class work, the secondyear students learned songs, poetry, and traditions of the Spanish people.

First-year French students were introduced to the language in either the sophomore or junior year. They studied French grammar and translated stories, improving their accents by listening to French pronunciation records. In addition to studying the customs and geography of France, the sec-ond-year students made an original taperecording about High Point to send to the twin school, Lycee-Dupuy-de-Lome, Lorient, France.

Both the French and Spanish departments participated in the State Language Examination program; they also sent representatives to the Annual Language Day Celebration held at WCUNC. Lectures, plays, and a luncheon were highlights of the meeting.

What is an "undefinable term"? Do "gray cells" really hop? In taking advantage of the excellent mathematics and science courses offered at High Point High School, students sought answers to these questions.

The Science Department endeavored to stimulate thought, to develop the scientific attitude, and to encourage experimentation. It inspired students to seek careers in the lucrative field of scientific endeavor and to gain an understanding of the part that science plays in our modern world. Biology students learned through dissection; aspiring chemists launched themselves into laboratory experiments; and physics students found excellent opportunities for scientific advancement through their Science Fair projects.

Many students were attracted by informative courses in mathematics. Pupils preparing for college struggled through algebra and plane geometry. Others, aiming for careers in the field of computation, tackled the elective subjects of advanced algebra, trigonometry, and solid geometry. If the business world beckoned, classes in general and business mathematics were available.

The interest shown in all these courses was a clear indication that students realized the importance of mathematics and science in the modern world.

American history, world history, geography, and problems of American democracy were the social studies courses offered at Senior High during the 1959-60 term. Connected with these subjects were many purposeful activities: parallel reading, historical movies, oral reports, and trips to nearby historic places.

Class discussion topics included current affairs as well as past events. The news magazines "Our Times" and "Every Week" provided a background for understanding the major issues of today.

To give a knowledge of the past in order to give a better understanding of the present; to broaden the outlook of students; and to help the students make intelligent decisions later when the responsibilities of citizenship rest upon them-these were the purposes of the social studies courses.

The rhythmic click-clack of typewriter keys was one of the most familiar sounds to be heard as one approached the business education department on the second floor. Besides the popular typing classes, many students chose advanced courses in shorthand and bookkeeping.

From the courses offered at High Point High, students developed skills for personal use at home and at college and received training for future careers.

Many students practiced what they had learned by working as student secretaries at school and by assisting teachers in the preparation of instructional materials. Others took part-time jobs in downtown offices and in elementary schools.

## Football team shows high spirit and good

Playing under a new coach, Herb Hipps, the Black Bison ended the football season with a record of two wins and seven losses, yet they defeated two of the hottest teams in the conference.

The HP boys showed excellent sportsmanship at each contest and improved as the season progressed.

REIDSVILLE: The Bison started off the season by losing a thriller to the Reidsville Golden Lions. Trailing 12-0, the Bison came back in the second quarter to drive 60 yards, with Mabe going over for the TD. In the third period Marley scored with a 72-yard jaunt that deadlocked the ballgame. Reidsville retaliated in the last three minutes with a 57 -yard drive, scoring in the last twenty seconds of play to win 20-18.

WILMINGTON: The opening home game pitted the Bison against the Wilmington team. By the fourth period the Wildcats led 19-0, but with nine minutes on the clock, the Bison came to life. After the High Pointers picked up a first down, Dillon hit Marley with a 21 -yard pass. The play set up the touch-
down, with Dillon sneaking over from the two. In the last six minutes of play, Dillon hit End Ritchie with a 48 -yard TD pass. Black kicked the extra point. Again the Bison took over on downs; and as time ran out, Mabe fought to the one.

DURHAM: Although the Bison played a hard-hitting game against Durham, nothing seemed to go right for them. The only bright spot was an 86 -yard kick-off return by Fuller for the only Bison score. Black kicked the extra point, and the Bison led 7-6. But Durham scored again in the second period to win the game 19-7.

GREENSBORO: The second home game of the season placed the Bison against their arch rival, Greensboro. It was the fourth loss of the season for the Bison who tallied their lone touchdown in the final period. With four minutes left in the game, Tackle Davis recovered a Whirlie fumble on their thirty. The Bison moved to a first down on the nineteen, ran three times for five yards, and then Dillon hit Ritchie in the end zone with a TD pass. The extra point attempt was blocked, and Greensboro took the game 27-6.
